Tornado Trips Texas Plains, Town Wrecked

HALE CENTER, Tex. (AP)—A tornado which bounded more than 20 miles across the Texas plains killed three persons and left about half of Hale Center in ruins Wednesday night.

The twister all but wrecked the business section in this farming center, which has about 2,000 residents, and damaged about half the town.

It destroyed the county courthouse, the police and fire stations, a hotel and the First National Bank. The funeral home was also destroyed. The hospital here admitted 48. Others were taken to neighboring cities.

Mrs. Floyd Shackelford was killed as the tornado crushed her farm home 2 miles east of Oton Center, which is 10 miles southwest of Hale Center, about northwest of Lubbock. Her husband was among three persons suffering serious injuries.

There also was damage near the village of Spangley, southwest of Oton Center.

State Police traced the tornado almost to the outskirts of Plainville, 20 miles north of Oton Center. It ripped out telephone wires and interrupted communications between Lubbock and Amarillo for hours.

Broken power lines and debris blocked U.S. Highway 87 between Hale Center and Plainville.

Lubbock, Amarillo and other cities sent Civil Defense units, medics and other supplies into the damaged area. National Guardsman and Army engineers came from Plainville.

Tornadoes have pounded the area for about an hour before the tornado struck Hale Center about 9:30 p.m.

