Nautilus Chief Speaker Today At Polk Launch

GROTON (AP)—William R. Anderson, skipper of the submarine Nautilus, will be the chief speaker today at the launching of the nuclear submarine James K. Polk.

Mr. Anderson's ship was America's first nuclear powered submarine. The Polk is the Navy's 35th Fleet Ballistic Missile Submarine.

The Polk is designed to fire a 500-mile range A3 Polaris missile.

Polk, the 11th president of the United States, was a congressman from Tennessee before he was elected secretary of the American Legion in 1957.

He assumed command of the Nautilus in 1967, and the next year took the ship on the Atlantic to Pacific patrol cruise.

Polk's first command was as the Navy's youngest captain.

He was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives in 1964.

Crank-Turning Youngsters Help Learn About Learning

A federal grant from the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development has brought two psychologists from the University of Connecticut to the Lincoln School. They are conducting an experiment with kindergarteners to determine how rewards affect learning. It is part of a larger study whose goal is to discover how learning processes occur in children at different ages. Dr. Charles Feldstone is in charge of the project. His assistant is C. E. Lapinski. Dr. Feldstone has set up what he calls a "deceptively simple" problem for the youngsters to solve. A reward is offered if the child can turn the crank on a machine at a certain rate of speed according to verbal instruction. Solving the problem (i.e. discovering the right rate of turning) requires a flexible approach. Dr. Feldstone says that adults are apt to take quite a rigid approach to the problem and thus not solve it as well as younger people. But children of all ages don't

do equally well, he observes. "In our experiments, we have found that pupils in Grades 3-6 do better than younger or older people."

Why adults and very young children should find this simple task of turning a crank at certain rates of speed more difficult, he has not yet ascertained.

But when the experiments are completed, he hopes to have more knowledge about how learning occurs. Out of this new knowledge may come directions for more constructive teaching.

And when Dr. Feldstone figures out what underlies simple learning processes like this crank turning one he hopes also to plug the information into a computer. A crank turning computer no doubt has vast implications.

STUDENTS HIRED

At least 15 local high school students have procured post-graduation employment in the area as a result of last month's Student Meets the Employer Week. Two of these students were hired at the spot during the interviews which formed a major portion of the week's activities; other applications are still pending.

All told, 18 mercantile and manufacturing concerns in the Manchester area sent representatives to the local employment office or invited students to visit their places of business. These firms conducted over 30 interviews with about 25 students, mostly from Manchester High School, with respect to an estimated total of 26 openings anticipated for June.

A special and well-received feature of the program this year was a series of job clinics designed to instruct the student in various aspects of the means of obtaining a job and presented by representatives from Burton's Inc., Cheney Bros. and Household Finance Corp. Topics covered ranged from determining which companies might utilize the student's particular talents to the effect of personal appearance and behavior during the interview for employment.

This year's figures were significantly different from last year's results, said local employment office manager Frederick Kania. Over 50 interviews conducted during the "Week" in 1964 yielded only nine filled positions. The rise in local employment prospects has been held generally to reflect the increase in business prosperity. As last year, the bulk of student interest in the program came from girls graduating from commercial courses.

TV Notebook

By JOAN CROSSBY

NEW YORK (NEA)—Henry Jaffe has to be the only television producer who also founded two craft unions (AGMA and AFRA, now AFTRA) and is deaf in his left ear because he cracked a joke while awaiting Army assignment in 1942.

Jaffe has had a long association with Dinah Shore, producing all her television shows. His Henry Jaffe Enterprises also produces the Bell Telephone Hour, which celebrated its 25th anniversary last month.

A trim, tanned man in his late 50s, Jaffe is a lawyer who, in 1932, specialized in show business clients. Among them was baritone Lawrence Tibbett, who was having trouble getting terms on contracts.

"There were only two concert bureaus in operation, one controlled by NBC and one by CBS. So we got a lot of famous concert artists together — Glink, Elsbals, Hel. etc., Paderewski, Pina, Melchior, Gilli, Martiniello—so we could get collective strength. I went to the bureaus and they were nice and polite, and threw me out. Larry said 'Let's form a guild' and at that moment the American Guild of Musical Artists was formed. I went back to the bureaus and they threw me out again, but this time more gently."

Hearing Held

Eventually there was an FCC hearing in Washington which resulted in the networks giving up their artists' bureaus. Shortly after this, Jaffe and two friends formed the American Federation of Radio Artists.

Jaffe became a producer when he made a deal with Pat Weaver, then head of NBC, to have Leland Hayward produce Noel Coward's "Tonight at 8:30."

"Hayward became ill and General Sarnoff said to me, 'Take over. You got us in this.' I went in for 90 days and liked producing so much I haven't stopped in 10 years."

Now about that deaf ear. "I was 2,000 in line waiting for military assignment. The sergeant was asking everyone what he wanted to do. He heard 1,999 funny answers. When he got to me I said 'I would like to go to a quiet place.' I meant it sincerely, because noise drives me crazy. So he sent me to the Fort Bragg artillery training center and assigned me to a 155 millimeter howitzer, the loudest gun made. Three years later, I had lost my hearing in the ear near the howitzer."

The Look Of Things In the Fall

NEW YORK (AP) — When the second week of September rolls in, network television will resume regular programming with 58 established shows and 35 new ones.

