Rockville-Vernon Latest Plan to Save CofC: Affiliation with Hartford's

 Directors of the Rockville Area Chamber of Commerce are considering a number of proposals designed to save the chamber from financial ruin.

The latest, proposed by director Seymour Lavitt, would be to save the local unit from extinction. Although the chamber has had two meetings since the directors' meeting, Lavitt's proposal is to have the local chamber affiliate with the Greater Hartford Chamber of Commerce.

Under terms of his recommendation, the chamber would pay the Hartford chamber an undisclosed sum, reportedly not excessive, to aid in the operation of Rockville's organization.

His proposal calls for the continuing of the Rockville branch and local chamber members would maintain their own board of directors and officers. The president of the local chamber would become a full-time member of the Hartford chamber.

Lavitt noted that the chamber has recently proposed dues revisions which will cause an increase in income.

Jobless Claims Increase by 8%

Unemployment claims filed in Manchester, which have been dropping steadily for weeks, took a sudden rise of 8 per cent last week with 47 more persons filing for the week ending May 15 than had filed for the week ending May 8.

The total claims were 634 last week, compared to 587 the week before.

The rise was not attributed to any particular cause except to a leveling off of the local unemployment total.

Claims filed throughout the state last week dropped 1,240 to an eight-year low of 22,030. The total compared with 30,070 claims filed during the corresponding period last year.

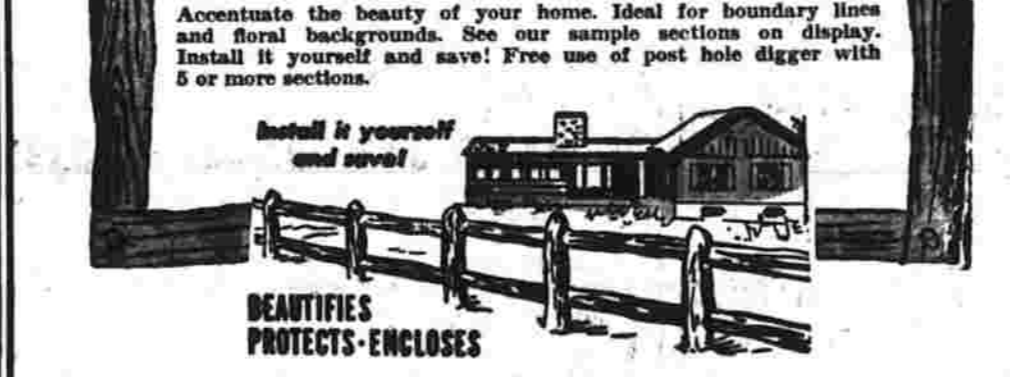

Treat Farm, Apartment Bids Draw Opposition at Hearing

The Town Planning Commission last night tabled section 4 requests for zone changes and a rezoning division after a public hearing of almost three hours.

Strong opposition was voiced to three of the applications:

1. A change to Business Zone II for the Arnold Palmer par- three golf course property across W. Middle Type, from Wickham Park.
2. A change to Residence Zone B for seven lots on Hawthorne St.
3. A change to Residence Zone B for an irregularly shaped tract inside the corner of Love Lane and Ocot St.

There was no opposition to a change to Business Zone II for a two-acre tract on the property across Tolland Type, from the proposed Corner shopping center, nor to a request for the rezoning of a two-acre tract on Chester Langtry and fronting on both French Rd. and W. Middle Type.

The commission expressed some reservations about about most of the requests, however.

As a result of an informal meeting after the hearing, the property owner will continue an existing border pit on about 10 acres of land off Hillstown Rd.

Opposition to Golf Associates request for a business zone across Middle Type, from Wickham Park came from attorney for the park's trustees, for developer Alexander Jarvis and for Matthew Moriarty (who is a park trustee). Republican Town Chairman Francis Della Fera also opposed the request.