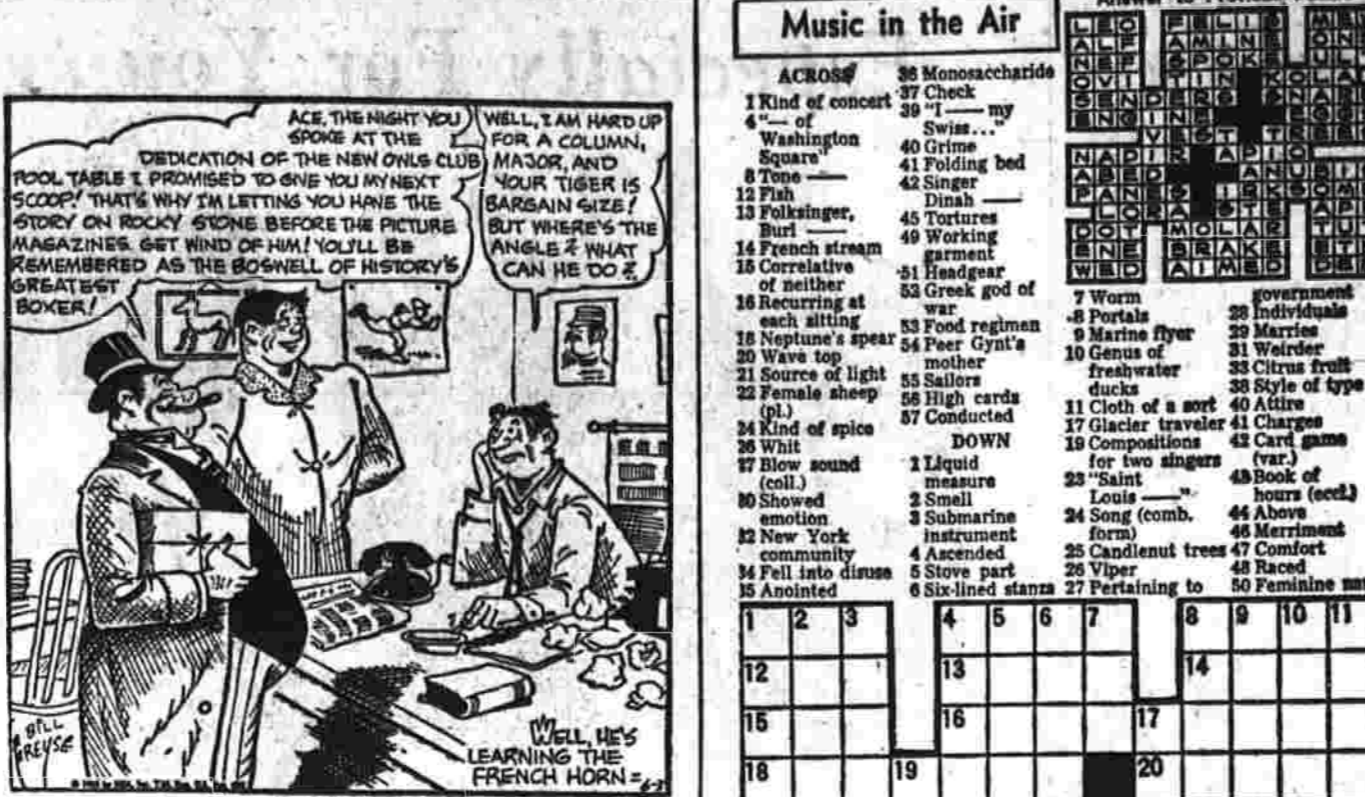

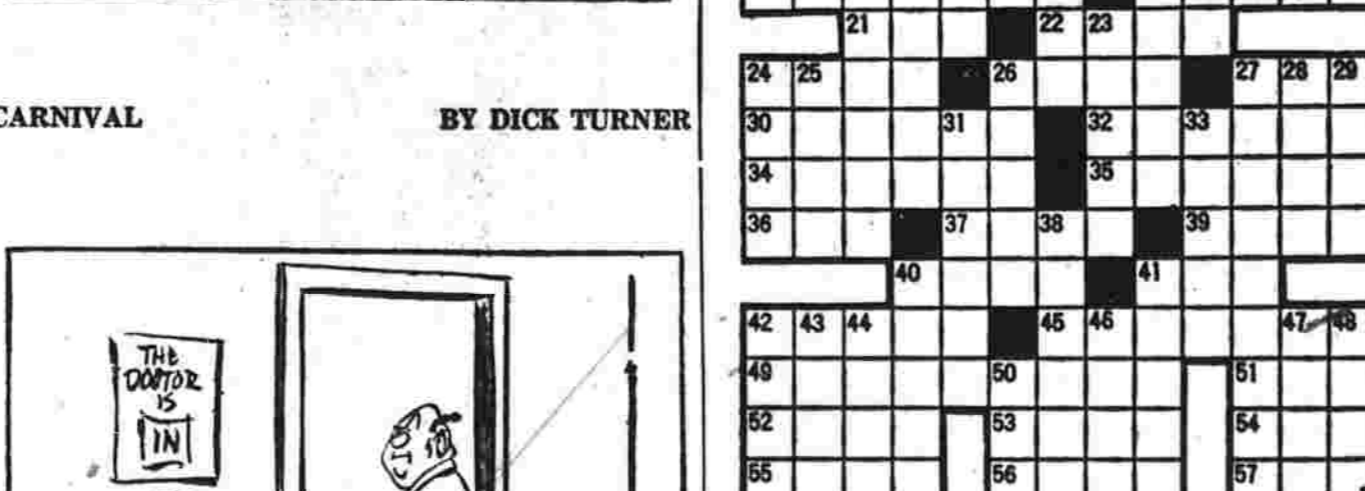

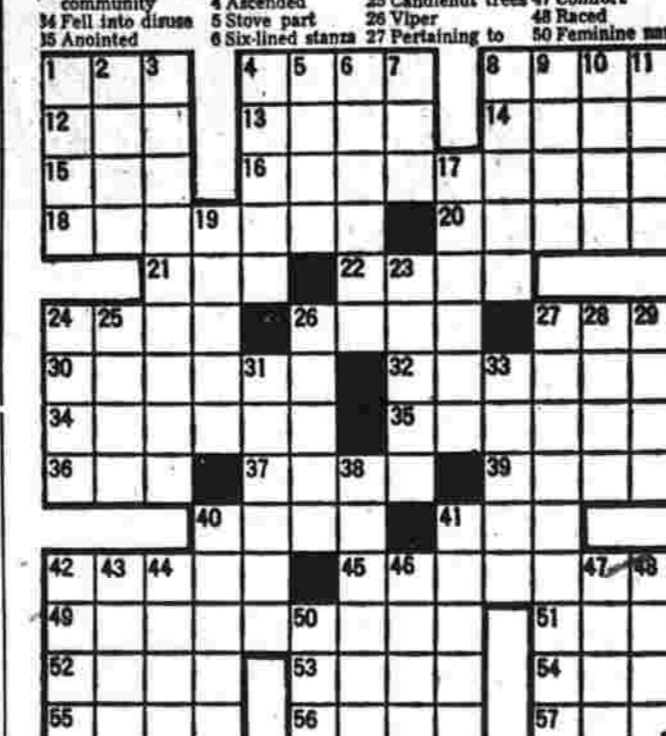

Space Capsule Back To Original Schedule HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—Astronauts James A. McDivitt and Edward H. White II whirled into the second day of their marathon space mission today, their spirits high and their flight plan back on schedule after some hectic early hours during which White took a celestial stroll.

The Mission Control Center laid everything apparently favorable for the Gemini 4 spacecraft to complete its full 7-hour, 20-minute mission. If there are no hitches, America's longest manned space flight will end at 12:20 p.m. EST Monday with a parachute landing in the Atlantic Ocean 400 miles southwest of Bermuda.

During a pass over the Houston control center on the 14th orbit today, White told capsule communicator Virgil I. Grissom a few more details about his 20-minute excursion into space during orbit No. 3 Thursday.

White described the "vivid blue" waters of the Gulf of Mexico and the Caribbean. He said he clearly saw Houston, Galveston Bay and even Clear Lake, 20 miles away, as he floated on the end of a golden 100-mile-long and 1 1/2 miles wide, in near the Houston hoods of both astronauts.

Marines Leave Santo Domingo

Drivers Evade Truth Computers Catching Application Errors

HARTFORD (AP)—Electronic is making it easier for the state to check out information on applications for drivers' licenses in Connecticut.

The State Motor Vehicles Department finds that a surprisingly large number of applicants do not tell the whole truth.

A recent survey showed that between 30 and 35 per cent of the applicants previously licensed in other states, did not give accurate information on their licenses applications in Connecticut.

The Connecticut application asks for previous traffic violations and convictions. The motor vehicles department has a key to speed up the check on suspected offenders.

The department immediately makes a check in two ways: through a form sent to the other state, and a computer card sent to the National Driver Register Service in Washington.

The federal service comes under the Bureau of Public Roads in the U.S. Department of Commerce and has been in existence for about three years. At present more than one-half of the states participate.

Not all of the states respond to the older method of detection, mainly because of budgetary staff. As computers become more numerous, the response is growing from various sources.

At present, the federal service keeps track only of drivers involved in fatal accidents and guilty of driving under the influence of liquor.

If a report comes back different from that given on the application, the driver is called. Whether he is brought into court and charged with perjury or not, will not be changed, but the investigation, depends on the seriousness of the offense.
