NRDD Expected to Dissolve, 3-Town Bill Gets Approval

With the passage by the State Assembly of a bill authorizing the dissolution of the three-town North Central Refuse District, the stage has been set for dissolving the four-town Northeast Refuse District (NRDD), when its 12 representatives meet tomorrow night at 8 in the Municipal Building Hearing Room.

The NRDD, comprised of Windsor and Bolton will continue under state statutes, as a paper organization, pending a six-month waiting period for withdrawal by the separate towns.

In the meantime, the towns of Vernon, South Windsor and Bolton will band together as the nucleus of the new district.

The precipitous action was decided upon last Thursday by the executive committee of the NRDD, following General Manager Richard Martin's disclosure that Manchester was satisfied with its present landfill method of refuse disposal.

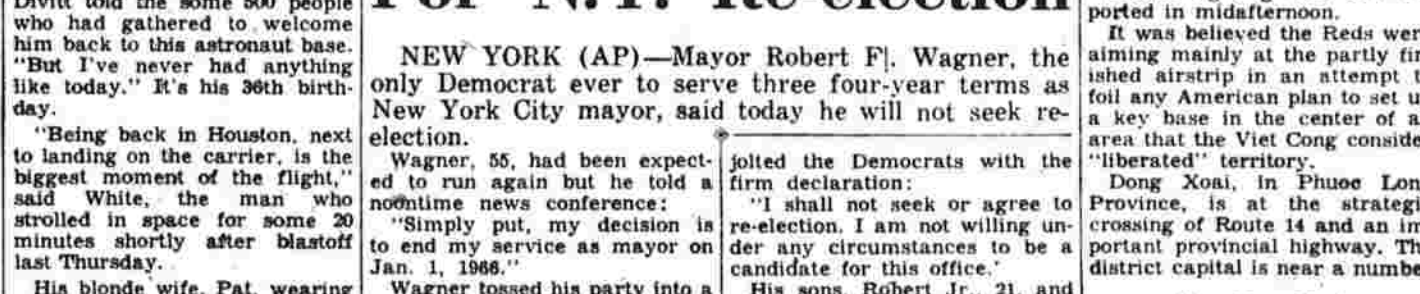

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—The embassy essentially is an oblong structure with offices in New Delhi between the four outer walls which cannot be expanded. CofC Seeks To Continue Refuse Study

In a last minute effort to keep the Northeast Refuse Disposal District (NRDD) from being dissolved tonight, the Manchester Chamber of Commerce is urging the town board of directors and its five representatives on the district to continue their membership.

The NRDD executive board agreed last Thursday to recommend that the District be dissolved and that the towns of Vernon, South Windsor and Bolton join the new North Central District, especially created for them by this week's passage of a state enabling act.

The executive board's action was precipitated by General Manager Richard Martin's statement that Manchester is satisfied with its present landfill method of disposal and that this town would be ready to take any action on any method.

The representation of the other three towns, faced with critical problems of disposal, prefer immediate plans action.

Though the meeting is at 8 in the Municipal Building Hearing Room.

Sheltered Workshop End To Failure for Retardates

By BOB KILPATRICK washers. A tenth is the only retardate working in the center's garage. He is a mechanic's assistant and attends classes at Cheney Tech twice a week.

Recently an eleven Manchester resident has begun to travel to the workshop on a trial basis. He has the others his training will be varied and his job varied.

Some may have to go to the workshop for the rest of their lives. They are terminal retardates, usually classified as trainable.

There are at least 350,000 trainees in the United States, according to the President's report. These moderately retarded people usually don't progress beyond the mental age of 10. These moderately retarded people usually don't progress beyond the mental age of 10.

But others in this group, like a few in the sheltered workshop, are eventually get a job outside.

These mildly retardates, are only mildly retarded and actually the largest segment of the nation's retardates—about five million. Their IQ range from 25 to 70.

But, said Fendell, the community will have to wait until then to join that figure.

WHO BENEFITS? exactly who will benefit from a workshop in town? Retardates who fall into the 35-70 range, said Fendell.

This range would include both trainable and educable, but the trainable would be terminal and would go to the workshop for the rest of their lives. The educable would be those who could not socially adjust to a real job situation in the community.

