addressed primarily a European problem, to be dealt with in the context of the interests of the two halves of Germany itself, and in the context of the concern of Germany's neighbors.

To this idea of what interests should be kept in mind in the creation of a new Germany, de Gaulle has added a hard, realistic comment: It is that the reunification of Germany is impossible so long as Western Germany maintains a special military alliance relationship with the United States.

President de Gaulle, it seems to us, has been describing not the procedure of negotiation on the German reunification problem, which has to include us, but rather he has been describing the condition which should accompany reunification.

And for us to assert, in response to this supposed slight to us in Gaulle, that we still regard the reunification of Germany as primarily our problem, which we intend to handle, is something of a mockery unless, for the first time in 20 years, we do begin having some real insight and some real propositions for making the reunification of Germany possible.

World's Fair Paradoxes: The ironies surrounding Mr. Robert Moses and his World's Fair continue to multiply.

Last year, Mr. Moses said the Fair was a business, and could not reduce its price.

This year, Mr. Moses proclaims that the fair has become no business at all, but a beautiful "intellectual picnic" wherefore it is entitled to raise its admission price.

Mr. Moses' action in raising admission prices in order to charge what his intellectual picnic is worth and, incidentally, try to improve last year's financial record for the Fair, has apparently helped the Fair establish a record of new low attendance records.

The low attendance, perhaps, because of the high admission price, is operating to make going to the Fair much more pleasant than it ever was last year.

Such are some of the paradoxes. Perhaps, in the whole record, there is, at long last, some refutation of an old and very popular paradox—the one about such characters as Mr. Moses. In this paradox, it is popularly held that if a public servant makes a spectacular specialty of insulting everybody else in public service, that automatically makes him the only wise and honest master builder of his time. This is not necessarily permanently true.

Lawmakers Duck On Fluoridation: Fluoridation is a hot word—as usual—in the Connecticut General Assembly these days.

But it is so hot that elected Connecticut lawmakers should back away from it and beguile the State Health Commissioner and the Health Council to order statewide fluoridation of public water supplies without a word of legislative debate.

At this moment the Legislature is feverishly ducking almost all responsibility in the fluoridation fight.

It doesn't take much reading of current events, then, to realize that, after bold and right use of the United Nations in such situations as Korea, Suez, the Congo, and Cyprus, our world has begun to give the United Nations the same shabby, down-grading treatment a previous world once gave the much less formidable League of Nations.

It is happening to us, and to our world, the same horrible thing that was allowed to happen to the idea of collective security and one law against aggression before. And, although there are all kinds of villains in the piece, including Russia and France, it has been the United States which, in the two current issues, Vietnam and the Dominican Republic, has been most determined to keep the United Nations on the outside looking in, weakly.

Safe Deposit Boxes Increasing in Use

NEW YORK (AP)—A rapid increase in the use of safe deposit boxes is reported by the Federal Reserve Bank of New York. Donovan to Quit NYC School Unit

NEW YORK (AP)—James B. Donovan, 41, who became internationally prominent for his prisoner exchange negotiations with the Soviet Union and Cuba, is resigning after a controversial 18 months as president of the city's integration-troubled Board of Education. Donovan's comments on integration embroiled him in controversies with civil rights groups. Several groups campaigned for his removal last year.

The board was involved in controversy over proposals to speed up integration during his tenure. Civil rights groups staged two major school boycotts. There also was one by a predominantly white group. Dr. Calvin E. Gross, superintendent of schools, to resign. He would hold the office only until June 30 to complete pending board matters. Donovan, who was hospitalized last June with a heart condition, said his decision to leave the board had no connection with his health or with the reported opposition. He added that the pressure of his private law practice and family obligations influenced his action.

Donovan gained international attention in 1962 when he negotiated a trade of Col. Rudolf Abel, convicted Soviet spy for whom he was court-appointed defense counsel in 1957, for Francis Gary Powers, the American U2 pilot who crashed in the Soviet Union.

Later that year, he arranged the exchange of medical supplies and farm equipment for prisoners captured in the Cuban Bay of Pigs invasion.

