

It would give a labor organi-sation the right to bargain for all employes in a department if the majority of employes sup-ported the bargaining unit. 

There was, when the sit-ins began this week, apparently nothing left to do except to make the sentimental, wistful, and ineffectual demonstration of placing human bodies

temporarily in the path of the bulldoz-When the police carried the bodies away, the bulldozers would resume

Then, the other day, at least a token kind of result was obtained. Governor halt a few days pending a reconsideration of construction plans. So it may be who knows that some

trees will be left standing and the state will find a route which doesn't cost so much natural beauty. Or it may be merely that the buildozers will be assigned to other trees, who don't happen to have any desperate friends. But even to halt the course of the

bulldozers for a few moments, even to force those in authority to pause and give some fleeting mental consideration to what they are doing to the country and to people—this is such a monumental achievement as to make a little individual courage, a little symbolic challenge to the law, seem worth while

There is no real escape; there is no real protection against the march of aucomotive progress, as any casual look at what the government of the state of Connecticut has allowed to happen to Bushnell Park on the very lawn of its own State Capitol will testify. We on the Eastern Seaboard are going to pave ourselves solid, and that is that.

But that delay of six days ordered down in Mount Vernon by Governor Rockefeller is an enticing development. Six days is six days. A few days here and there, a few trees here and there, here and there a piece of green field, here and there a piece of park, here and there an historic home whose stately beauty somebody couldn't bear to have destroyed, and eventually one might have, scattered about the Seaboard, the equivalent of an old-time

Talk One Way, Shoot The Other We have now done about everything in the Dominican situation, with our performance being climaxed by what was going on yesterday.

Yesterday, while we were talking the formation of a coalition government in the Dominican Republic, which would be headed by a representative of the rebel side, which likes to call itself the "constitutionalist" side, our military power in Santo Domingo was helping the military junta clean up a pocket of Massachusetts, New Hampshire, and

So, yesterday, we were talking and supposedly negotiating one way, and we were shooting the other way, and that seems to be about par for the course, for United States policy in rouble spots these days.

It is not to be assumed, however, that we are operating entirely alone in our capacity to create and spread con-

The special O.A.S. committee which once had succeeded in negotiating a esase fire in Dominica, but which roved unable to make it last, was hrowing up its hands yesterday, com-plaining that interference by other out-ide forces had spoiled its chances. It ted the U.N., which has also begun appealing for a truce, to keep out of the situation, and it attacked Presiat Johnson for, last weekend, send-

ing his own secret high level mission nto the situation. But, with everybody blaming every-

body else, and with United States talk apparently offering no real clue to what even we are going to do, the deepening tragedy is that nobody has a solution coming up from the diplomatic or political side. When everything on that side of the affair seems either confusion or outright vacuum, one knows well enough what will fill that vacuum. It will be gunfire. And our guns in Santo Domingo have, so far, suffered little of the confusion revealed in our talk. They have fired, consistently, on the rebellion our military commanders on the scene have considered it their assignment to stop and defeat. They have onsidered that their mission from the beginning, and their guns have kept shocting that way ever since. But, if this proves to be the only way there is any kind of solution attainable, then even solution itself must be labeled a tragic failure.

That is the kind of mess it is one in which the most likely way out seems terrible and itself a long-range defeat of the best interest of the Dominicans and the United States alike. Against all this unhappy prospect, there is always of course, the unknown prospect of what might have happened had nobody intervened.

Our Best Friends Tell Us

Once again, at the recent NATO meeting in London, United States policy allowed itself to appear in the wistful attitude of seeking after-the-fact approval of a policy from a group of its friends and allies.

This time, we wanted an organization titled the North Atlantic Treaty Organization to concern itself with a struggle the United States has been waging, as its own policy and outside any regional treaty obligation, way over n Southeast Asia. And, reaching in the other direction, we would have been delighted, as well, for some word of blessng on our behavior in the crisis nearer home, in the Caribbean.

In Maine the last execution took place shed the death penalty; since then the naximum penalty for any crime has 10 years, this has been made subject t parole after approximately 24 years, for first offenders.

Governor Philip H. Hoff of Vermont on April 15 of this year signed into law a bill which abolishes the death penalty except when the conviction is for a sec ond murder provided the two slayings are not related, or when the murder victim is an off-duty police officer or prison guard, even if it is a first of-fense. In both of these cases, the jury would decide whether to recommend the

Connecticut face the issue of capital punishment at each successive session of their legislatures. In Massachusetts this year, the Legislature has killed all bills to abolish capital punishment or further restrict its use. A measure has een filed in the New Hampshire House but no action has so far been taken on get a favorable report from the commit tee, but its prospects of getting through the House are slim.

It is significant that in the two states where capital punishment has been dead for over 75 years there has been no noted increase in the murder rate and no strong move to reinstate punishment by execution. This is the most effective argument we know against the deterrent theory to justify capital punishment—the only argument which deserves serious consideration. The time is coming when Connecticut will join the more civilized sisters among the six New England states in abolishing a penalty which is proving ineffective and which may be irrevocably unjust. — MERIDEN RECORD
