### Important Cong Anniversaries May Trigger Spectacular Feats

Two important anniversaries this month may tempt the Viet Cong Communists to attempt some sort of spectacular feat in South Viet Nam as a means of commemorating the date.

### California Breeding The Actor-Politician

**SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)**—If there would be "no bloody primary fight," Democratic Gov. Edmund G. Brown, victor over two California Republicans giants in past campaigns, is edging toward a possible 1968 battle against a new breed of actor-politician.

Reagan's backers — who proudly wear the conservative label — see a threat on the example of his fellow Republican, George Murphy, the state's new junior U.S. senator.

Former actor Murphy readily admits his film exposure gave an early push to his 1964 campaign. It ended with a win over Pierre Salinger, press secretary to President Kennedy, and Johnson.

At a recent meeting of the Volunteer California Republican Assembly, Reagan told reporters he is ready to run — he

is the second more important 75th birthday of Ho Chi Minh on May 19. Ho, president of Communist North Viet Nam, inspired the Viet Cong rebellion in the South.

In August 1945, Ho proclaimed a republic of Viet Nam, with himself as president. Attempts at an accommodation with the French broke down and the Viet Minh guerrilla war began in earnest. Guerrilla war has raged in Viet Nam ever since.

The Viet Cong now hope, for another Dien Bien Phu, this time to entrap the Americans. The Americans, however, are not as the French were — isolated in jungle bases. A Dien Bien Phu seems hardly likely. The Communists instead may be relying on wearing down the will of their enemies to resist a combination of guerrilla attrition and political attacks in South Viet Nam.

Missed birthdays such as the 75th are always important for Communist propaganda. It would be logical to expect the Communists to plan some sort of gesture to commemorate the birthday of the man who has presided autocratically over South Viet Nam since the end of a quarter century.

Ho Chi Minh — Uncle Ho, as he likes to be called — has been primarily a Minuteman, international Communist at his life's less oriented toward the Soviet Union. His border with China and Peking's determined effort to keep Moscow out of Southeast Asia have obliged him to howl to his big neighbor, probably reluctantly in some cases.

He probably has the Vietnamese innate distrust of the Chinese, for centuries a threat to the country. In addition, he is far more cosmopolitan than the Chinese leaders, far less isolated from appreciation of what the rest of the world is all about.

Ho has gone under many names but adopted the revolutionary name of Ho Chi Minh in 1944. At 19, he sailed as a cabin boy on a long voyage which left him in France, where he plunged into Marxist politics. He established his revolutionary colleagues by his mastery of languages.

Intelligent and austere, he was bound to attract the attention of the Comintern — the Communist international — and in 1922 he was whisked to Moscow. From there he went to China as a Comintern agent to help found the Chinese Communist party. He returned to Moscow in 1927 and was assigned to organize an Indochinese Communist party. He was given charge of Communist movements in Indochina, Malaya and Thailand.

He hid out in China's Yunnan Province after the Japanese oc-

### Athens Rats Major Issue

**ATHENS, Greece (AP)** — An Athens greeter says that when he went to open up his store he found a long line of rats methodically passing eggs, one at a time, from a crate near the counter to a hole in the basement and from there into the sewers.

Some of the rats in the "work gang," he wrote in a letter to a newspaper, were 20 inches from nose to tip of tail.

The greeter may have been exaggerating, but his letter concerned the subject of the day in the Greek capital.

Everyone is talking about rats. The government has acted. Squads have been formed to lay poisoned bait. The state laboratories are testing all known rat poisons and combinations of them.

Counting couples have seen them in the moonlight on Mt. Lycabettus, the highest point overlooking Athens; in movie theaters, and in parks.

Rats scampering across Constitution Square, in central Athens, up among the tables outside the luxury hotels, have become almost a common sight in the small hours.

In the market area, on a quiet night, the rats rustle like dead leaves in the autumn wind.

All this was known, but not talked about until the greeter wrote his letter.

The Athens Chamber of Trade, representing the smaller businesses of the city, immediately made it an issue.

The emergence of the rats was attributed to the destruction of many of their old homes through demolition of large numbers of 19th century buildings to make way for new apartment blocks, and the continual reconstruction of Athens since.