Atty. Eugene Kelly, representing the applicant, said that the change would only recognize the present use of the Golf Associates property as a commercial recreational building to the south and some commercial buildings to the east.

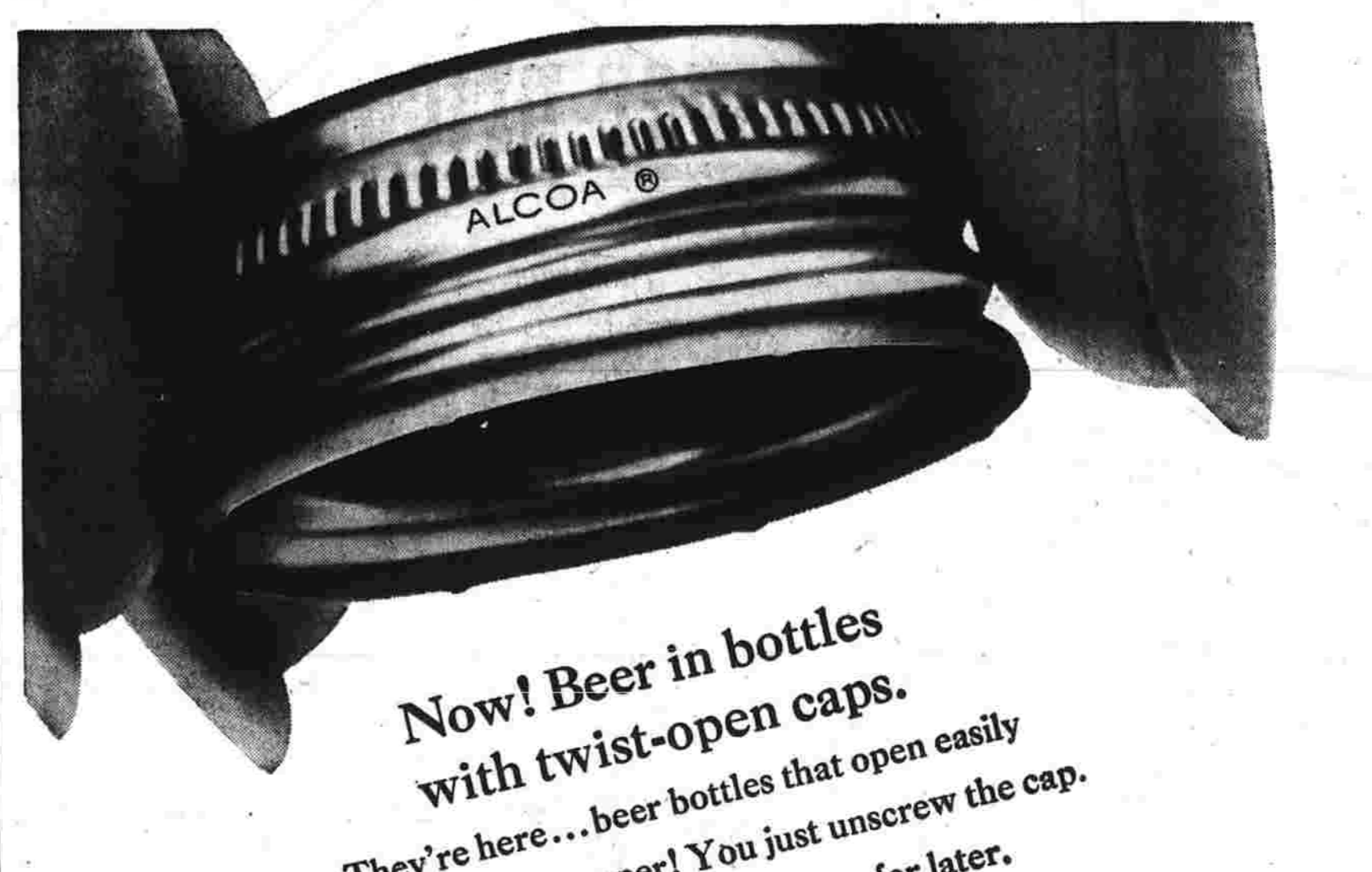

An experiment in guidance counseling was conducted last night at Manchester Community College.

