









Hitler's Germany—Part 2

Chance Came Quickly For New 'Third Reich'

BERLIN (AP)—Shortly after he gained power in 1933, Adolf Hitler and his fellow Nazis began looking for an excuse that would give them an unfettered hand in shaping the destinies of Germany and eventually the world. Today Germany belongs to Hitler. They found their chance for complete power over Germany in less than a month. On Feb. 27, the Reichstag building in Berlin, the Reichstag, burned down. Historians still argue whether Communists or some of Hitler's close followers planned the blaze. Hitler blamed it on the Reds and demanded absolute power to fight socialist unrest. Parliament passed a law giving all his powers to Hitler personally. With no more parliamentary restrictions, the Nazis announced a national boycott of Jewish shops, excluded Jews from public office, journalism, farming and the theater. Anti-Semitic signs—"Jews enter this town at their own risk"—popped up all over Germany and the first Nazi concentration camp was opened in Dachau near Munich. The Nuremberg laws finally deprived Jews of German citizenship, forbade marriage between Jews and gentiles, and even prohibited mixed marriages under 21. The road was prepared that eventually led to the gas chambers of Auschwitz.

of his birth, Austria, to start a series of bombings and violent demonstrations to weaken the government of Chancellor Kurt von Schuschnigg. By 1938, the groundwork had been so well-prepared that the German army marched into Austria without firing a shot and without fear of foreign countermeasures. When he arrived in Vienna, thousands of Austrians lined up to greet him with shouts of "Heil Hitler!" He told them that Austria was just the beginning. He said he intended to achieve the union of all Germans in a greater Germany and mentioned specifically the Sudetenland in Czechoslovakia with its three million Germans. With the help of Mussolini, Hitler threatened war and frightened British and French leaders into supporting his annexation of the Sudetenland. His surrender came at a four-part summit conference in Munich. The Czechs were not allowed to take part. On his return to London from Munich, Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain said he had brought back "peace with honor" and expressed his conviction that there would be "peace in our time." There was peace for a while—even though German troops marched into Prague the following year, on trumped-up grounds of maintaining peace and order. The Western Allies failed to come to the aid of the country they had formed on the basis of President Woodrow Wilson's 14 points after World War I. Hitler's bold successes won him ever more popularity and respect at home. Even those who did not agree entirely with his views had to give him a measure of grudging respect for the skill of his bluffing game. His successes also whetted Hitler's own appetite and raised his self-confidence. He saw no chance for error, no shadow of defeat on his path toward war.

### Hal Boyle Night Work Comes Soon For Marines

DA NANG, South Viet Nam (AP) — The Marines are friendly at the front. Maj. Mark Moore is known as the hospitable host of Backbreak Hotel.

"Welcome to your home away from home," he said at the entrance of his command tent at the base of Hill 312 where U.S. Marines have turned out their perimeter guard of the vast Da Nang air base.

"All the conveniences you'd want including hot and cold running water," he pointed at a bag hung from some posts, and a couple of double electric bars.

Moore, 36, is a lanky 6-foot, 4-inch officer with long-colored hair and blue eyes that crinkle easily into laughter. He is seeing his first battle action since serving 18 months as an aerial observer during the Korean campaign. He comes from Duluth, Minn., but his wife and four children now are staying in Cleveland, Calif.

An operations officer of the 2nd Battalion of the 3rd Marine Regiment, Moore has been with the first patrol to push out from the key airbase. It is from here that several types of planes strike at military targets in North Viet Nam.

So far, the Marine patrols have been conducted in hot and sticky daylight hours. But the enemy is likely to have its sleep disturbed in the future. "We like to work at night," said the major. "That's when the Viet Cong thinks he really owns the territory — and we want to show him that he doesn't."

"We don't want to be channelled," Moore said. "We want to be completely unpredictable."

As Moore spoke, Marines under orders to protect them from the sultry sun were doing, reading, or mechanically cleaning their guns. They were as relaxed as if they were in a training area.

The command post was situated in thick shade-high scrub in which bloomed bright yellow and purple flowers.

A few feet to one side of the tent was an open bunker banked with sandbags — just in case the enemy might hurt a mortar barrage. In the valley below them the ancient work of Asia went on unchanged as it had for centuries — with black-drummers, barefoot men and women and stolid buffalo tilling the fields.

Moore makes no attempt to belittle the fighting quality of the enemy.

"They like to pull surprise, and so do we. We hope to keep them off balance," he said.

"Until now we've really been on what amounts to a ground orientation program. We've just been running search parties. The enemy knows what we are doing. They know our movements by beating drums, flashing mirrors from the hillside and by blowing whistles."

"We've had no trouble cooperating with the Vietnamese troops. We take some of them along on our patrols, and if we take prisoners let them do the talking to them."

The Marines have been well indoctrinated into the fact that this is as much a political as a military war. The patrols take along gifts of candy and school textbooks to distribute to friendly villagers.