Comedy will continue to reign as the most popular form of evening entertainment — 38 shows will be designed to keep us laughing.

Second most popular is a catch-all category of "dramatic anthology" which will contain 33 programs, ranging from "Laredo" (one of 11 Westerns) to sassy "Peyton Place" to "Flipper," the adventures of a lovable dolphin.

There will be a magnificent total of eight prime time hours a week devoted to running old feature movies — four programs spanning all three networks.

Variety and vaudeville programs will fill 12 programs and 11 hours of viewing time.

War will be a popular subject for both comedy and action shows, with at least 10 programs about men in uniform. Treatment will vary from the sober side shown in "Combat" and "Convoy" to a fun-war in "McHale's Navy" and "Hogan's Heroes," a new series set in a prisoner-of-war camp.

"Peyton Place" this season was successful with two half-hour shows a week. Next season, it will be expanded to three, and two other programs will imitate its semi-weekly form. "Dr. Kildare" will treat patients in half-hour episodes on Monday and Tuesday nights, while the teen-age rock 'n' roll show, "Shindig" will turn up for a half-hour on Thursday and Saturday evenings.

"Hullabaloo" and "The King Family," hour-long programs this season, will return cut in half.

Dean Martin will be star of a new NBC variety hour and Steve Lawrence, of a new CBS

'Drivers' Test' Is Set Monday

Millions of American drivers sitting in their own living rooms will be able to test their driving knowledge through a national audience participation technique during an hour-long CBS program, "The National Drivers' Test," to be broadcast Monday from 10-11 p.m.

The broadcast will test drivers on their driving judgment in two-car collision situations, on their knowledge of the rules of the road and on their ability to perceive driving hazards. Specially prepared film sequences will illustrate each question, and will be shown both in slow-motion and at normal speed in order to permit the viewer to share the experience of a collision or near-collision.

Viewers at home will be able to compare their answers and scores not only with other members of their families, friends and relatives, but with the results of a carefully selected cross-section of American drivers who will begin the same test minutes before the broadcast. Walter Cronkite and Mike Wallace will be the reporters.

New, Telegenic

Searching for Sports

NEW YORK (AP) — What network television wants — and needs — are some new organized sports, preferably ones with championship play-offs.

ABC, with understandable excitement, came up with a new one Wednesday: the national skateboard championship play-offs, which it will televise on May 29.

Roone Arledge, the network's vice president in charge of sports, explained that with television's passionate desire to cover exciting spectator games, "a great premium has been placed on all the very large, established sporting events."

In fact he estimates that "premium" is an over-all quadrupling in price over a four year period for the TV rights to the important, popular sports — baseball, football, golf and a few others.

With all three networks interested, there is a frantic worldwide search for new, telegenic sports.

NBC got there fastest with the mostest cash for the Monte Carlo Rally and will broadcast the endurance auto race Sunday night.

ABC has nailed the Le Mans race for broadcasting June 19. Unfortunately, nobody will show the Indianapolis 500 — it is all tied up for a closed circuit broadcast to theatres around the country.

Arledge has been offered — and reportedly turned down — such sporting events as the world's championship hair-styling contest.

ABC's search for vicarious thrills in people's lives will lead to coverage of the Irish Sweepstakes Derby (a famous event indeed, which few of the interested ticket holders have ever seen) on June 26 and the U.S.-Soviet track meet in Moscow at the end of July.

Studies indicate that close to half of the audience of the average sport show (as opposed to the mere coverage of a special event) consists of women. Arledge insists they are more interested in "the panorama and spectacle surrounding the events and in watching the clothes and manners and faces of the crowds than the contest itself."

Parachute jumping for sport,

while most colorful, is about the most difficult sport to cover, Arledge says, while hockey is the game least successfully exploited with the TV viewers. But baseball — with football — the most intensively covered sport of all — is the game he wishes could be speeded up for the benefit of the viewers.

"With all the competition, TV has created a sort of sports monster," Arledge admitted. "But we're all learning to live comfortably with it."

The currently thin ranks of cloak-and-dagger boys will be swelled by the addition of "The FBI," "Amos Burke, Secret Agent," "I Spy," and an unhabited comedy series hiding all of them, "Get Smart."

"Perry Mason" will move in its swan-song season to a Sunday evening spot opposite "Bonanza." The commander — and star — the air squadron of "12 O'Clock High," Robert Lansing, will be replaced by Paul Burke, playing a major. "The Farmer's Daughter" will finally marry the congressman.

Death will come to some 30 shows, among them "Wagon Train," "The Defenders," the Alfred Hitchcock Hour, "The Jack Paar Show," "International Showtime" and "The Doctors and the Nurses," all of which have been around for several seasons.

Leaders Studied In New Series

Men of power who have shaped the world during the twentieth century are profiled on "Men of Our Time," a new Channel 24 series which premieres Monday at 9 p.m. This first program will be repeated the following Sunday at 3:30 p.m.

The first of the monthly one-hour documentaries profiles Nazi dictator Adolf Hitler, the undisputed ruler of Germany for twelve years and the master of Europe for four. Hitler's spectacular rise is documented from his unpretentious beginnings as a member of the tiny German Workers Party in 1919 to his ignominious death by suicide in the closing days of World War II.

In the coming months, "Men of Our Time" will examine the lives of Nikolai Lenin, Benito Mussolini, Mahatma Gandhi, George V and Stanley Baldwin.
