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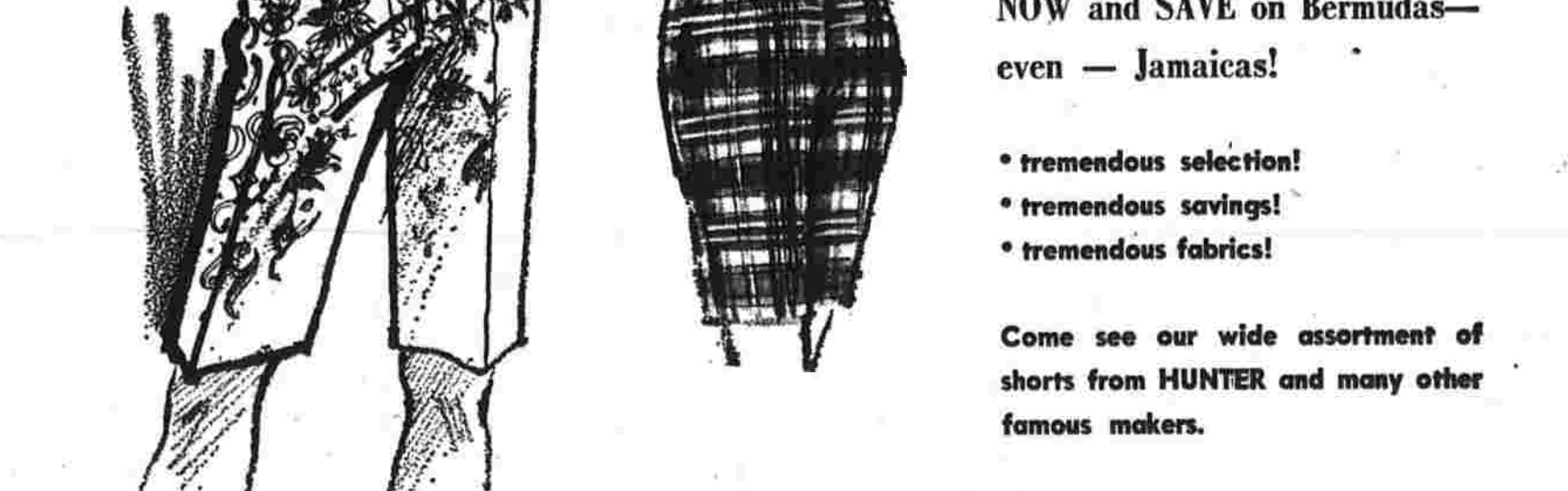

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That White House Silence

If Americans in the past two weeks have been dimly conscious that one particular set of news events was getting a kind of rest, Arthur Krook in the New York Times has pinpointed the reason. The President of the United States has for three weeks kept himself pretty much out of the public eye. His last public speech was made May 15; he has been off television; he has been out of the news broadcasts; his voice has not been heard; he himself has not been seen.

But the President has all the while, reports Krook, been as busy as usual, trying in quieter ways to accomplish what he was trying to accomplish by that great torrent of attempted public persuasion he was indulging himself in up to two weeks ago.

The contrast in them, one of mode and style of operation, between the present attitude of restraint and self control on the part of the White House, and the incessant approach to the eyes and ears of the world which preceded it. The surface impression has been an improvement. The arguments the President used during his period of inactivity, impromptu, spur of the moment appearances were often weak and often contradicted themselves from one appearance to another.

The personality and mood the President exhibited in these performances were not impressively reassuring. These surface impressions, when coupled with equally incessant gossip reports of the White House moods and moods the public did not see, created a basic national uneasiness.

