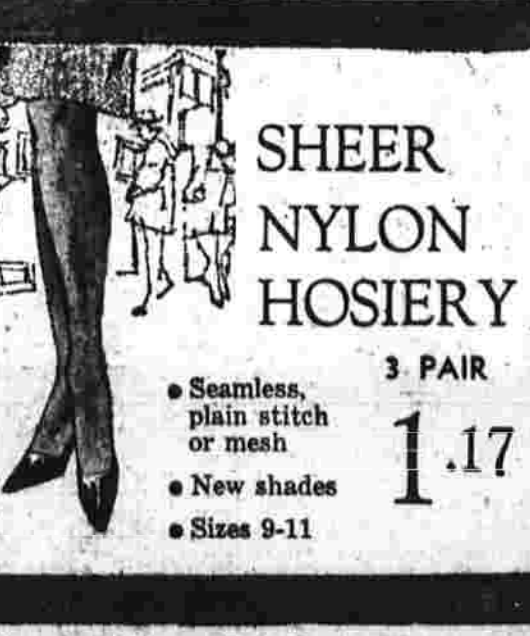

might have happened to Americans in the Dominican troubles if the Marines hadn't landed when they did.

But it is only fair and logical to state that not knowing what we were doing, we do not know that lives would have been lost if we had not intervened.

And we do not know that our intervention cost of loss of lives by our intervention.

In the Congo, it actually happened that the arrival of the rescue mission triggered some of the massacres which had been threatened if we did intervene, and it actually happened that the American missionary the United States was most intent upon saving lost his life only after the rescue mission had arrived.

In the Dominican occupation, the only American lives lost seem to have been those of the American troops conducting the occupation. Thousands of Americans have been evacuated, but there was apparently no enmity toward Americans on the part of any of the Dominican revolutionaries. The Dominican revolutionaries are, for the "rescuing" government is holding the lives of these civilian bystanders in check.

Sometimes, it may be the "rescuing" government may be using them as pawns to open the way for its own main venture or the other, that is, has saved the lives of the innocent with the force which can quell it.

So it is quite impossible to say, of one venture or the other, that it has saved so many thousands lives. The truth could be that the venture into the Congo was the thing that cost the life of the American missionary we wanted to save and the lives of hundreds of other innocents, and that our move into Santo Domingo has started a new and continuing horror of the same horror of a situation where no American life was being lost.

Trying to guess when intervention might save lives or do by contrast, as another of those decisions no ordinary individual will envy the White House.

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Bolton Board Agrees to Hire High School Principal

The board of education voted unanimously to hire a principal for the junior-senior high school at its meeting last night. It established the position during a discussion of the 1965-66 operating budget.

The salary offered will range from \$10,000 and \$12,000, depending on the experience and educational background of the candidate chosen.

Principal Lincoln Nyström's salary for 1965-66 will be \$10,000, up from \$9,500. Stanley Ziel, guidance director, will receive \$7,700 from \$9,300.

Michael Landquist, physical education instructor, will receive \$6,000 extra a year for coaching. He was appointed head coach of varsity basketball, junior varsity soccer and junior high baseball, and assistant coach of varsity soccer and varsity basketball.

Landquist said that the main duty of a principal was to insure that students get the best possible education. He said a principal serves as a resource person for the teachers and helps in the development of curriculum and new programs.

Laguri said that it was important that a principal be available for students to talk with, and said that students talk to a principal for different reasons than they talk to a guidance counselor. Laguri said that he had not been available as often as he wanted to this year.

He added that he was not saying he couldn't "pop" but that a better job could be done with a principal.

He said that there were only three towns in the state with superintendents assuming dual roles, and that these towns had school expansion programs. There are no towns without principals in each school when there are more than two schools in the elementary school.

He said he reminded the board that the elementary school was being under renovation and that a new elementary school is being considered. It was pointed out that the hiring of a principal would be a new subject, and that it had been predicted when the school specifications for the new school were being discussed.

There was no disagreement among board members. John McCormack said he felt the title was "right" to hire a principal at this level. He said that the school would remain in Manchester High School.

Laguri told the board that if it could attract a "top-notch" beginner for \$10,500 or an experienced man for \$12,000, the board would be in a position to hire a principal. Mrs. Claire Warfel agreed, saying the situation as one in which the school was in a position to give a salary range and see what candidate was attracted.

Part-time Teacher Elected

The board of education elected an additional part-time kindergarten teacher at the close of its meeting last night. There are 81 kindergarten pupils registered on a far for next year. Supt. Laguri said that if the board elected to follow its policy of 25 pupils maximum at that level, a fourth session will be required.

This year there are two morning and one afternoon sessions.

Laguri suggested that perhaps tuition pupils could be taken from towns with no kindergartens to make up the difference. The question was not resolved.

The board went into executive session on a personnel matter at 11 p.m. A meeting to continue a discussion of the budget will be held Monday at 8 p.m. at the school.

Open Budget Meetings

Walter Waddell, board of education chairman, gave a short introductory speech before the budget was discussed. Last year, he said, the budget was discussed in executive session for many reasons, among them the fact that the figures could be taken out of context and be completely misleading to townpeople.

This year, however, Waddell said he wanted the meetings open for many reasons. First, adult education information should be provided with information during the meeting, and second, the press to be open. He said that the press has a real opportunity to help townpeople by providing them with information that is needed to vote on the budget.

