

Rockville-Vernon 14-Mill Hike Looms For Rural Residents

Vernon's tax rate under the consolidated government has been estimated at \$4 mills, according to Robert W. Denning, chairman of the board of representatives finance committee. Speaking after a recent public hearing on the new proposed budget, Denning predicted the tax rate would mean increase of one-half mill for every resident and 14 mills for rural taxpayers. He said efforts are being made to reduce the rate.

Denning said that only three mills of the increase for rural Vernon (the district) was due to consolidation. The three mills share in the equity of the Rockville Filtration Plant, an estimated \$8,000 for the lighting of the plant, and about \$1,000 for the plant's operation.

Vernon will receive benefits not offered to other municipalities, including a 40-hour week with a pay reduction, and additional policemen and a proposed new police cruiser.

An anticipated impact on the tax hike will be the board of education and the \$642,000 of the estimated \$1 million increase in the budget for next school year.

Principal and interested parties on bonds for the new junior high school, scheduled for occupancy in September, 1966, is \$241,000.

Because of an estimated enrollment increase of 225 pupils in September, the present school building will be increased by 35. A total of \$401,198 is estimated for additional educational expenses, not including the new school.

Of the \$401,198, about 73 per cent, or \$293,631 will go to salaries for teachers and staff. \$8,238; insurance, \$23,437; \$12,600 for rental of classrooms until the new school is ready for development, including costs of \$100,000 for supplies, equipment and maintenance.

Denning noted that tax rate increases would help reduce the tax rate. He also mentioned that present government, increased state aid to education, still under consideration by the general assembly, and possible budget cuts.

WASHINGTON (AP)—American nuclear weapons employ a four-stage fusion-fission energy release, Dr. Ralph Lapp said today.

The nuclear physicist provided this new insight on how hydrogen bombs work after studying a long-overlooked process, a report which describes the key ingredients in the weapons, an ordinarily nonexplosive chemical called lithium deuteride.

Lapp said he is not expected to enter into consultation with a surprise, since the present administration is following a tight budget.

The Atomic Energy Commission some time ago made public the fact that tritium, an isotope of hydrogen, is produced in the process of the explosive thermonuclear reaction of H bomb. It's done by a process known as fusion—joining—of an ordinary nonexplosive gas, splitting—process of fission.

Road Paving Work Begins Next Week

About three-and-a-half miles of town highways are slated for resurfacing or partial reconstruction next week under the town's spring paving program.

The Edward Ball Co. is set to begin work on Wednesday on the \$30,000 program. The first of two scheduled during the 1965 construction season.

The program calls for the partial reconstruction of W. Middle Tpke., immediately west of Main St., and of a short stretch of Laddow Rd.

The highway work will be financed from State aid grants from both the current and the coming fiscal years. About \$18,000 of the amount will come from the present grant, and the remainder from the 1965-66 allocation.

Ball has been chosen to do the work, taking advantage of the low bid it has submitted to the state for paving.

The public works head, Wm. P. Pius said this morning that the reconstruction of W. Middle Tpke. would require the relocation and rebuilding of a particularly tangled section in the middle of the street, which extends from 225 feet west from the Tpke's intersection with Main St. The entire width of the road will be resurfaced.

The portion of Laddow Rd. scheduled for reconstruction has been the scene of some unexplained and unexplained damage to the road, which has been installed during the winter.

The streets in residential subdivisions that are scheduled for resurfacing were mostly built before the town's existing zoning regulations went into effect. The regulations require a considerably more substantial street than they used to allow.

In the Wetherill St. area, Portland St. and Wetherill St. are scheduled for paving, as are all of Litchfield St.

A second major resurfacing program is scheduled for next summer road work.