The absence of all this has been a sort of blessing. 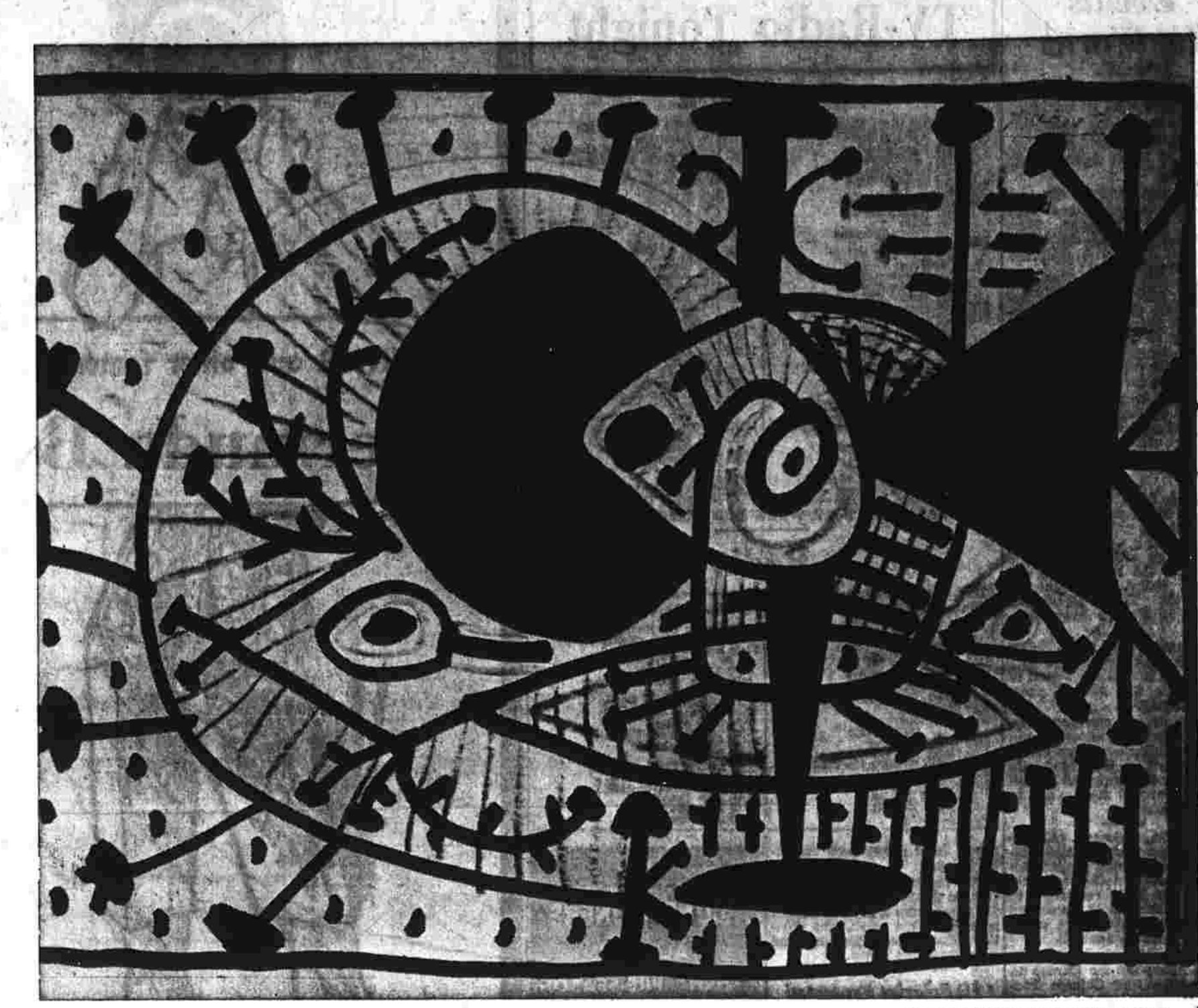

the entire state of Alaska would have been covered.

The bill, which would require two-thirds, pretty much took the starch out of the measure's bid for violence.

With the clock ticking against him, Sen. Evin rapidly called up a batch of Southern-backed amendments. They were rejected by top-heavy margins.

Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr., D-N.C., a former judge who has questioned the constitutionality of the measure and has been trying to get it out of the Senate, said the measure is designed primarily to sweep obstacles from the path of Negro voters in the Deep South. Negro leaders, liberal organizations and labor unions are united in opposing the administration's call for approval.

Senate passage will send the bill to the House where a similar measure has been approved by the House Judiciary Committee.

Johnson went before a joint session of Congress March 15 during the Senate. He urged swift action to prevent Negroes from being denied the right to register and vote. The bill reached the Senate floor April 22 and debate on it was generally languid.

The bill provides for suspension of literacy and similar voter qualification tests and the right to register and vote in Alabama, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi and South Carolina and parts of North Carolina and Virginia.