At the invitation of Fred A. Ramsey Jr., the college's director of placement, the employment supervisor for Hamilton College, agreed to conduct a simulated job interview for each of the college's seven graduates.

Most of the young students hadn't had much experience in applying for jobs, and the college is still too much in its infancy to give them this sort of preparation.

Some were comfortable during the interview, while others seemed ill at ease. Some communicated freely; others had to be drawn out.

He also gave each student some pointers to follow in future interviews. An interviewing technique, he said, will put the applicant just that much ahead of the game.

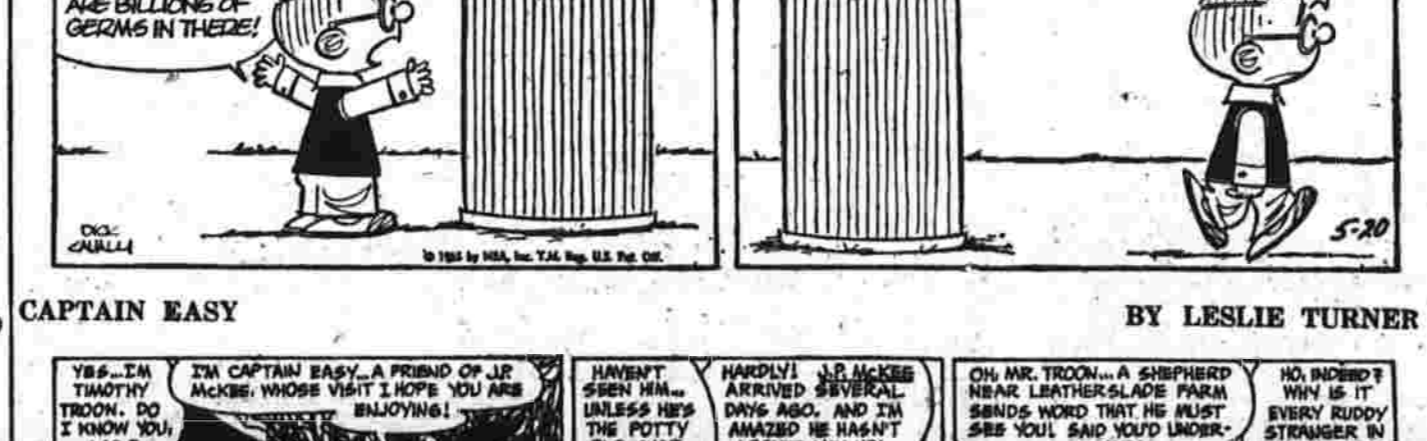

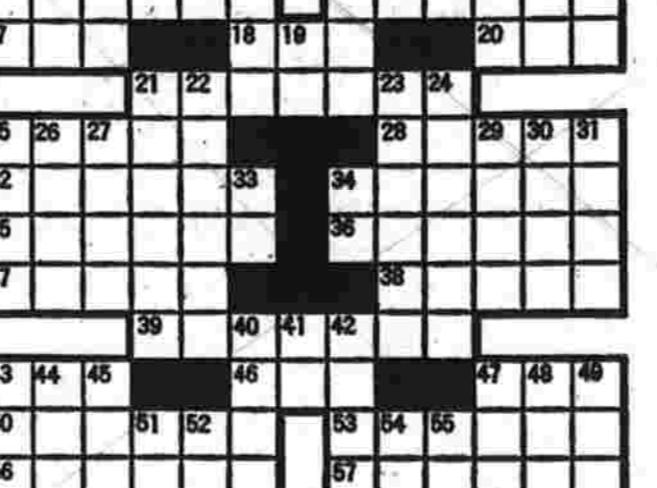
