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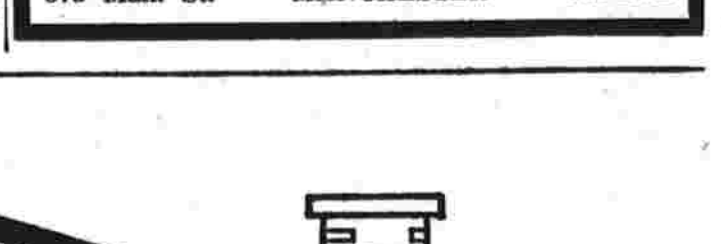

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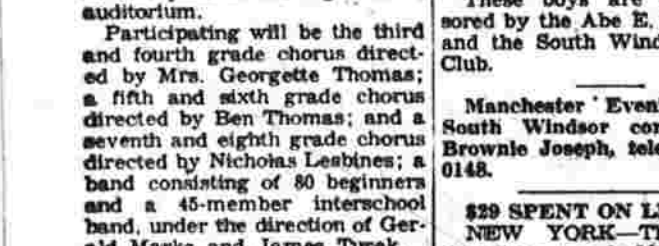

Grimy Japanese Miner Is Lifted onto Stretcher After Rescue

### 236 Feared Dead Japanese Mine Disaster Ignites Safety Dispute

TOKYO (AP)—A total of 236 men are feared dead in Japan's second worst postwar coal mine disaster. It threatened new controversy over safety conditions in sources of Japanese fuel.

Rescue workers recovered 219 bodies from the Yamano mine on Kyushu Island, where a gas explosion occurred nearly 2,000 feet underground Tuesday. Police said more than 17 other miners believed buried under miles of coal and rock. Of the 502 miners and other employees working in the pits when the explosion occurred, 216 escaped. Thirty-nine were hospitalized, most of them with carbon monoxide poisoning.

Investigators were seeking the cause of the explosion on Japan's southernmost main island, which has a history of mine disasters. The Yamano mine is only 20 miles north of the Omura pit, scene of Japan's worst postwar mine disaster in November 1963. That underground explosion killed 463 men.

Officials say mines in the region are plagued by rapid accumulation of gas. It was believed the Yamano blast might have been touched off by a spark from an electric motor or by dynamite used to loosen coal pockets.

Some survivors complained that better safety precautions should have been put in force. Government investigators checked the mine a month ago and recommended certain safety measures.

Industry Minister Yoshio Sakuruchi, who has been conducting a mine safety program throughout Japan, submitted his resignation to assume full responsibility for the series of mine disasters this year. A gas explosion in Yubari, Hokkaido, killed 62 miners in February, and 24 injured.

**Dean To Die**

Vera Michels Dean, a lady known for many years as an official of the United States Foreign Policy Association, and currently a professor of international development at New York University, wrote a letter to the New York Times the other day from her own background of attempted non-partisan and dispassionate expertise in the field of foreign policy, she wished to quarrel with the now famous statement of Secretary of State Dean Rusk when, in an address to the American Society of International Law, he asserted that he had questioned the wisdom and rightness of our Vietnam policy.

"I sometimes wonder about the probability of educated men and the establishment of a new world order that we young to learn—especially to learn how to think."

That was Mr. Rusk's famed insult to the professors of the land. As for the soundness of his anger and the logic of his criticism, it has seemed to many Americans that Mr. Rusk, in his official attempt to defend recent American decisions both in Vietnam and Dominica, has been a leader in the field of a stimulation of publicity and an all too nimble specialist in avoiding the contemplation of plain facts staring right at his nose.

Professor Dean, at any rate, takes off after Secretary Rusk, debating the vital question of whether we should, and in discussion on foreign policy which does not agree with our President and Secretary of State tell us we should think and believe.