And, in addition to these, Fendell says the workshop would benefit those who could not get a job once they had left high school but who could benefit from specific vocational training. The workshop would also be open to the emotionally disturbed when the schools cannot take in; it would be open to the physically handicapped, too.

Right now, says Ronald Scott, assistant superintendent of schools, there are about 200 trainees at the Cheney St. School who could use a workshop. But Manchester has many terminal cases it cannot place into outside work settings.

These, some of whom have IQ's as low as 10, will remain at Manchester for the rest of their lives. They have had so much room and to these terminal retardates it must be a significant amount of time, space, and money.

But there are two other factors that deter from future dependence on Manchester. On a regional basis, there is a workshop for the retardates in Manchester. It is a day field concurs with this idea and favors the establishment of a workshop here.

In Town Claims

Unemployment compensation claims filed in Manchester last week rose by about 7 per cent over the previous week, according to the state labor department. A total of 597 claimants drew checks locally for the week ending June 6.

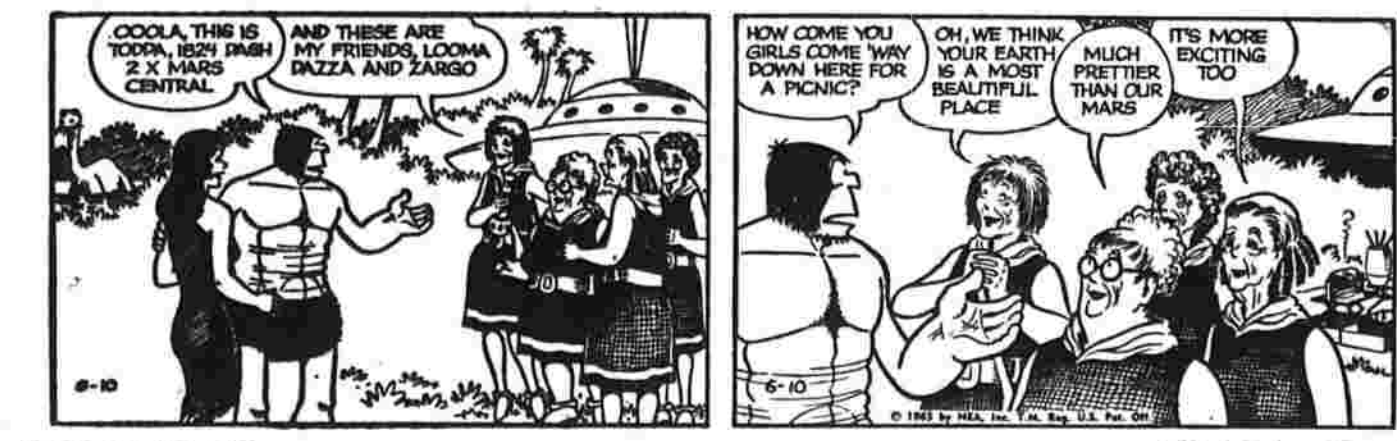

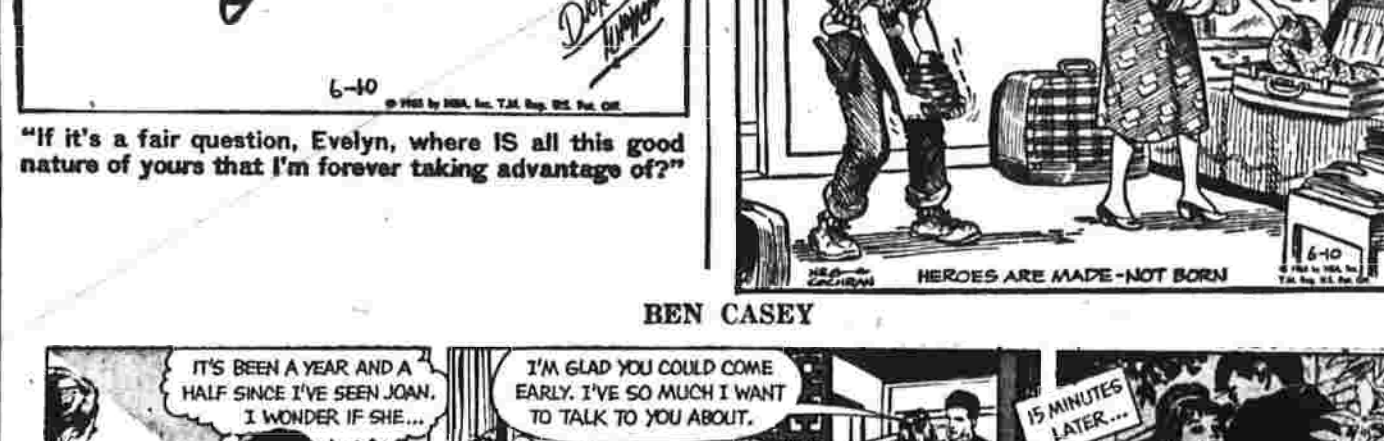

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—The battle for Dong Xoai ended today with heavy casualties on both sides. The routed Viet Cong left distressed headquarters in ruins, strewn with bodies of men, women and children. U.S. military authorities said the latest count of American casualties in the battle were three dead, 15 missing and 12 missing. Eight of the missing were crewmen on two helicopters destroyed by enemy fire. A newsman who visited the town 40 miles north of Saigon said several American bodies were found in the ruins.

Old Hotel Burns, 2 Dead, 15 Hurt

PLAINFIELD, N. J. (AP)—Fire swept through the sprawling century-old Victoria Hotel today, taking at least two lives, injuring 15 persons and leaving four more missing. More than 100 permanent and transient guests fled the blazing three-story building, located near the business district of this central Jersey community. One policeman, patrolman Robert Miller, 31, led about a dozen persons to safety from the building and then suffered a deep smoke inhalation in an attempt to rescue a woman. Both Miller and the woman were hospitalized, neither in critical condition. The blaze burned out of control for 2 1/2 hours, reducing the frame structure to charred rubble. It also jumped to a number of smaller buildings attached to the main structure. "It was fierce as hell," said Philip Traynor, Philadelphia, one of the men who escaped through a window. The doorway was blocked by smoke and flames. The blaze started in the main fire department headquarters and the houses were first spotted by telephone dispatcher at the fire.