In other areas, federal registrars could be appointed and literacy tests suspended by federal court order if the attorney general establishes denial of voting rights on account of race or color in violation of the 19th Amendment.

Bolton Building Panel Held Legal; Must Return \$6,500 to Fund

According to an opinion of Town Council Harold Garity, the public building commission must return \$6,500 spent on preliminary plans for the junior-senior high school to the general fund.

Atty. Garity also ruled that the building commission is legal and that it has the authority to build a job building, although not specifically authorized by town meeting to do so.

The opinion, requested by the selection, was read at a meeting of the board of finance last night. Douglas Cheney, chairman of the PBC, and other commission members were present and held their own meeting separately after the joint discussion.

The selection had asked Garity if the \$7,000 appropriated for preliminary plans for the new school for town meeting May 16, 1965, should be returned to the general fund if the amount was expended on building and furnishing the school.

A history of this or-disputed amount was furnished Garity as follows: "The PBC budgeted this amount as \$6,500 for architect's fee and \$500 for site engineering fees. The \$500 was deducted from the total amount due the architect on his bill, so that less was spent out of the school fund for his fee. The board of finance had authorized the expenditure of \$6,500 for library books for the school from this. They now feel this was wrong and should let them spend this money for books. The balance of the bond money now stands at \$2,000 roughly, so something should be decided about the \$6,500 while there is still enough money left.

Garity, in his opinion, said that an agreement between the PBC and the architect was entered into whereby the architect received \$100. This was deducted from the total fee payment when a second contract was signed for the actual construction of the school.

He said, "At the time the Public Building Commission was created under the powers granted in Sec. 7-148 of the General Statutes, it was my opinion that it was a legally constituted body and had all powers set forth in the ordinance creating the Public Building Commission. In my opinion dated May 15, 1963, I stated that the PBC was a legally constituted body in this state. I am still of the same opinion and I believe its validity would be upheld in court."

The third opinion concerned who has authority to build a job building at the town meeting, when the sum of \$3,000 was voted as part of the 1964-65 budget and no one was given authority. The PBC, at the request of the selection, has obtained plans and the building has been let out by the PBC. The big opening set for June 7.

Garity said that it was his opinion, according to the PBC ordinance, that since the town meeting "did not direct any other board, agency or commission to construct the building, the public building commission... is empowered to do so."

The section of the 1960 ordinance quoted reads: "Except as otherwise provided said commission shall have and exercise exclusive authority and direction over the public building program in the town of Bolton and the alteration, expansion, modification or construction of public buildings, structures and appurtenant facilities other than normal maintenance, minor alterations and repair of such public buildings, structures and appurtenant facilities."

Joint Meeting Planned.

PBC Chairman Cheney said today that the \$6,500 he says was spent legitimately "will become available for reimbursement to the preliminary plan account from the bond money."

The question of exactly what portions of the remaining \$1,000 were legitimate preliminary plan expenses will be discussed at a joint meeting of the board of finance and the PBC some time next week.

Cheney said that \$295 remained in this account. Town treasurer Mrs. Shirley Riley said that this account was closed as of Sept. 30, 1965. A \$75 legal fee and a \$549.25 engineering expense were charged to this account.

Cheney said that he would find out how much of the \$6,500 for library books has been used.

The board of finance had recommended last year that the amount be taken from the bond money but that the PBC was still being considered as possible.

Brother, Sis Reunited After 51 Years Apart

By RICHARD ESADA

A full century of life dissolved itself into a few quick heart beats when a Manchester man and his sister embraced each other in a tearful and joyful reunion last week at Bradley Field.

The turbulence and calm of five blighting decades had cascaded through each other's lives since the excited 15-year-old German youth had clasped his 6-year-old sister in a final farewell embrace on a windy train platform in the modest German town of Landstuhl on a day in March of 1914.

That the two were about to stand apart on opposite banks of the first of two terrible world conflicts was then unthinkable to either. For Ludwig, Fischer, the journey meant a new life filled with the opportunity of a new country that yearned for fresh outlooks and energies. He had earlier tested America for 2 1/2 years before he returned to his fatherland to compare the two contrary worlds.

America was the better of the two, that was his decision in that spring of 1914 and he would go there. Maria, was destined to fall in love, raise a family and admire her grandchildren still in Landstuhl.