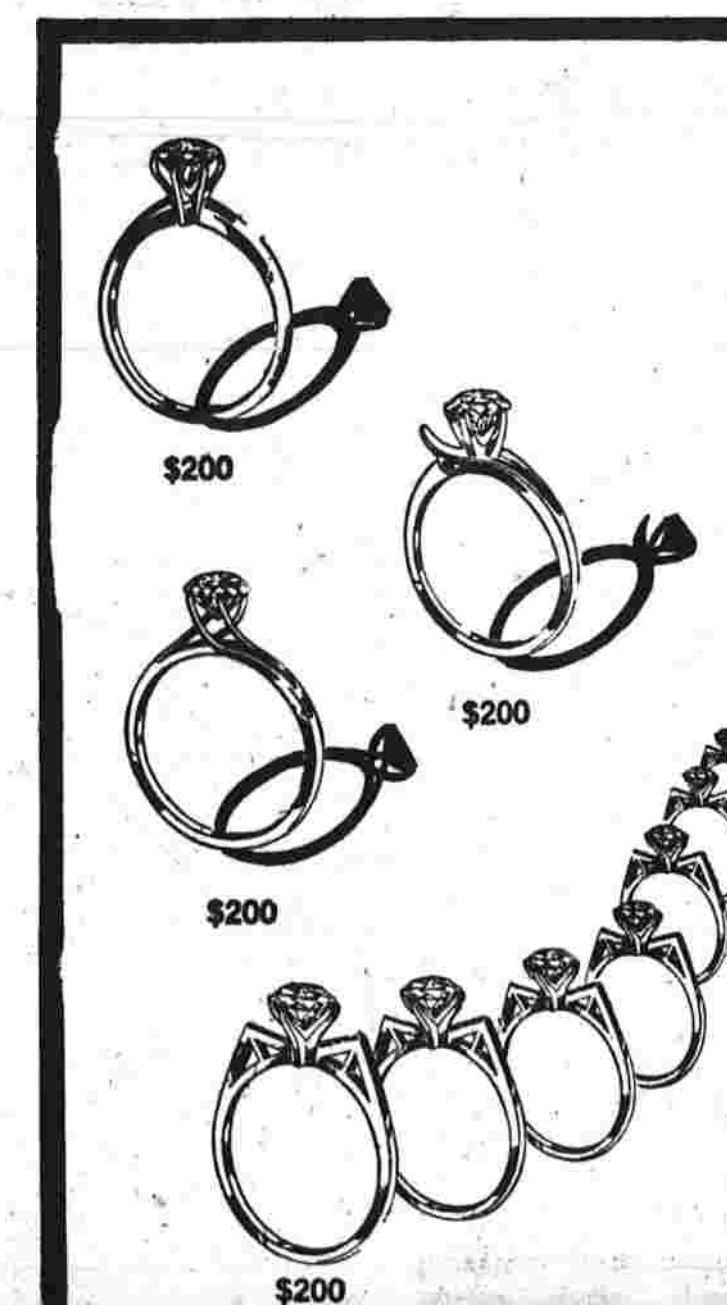

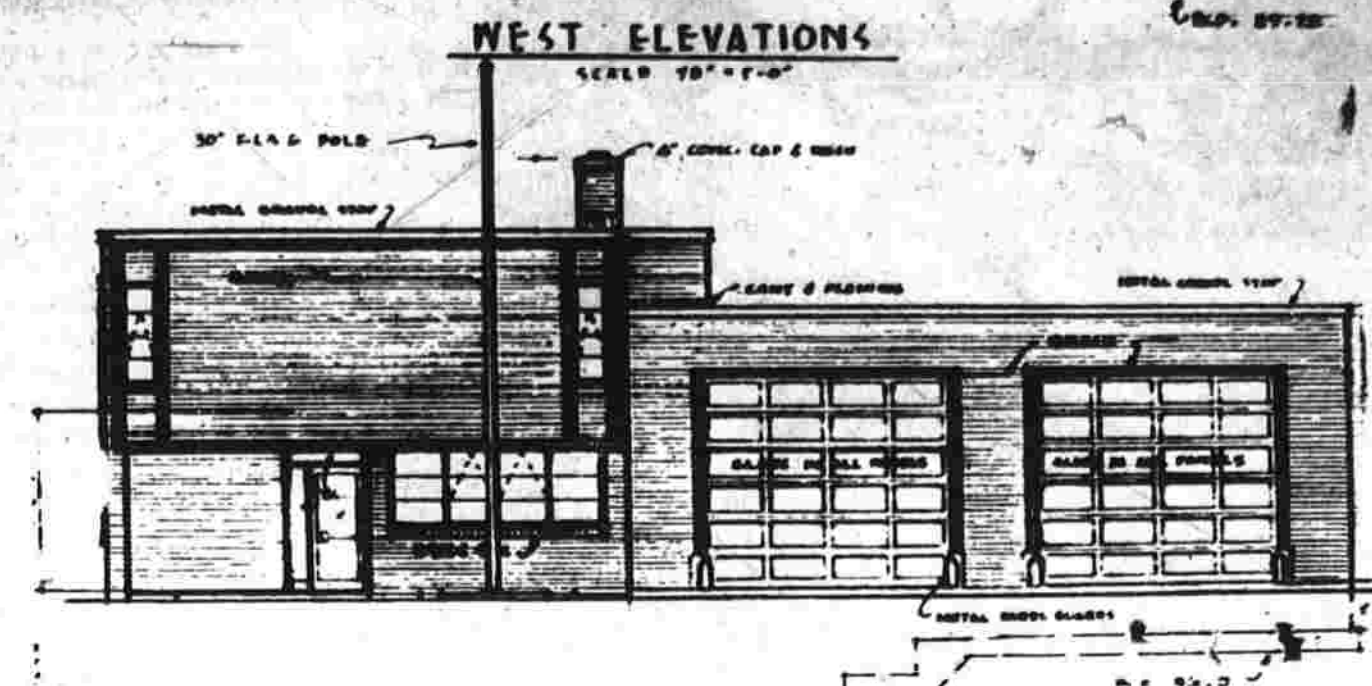
12th Circuit Court Cases

Board Votes Funds For New Firehouse

Construction of the new McKee St. firehouse will probably begin before the end of the month. Town directors voted unanimously last night to appropriate \$190,000 for the firehouse project, and concurred with General Manager Richard Martin's expressed intention to award the contract to Trinity Builders Inc., Westchester, Conn.

Not a single townsperson spoke at the public hearing held for the appropriation was voted, despite rumors from some area residents of dissatisfaction with the project.

