SOUTHURY (AP)—Emma Francis Morey was 91 and James John Wilson was 86 and they wanted to marry for the sake of the companionship it would bring.

But they were afraid. "They thought everyone would laugh at them," explained Mrs. Beverly Calkins, who manages the rest home where the elderly friends reside. "So they put it off and put it off." Mrs. Calkins said. For the past few months, they would be seen walking around the grounds hand-in-hand. Mrs. Morey, a widow, and Wilson, a widower, sat together at their own special table. "They were always together," Mrs. Calkins said. And gradually, their fears faded away and wedding plans were made.

They were married Sunday at a brief ceremony in the rest home. Four generations of Mrs. Morey's offspring were among the guests at the ceremony and the reception that followed. One of the guests was Mrs. Morey's son, George, 82, of Shelton. "She seems to be very happy," he said of his mother, who had been a widow for almost 35 years. "She now has companionship and that's the best thing in the world for her." They'll continue to live at the rest home, where they have taken over a double room.

Commerce Post Goes To Collins

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson tapped LeRoy Collins, former Florida governor, today to be the new undersecretary of commerce.

Collins, 56, is now director of the Community Relations Service in the Commerce Department. Whether he will have a double title, enabling him to continue in community relations work, was left inconclusive by the White House. This service was created by the 1964 Civil Rights Act. Presidential press secretary George E. Reedy said that in any event Collins would be available for consultation and advice and his experience in the community relations field would not be lost. Reedy said he had nothing to say about whether the community relations post might be offered to someone else, or who it might be. Collins was elected governor of Florida in 1964 and served six years.

Husband Held In Shooting of Hartford Woman

HARTFORD (AP)—Mrs. Helen Detelj, 46, was shot in the abdomen early today, police said. They arrested her estranged husband on a charge of assault with intent to kill.

The address of the husband, Anthony Detelj, 49, was given as Route 149, Westchester, a section of Colchester. Police said they recovered a .38-caliber revolver. According to police, an officer was checking doors on his beat at 1:15 a.m. in the area of Farmington and Sisson Avenues when he heard a shot. A few minutes later, the officer saw Detelj enter an outdoor telephone booth and try to make a call. The policeman questioned Detelj, who led him to his wife's apartment.

Mrs. Detelj was sitting in a chair and still conscious. At St. Francis Hospital her condition was termed critical.

Cites Health Needs

HARTFORD (AP)—A task force on mental health services for children has reported a "truly staggering need for improvement" in state facilities. In a meeting at the State Capitol Saturday, the task force called for early preventive measures to keep disturbed children from ending up gravely ill in institutions.

The task force was one of 16 groups in the statewide Mental Health Planning Project, surveying the needs of 14 state regions and four special fields of concern.

The group reported a "staggering" amount of mental illness in childhood. It said about 10 percent of the school population, — over 50,000 children — needed help.

Mental health programs, said the group, should be organized on community or regional bases. The task force recommended training such people as parents, teachers, clergy and general physicians in the fundamentals of mental health.

The group also called for a regional system of comprehensive mental health centers and children's councils in each of the 14 regions.

State Vote Light

HARTFORD (AP)—Preliminary official figures show that less than six per cent of the eligible voters turned out Tuesday for an election to choose 84 delegates to the state constitutional convention.

Ellis T. Gessuso, Secretary of State, reported Saturday that only about 70,000 of the state's 1,373,000 registered voters participated.

Voters were electing 14 delegates from each of the state's six congressional districts. Republicans and Democrats put up seven candidates apiece in each district. Voters were faced with no choices except in the First District.

Mr. and Mrs. James Collins, who challenged the First District Republican slate under a "protest Republican" label, lost by a better than three-to-one margin. Their names had been placed on the ballot by a special petition.

One of their Republican opponents, Raymond E. Baldwin of Glastonbury, was the high vote-getter in the election. The former governor, U.S. Sen. and Chief Justice of the state Supreme Court of Appeals received 12,982 votes.

N.H. Judge Gets Tough With Rioters

LACONIA, N. H. (AP)—The courts cracked down today on two score persons arrested in a night of wild rioting by thousands of motorcycle racing fans gathered for weekend racing events.

Judge Sniderman ordered \$500 cash bail to be posted by 10 blue jean and T-shirt clad defendants, the first to be brought to District Court, on charges of failing to leave the scene of mob action on orders.

On that charge, violators can be fined \$500 and jailed for a year.

800 Flee High River In Kansas

KINSLEY, Kan. (AP)—About 800 persons — more than one-third of this Edwards County seat — were evacuated ahead of flood torrents pouring down the Arkansas River from Colorado and Western Kansas today.

"We moved out everybody south of Coon Creek and most of the east end of town and the hospital," said Sheriff Lloyd Britton.

Some hospital patients were taken to facilities in Spearville and Dodge City. Others went to their homes or to a nursing home on high ground in this city of 2,300 persons.

The destructive flood swept out of Colorado last week and is moving at two to three miles per hour across the Arkansas River Valley which winds across much of southwest and south-central Kansas.

The flood, with secondary crests sustaining high water levels for 24 hours or more across a width of up to five miles, left heavy damage at Syracuse, Lakin, Garden City and Dodge City before sweeping into Kinsley and heading toward Larned and Great Bend.