On the way toward her argument, however, Professor Dean raises an interesting sub-question, in the following paragraph:

"Having met Mr. Rusk in his early roles of history professor and college dean, I cannot but wonder at the transformation that public service seems to have wrought in his concept and practice of intellectual freedom, and at the effect this transformation is having, not may continue to have in the future, on free discussion of foreign policy in the United States."

"It may well be desirable, in fact necessary, for Government officials to see only the point of view of the Administration they serve—although it is difficult to believe that for some at least of the highly trained and experienced personnel of the Department of State there is one side, and one side only, to such multifaceted crises, deeply rooted in history, as those of Vietnam and the Dominican Republic."

What bothers Professor Dean is her idea that if Dean Rusk weren't Secretary of State he would be writing a letter like hers, and teaching his students to question the complete wisdom of decisions in Vietnam and Dominica.

The answer has something to do with power. It happens all the time, John Foster Dulles was an outstanding churchman, who believed and acted on the necessity of not presenting the other side too hard, before he went to Washington and became the daring strategist of brinkmanship, in which the idea was to push the other fellow as hard as one could.

President Truman once found a fine fellow who was spending a great deal of time teaching his idea that the other fellow was to be offered him the job of being Secretary of the Air Force. He accepted the appointment with alacrity, and when someone pointed out to the President that his appointee belonged to a movement which was in favor of world law against war, Mr. Truman answered at such silliness and said his appointee was severing such connection, and the appointee got happily to the task of building us a bigger air force.

President Johnson, not long ago, was looking for a Secretary of the Navy, and found a nice gentleman who had spent most of his career being a "think" man for our foreign policy. Once, in an academic forum discussion, he had put up for theoretical examination a suggestion that the United States, in an effort to help guarantee world peace, be willing to place some of its great military power under the command of the

United Nations. When it was suggested that this idea was close to treason, the prospective Johnson appointee volunteered to make it quite clear he had never really meant such a thing, and then went on to prove that there was a big Navy heart inside him, after all, and he has, subsequently been proving that in office.

So there is indeed a transformation, which can come over the lips, the face, the reasonable, idealistic soul, and turn them into marbling tigers of practical action. And what all these souls are torn by seems to be the thrill of exercising power.

The excess they all give themselves in, and all it adds up to what might be written out and unannounced, some day, as the sickening epitaph of all humanity.

It goes like this: A private citizen, or a professor, can be allowed, up to limits, the privilege of thinking and caring about what is right; the individual who is in office with responsibility for the conduct of his country in the world no longer can afford such a nice luxury; he must think not of what might be right, but of what might work. There are two kinds of morality, one for private living, and one for public living. The two cannot be mixed. The private morality can derive from something like a religion. The morality which applies to the conduct of governments comes from the jungle, and has a right to stay there, until the other fellow moves out of that jungle.

That is how good men like Dulles and Rusk can, in office, eagerly and vigorously pursue policies which they would freely toast Foreign Policy Association, and the double standard by which the world keeps on doomling itself, telling itself, all the while, that this is the only practical, realistic thing to do.

**Maybe Hunzas Envy Us**  
 They are light-skinned Aryans who claim to be descendants of the ancient soldiers who helped Alexander the Great conquer his world. They live in the quiet mountain fastnesses of the western Himalayas, and they are called the Hunzas, and their women give birth to children at the age of 40 and live to be 100 years old.

The French experts, finding certain minerals in the water of the region, and a complete absence of poisonous fumes in the air, and noting that the Hunza women had been a leader in the field of a stimulation of publicity and an all too nimble specialist in avoiding the contemplation of plain facts staring right at his nose.

French and American researchers have found all the answers, in sending a full team of scientists, including physicians, botanists, anthropologists, and geneticists, into the Hunza region to live with these people for a period of some months and see if they can bring out some explanation all the rest of us on the world over can use to prolong our own life span until we too can feel youthful at 100. And this sounds as if it might produce the first real complete understanding and communication between the Hunzas and the rest of the world.