According to General Manager Martin, the funds will come from expected surpluses in the department's operating expense and capital improvement budgets.

The relief sewer will supplement the trunk line that picks up sewage from homes between the Green and the town sewage treatment plant, off Oak St. The project trunk is operating near or at capacity.

The Manchester Police Department finished the month of April with one of the highest monthly arrest totals in its history. An enormous number of arrests for motor vehicle violations were made in the month.

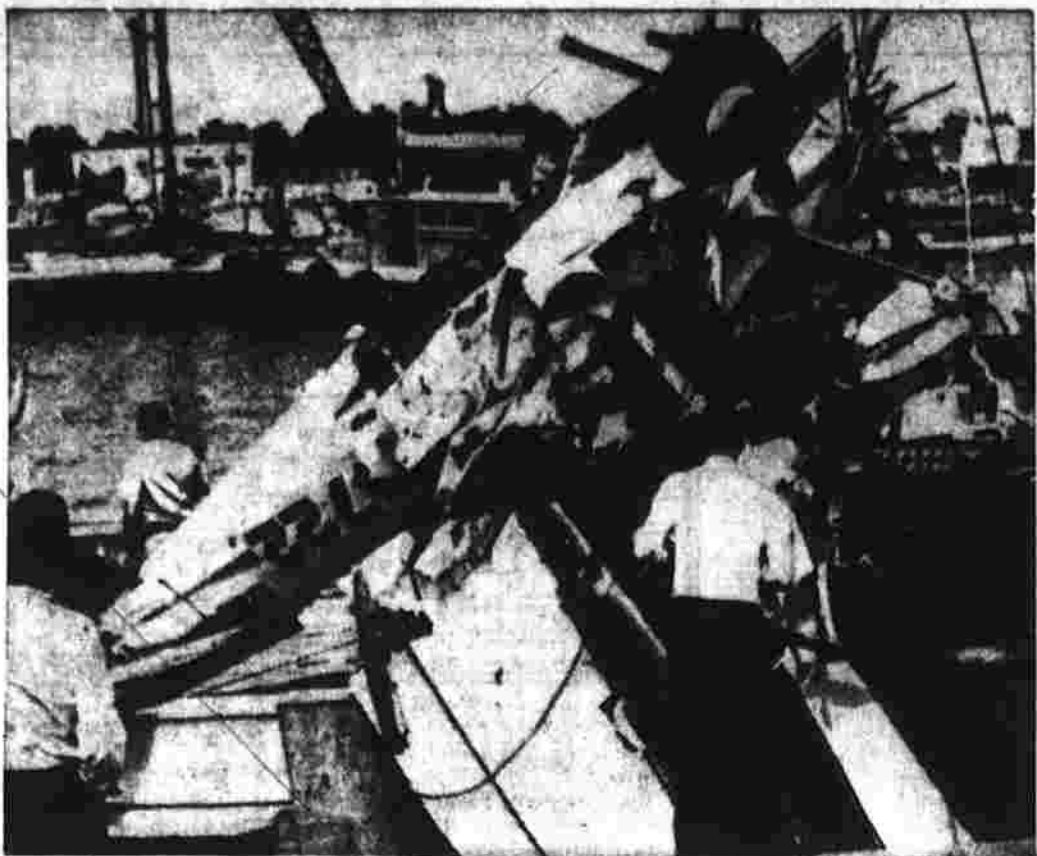
The total of 461 arrests was the first monthly arrest total which has surpassed the 400 mark since May 1963 and was more than double the figure for March.