"This is a whole new challenging role for us with a lot of challenging overtones," said Moore soberly. "We've always considered ourselves a shock outfit. But this is not just a frontal assault as in World War II."

"For the Marines, merely to land and seize a position is no longer the answer. There's a new perspective to this warfare. It's a long-range problem, not an overnight deal. We may be here for years."

### 'College' Limit Struck Out Of Nike Site Fee Motion

A \$400 appropriation item, the smallest on the board of directors agenda last night, produced the most discussion and resulted in the passage of an amendment to the original proposal. It concerned payment of an appraisal fee to the federal government for the Keesey St. Nike Site, acquired by the town at no cost, under an educational use application.

The dispute arose over the wording of the appropriation, proposed to be made to the "Community College."

Director Martin Taylor moved to strike out the words "Community College" and to substitute "Board of Education" instead.

Taylor maintained, and was backed up by General Manager Richard Martin, that the application, when submitted, specifies "for educational use," and that it would set a wrong precedent to pinpoint the site for "Community College use only."

His motion to amend was passed and the motion to appropriate \$400 to the board of education also passed.

Other appropriations voted were —

1. A sum of \$36,958 to the Community College for the purchase of business training equipment to be repaid by the General Fund during July by the 100-per-cent refund grant from the Federal Government.
2. A sum of \$7,500 to the Town's Counsel's Settlement Claims Account, to replace depleted funds.
3. A sum of \$4,000 to the Special Downtown Parking District

### Rockville-Vernon Selectmen Create Sewer Commission

Vernon selectmen have agreed to create a sewer commission to consider the needs of the rural area of the town.

The action was taken last night at their regular meeting. Selectmen rejected a proposal to create a Sewer Authority, and selected the commission, which would serve as an advisory board to the town's government.

Because selectmen have just 30 days left to serve before the consolidated government takes over administration of the town, selectmen decided that the town's new legislative body, Representatives, should select the members of the sewer commission.

Selectman Robert W. Denning, also a member of the board, was assigned the task of informing the board that it would select members to the sewer commission.

The action follows the submission of a report on town-wide sewers by A. Richard Lombardi, an engineer with the Hartford engineering firm of Anderson Nichols.

The firm recently completed a sewer study financed by federal funds, which would be an autonomous body without any control by the town, was rejected several months ago at a town meeting, which discussed the proposal. Arguments against an authority was that it would have too much power.

The sewer commission, approved last night, would serve as an advisory council to the town.

The Board of Representatives was given the privilege of selecting members to the commission, since selectmen felt that the board would have to work with them.

First consideration expected by the board is the route of a sewer line to the new junior high school, now being constructed on West Rd. at St. 30.

Initial plans call for the line to travel down West Rd. to South St., where it will hook into the city's sewer main. Cost of the project is estimated at \$70,000.

Another route, suggested as an alternative by Lombardi, would have the line go down Peterson Rd., Center Rd. and along Rt. 83. Estimate cost is \$220,000.

Lombardi noted that the West route provides only sewerage for the school. The other route will permit adjacent homes to tie in to the sewer line. Fees and assessments would help pay for the line, Lombardi said. He noted that there are two housing developments in the area.

Lombardi noted that construction of the line will take eight or nine months, and suggested that contracts be let in the fall, so that the line will be completed for the opening of the school in September, 1966.

First selectmen Samuel Pearl noted that the town would get back about \$60,000 in assessments if the sewer line ran through the Center Rd. route. He added that commercial oc-