Landstuhl is still a village nestled comfortably in the hills and meandering forests of the Rhine country of West Germany. Like many German towns, it is dominated by a feudal castle, sort of an uncinqued monument to the people's permanence and stability.

Maria's home is comparatively small with five tiny rooms opening onto a quiet garden, standing in a neat line of houses built by Hitler for his "folk" before his ultimate world-fet mistake. She lives today in this house left her by her husband who was lost in action on the Russian front.

Ludwig's home at 253 Charter Oak St. is not too dissimilar from Maria's. The house is quite small, very comfortable, typically New Englandish in outlook but of an Old World mien within. It also has a peaceful garden in its backyard. He lives there with his two sons, William and Wardford, both employed at Cheney Bros., his age. Ludwig recently retired from Cheney Bros. himself.

She indicated that the war and hurry of motorized America is nothing foreign to her; Germany is also crisscrossed with traffic and quickened by ambition.

One of the goals of her visit will be to learn a little English; another will be to try to understand the character of the people in Manchester. There are reputedly many people here who can call upon the German culture and language as their inheritance.

At the end of her visit, what Maria and Ludwig may discuss is that not only have their private worlds been brought together but so those of their home lands.

Fair Short of Cash, But Not of Critics

NEW YORK (AP) — Rounding-up a board of directors suffered a court setback when the city and final season, the New York World's Fair today finds itself running short of cash and customers — but not suggestions.

Reopening last month at least \$7.5 million in the hole, the billion-dollar exposition finds attendance figures 20 per cent below the first-month total for 1964.

"Undersold and overpriced" is the way more and more commentators are describing the fair.

"This prudence attitude toward good, clean sex, and boosting the admission price from \$2 to \$2.50 is killing the fair," said Robert Nelson, manager of the "Dancing Waters" show in the amusement area.

Even the international exhibitors, who for the most part don't have to depend on sales and individual gate receipts, have complained about the admission boom.

So far, fair President Robert Robert Moses has stood firm in his determination to keep the admissions at \$2.50 throughout the day and evening and ban strip shows.

Nelson had planned to stage a "massless strip tease" by dancer Sherry Britton in an effort to attract more patrons to his establishment.

Fair officials rejected the idea.

A spokesman for the Hotel Association of New York City had another dire report.

He said advance hotel reservations are running about 35 per cent behind last year for out-of-town fair patrons.

"Of course," he said, "last year there was a rush by people who were afraid we were going to run out of rooms. So there is still hope that things will pick up."

"Why not drop the daytime price to no higher than \$2 and make it \$1 after 6 o'clock at night," he said. "And seeing the fair is open to free admission after 9 o'clock at night."

He said most of the concessions work on a percentage basis, paying in rent to the fair a certain percentage of the amount of business they do daily.

"So, if we drew in four times as many people at night, we would pay four times as much to the fair," he reasoned. "And the fair would go over the top."

Those close to the fiscal situation conceded that the fair corporation is dangerously close to the critical stage. Among other things, it sold 17 million ad-