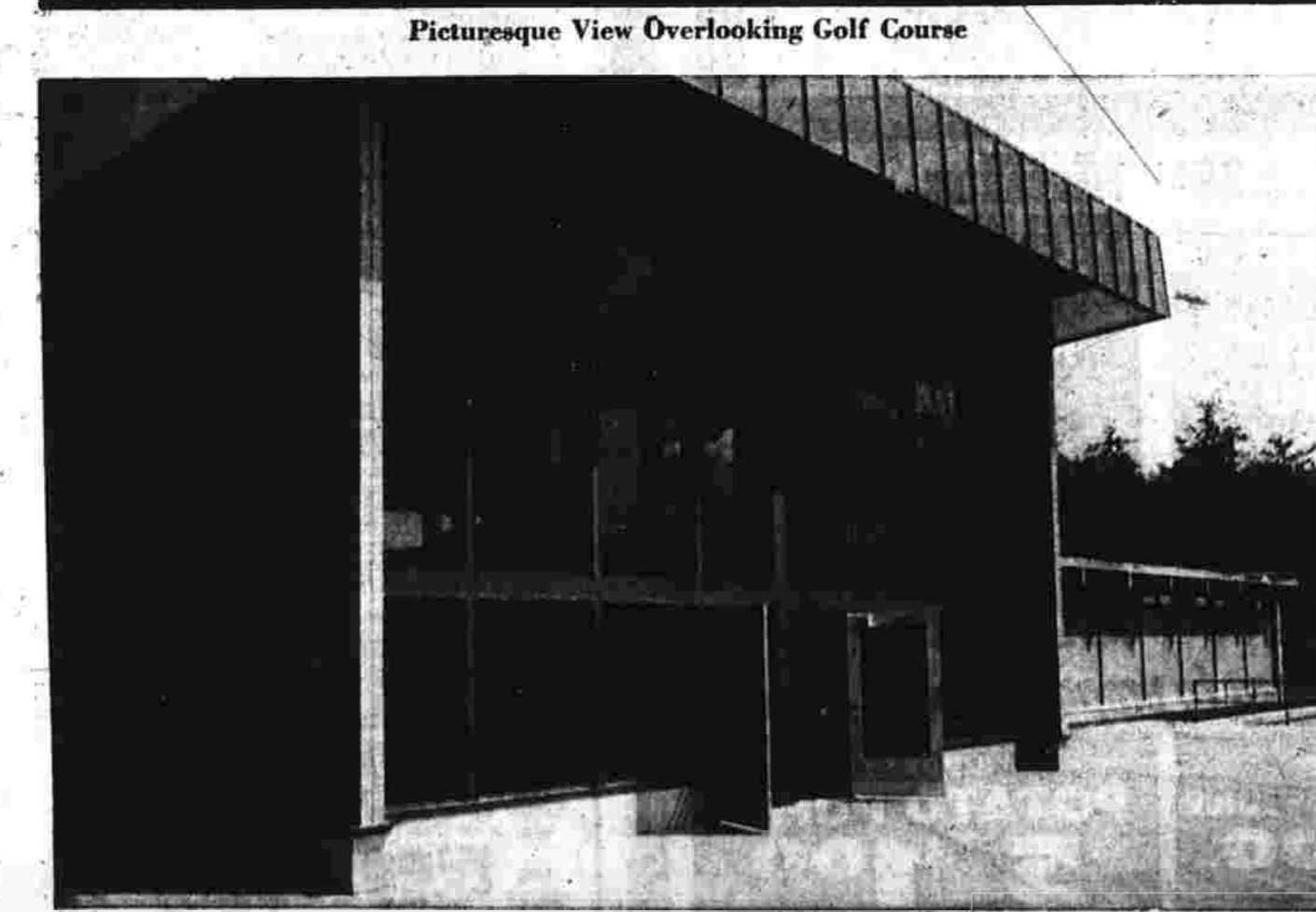

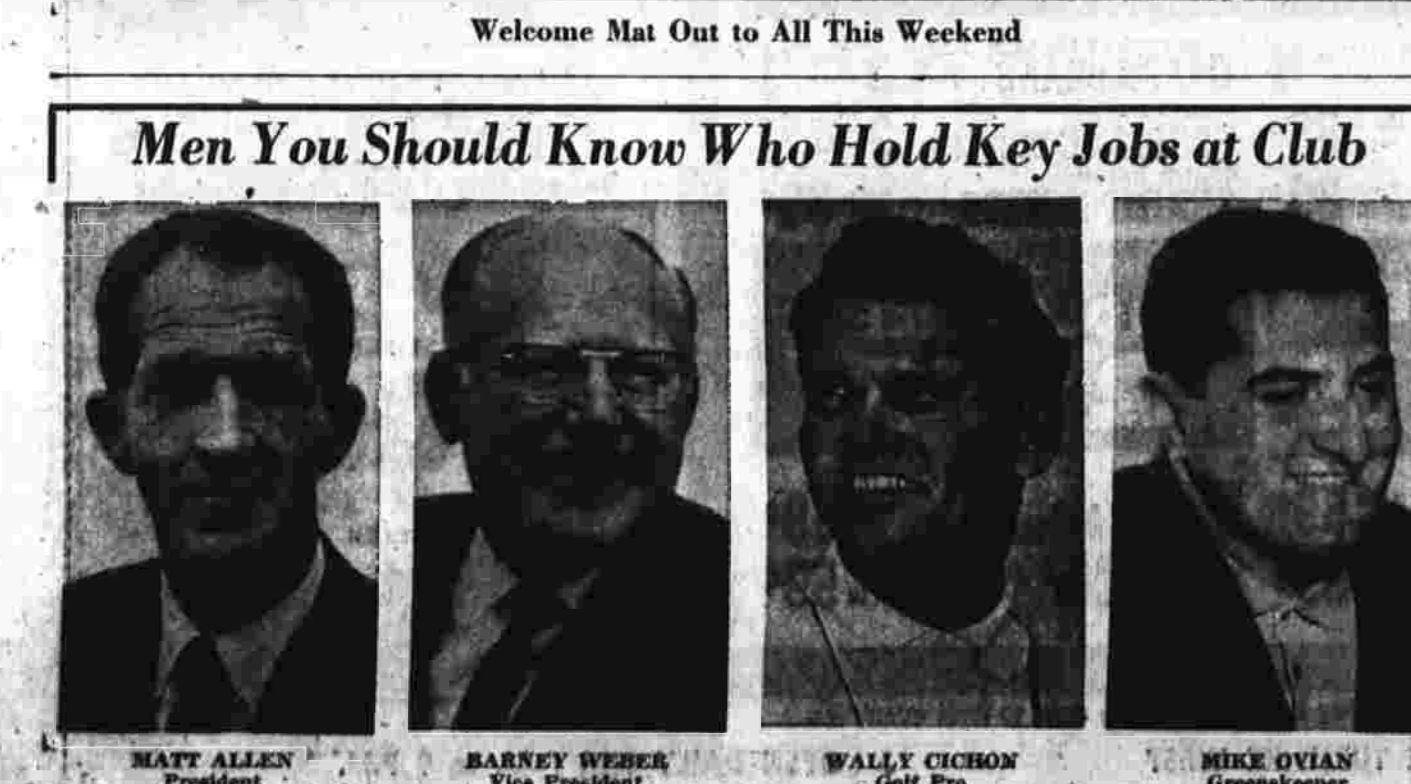

Governments were formed when men gathered together to protect themselves against the masses. These