There was no objection among board members. Minutes of last week's open and executive sessions were also furnished of the press for the first time.

California reported its valuable crop seriously damaged, with losses in Los Angeles County estimated at \$4 million. New England also reported heavy strawberry damage, and Louisiana said its production had dropped sharply.

Freshkiss weather also severely cut into the Maryland-Louisiana peach crop along the Eastern Shore peninsula. That violation was a January freeze.

Most Midwestern points said the late spring had slowed planting and left the ground wet. Michigan officials also said fruit-bud development was about 10 days later than customary.

The effects of the crop delays are not yet known, but will be determined by weather patterns in the next few months.

One crop expert said the spring frosts, which left thousands of acres of apple and under water, would not hurt the fruit crops generally planted at higher ground.

New British Security Shakeup Following Two Spy Confessions

LONDON (AP) — Another shakeup was under way in British security services today following the confession of a former high-level intelligence officer that he was a spy agent who sold rocket secrets to the Russians.

The man in charge of the shakeup is George Wigg, who exposed the Profumo scandal in 1963. Wigg holds the sinecure post of minister general in the prime minister Harold Wilson's cabinet. As Whitehall they call him "sympathizer general."

The first leak, informed sources reported, has been to strengthen the system of screening government employees with access to secrets.

The second leak has been to establish records in the past few weeks on the whereabouts of all those who were in the United Kingdom in 1951, when the first major spy case was uncovered. It was then that the British Ministry of Defense, 52, was sentenced to 15 years in prison at Old Bailey.

Central Criminal Court Monday afternoon pleaded guilty to charges of selling secrets to the Russians and one of recording secret documents.

In a second and unconnected trial Monday, an army sergeant, Percy Aldwin Allen, 32, was jailed for 10 years on three charges of selling military information to Arab states.

Critics of British security services were asking how Secretary of State Harold Wilson could have allowed access to secret information when his whole history raised sharp doubts.

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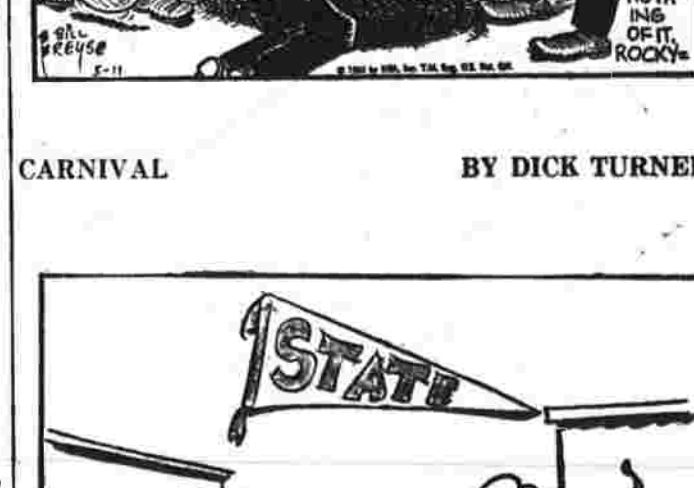
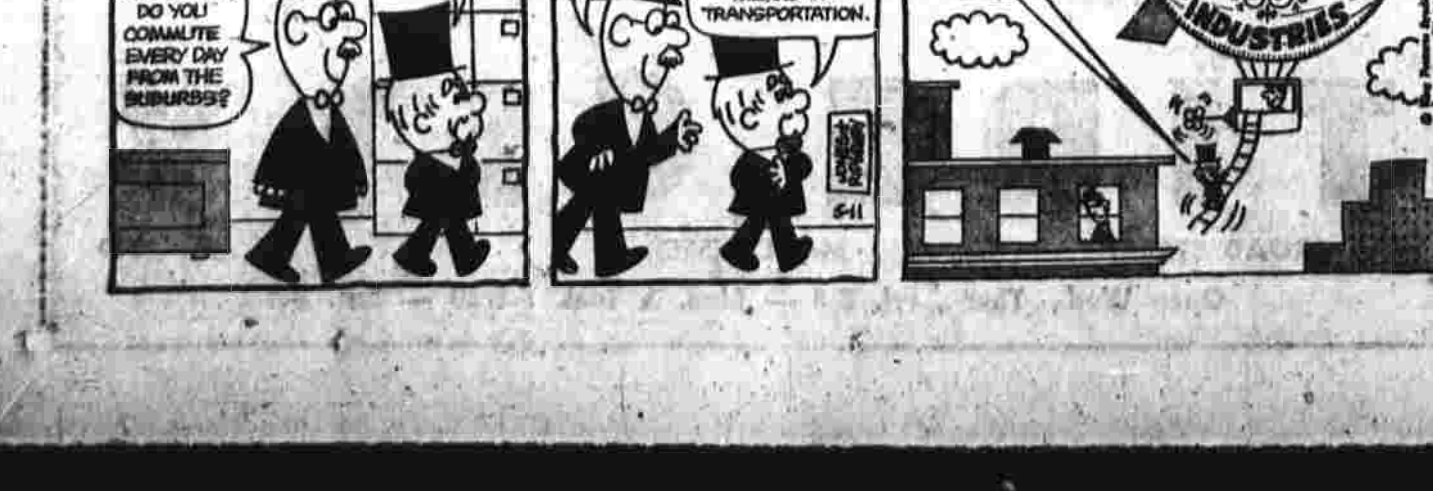