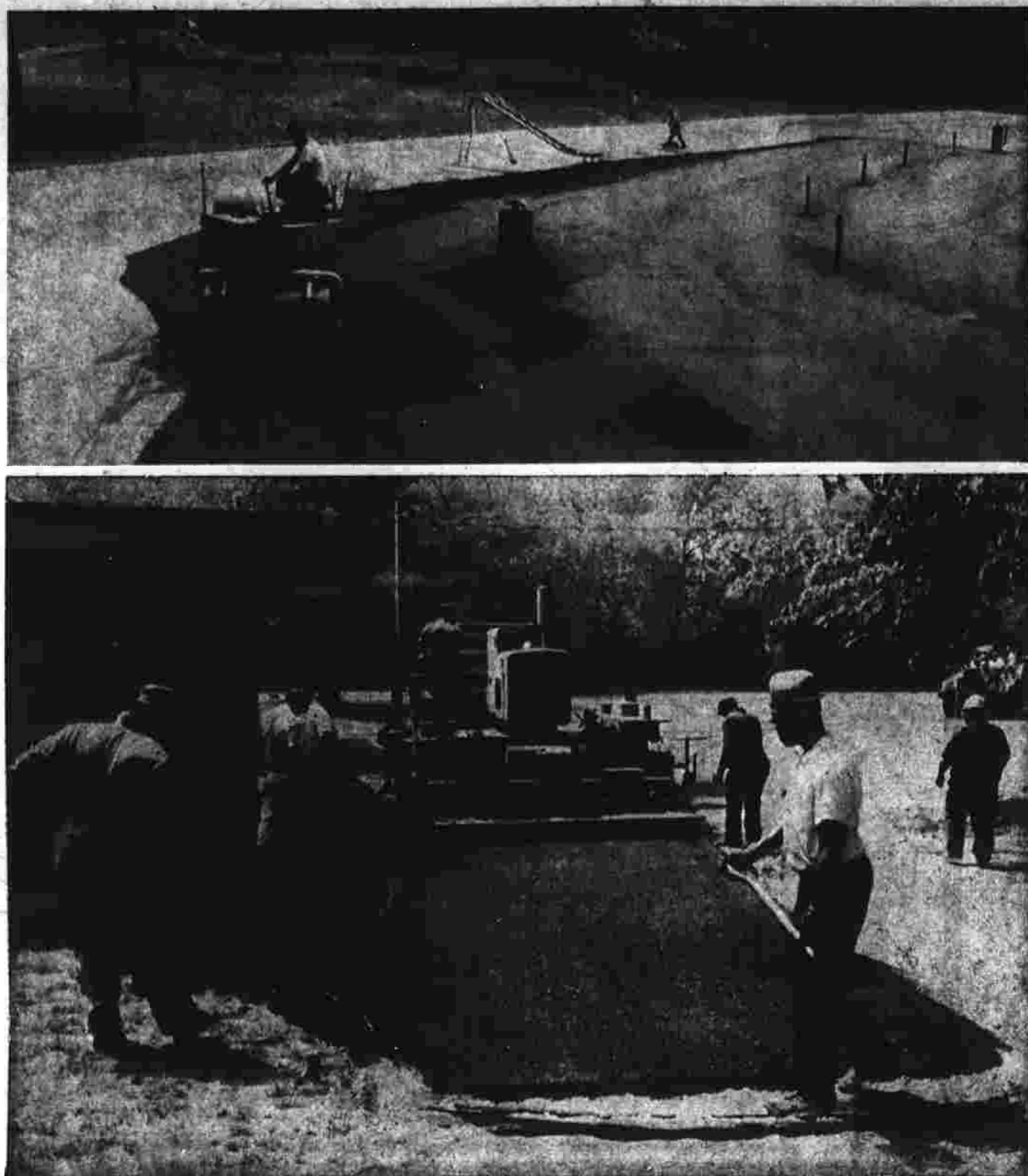

War Without Hate, It's for the Pros

DA NANG, South Viet Nam. (AP) — What this war needs is a little amateur hating. It is, as has been pointed out by a number of observers, a different kind of war for us. Our men over here are mostly professionals. We are used to winning our wars with masses of civilians in uniform led by cadres of professional warriors. But in this war in Viet Nam the whole show is run by the professionals. That makes for a different kind of war.

The civilian soldier is usually an angry soldier. He has to have someone to hate, such as Adolf Hitler in World War II. The professional soldier, on the other hand, rarely is fueled by emotion. War is more to him like a boxing match in which the payoff goes to long training and skill. One of the psychological burdens also is the fact that our side lacks a love object even at anybody. They regard their assignment rather as if it were merely a kind of unpleasant assignment rather than a fight. As the result of the present rotation policy, this seems less like a war to a finish than an extended training exercise under combat conditions. As Army captain comes for a year, a fighter pilot for 90 days. Then they go home, their places are taken by new men who have to learn from scratch and the war goes on and on. None of this is meant to criticize the men of the American professional fighting men here, but their performance which is excellent.