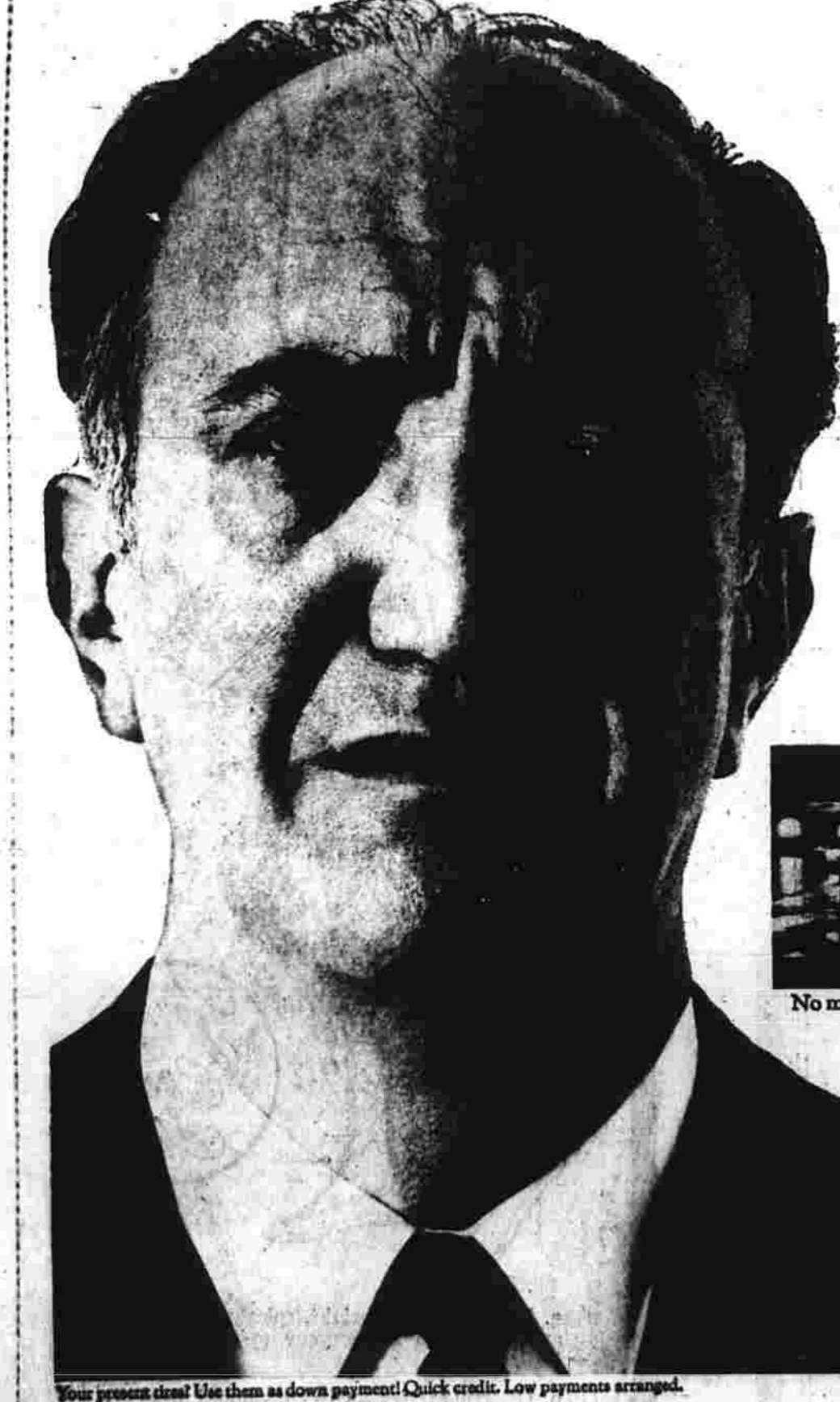

New Court System Lifts Burden of Bail

By RICHARD BRADA

"A man is presumed to be innocent until he is proved guilty" — theory or truth? What is the truth in a defendant's theoretical innocence while he languishes for weeks awaiting trial in a dreary, humiliating prison cell, because he cannot raise bond?

A defendant's right to prevail liberty, historically available only to those with the ability to pay a price — as though liberty were an expensive item in a market — has undergone a quiet but emphatic revolution. Yesterday, for the first time on a systematic basis since their incorporation, 12 of the 16 circuit courts, in Connecticut, including Manchester's 12th Circuit, commenced operation of this obvious civil right to those who are unable to furnish the required bail.

Challenging the entire bail system, an institution as ancient as our country, the new program is intended to others now functioning successfully across the nation. Basically, it revolves about an investigation into the character and resources of the accused and the prospects of his returning voluntarily to court in the event that he is released on his own honor.

Underlying this revolution has been the scientifically increasing body of evidence that sentences meted out by judges everywhere in our judicial system were, by and large, high concerning the actual crime related to whether or not the defendant was actually incarcerated while awaiting trial. In fact, the Manchester Superior Court between 1957 and 1962, 100 percent of those defendants free on bail failed to appear in court for trial, and 17 percent received jail sentences upon conviction. On the other hand, of those waiting for trial in jail because they were not able to afford bail, 90 percent were sentenced to prison.

