That leaves only the question of the particular price. The entrepreneurs who launched this particular chain decided upon 69 cents anything and everything in their

And that, of course, is the really fascinating question about the whole enterprise. Why 69 cents? Why not 39, or

One assumes these adventurers into the one price field tried to strike a productive golden mean from two separate

For one thing, we suppose, they wanted to select a price which would be the median for the largest possible number of merchandise items. We assume they found that they could put more different kinds of things on their ahelves at 69 cents, or in that neighborhood, than at any other price which would be either substantially lower or

And we suppose their final decision from the angle of the merchandise was influenced and adjusted by whatever they concluded about the average ready-to-spend pocketbook situation and disposition of the average New Yorker. One assumes that their sociological and statistical studies came up with the verdict that, in possession of coins, and in feeling of freedom to spend these coins, the magic amount for the average New Yorker hovered somewhere around that same 69 cent

Having imagined such sure-fire calculations for the setting up of the 69 per cent store we can't imagine how it could ever fall. It must have success computed into it. If not, there will be, one day, a 59 cent sale in the 69 cent store.

#### Tennis Short-Served

Meriden's tennis players are getting the short end of the racket where city courts are concerned. Alone among sportsmen, they are watching the fa ilities for their sport shrink and deteriorate—and their opportunities for play along with them. From a city which justifiable pride in its well-built, well-maintained public courts all over town. Meriden is becoming a place where it's hard to find a good court to play

Most of Meriden's city courts date from some three decades ago, when WPA funds during the depression were used to build first-rate facilities in several well-chosen spots. Since that time, there hasn't been a clay court built by the city, and work on the existing courts has been mainly maintenance and mostly minimal. Worse, several perfectly good courts

have been black-topped for all-weather play and easier maintenance, and new courts at the two high schools and at Ceppa Field have been topped with composition material. These courts are all right for learners, and one should be weather play. But asking a serious tennis player to play on composition courts is like asking a serious golfer to putt on composition greens—and we can hear the cry from players at Municipai if such a money-saving scheme were proposed. The high school teams won't even play on their own courts; matches and most practice must take place at Here's the local tennis picture for

courts: Two composition courts at Piatt, two at Maloney (without nets on a recent sunny afternoon,) both under the control of the Board of Education and unavailable for general play. Two com-position courts ready for play at Ceppa Field. Two composition courts at Haber-shon Field. At Washington Park, two dusty clay courts; the third clay court has been allowed to deteriorate and the fourth has long since been blacktopped for basketball. At Lewis Avenue, two composition courts with nets and two clay courts which as of last Thursday hadn't been lined or rolled. Two fair clay courts at Brookside, ready for play but facing an uncertain future as Play but facing an uncertain ruture as Route 6-A rolls toward them. Three courts at Hubbard Park in fair condition, faithfully maintained by the Park Department with insufficient funds and equipment—the only courts in the city where serious players can compete.

WASHINGTON — Although Attorney General Nicholas Katz-enbach was adamantly opposed to the anti-poll tax amendment in the voting rights bill, President Johnson's own heart wasn't really in the fight.

The President made that clear to his legislative leaders over breakfast in the White House hast Tuesday morning (May 11), hours before Sen. Edward (Ted) Kennedy's amendment banning the poll tax was beaten.

How is it, the President asked his old Congressional friends, that after years of being against the poll tax he now was being portrayed as its defender?

The truth is, the President continued, that he is as much opposed to the poli tax as ever.
But as President, he went on,
he is obliged to accept his Attorney General's opinion that
the Kennedy amendment is un-Headlines pitting the Admin-istration (backed by Republi-cans and Southern Democrats) against liberal Democrats (led in this case by Ted Kennedy) would be unavoidable, Mr. John-son mourned. Nobody, he contin-ued, would remember the Constitutional grounds for his op-position to the Kennedy amend-

Frankly, the LBJ monologue went on, he wished the repe could have been put right into the bill originally. When his Attorney General warned that that might undermine the entire bill, President said he accepted the advice.

However, he told his leaders over breakfast, he definitely wants the bill's final version to include one part of the Kenned

amendment, putting Congress on record that the poll tax is disoriminatory on its face.

A footnote: Despite the Justice Department's talk about un-Constitutionality, a more important reason for Katzenbach's advice to the President was Sen-ate strategy. Katzenbach feared that if the poll tax ban had been adopted, Senate leaders might never have been able to bring the bill to a vote.

The reason for this fear was Sen. Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois, the powerful Republican leader who drafted the original with Katzenbach. Dirkse was absolutely against the pol