Britton said he didn't know how many patients were in the hospital but that all were moved.

"I believe at least half of the town is involved in the flood," he said. "But not that many (SIC) have been evacuated."

He said the river had been rising all night, seven inches in

Bernard Baruch, Dies, Adviser to Presidents

NEW YORK (AP)—Tributes began flowing in today, eulogizing Bernard M. Baruch, capitalist-philanthropist and adviser to presidents of both parties, who died Sunday night of a heart attack at age 94.

At Baruch's bedside when he died in his home were his son, daughter, son-in-law and former South Carolina Gov. James F. Byrnes, an old friend. Baruch had been ill for a week.

Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, just returned from Paris, told newsmen Sunday night at Andrews Air Force Base, near Washington:

"We have lost a very great man, a counselor of presidents and one of the most respected elder statesmen of this century."

Aldal E. Stevenson, chief U.S. delegate to the United Nations, issued this statement:

"We have lost a remarkable citizen whose acumen and energies have benefited the nation as well as countless good causes."

"I bid goodbye to an old friend with sorrow and gratitude for his useful life and for the privilege of knowing him."

Through shrewd speculation in the stock market after graduating from City College of New York, Baruch parlayed a part-time job into more than a million dollars by the time he was 30. He amassed many more millions, but lost interest in wealth except to use it for large donations toward medical research, education and charity.

Born in Camden, S.C., Baruch was taken north by his parents when he was 11 years old. Baruch was a Jew, of Portuguese-Spanish extraction on his

mother's side and German on his father's.

Baruch's father emigrated to South Carolina in 1855. He served as a surgeon with the Confederate army through the Civil War. He was one of the

leaders of the original Ku Klux Klan in South Carolina. The elder Baruch became a successful physician in New York.

During World War I, President Woodrow Wilson named Baruch chairman of the War Industries Board.

Because Baruch was forever delving for accurate information, President Wilson called him "Dr. Facts."

Baruch once said he just wanted the facts, adding: "If you get all the facts, your judgment can be right; if you don't get all the facts, it can't be right."

Baruch urged on succeeding presidents, Warren G. Harding and Calvin Coolidge, that war debts be canceled.

Friends reported that Harding listened with warm interest and that Coolidge just listened. However, both endorsed his suggestion for a standby industrial mobilization plan, in case of another war.

Hard of hearing in his later years, Baruch often spoke of persons coming to him for advice but not hearing his answers.

"They usually want to be encouraged to do what they are already doing," he said. He commented in his autobiography that friends long had told him that many of his pro-

Algiers Youth Mobs Cheer for Ben Bella

ALGIERS (AP)—Crowds of youths took to the streets in Algiers today to demonstrate in favor of deposed President Ahmed Ben Bella. Troops and police were rushed to the city's center.

Soldiers fired shots in the air to disperse the crowd which chanted "Vive Ben Bella!" and "Ya-hyah!" (long live Ben Bella!).

Special riot troops of the security police were called out to bolster troops. Some demonstrators were arrested and hustled away.

Nearly 1,000 youths demonstrated Sunday night but were quickly broken up.

For many hours today foreign newsmen were unable to send dispatches out of Algiers.

Troops appeared in today's demonstration for the first time since the predawn coup unseated Ben Bella on Saturday.

The demonstration broke out in the afternoon near the post office and quickly grew despite police and army efforts.

The tough gendarmes rolled up in big gray trucks with sirens over the windshields and windows. They spilled out,

Brown Removed From Ruby Case

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—Dist. Court Judge Joe E. Brown, the jurist who presided over the Jack Ruby murder trial in 1964, has been removed from further proceedings in the case.

Brown requested today that he be relieved. He gave no reason, saying, "I don't think a judge has to give reasons for personal decisions he makes."

Judge Dallas A. Blankenship, the judicial officer in Dallas who assigns judges to various cases, said Brown's removal is "effective now."

Blankenship said he has not yet decided which judge will replace Brown in the Ruby case, nor whether he will direct that further developments at the trial court level be removed out of Dallas County.

Pickets Protest Suspension of N.J. Policeman

NEWARK, N.J. (AP)—Newark police picketed City Hall for the fourth straight day today to protest the suspension of a white patrolman who shot and killed a Negro motorist.

About 100 policemen kept up the continuous protest, which has been orderly except for several minor incidents early Saturday.

Mayor Hugh J. Addonizio accused the demonstration of "striking to split our community in two" and of "providing a rallying point for every malcontent, hoodlum and bigot in the area."

The pickets have been marching continuously since Friday, carrying placards protesting the suspension of Patrolman Henry Martinez, 29, a five-year veteran of the force.

State Colleges Get \$3 Million In Federal Aid

WASHINGTON (AP)—Grants totaling some \$3 million to help finance construction of new facilities at Connecticut colleges were approved today by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

HEW Secretary Anthony J. Celebrezze listed the Connecticut grants which would amount to \$6.7 million in construction of new facilities at universities throughout the country.

The funds were provided through the Office of Education under the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963, which authorizes aid to institutions of higher learning desiring to build or remodel facilities.