An even more disturbing revelation gained from this study was that the firm of offenders, jailed before trial for lack of bail money, were half as likely to re-offend as those sentenced in prison. In fact, the study revealed that the rate of re-offending was 50 percent lower among those who had been released on their own honor than among those who had been incarcerated.

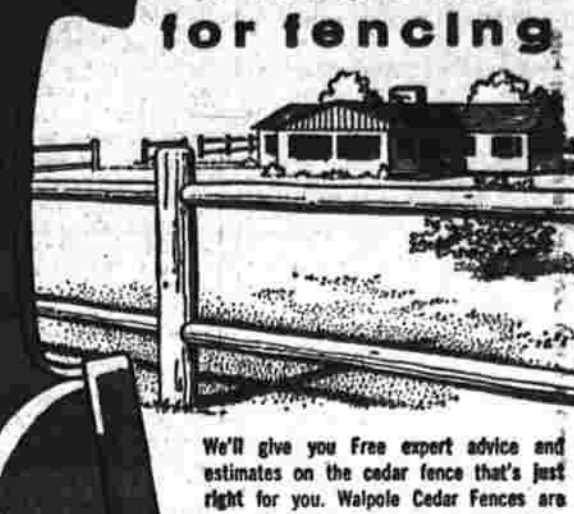

Students Help Show Fitness Techniques

In a vivid, day-long dramatization of the importance of physical fitness that included levels of participation from President Johnson to first graders from Bentley School, the nation's first physical fitness conference was held yesterday at Manchester High School.

The president appeared on a film shown by a representative from his Council on Physical Fitness, Robert Stewart. In it he included the whole nation, all people of all ages, in a constant effort to keep physically fit.

"A nation is only as strong as its people," the President said. "The future belongs to us."

When they got out on the floor, a recording of "Autumn Leaves" blared forth and each began swaying movements to its rhythm. Minutes later, Presidential First Piano Concerto provided more strenuous rhythms.

The boys performed in a demonstration called "Physical Fitness Defined: Physical Fitness Most," which stressed strength and endurance. Part of it was a new development called "circuit training," a series of exercises, changing practically every muscle in the body.

A large circle of different exercises was thrown up around the gym. The boys went from exercise to exercise and when they completed one circuit, they went around again; only the second time, the number increased.

This type of exercise, it was pointed out, required little equipment, yet could involve many people. It benefited the young and the old. And, in fact, it is used to recondition patients just recovering from heart attacks, those who need fitness the most.

But what is "physical fitness," why is it needed, and what is its place in our society?

"These were question various experts asked before and after the demonstrations.

Charlotte McCormick, a member of the Governor's Physical Fitness Committee and former Manchester school board chairman, set the primary goal of the assembly early in the meeting.

"We're here to see and hear why we need a physical fitness program as early as a real and integral part of the public school system."

But before the last word had been spoken shortly after 9 p.m., the scope had been enlarged to include adults as well as children.

By then the facts of a fat and feebly nation had been stated. A nation one quarter of whom were no fit, with minimum fitness standards; a nation half of whose grades in 1963 were classified for physical reasons; a nation in which one out of every four is overweight; a nation half of whose deaths occur as a result of disease of the heart and blood vessels.

Dr. Alan Ryan, of the American Medical Association's committee on exercise and fitness, defined physical fitness as the "general capacity to adopt to and recover from the performance of physical activity."

He brought out an old idea that sedentary activities promote good health. And no one need be worried about straining his capacity, he added; using as an example a Norwegian runner, who at the age of 36, ran from Paris to Moscow in 14 days and then ran back again.

He noted that physical fitness was lifetime quest. "Those students who in college or high school perform the vigorous exercise after graduation are the ones who are likeliest to live longer than their less athletic contemporaries," he observed.

Thus, he said, school boards must introduce a physical fitness program as early as possible and in such a manner to instill the student with a philosophy for physical fitness and the capacity to carry it out through life.

Simon A. McNeely, director of the President's Council on Physical Fitness, agreed with Dr. Ryan in stating a program early. He said he was glad to see that physical fitness programs had been included in Operation Head Start. The pre-kindergarten level is not too early to begin, he said.

Trying school administrators to take a good look at their physical education programs, he said that the biggest problem facing the Council was bringing the results of research to the individual schools.

Bernard W. Dolan, a consultant for physical education in the State Department of Education, brought the idea of good fitness programs further by listing criteria for evaluating the programs.

After dinner, Dr. William J. Sanders, state commissioner of education, greeted the group on behalf of Governor Dempsey, and Mayor Francis Mahoney welcomed them on behalf of Manchester.