Beautiful Baker Secretary Kept Own Counsel in Crisis

WASHINGTON (AP) — Carole Tyler, a 36-year-old widow with hazel eyes, knew how to keep her own counsel at the crucial moment.

Twenty years hence, she might have written a fascinating "I know them when" book about operations in the nation's capital.

But that was not to be. The covers of the not-yet-written book were sealed forever Monday when her body, the chief hair-do, clothes, shoes and jewelry were recovered from the Atlantic just off Bobby Baker's Cromwell Motel at Ocean City, Md.

The body, clad in apple green slacks, jacket and tennis shoes, was taken out of the sea by skin divers. So was the body of Robert H. Davis, career private pilot who had invited Mrs. Tyler to go for a ride in his red-and-white stunt plane.

Over the Carolina sea plane, Mrs. Tyler was waving the wings in greeting.

Then over the sea, where it looped and fell like a rock.

When the bodies were brought ashore, wrapped in purple blankets, Baker was there, weeping and saying:

"She was a very great lady, and to me, she was the greatest friend."

Mrs. Tyler was administrative assistant to Baker, who rose to influence by extra-curricular deals when he was secretary to the Democratic majority in the Senate. When Baker's scandal came, she continued to work for him, lately on secretarial duties at the Cromwell Motel.

Called before a Senate investigation, she denied any wrongdoing. Refusing three dozen times to answer questions, she declined to answer Baker's questions about the plane crash and said on advice of counsel: "I pray that the public will keep an open mind regarding

me in order to insure that no further irreparable injury results to my reputation."

Later she took the press to her room at the Cromwell Motel. She said, "I was not really there, she said, that Baker had put up the money, she said, though as a single person she could not get FHA financing in her own name."

Nor was it true that the house had French wallpaper or lavender curtains, she said. She described the wallpaper as American-made and carpeting as Persian.

Mrs. Tyler came from Lenox, N.Y., and had a high school diploma and two college degrees. She was a member of the Lenox Country Club and the "Miss Lenox County" beauty contest.

Coming to Washington, she posed for the arms of the statue of Peace at the east front of the Capitol. "I needed the money," she remarked, "and the most thing paid \$5 an hour for three hours."

She went to work for Baker, rising to an \$8,300 annual salary, and thus came eventually to nationwide attention.

But she liked to refer to herself as a "small town girl."

That the same kind of girl she read back in Lenox City, Vermont McKinney, editor of the Lenox City News-Banner, said Tuesday:

"Everybody here considers her death a terrible tragedy. When I say everybody, I mean everybody. Carole was a fine girl and highly respected here. This has been the universal comment of people who knew her."

Said Mrs. Glenn Chick, "Carole used to baby-sit with our four children. She was a real sweet person and had a fine personality. The children just loved her. We feel like we have lost one of our own."