Wouldn't it be something if it developed that the Hunzas, for their part, were envious of all the rest of us, for our troubles and stress, for our decline and fall, for our loss of the power of a saneable age, for our earlier release from it all?

Barney Baruch says that men are born with these skills just as artists are born with skills. They can develop them in later life. There is also a suggestion to develop and this something has nothing to do with academic work. There is also motivation. A wife who like like clothes and a couple of hungry children can make a genius out of a very slow starter.

# New York State Abolishes Most Death Penalties

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP)—The state of New York today abolished most death penalties in the state.

Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller today signed a bill doing away with the death penalty in most cases.

Rockefeller, who had expressed reservations about the bill, said he would grant executive clemency to most — if not all — of the men who had been awaiting execution.

The bill abolished capital punishment, effective with Rockefeller's signature, except when a police officer is killed while on duty or when a convicted serving life commutes a murder.

Under the old law, death could be imposed for murder, kidnapping or treason.

Rockefeller said that he would commute to life imprisonment the death sentences of those who would not have been sentenced to death under the new law. Of the 29, three were sentenced to death for killing policemen.

Sen. Joseph S. Clark, D-Pa., has said opponents will filibuster against Senate action on the proposed amendment, a clear indication that the liberals do not believe at this point that they could muster the one-third of the vote to defeat it. Submission of a constitutional amendment to the states requires approval by two-thirds majorities of both houses.

Douglas said he wouldn't characterize the tactics he and other opponents will employ as a filibuster.

But he added: "The subject deserves discussion in depth. Legislators should represent people, not acres, not cows, not trees."

Dirksen said he is not worried about the possibility of lengthy talks.

"We've had filibuster threats before," he said.

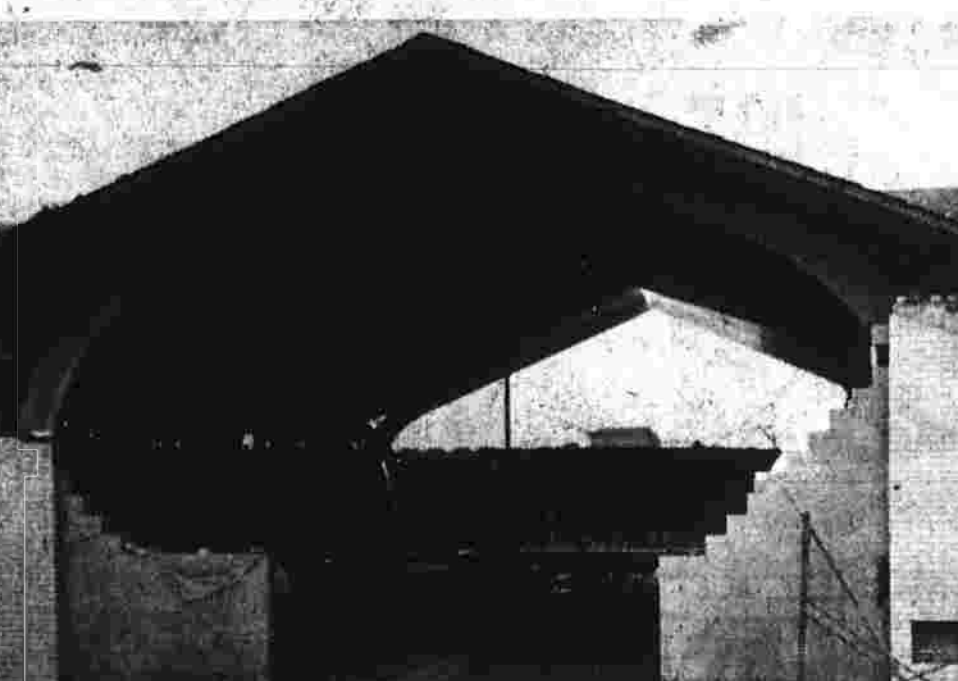
The personnel rules now provide for payment of accumulated vacation and sick leave time, upon the retirement or death of a municipal employee.

