Coal Mine Blast Traps 25 in Wales

TONTYPANDY, Wales (AP) — A gas explosion ripped through the depths of a soon-to-be-closed coal mine today, killing at least one miner and trapping 25 others.

Rescuers brought up two miners and the body of a third. Condition of the two was not immediately known.

"We fear many of the trapped may be dead," one rescue worker said. "Though not confirmed, it is feared about 15 may have died."

A spokesman for the nationalized coal board said the blast brought down the roof of the mine in one area.

Fire services and rescue teams from the coal board's southwestern division were rushed to the scene, along with 10 ambulances and extra police.

A total of 838 men are employed on the day shift at the mine, but only 80 were underground when the explosion took place, at a depth of 300 feet. The mine's maximum depth is 600 feet.

Relatives gathered at the pithead, standing in the rain awaiting news. Other villagers stood in front of their cottages.

In London, Minister of Power Fred Lee told the House of Commons of the tragedy. He said he had decided to hold a public inquiry.

Viet Nam Teach-In Results Questioned

WASHINGTON (AP) — Some who stayed to listen and argue for hours came away feeling there was no winning side.

But college students and professors, after a weekend "teach-in" discussion of U.S. Viet Nam policy, seem to think the idea is simply great.

Questioning of American foreign policy is a responsibility university students have never taken on before in this country," said Margaret Thomas, a political science student at American University in Washington.

Reaction to the teach-in was verbal heat was directed at McGeorge Bundy, presidential adviser on national security, who was the target of the Washington program at the last minute.

The teach-in was praised as a "searching public investigation" by Stanley Spector, a professor at Washington University in St. Louis. He predicted its continued use, saying, "when government gets too far from the people, it is going to be called to account again in this way."

While many, like Dr. Edwin Hoyt of the University of New Mexico, felt the teach-in worthwhile, others disagreed.

Republican Gov. Warren P. Knowles of Wisconsin turned down an invitation to attend a teach-in at the University of Wisconsin. He said recent picketing demonstrations at the Madison campus in opposition to Viet Nam and Dominican involvement were not the type of conduct of which the state could be proud.

"I question whether these individuals realize the consequences of their acts," the governor said. "Our government has determined that the Communist military aggression is endangering the security of our country and has seen fit to commit the lives of many Americans to meet these Communist military threats."

Junta Fights Rebels, Pressure to Resign

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP) — The United States was reported pressuring the Dominican junta to resign as junta tanks battled the rebels in northern Santo Domingo Sunday night.

Ranked junta forces renewed their offensive against the rebels in a driving rain. The battle had raged through Saturday night, diminished around the noon Sunday, only to flare up again Sunday night.

U.S. troops were not involved in the action, but three U.S. paratroopers were wounded Saturday night during a heavy exchange of fire between rebels and the 82nd U.S. Airborne Brigade.

A U.S. spokesman said the firing across the Ozama River was the heaviest action recorded for a 24-hour period since U.S. forces arrived.

The American troops control the river's west bank and the rebels the east. The rebels have been using mortars and heavy caliber weapons against the Americans. The U.S. troops have been firing back with ordnance up to recoilless 106mm antitank weapons.

A high-level White House mission which came from Washington Sunday met with junta president Brig. Gen. Antonio Imbert Barreras and reportedly pressured the junta to resign. Junta sources said Imbert refused.

Another meeting between Imbert and Undersecretary of State Thomas C. Mann was scheduled today. Junta sources said the U.S. government was trying to get the junta to step aside so "that an understanding could be reached with rebel constitutional forces for a peaceful solution to the Dominican conflict."

The White House mission also includes McGeorge Bundy, special assistant to the President on national security affairs; Deputy Secretary of Defense Cyrus C. Vance, and Jack H. Vaughn, assistant secretary of state for Latin-American affairs.

Diplomat's Family Held Polish Defector Queried

BERLIN (AP) — U.S. officials today questioned the high-ranking Polish diplomat who defected and asked political asylum in the United States. Polish officials took the man's wife and baby into Communist East Berlin.

