Shapiro Stops Welfare Help, No Money Left

HARTFORD (AP) — State Welfare Commissioner Bernard Shapiro has stopped payment of benefits in the Aid to Dependent Children and the Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled programs because both are out of money.

The commissioner said he has "assurances the legislature will pass a \$1.9 million deficiency appropriation Tuesday or Wednesday" which he said will enable his department to resume payments in the two programs.

In the interim, he said, he has asked local welfare departments to make payments to state welfare recipients where there are emergencies. The local welfare department will be fully reimbursed, he said.

Rep. Allan C. Innes, R — Thomaston, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, immediately charged Shapiro with "playing politics as usual with the state's needy under the guise that he is being shortchanged by the legislature."

Innes said the House Appropriations Committee informed State Finance Commissioner George J. Conkling last Thursday that Shapiro's department was to get \$8.8 million in a deficiency bill that will be presented to the legislature tomorrow.

Also, Innes said, if there was the emergency Shapiro "now pretends to face" he could have used the open end provision in the budget that he has used in the past.

India, Pakistan Guns Are Quiet, Wait for Rains

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — An unofficial cease-fire prevailed in the Rann of Kutch today, but India and Pakistan had more than 100,000 troops stretched along their frontiers.

No formal truce has been announced. It appeared, however, that both sides were content to let the guns remain silent until monsoon rains flood the barren desert a couple of weeks from now, making further fighting impossible.

Troop concentrations were reported along other frontiers, especially close to the large population centers of Calcutta and Lahore. There was fear that some minor incident would touch off a major clash.

Calcutta, with 7 million inhabitants, the largest city on the subcontinent, is less than 50 miles from the East Pakistan frontier. Lahore, with a population of nearly 600,000 Pakistanis, is less than 50 miles from the frontier between West Pakistan and India.

India and Pakistan have been hostile neighbors since gaining

U.S. Paratroopers Arrive in Saigon

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—The advance unit for 2,500 American paratroopers arrived in Saigon today. The balance of the three airborne battalions was expected within a few days.

The paratroopers are the first U.S. Army combat ground unit assigned to South Viet Nam. U.S. officials said they would "increase security at key installations and press the war more effectively."

Sixty men were in the advance unit. U.S. officials declined to say when the main force would arrive. But they said they would be stationed at Bien Hoa, a big air base 12 miles northeast of Saigon, and Vung Tay, a coastal city 40 miles southeast of Saigon.

The new arrivals comprise most of the 173rd Airborne Brigade stationed on Okinawa.

U.S. officials said the airborne contingent would bring the total U.S. strength in South Viet Nam to around 38,000 men. There already are 3,500 U.S. combat Marines in South Viet Nam.

Commanded by Brig. Gen. Ellis W. Williamson, the airborne contingent includes two infantry battalions, one artillery battalion and the equivalent of one battalion of various support units.

Stationed in defensive roles, a U.S. spokesman said, the American paratroopers "will free Vietnamese combat troops for offensive operations."

U.S. officials announced that three new Army helicopter companies of 260 men and 25 helicopters arrived over the weekend. There are now 12 Army helicopter companies in Viet Nam, two Marine squadrons and several Vietnamese squadrons.

After being idled Saturday by unfavorable weather, U.S. jets resumed air strikes Sunday against Communist North Viet Nam.

U.S. Navy jets blasted a railroad siding and three boxcars 100 miles south of Hanoi.

Court Backs Right to Ban Cuban Travel

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court ruled today the secretary of state has the constitutional power to bar American citizens from traveling to Cuba.

Chief Justice Earl Warren delivered the 6-3 decision. There were three separate dissents.

The court ruled for the majority: "The questions for decision are whether the secretary of state is statutorily authorized to refuse to validate the passports of U.S. citizens for travel to Cuba, and, if he is, whether the exercise of that authority is constitutionally permissible."

"We answer both questions in the affirmative."

The court ruled on an appeal by Louis Zemel, a Middlefield, Conn., ski resort operator. He wanted to go to Cuba, he said, to become a better informed citizen.

The State Department refused permission for the trip under a travel ban imposed in January 1961. Zemel sued, but a special U.S. District Court in New Haven ruled against him in a 3-1 vote.