# Sum Voted For Heating At Bentley

As the result of a \$60,000 allocation voted last night by the town's board of directors, the town will advertise for bids on Monday for renovation and reconstruction of the Bentley (Hollister St.) School heating system.

Supt. of Schools William Curtis told the board that the bids will be opened on June 21 and that, by an immediate award of a contract, the greater part of the project should be completed when the school opens in September.

He said that whatever work remains to be finished then will be done by making classroom adjustments for a day or two. ### Even Barbecue Bunglers Win With Hamburgers and Franks

 Charcoal-grilled hamburgers and franks are as American as baseball. They all flourish in the good old summertime.  
 Give the summer chef some ground beef or good quality frankfurters, turn him outdoors and tell him a few facts of life about starting the fire.  
 Before using the barbecue grill, most experts suggest that a permanent layer of gravel 1/2 to 1-inch deep be put in the bottom of the fire bowl. This prevents the fire from burning. The gravel should be removed, washed and dried after four to six barbecues.  
 Build up 20-40 briquets or an equivalent amount of loose charcoal into a pyramid shape. Four 1/4 cup of starter fluid (a fluid sold specifically for use) over the charcoal. Let stand 2 to 3 minutes. Throw a lighted match on the charcoal. The fire should be ready in about 30 minutes by this method.

Heat 1/2 cup water to boiling, add bouillon cube and stir until dissolved. Mix cornstarch and remaining 1/2 cup water. Combine all ingredients. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Chill. Serve sauce over frankfurters.

Yield: 1 1/2 cups.

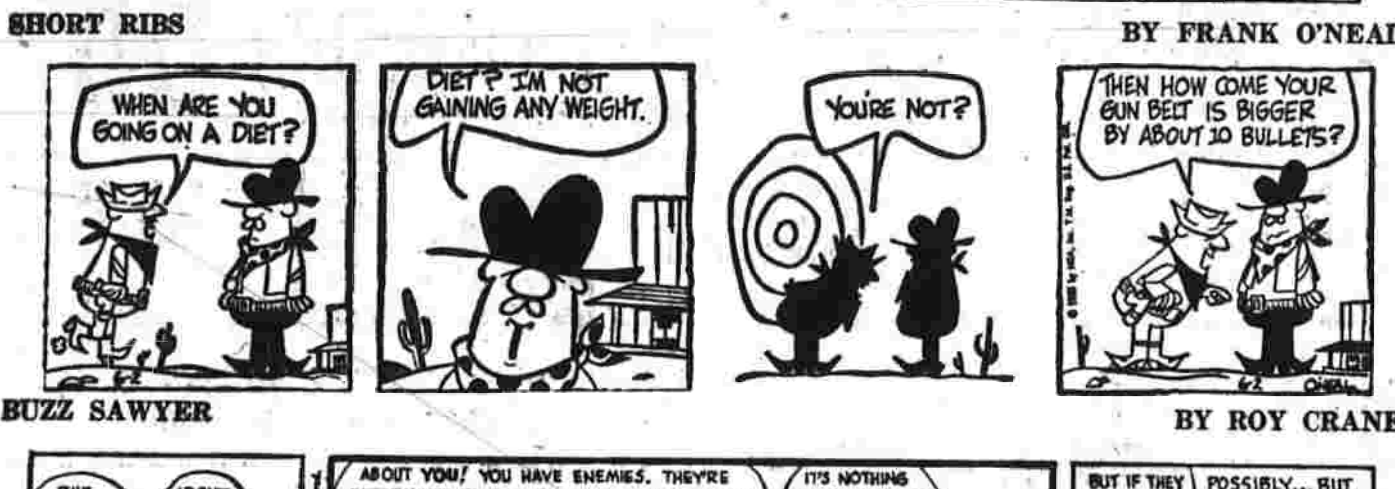