A U.S. Air Force plane flew the defector, Wladislaw Tykocinski, about 44, from West Berlin into West Germany. U.S. officials said his request for asylum was being considered.

"The Americans got themselves a big fish," said a diplomat who had worked with Tykocinski in West Berlin. "I never had any feeling that he might defect."

Tykocinski had been chief of Poland's military mission in West Berlin for eight years. Officials of the Polish mission continued to decline all comment on the case.

They are important espionage centers. Tykocinski had been in West Berlin five years. A friend said he had been minister in the Polish Embassy in Rome previously and before that was a member of the International Armistice Commission in Korea.

A big man, 5-feet-3 weighing 250 pounds, Tykocinski walked up to Sgt. Myron H. Tomlinson of Mt. Vernon, Ind., Sunday morning as Tomlinson was stopping in a delicatessen near military headquarters in West Berlin. The Pole said he wanted political asylum.

Tomlinson contacted his superiors in the U.S. Berlin Brigade and they turned the defector over to officials of the U.S. State Department.

A U.S. spokesman said American officials accompanied Tykocinski at his request to his residence in the U.S. sector of Berlin.

WINNEBA, Ghana (AP) — The African-Asian Peoples Solidarity Organization ended its fourth conference Sunday with a call to bring U.S. racial problems before the United Nations.

The 200 delegates from 70 countries also voted to use "ball powers" and means at the command of our people to compel the Afro-American imperialists to withdraw their military forces from South Viet Nam, the Congo, the Dominican Republic, South Yemen and Malaysia including Singapore and North Borneo.

Another resolution demanded "the dismantling of all imperialist bases in Asia, Africa and Latin America and an end to the exploitation of the peoples of the Republic of Cuba, the Dominican Republic and all other states in similar positions."

The organization voted to invite Latin America and to hold the first conference of the new organization in Havana Jan. 6.

RAWALPINDI, Pakistan (AP) — The official toll of the cyclone in East Pakistan last week has risen to 6,492 dead. Five to seven million people are homeless, and property damage is estimated at \$200 million.

The Pakistan Press Association reported that there is a sign of human habitation in large areas to the coast of the Bay of Bengal.

The cyclone was accompanied by a tidal wave which capsized hundreds of boats and flooded small islands along the coast.

VATICAN CITY (AP) — A Vatican drafting commission has changed the document of the Council on the modern world problems to state that a nation may be forced to use nuclear weapons to insure its survival.

The change, reported by Vatican sources, was considered a victory for Roman Catholics who have long opposed the use of nuclear weapons. The previous text urged that nuclear weapons be "utterly destroyed and banned."

American and British statesmen contended that the United States and Britain should retain nuclear weapons, the Western government would not consider giving up their own nuclear protection.

The sources said the revised text still demands total, direct, chemical or biological war but makes a distinction for a "preventive war."

Two Ex-Convicts Die In Detroit Gun Fight

DETROIT (AP) — One convict killed another and then was fatally wounded himself in a gun battle with police at a downtown Detroit intersection today. Another man was wounded critically by police.

The battle climaxed the gun-shot slaying of Dennis Jones, 25, on parole from prison on a breaking and entering sentence in the men's rest room of a downtown bar.

His body was dragged through the bar into a car by three companions. An alerted police cruiser spotted the getaway vehicle and gave chase.

Killed in a gunfire exchange with police was Jimmy Chavez, 23, an American Indian of Detroit.

Critically wounded was William Berry, 24, released from prison last April after serving almost four years for breaking and entering.

A fourth man in the getaway car, Hassan Mohtam, 23, a roommate of Chavez, escaped injury.

Police Lt. Sebastian Elfrid said Jones, Berry, Chavez and Mohtam entered the bar together early today, and that shortly thereafter Berry and Jones entered the men's lavatory.

Elfrid said witnesses told police they heard loud talk, then the blast of a gun.
