



And the encouragement it holds out is the hope that, although the approach of the famed monsoon weather season undoubtedly heralds stepped up attempts by the Communist guerrillas to regain initiative and prestige, the United States may be in positions and in possession of tactics which can at least stand off the guerrillas during their treeks of weather advantage, and thus prove to them that they are going nowhere in South Vietnam-not, at least, by the use of arms.

As Correspondent Keatley analyses the military situation, the monsoon weather, by shutting down on our ability to use our planes for fighting and rillas a season for considerable success in a strategy of hitting at will and obtaining temporary triumphs almost anywhere they choose.

In addition, the guerrilla forces have to be conceded, even without monsoon weather, an indisputable amount of security in their own jungles, where air power and civilized troops cannot pene-

But, conceding these two advantages to the guerrillas, Correspondent Keatley finds that the actual nature of the combat in Vietnam has been changing n recent months, in the direction of greater proportionate losses for the Communists in every engagement that es taken place.

And he poses the possibility that, even furing the monsoon season, the guerrilla seimure of any position of imporsance could be converted into the occasion for a sequel engagement which would be more on our terms than the original guerrilla strike.

If this writing sounds as if American troops were going to be carrying most of the military load, that is perhaps a realistic guess even though Correspondent Kestley himself does not make it. There have been too many accounts of too many battles which have indicated that the South Vietnamese troops by themselves are not an all-conquering force, too much admission that, where we have installations, we no longer dare trust even sentry protection of them to our native allies, for anybody to assume that Americans are not going to be doing more and more of the actual fighting in Vietnam from now on. This is not only unpleasant to realize,

especially in view of all the high promises that it would never take place. It will be a process which, even if it . succeeds in one objective, that of giving full battle to the Communist guerrillas, will be losing Southeast Asia for us in the long run. It is an inescapable axiom that the more men we put in and the more conspicuously we make the battle there our battle the sooner even our swn supposed best friends there are gong to turn against us and want us out, they inevitably must want any outde military force out.

But we are not dealing with any ideal ituation, full of ideal policy choices. If ybody has made any sensible suggesion for getting out of Vietnam withut having first stalemated the guerilla movement, we have not seen it. ere have, it is true, been all kinds of efects in our own proclamations and liations of willingness to talk peace, these have not been defects our ce-minded friends in the world ildn't have got around if there had en any disposition from the Commu-

We see no prospect except that the nunist guerrillas are going to make seir big effort to achieve successes this immer, and that, secondingly, the inited States must see they gain no reat or lasting triumphs for themives. That makes Correspondent Kestreport as encouraging a report.