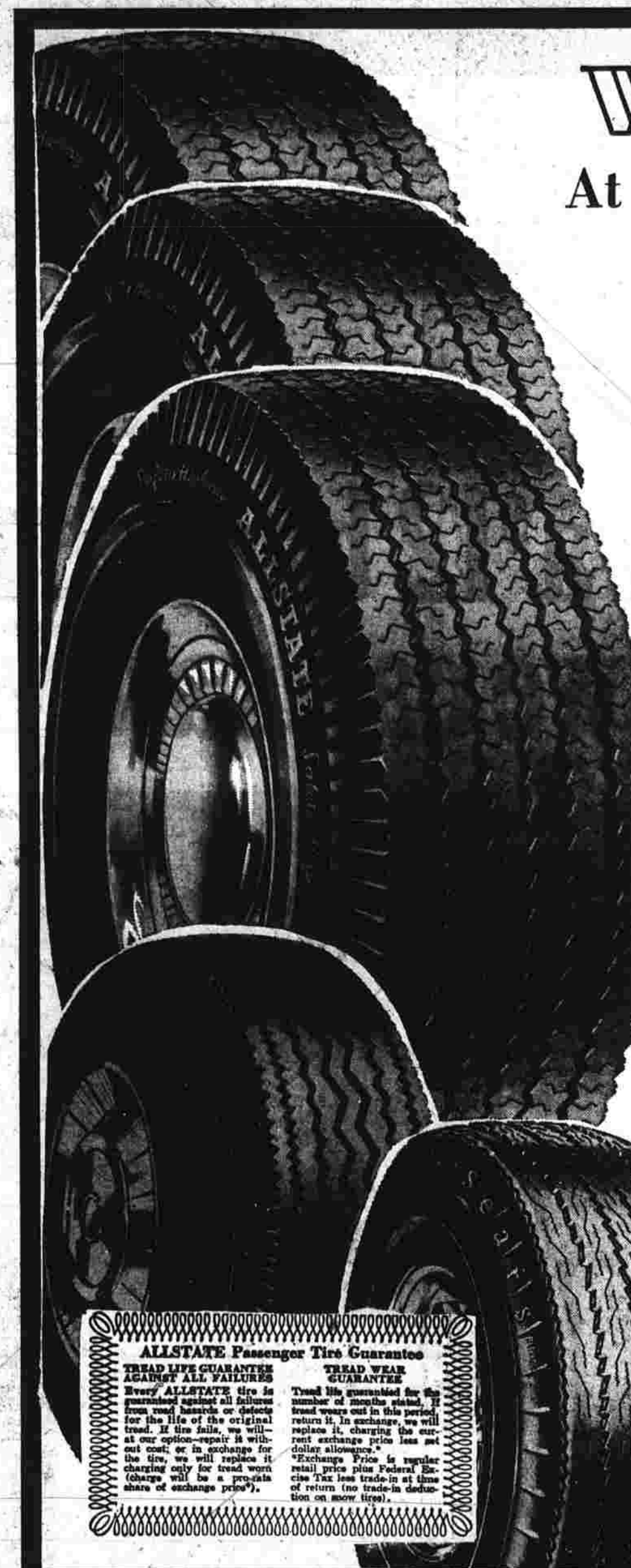

Wellnet Project College Students Live With Mental Patients

By JAMES F. DONOHUE
CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — On a quiet street near Harvard is a crowded house called Wellnet. Eight college students live there with eight mental patients.

Some patients, says Dave Kantor, Wellnet Project president, are "the people everybody has given up on."

Wellnet is a place to live for those who have no place else except the wards of mental hospitals. It is meant to be an alternative to endless days of custodial care.

In Wellnet the patient finds a family — his fellow patients and the students who, says Kantor, "bring to the house zest, enthusiasm, flexibility, a set of ideas, a great tolerance for the deviant, a consciousness of the human dignity of the patient."

"The world can be changed. Precisely the kind of

that the community should have more of. That is what we are trying to do. We are willing to keep people who are not bedridden and unproductive. The whole idea is to have one community, not one community of sick people and another of well people."

The students, five men and three women, attend Harvard and Radcliffe College. They pay \$20 a week room and board and take regular turns at house-keeping chores, as do the patients. The patients pay room and board as they are able. A student normally stays one semester at the house.

The Wellnet experiment began with another experiment when five Harvard students, as part of a psychiatry course, had themselves committed briefly to a state mental hospital.

Dean Carmel, Wellnet resident director, describes their relationship with another experiment in the back ward where people are literally forgotten and he said, "There people don't need to be here. They decided to get them out."

MHA Trims Wing Plans

The Manchester Housing Authority last night approved a final trimming from the plans and specifications for the West-hill Gardens addition in time for a bid opening in June.

Authorized were additional changes that had been recommended by Public Housing Administration officials, including reduction of hot water storage tanks. Chairman Theodore Brindamour had urged that the tanks be dropped in favor of instant gas hot water heaters.