men had no intention of seeking any sport's abolishment, but they did want to protect their individual and their group's interests.

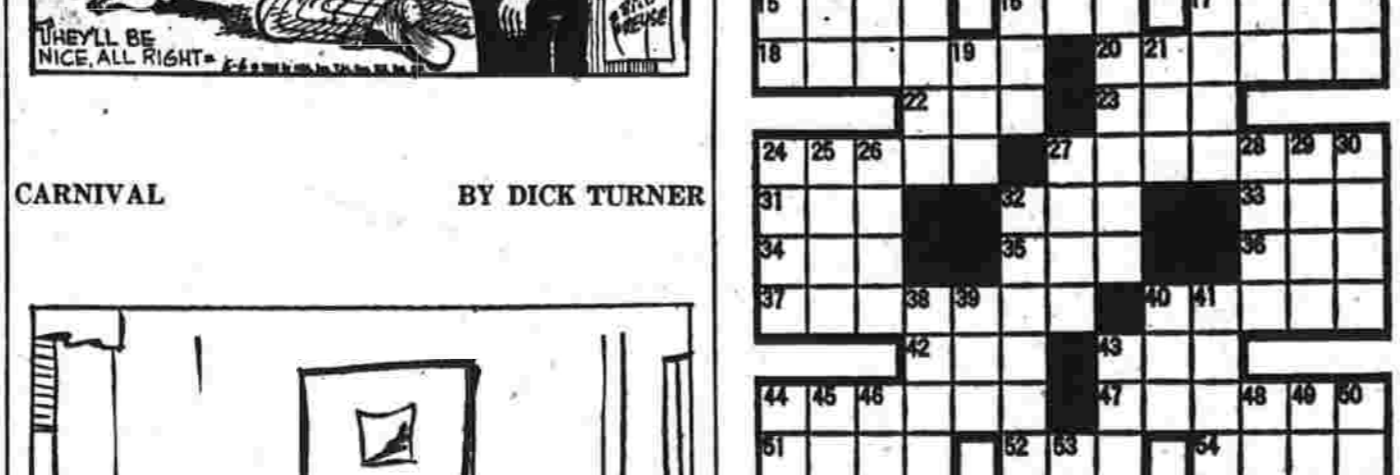
