



But we are beginning to think we could do nothing better with our money and our brains and our imagination and our human courage. In fact, looking back at the state of things on earth itself, we see proof that we can do a great deal worse. Now that we can all feel ourselves beginning to live, in our minds, in an outer and wider and limitless world, why not rejoice that it is indeed a new and permanent dimension to life, which has arrived, perhaps, just in time?

An Almost Impregnable Mr. Bundy nencement Sunday at universities throughout the land sounded like a concerted defense of the administration at Washington against some of the professors who have been criticizing its foreign policy.

Perhaps most interest centered on the ceremonies out at Notre Dame, where McGeorge Bundy, now considered the most important single man in Washington next to the President, was being awarded an honorary degree. Bundy, by all accounts the prime mover for the bombing of North Vietnam, and, more recently, the President's special emissary to Dominica, made his response to his academic critics in two

First, he gave them a brief dose of his wit, in which he observed that this seemed to have been an academic spring in which "those who are the least learned make the most noise." Second, Bundy made one of those neasured intellectual statements which are his familiar trademark, and which so often silence or parry criticism because they seem to weave a defensive web which offers no handles or openings to critics.

"I think," said Bundy in defending and interpreting what the policy he has helped architect has been trying to do, "that we have given respectnot always in the perfect order and not always in perfect time, but always, think, with basic national goodwillto the fact that there are interests, hopes and purposes not the same as ours; that we have conducted our affairs so as to permit and even to encourage the diversity which the world has by nature of its peoples and its countries and its climate; and that we have not sought to make this an Amer-ican century, and I think that in the main we have met this challenge, where we could and as we could, posed not for us alone, but for the hopes of all free men by the ambition of the

There, say we, is a sentence such as we ourselves would like to construct, a whole paragraph long. It is so well woven, it seems to touch and gather up so many strands that it might be judged to be almost impregnable, leaving those who disagree with the actual practical recommendations of Bundy on the actual policy firing line no recourse except to snarl their

instinctual and emotional and liberal dislike of the man-policy combination. But Mr. Bundy is not quite that secure. He weaves an imposing edifice of logic and gives that to us without ever inviting us to take a look at, and debate with him, the foundation upon which it all rests. He asks us to accept the reasonableness of what he does and of how he does it without first obtaining, by argument, exposition and persuasion, our consent that he ought to be engaged in doing any of it in the

On that basis, on the basis that his own fundamental instinctive and emotional assumptions are open to question. he can be attacked, and we have no doubt that the academic fraternity, or at least the loud part of it, will soon be off after him with full hue and cry.

What Mr. Bundy assumes, from his

own instinctive and emotional make-up, is the inevitability and the rightness of a holy war against Communism. He brings this concept front and center after two Popes, John and Paul, have both discounted the rightness and logic of any such holy war. He would not get very far with this concept with John F. Kennedy, the man who originally brought him to Washington, and who could think and rationalize on a level with any of his scholarly assisants. But, given a pragmatist efficiency expert from Detroit as a colleague, and a mind full of Texas-style instincts and judgments for a superior, and Mr. Bundy finds himself suddenly at the very pinnacle of possible influence for any man not President, and able to prosecute a holy war without justifying it or declaring it or conceding that, apart from the little tactical mistakes he so charmingly admits, it may in-

Mr. Bundy charmingly disowns the goal of an "American century," in which we would be taking our enlightened whirl at running the world. That means we don't seek an American em-

The trouble is, however, that we could get to just about the same places on the map, just about the same type of operation, if we merely followed the slightly more modest goal of consider ing it our imperative mission to get into the field agains

nothing not to perpetuate the theory and excuse and tradition behind all empire-making, and all rivalry in empiremaking, that Mr. Bundy is so much less givilized than he sounds.