The newly approved changes will be issued as addenda to the specifications.

The authority asked that its estimate of cost savings that will result from the design modifications be withheld, because bidding on the project has formally opened. Council Sanford Popper said he feared that the newspaper accounts might affect the bids.

The authority has approved the cuts to bring down the estimated bid price of the 100-

Six Subcommittees Formed To Plan for Regional College

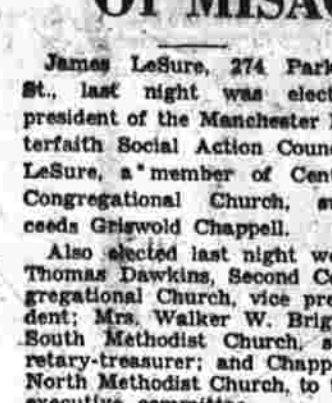

Flying in Red China Is Done in Old Style

EDITORS NOTE — On a flight of doom, Paper bags held at the ready, we look off the Southern new service in China in making his dispatches available to the Associated Press. U.S. reporters are barred from Red China.

PEKING (AP)—You leave the jet set behind you when you travel inside China on the Chinese People's Airline. It's back to the thunder of pistons and the popping of ears.

Airports are close to downtown in the old style the way from the hotel in Harbin to the airport is a long walk. The only other plane on the Peiping tarmac was a Viscount, used by the Chinese People's Airline on the run south from Peiking to Canton. There are no jets—the Peiking airport, even though it is about 60 miles from town, isn't big enough to take them.

At the conclusion of the four-day tour, two resolutions for travel in China: go by train whenever possible, and no sea shugs.

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Forms Ready For Project Head Start

Applications for Project Head Start are now available in local elementary schools. The project received federal approval last week and is slated to start July 8 and continue to Aug. 27 in three schools—Nathan Hale, Lincoln and Wad. del.

The project is intended for children who will enter kindergarten this fall and who, either through cultural or economic deprivation, may need a head start if they are to enter kindergarten on a par with their contemporaries throughout town.

However, any local youngster registered for kindergarten in September is eligible to apply for participation. All applications must be returned to any of the elementary schools by Friday, June 11.

There will be no cost to participants since the project is federally financed through the Economic Opportunity Act. Transportation will be provided where a need is indicated.

Shortly after June 11, the 60 children will be chosen and notified. Under the leadership of the school social workers and the school nurses, a team program will be initiated.

The team is composed of representatives from the following agencies: School Social Work Department, School Health Department, Office of Aid to Dependent Children, State Division of Child Welfare, Voluntary Nurses Association, Children's Services, Connecticut Community Child Guidance Clinic, and the YWCA.

Since the project is primarily for children from economic and culturally deprived families, an attempt will be made to involve the parents in field trips, playground duties, clean-up projects, and arts and crafts ventures.

The following is a list of the kind of daily activities that may be scheduled:

1. Activities related to improving the child's health, including health inspection and training in good health habits, and a made time with discussion of good nutrition.
2. Activities relating to improving the child's understanding, creative play, arts, crafts, musical activities, story telling, and others.
3. Activities to broaden the child's experiences including frequent trips within and beyond town such as to museums, shops, farms, cities, zoos, picnic areas, etc.

It is planned that on days when there are no field trips the session will last about three hours; on field trip days, several of which are planned each week, the session may be as long as five hours.

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House Passes Bill Curbing Lie Detectors

HARTFORD (AP)—Employers would be prohibited from using lie detectors on their employees under a bill passed by the House today and sent to the Senate.

Democrats tried unsuccessfully to amend the measure to allow the state police and local police departments — in their enforcement of the law — to use the tests on men applying for police jobs.

Rep. Robert J. Testa, D-Bridgeport, sponsor of the measure, said use of lie detectors on job applicants should be continued by police departments because of the "unique position that the law enforcement has in our society."

The amendment was defeated 129-90 on a roll call vote.

Minority Leader William T. Shea, D-Meriden then said that although they would prefer a bill exempting police departments the Democrats were generally in favor of the proposition of outlawing use of lie detectors by employers. Accordingly, they would vote for the bill.

The measure passed on a voice vote. Only a handful of "no" votes were heard.

The center for Hartford area youth will be located in downtown Hartford at 343 Main St.