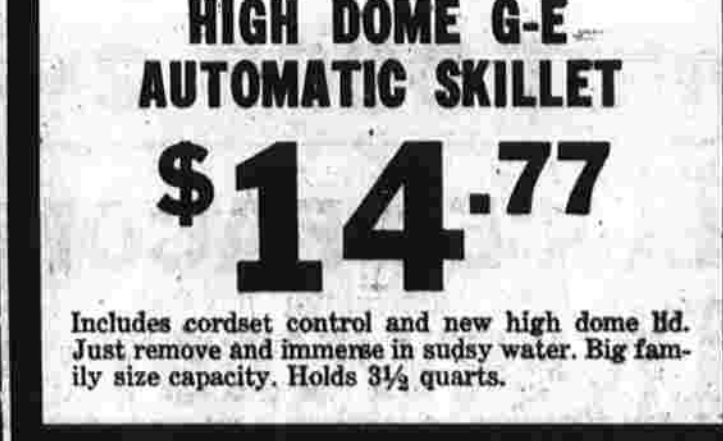

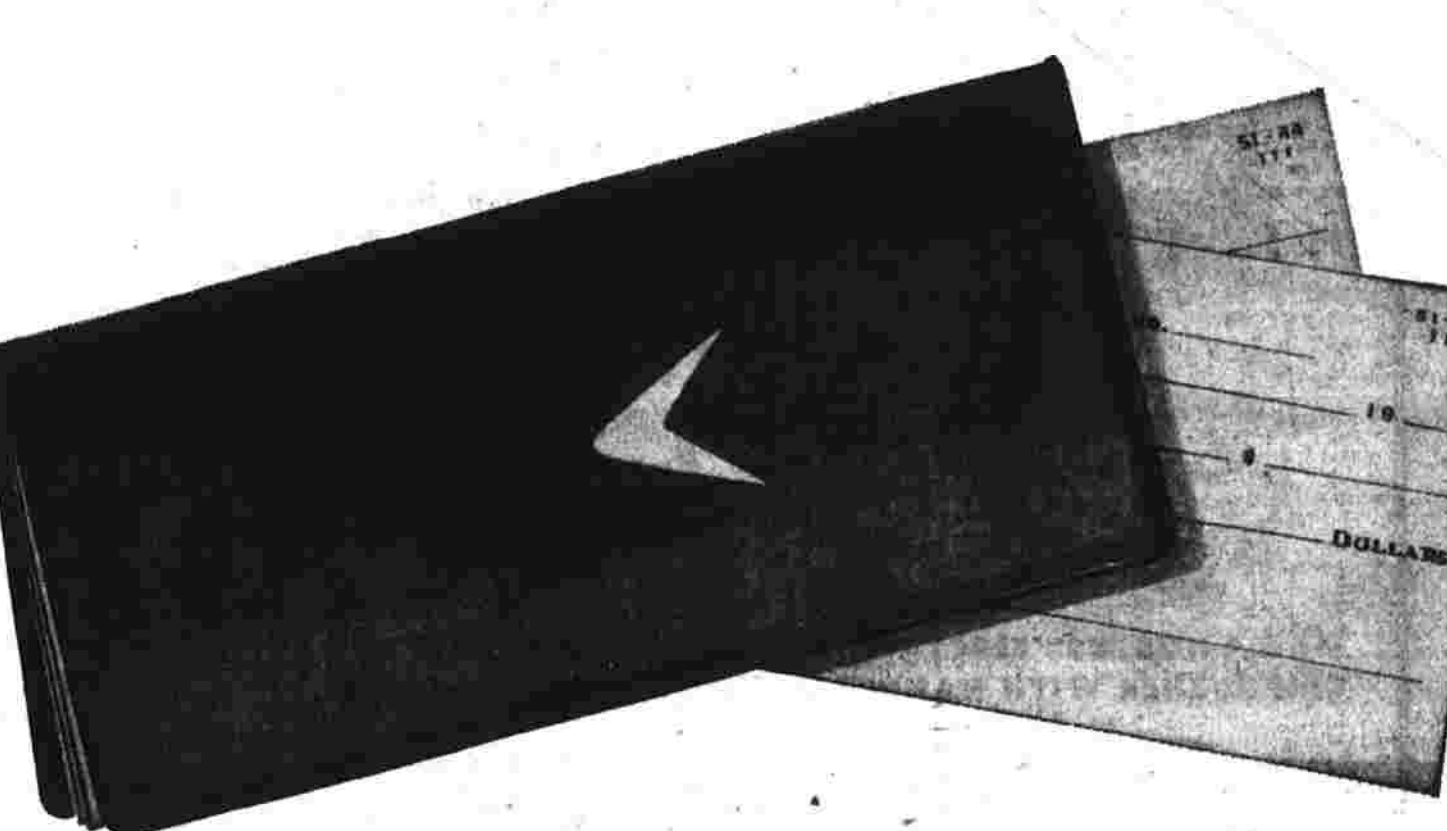

Board Tables Vote On Firehouse Site

The board of directors last night tabled until its June 1 meeting a vote on appropriating \$45,000 for purchase of a firehouse site at E. Center and Woodbridge Sts., pending a review of other available property in the area.

The action to table was led by Republican Directors Harold A. Turkington and Harlan Taylor, backed up by arguments from Franklin Parker of Academy St. and Wilbur Bennett of 96 Moore St.

Porter, who died last October at the age of 72, was such a prolific songwriter that he often wrote two or three songs for the same stage situation.

Most of the unpublished songs were written for Porter's Broadway musicals but were never used. Some were for a motion picture that was not made.

Dr. Albert Sirmay, chief editor of Chappell & Co. music publishers, disclosed Tuesday night that he made the discoveries while looking into Porter's inventory of music material at the late composer's Waldorf Towers apartment last December, January and February.

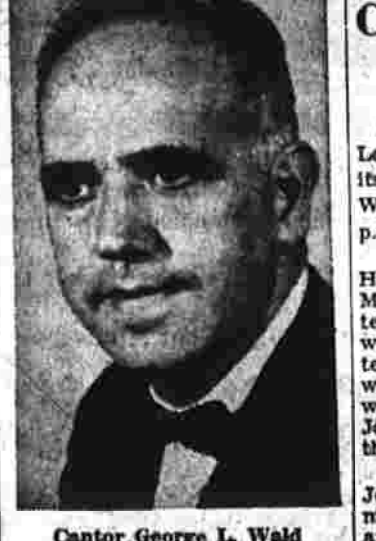
