The Collins Speech LeRoy Collins first came upon the national scene as presiding officer of the 960 Democratic National Convention at Los Angeles. His selection for that role, and his performance in that role, reflected the fact that this Florida governor was in no sense the stereotyped Southern governor, but rather one breaking trail toward the future.

The present official position Mr. Collins holds in the Johnson administration illustrates that kind of appraisal of him. He is director of the federal Community Relations Service, which is dedicated to helping American living achieve some of the conditions civil rights law also tries to establish, but cannot always establish by mere fist. With this background and position, Mr. Collins was speaker at a joint banquet of the American and Inter-American Bar Association in San Juan, Puerto

Rico, the other night. In this speech, Mr. Collins branched out into the world. And he branched out into the world with such intelligence, with such sanity, that he felt it necessary to hold a special press conference before he made his speech in order to explain that, alrected at Latin America, they were not intended to be criticism of United tates policies now in the news.

After all, he pointed out, President ohnson himself had just given the FBI a special assignment to find out whether, after all, the Communists had had control of the Dominican rebellion. President Johnson may be searching for the answer himself."

This disclaimer and precaution was ecessary because what Mr. Collins alked about was Communism, and the dangers of giving it either blame or credit for everything that happens. "I hope we are learning," said Mr. Collins in the crucial passage of his speech, "that force is not always the answer to Communism but even can be-

come its greatest incubator. "The struggle going on all over the world is not some gigantic, devilish plot

Rather, he said, unrest in Latin America is caused by a "worldwide movement of undeniable aspirations for uman freedom and dignity" quite simiar to what this country has been experiencing in places like Selma. There is no reason, said Mr. Collins,

for the prosperous one-third of mandind to be frightened of such aspirations unless "in their panic they should elect to run out in front of the avalanche and try to make it come to a

"The easy answer," he said, "is to plame this unrest on Communism. But the truth is just not that simple. "It is not fair to the millions upon millions of people who struggle for no other reason than to improve their own and their children's lot in life-indeed it is an outrageous distortion of historyto credit their aspirations to Karl Marx or any of his latterday followers." Wherever there is human suffering

und resentment, Mr. Collins said, there will be "the activists of the totalitarian eft seeking to guide the inevitable change in their direction, just as there will be activists of the totalitarian right trying to preserve the status quo or recover what once was the status quo. "I hope we are learning that not everyone who struggles for change is an instrument of Communism and that

indamental change does not necessarily mean Communism, just as not sveryone who opposes Communism is a supporter of human freedom." It is pleasant indeed to have such

words coming from somebody who is at east in some association and identifieation with an administration which has been showing some signs of treating its subjects as if they hadn't qualified for ndergarten yet.

This was a trip originally designed when it seemed that Britain might be about to be welcomed into the Common Market. It was originally expected to symbolize Britain's amiable feelings toward the Continent.

The French rejection of the British application to the Common Market, plus subsequent diplomatic pulling and hauling centered around rival British and French relations with Germany, with the United States, and with the United States role in Europe, have all operated to add overtones and undertones to the Queen's visiting. If she uses words of reconciliation with the Germans, she may be allenating the French on the Continent and offending some of her own people at home, who haven't forgotten London and Coventry. At the same time, her willingness to smile and forget can run into trouble in Germany, with Germans who haven't orgotten the British bombing of Co-

The worst part of it all is that some of these seemingly catty questions—is Britain trying to steal Germany away from France?-are France and Germany going to make their own entents against British influence on the continent-are also fundamental questions, such as have played their part in history before. So far, one would judge, things are

a little better than they were at a similar stage after World War I. Then, instead of sending a Queen over, the British were giving the Germans their special permission to begin violating the naval restrictions of the Treaty of Versailles. That set in motion the mutual rivalry between France and Britain, the victors of World War I, which led them both to the point where the only thing they could agree on was to give Hitler Czechoslovakia and hope he would go make war on Russia.

Things seem a little bit better this time. But not too much better. Britain and France, two of the victors, are vying for the closer understanding with Germany. France and the United States are at cross purposes over the degree of prestige and influence the United States should retain on the continent, and France, in this connection, may have some instinct to play footsie with another World War II victor, Russia.