New Turnpikes Proven Safer Than Old Roads

CHICAGO (AP)—"Now this is a long trip so play it safe; drive on divided highways where the traffic is heavy." As old as this advice may seem, it is sound. Statistical show that despite heavy travel, divided highways, such as turnpikes, parkways and interstate highways, have a much lower fatality rate than older highways. During the three-day Memorial Day holiday period this year, in a record 67 percent, died in traffic crashes, divided highways were the safest routes. An Associated Press survey indicated today that 12 deaths occurred on such roads in this period. And year-long records show the same results. National Council records show the fatality rate on turnpikes and interstate highways is less than half the national average and less than one-third the rural mileage death rate. One key reason is that head-on collisions are extremely rare on divided highways, separated by road or by ditches, deep ditches, mounds or tough steel or concrete barriers. Head-on collisions took 7,361 lives in the United States last year, accounting for 16.4 percent of the 47,800 traffic fatalities. The tolls are dratted to that level on the all-water level. Sun-Filled Bermuda Needs Showers Badly

HAMILTON, Bermuda (AP)—Bermuda, the land of sunshine gladly would swap the parching glow for a week of steady rain. The drought-stricken British colony is conserving every drop of water in its shipping charges — for 1 million gallons of water from the United States. For its drinking water Bermuda depends largely on rain caught in the gutters of the picturesque white-roofed houses and drained into basement tanks. But the rainfall has been well below normal since the beginning of the year. In May it was only 98 of an inch, and would have been below the low-est recorded for May — 8 of an inch in 1949 — if a brief cold front hadn't come on May 21. The end of May rain came too late to save the cucumber crop. It gave other vegetables a new lease on life. Water conservation is being practiced by the Bermudians, who know well the dangers of drought. All hotels have placed signs over their wash basins urging guests to be careful of the water supply. The U.S. Naval Station and the U.S. Air Force's King's Bay Base have their own distill plants, but car washing has been banned there. Many hotels, businesses and some homes use well water supplied by the Washington Water Works for sanitary purposes. These wells are replenished by rain water that filters through underground pockets within the island's limestone and flows on salt water that seeps in from the sea.