One of the three dissenters today, Justice William O. Douglas, quoted the late Pope John XXIII to the effect that to know Communism one must mingle with them.

Douglas said he agrees there are areas to which Congress can restrict or ban travel.

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP)—The United States began rushing another 4,500 troops to the Dominican Republic today after President Johnson said the rebel uprising had been taken over by Communist conspirators directed from abroad.

U. N. Delays Debate Over Role of U. S.

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — With the consent of the Soviet Union, the U.N. Security Council today delayed debate until this afternoon on the presence of U.S. military forces in the Dominican Republic.

Soviet Ambassador Nikolai T. Fedorenko agreed to the delay as the 11-nation council convened after a weekend of maneuvering on a Soviet request for urgent discussion of the Dominican problem.

This morning's council meeting was originally called to hear further speakers on the political situation in Southern Rhodesia. Fedorenko said he had no objection to continuation of the Southern Rhodesian debate and putting the Dominican issue off until an afternoon session at 2 p.m.

Soviet sources said Fedorenko was prepared to submit a resolution demanding action on Soviet charges of illegal U.S. intervention in the affairs of the Dominican Republic.

No details of the resolution were available but it was expected to call for the withdrawal of U.S. forces, and possibly to

The embassy in San Salvador advised the State Department that the earthquake, described as severe, struck about 4:05 a.m.

The embassy said that there were some fatalities reported in villages near the capital.

There were no known injuries to U.S. citizens. Some buildings in the capital were described in the initial report as having suffered minor damage.

Subsequently, the State Department was informed of information reaching the Salvadorian Embassy here that the villages of Santo Tomas and San Marcos had been hit by the shock.

Injuries were reported in those villages together with damage to buildings but the Salvadorian Embassy report did not speak of fatalities.

Manuel Monferron, first secretary said the embassy had received a report from the operator of a private radio station in San Salvador that the damage was not severe.

The report said that some

houses were destroyed in the Santo Tomas and San Marcos suburbs of San Salvador but there were no deaths.

Patients Bring Sneezes

Veterinarian Allergic But Will Stick to Job

MIDDLETOWN, N.J. (AP) — When business booms, Dr. Cecil Sprung wheezes and sneezes, his eyes water, his nose gets clogged and he has difficulty breathing.

Dr. Sprung is a veterinarian who is allergic to cats and dogs. Still, he's sticking to his job.

The doctor's allergy came to his attention three years ago

when he brought a kitten home from his office as a pet.

"Then my eyes started tearing, my nasal passages started swelling and my lungs became congested. I was really puzzled," he recalled.

The 33-year-old veterinarian went to an allergist who informed him he was allergic to cats. Worse yet, a few months later he learned he was allergic to dogs too.

Dr. Sprung's physician explained that his symptoms became noticeable only because he was in 24-hour contact with cats—at his veterinary hospital and at home.

The young doctor thought riding himself of his pet kitten would solve the problem, but it didn't. "When I learned I was allergic to dogs, too, I thought about quitting the profession and going into another line of work," he said. "But I just made up my mind to stick it out and stay where I was."

"A busy day usually has me sneezing up a storm because I'm in constant contact with the animals," he said, "but a couple of pills takes care of it for quite some time so I can go about my work untroubled."

Dr. Sprung puts in an average of 12 hours a day in his veterinary practice which he started here six years ago.

River Going Up Again But Record Days End

CHICAGO (AP)—The Mississippi River, still gorged with its record flood burden, rose again today in the Hannibal, Mo., and Quincy, Ill., section but its record-breaking days were over.

The river, from Hannibal north to Minnesota, broke all high water mark records during

its month-long rampage, took 14 lives, and caused upward of \$100 million damage.

To the south, with more room to spread out, it is not expected to cause major problems. The river is not expected to come within four feet of flood stage at St. Louis, and will only approach flood level at Chester and Cairo, Ill., the Weather Bureau said.

There was still major strain on the levees upstream where patrols kept watch, and sandbags were placed to reinforce weak spots.

The American Red Cross still provided shelter for 791 persons along the river, and said it was feeding 5,000 — mostly levee workers.