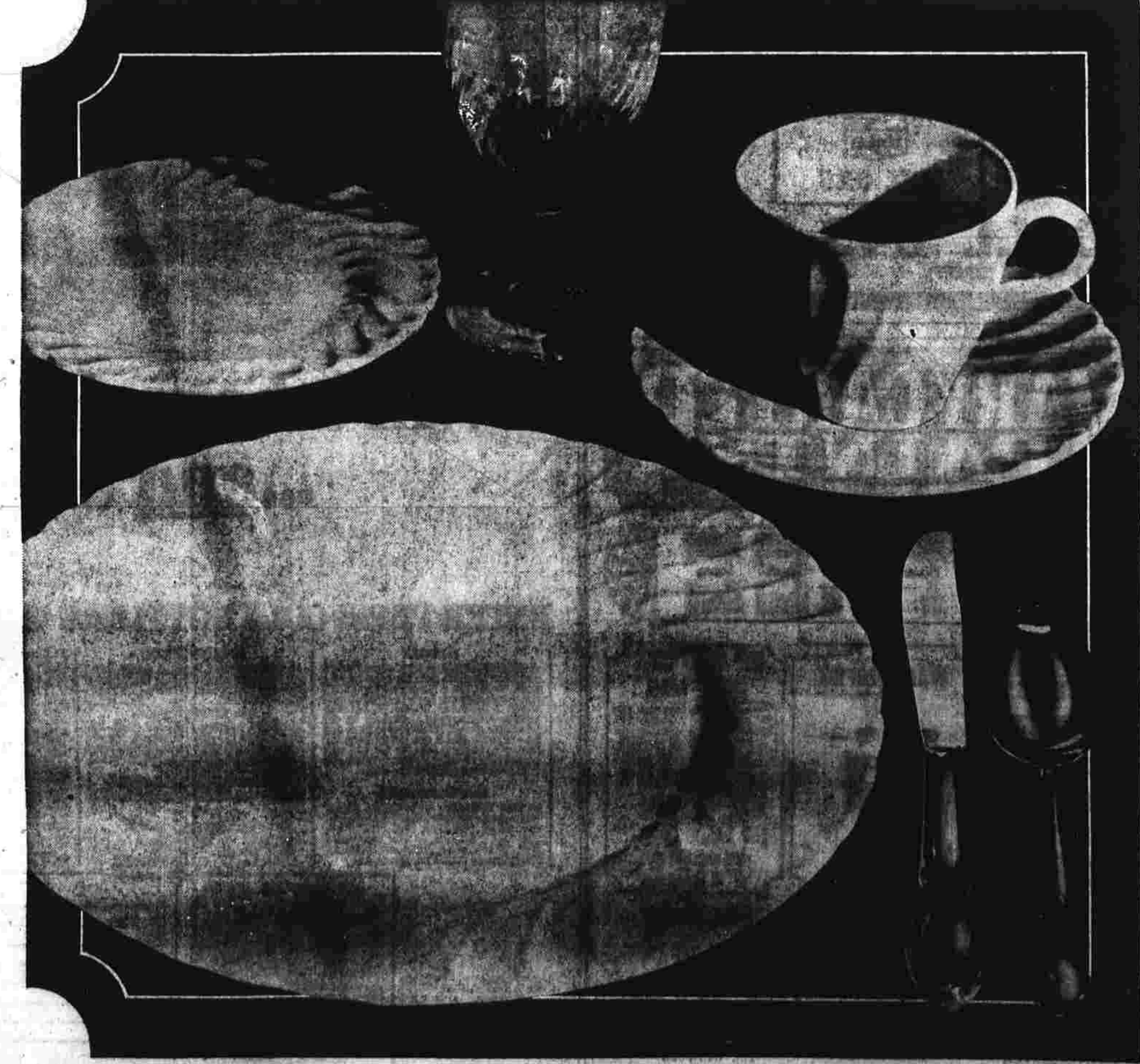

Board Passes Plan For Middle School

Starting today, news headlines should be sent to the regular South Windsor correspondent, Brodwin Joseph, telephone 644-0148.

The board of education voted to approve the educational specifications for the proposed middle school at a meeting held last night.

Approved was the preliminary middle school program of studies. This outlines the curriculum for the middle school, from the first to the eighth grade.

Board member D. P. Cavanaugh questioned if a 1,200-pupil capacity was necessary at this time. Cavanaugh stated that it was being built for future expansion.

Some of the benefits which accrue from a middle school program are more effective grouping of students, a period of transition between elementary school and high school, more effective utilization of teaching personnel and a better program through which children can be prepared for the future.

The recommended site should have an area of at least 20-25 acres. This would provide adequate space for the building area and playgrounds along with areas required to service the building.

Under the proposed program of studies for Grade 7, a total of 28 periods per week would be included. This schedule would be composed of five periods a week in English, math, science and art.

It was noted that a choice of three elective courses would be offered. Mr. Perry stated that on the junior high level elective courses should be limited to a choice of three because of the age of the children and that a program of set courses was in-

hour-long lunch period as in the past, the report stated. Mr. Perry pointed out that the one hour lunch period is divided into actual time spent in the cafeteria and recess time. This will be changed to a 30 minute lunch period which will include a short recess time.

The report stated that school clubs, athletic and social affairs will be offered, but compulsory. Board member Mrs. Romney stated that it was her feeling that a de-emphasis should be placed on the school sports program.

Supervisor Warner said there are two more meetings this week from high school rather than from the eighth grade.

Assistant Supt. Perry also noted that the administration felt it would be advisable to de-emphasize the graduation festival.