Then Robert Stewart, administrator of the President's Council, enlarged the scope of the meeting, with the film of the President and by speaking about the nationwide activities of the Council.

"We hope to introduce circuit training into business and industry and make fitness fun. We plan to get away from physical fitness beyond the school room," he said. They reach to the moral and mental health of the community in the nation.

Robert J. Kipphut, chairman of the Governor's Committee, spoke about the state's program. The "New Goals" are planned to be satisfying to take a person out of himself, he said. He said the committee was ready to go around to schools in the state and give demonstrations such as had been given in Manchester.

Students Help Show Fitness Techniques

In a vivid, day-long dramatization of the importance of physical fitness that included levels of participation from President Johnson to first graders from Bentley School, the nation's first physical fitness conference was held yesterday at Manchester High School.

The president appeared on a film shown by a representative from his Council on Physical Fitness, Robert Stewart. In it he included the whole nation, all people of all ages, in a constant effort to keep physically fit.

"A nation is only as strong as its people," the President said. "The future belongs to us."

When they got out on the floor, a recording of "Autumn Leaves" blared forth and each began swaying movements to its rhythm. Minutes later, Presidential First Piano Concerto provided more strenuous rhythms.

The boys performed in a demonstration called "Physical Fitness Defined: Physical Fitness Most," which stressed strength and endurance. Part of it was a new development called "circuit training," a series of exercises, changing practically every muscle in the body.

A large circle of different exercises was thrown up around the gym. The boys went from exercise to exercise and when they completed one circuit, they went around again; only the second time, the number increased.

This type of exercise, it was pointed out, required little equipment, yet could involve many people. It benefited the young and the old. And, in fact, it is used to recondition patients just recovering from heart attacks, those who need fitness the most.

But what is "physical fitness," why is it needed, and what is its place in our society?

"These were question various experts asked before and after the demonstrations.

Charlotte McCormick, a member of the Governor's Physical Fitness Committee and former Manchester school board chairman, set the primary goal of the assembly early in the meeting.

"We're here to see and hear why we need a physical fitness program as early as a real and integral part of the public school system."

But before the last word had been spoken shortly after 9 p.m., the scope had been enlarged to include adults as well as children.

By then the facts of a fat and feebly nation had been stated. A nation one quarter of whom were no fit, with minimum fitness standards; a nation half of whose grades in 1963 were classified for physical reasons; a nation in which one out of every four is overweight; a nation half of whose deaths occur as a result of disease of the heart and blood vessels.

Dr. Alan Ryan, of the American Medical Association's committee on exercise and fitness, defined physical fitness as the "general capacity to adopt to and recover from the performance of physical activity."

He brought out an old idea that sedentary activities promote good health. And no one need be worried about straining his capacity, he added; using as an example a Norwegian runner, who at the age of 36, ran from Paris to Moscow in 14 days and then ran back again.

He noted that physical fitness was lifetime quest. "Those students who in college or high school perform the vigorous exercise after graduation are the ones who are likeliest to live longer than their less athletic contemporaries," he observed.

Thus, he said, school boards must introduce a physical fitness program as early as possible and in such a manner to instill the student with a philosophy for physical fitness and the capacity to carry it out through life.

Simon A. McNeely, director of the President's Council on Physical Fitness, agreed with Dr. Ryan in stating a program early. He said he was glad to see that physical fitness programs had been included in Operation Head Start. The pre-kindergarten level is not too early to begin, he said.

Trying school administrators to take a good look at their physical education programs, he said that the biggest problem facing the Council was bringing the results of research to the individual schools.

Bernard W. Dolan, a consultant for physical education in the State Department of Education, brought the idea of good fitness programs further by listing criteria for evaluating the programs.

After dinner, Dr. William J. Sanders, state commissioner of education, greeted the group on behalf of Governor Dempsey, and Mayor Francis Mahoney welcomed them on behalf of Manchester.

Then Robert Stewart, administrator of the President's Council, enlarged the scope of the meeting, with the film of the President and by speaking about the nationwide activities of the Council.

"We hope to introduce circuit training into business and industry and make fitness fun. We plan to get away from physical fitness beyond the school room," he said. They reach to the moral and mental health of the community in the nation.

Robert J. Kipphut, chairman of the Governor's Committee, spoke about the state's program. The "New Goals" are planned to be satisfying to take a person out of himself, he said. He said the committee was ready to go around to schools in the state and give demonstrations such as had been given in Manchester.

Closing out the meeting were summary remarks by Stuart Gillespie, vice president of
