NEW YORK (AP) — Genie Chance, wife of an Anchorage, Alaska, automobile dealer and mother of three children, had the kind of free-wheeling job every broadcast journalist dreams about.

As a regular reporter for an Anchorage radio station 14 months ago, her beat covered an area of about 18,000 square miles. She chased police cars and fire engires in Anchorage, but sometimes found herself with camera and tape recorder, aboard a erab boat en route to a remote Eskimo village; in a plane with smoke jumpers fighting a 10,000-acre tundra fire.

Under such circumstances, it was ironic that Genie Chance's biggest story broke when she was riding quietly down an Anchorage street in her automobile. It was on March 27, 1964, and all of a sudden her car began to bounce.

"I thought at first it was a secalls. "Then I saw poople running out of buildings and looking up — and suiders in gustreally began to wave."

It was the great Alaikan after the quake and using the broadcasting equipment in her automobile remained on duty ontinuously for 59 hours.
