Sheinwold on Bridge

By ALFRED SHEINWOLD

If bridge players could only guess correctly they wouldn't need to read bridge columns. Since this would be true for me, I won't complain about bad guessing; I merely point out that anybody who does occasionally guess wrong should read this column.

Opening lead — Seven of spades.

South won the first trick with the king of spades and wondered whether to get to dummy with a club to try the diamond finesse or to get to dummy with a diamond to try the club finesse. Since North was a chance of dropping the king of diamonds South led out the ace of diamonds and then led a low diamond.

It was the wrong guess. East won the return and won a low spade. South eventually tried the club finesse, and West returned his last spade. East then defeated the contract with three spade tricks.

South makes the contract if he leads a club at the second trick. He gets to dummy with a club to try the diamond finesse, and makes the contract with five diamonds; two spades, two clubs and a heart. Isn't it a pity that South made the wrong guess at the second trick?

No Guess Needed.

Anybody who reads this column wouldn't waste his time guessing which fines to take. He'd take both fines.

Declarer should play the queen of spades from dummy at the first trick. East must duck since he only has one spade in the hand. When dummy's queen of spades is played, the first trick, declarer can immediately try the diamond finesse.

As it happens, the diamond finesse works, and South has no further problem. If the diamond finesse had failed, declarer would return to dummy with diamonds and would eventually try the club finesse. He would be home.

Thousands Flee Arkansas River

GREAT BEND, Kan. (AP)—Thousands of people continued to flee ahead of the great Arkansas River flood but it started to show signs today of developing middle-stage, slowing down until reaching Great Bend.

The water here rose rapidly, but an earlier forecast of a 17-foot crest was revised downward to between 13 and 14 feet. Authorities expressed cautious optimism that the city would escape extensive flooding.

Great Bend levees have been extended by sandbagging to 10 1/2 feet, and it would take an estimated 8 feet over banked to top them. The forecast is for a crest 5 feet above flood level around noon today.

River spotters also reported the flow had diminished to about a mile an hour, indicating a lessening of pressure as the flood spread over the broad plains in the Great Bend area.

A temporary dike on farm land 2 miles southwest of Great Bend broke shortly before midnight.

No homes in the area were threatened, but a permanent dike about three miles from the city should help divert the water back toward the main channel.

At Dundee, 5 miles upstream, the flood widened from four to seven miles before falling. Later, further upstream, reported that its two-mile levee was holding.

The Arkansas approaches Great Bend from the southwest and bends south of the city from west to east.

As a precaution, about 2,500 persons were asked to leave their homes in lowland west and south of Great Bend.

Back of the flood in Kansas, there have been three deaths, according to the Red Cross, and an estimated \$2 million damage, an estimate made by Gov. William H. Avery.

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Post Quits Publication In Automation Argument

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York Post has suspended publication temporarily in a labor dispute with the printers union over automation.

The afternoon newspaper's publisher and president, Donald Schiff, said Tuesday night he would not meet with Bertram A. Powers, president of the New York Typographical Local No. 6, unless he signed a contract with the Post which quit the union and agreed to use the computerized typesetting system to be introduced into the Post's operations.

"Mrs. Schiff also told the typographers that the Post was willing to consider the principle of sharing the savings from the union but only on a basis that was related to the profitability of the paper," Mrs. Schiff said that no paper in the world had agreed to anything like what the New York newspaper typographical union was demanding as a share of its typing operations.

Powers told the men, the statement said, that "management and the union were far apart on the issue."

The publishers of the paper's other dailies have agreed that the union will share in savings, regardless of profits, said Powers.

"The (Mrs. Schiff) is attempting to introduce the profit sharing plan at a prior condition to the sharing savings. She is trying to force better terms than that given to the other publishers," Powers said.

The union also got a \$12 weekly wage package increase over two years and a stipulation that no new automatic processes for setting type could be introduced in composing rooms without the union's specific approval.

The union, in its negotiations with the Post which quit the publishers' association in 1963 during the 114-day newspaper strike, has asked similar concessions.

However, the Post has sought the right to negotiate a contract differing from that of the publishers' association. It asked for a different sharing arrangement on outside type and the right to install a computer without specific union approval. It was requested by the newspaper that it not be required to share savings when it was not making a profit.

The Post is considered New York's oldest paper and traces its history to 1811 when it was founded by Alexander Hamilton. According to the Audit Bureau of Circulations, the Post had a circulation on March 21 of 27,582 daily and 260,000 on its weekend issue.

The Post is one of Manhattan's six daily newspapers. The others, all members of the publishers' association are the morning Times, Herald Tribune and Daily News, and the afternoon World-Telegram and Sun and Journal-American. The two other members of the publishers' association are the Long Island Press and Long Island Star-Journal.

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South Windsor Board of Education Votes Changes in Career Status

The board of education voted to change the career status of teachers in the South Windsor school system last night to approve recommendations made by the board of career status.

The board of career status, headed by Superintendent Charles Warner, presented the recommendations to the board of education at a meeting held at the school last night.

The recommendations are: a master's degree or 30-hour equivalent as a condition of employment; a provisional certificate at the time of application; and four years of service in South Windsor at the time of placement.

Connecticut teachers with tenure in another Connecticut town will be eligible for career status in South Windsor after the first year of tenure in South Windsor.

Supt. Warner pointed out that in order to obtain a provisional certificate, a teacher must be completely certified. This revision replaces the implementation for establishment of a career status in South Windsor for placement on the master's schedule.

Also required was two years' experience as a career teacher in South Windsor for eligibility for placement on the master's schedule.

Board member D. P. Cavannaugh read a further inclusion stating that "the superintendent shall determine if the teacher and professional growth of a teacher on career or master schedule have for two years failed to satisfy requirements of such teacher will be reduced one step on the career scale."

The same provision is followed each year until the salary of the teacher shall not exceed the amount they would have been paid on professional status.

Supt. Warner said he felt that the first re-evaluation of a teacher was found to be failing to satisfy requirements of work and professional growth, income should be withheld, but no reduction from the present salary made.

Also approved by the board was a change in school organization as stated in the rules and regulations. William Perry presented a five-year study on the administration of the Westhill Gardens housing project.

and Development Command. Among major reasons for hope, he and others said, are: the fact that malaria is a disease that clears up through natural immunity. Some people naturally are more bug-proof than others — mosquitoes usually avoid them — and scientists have some ideas as to why this is so.

A fair amount of knowledge has been found as to what seems to attract or repel blood-sucking insects — how they are governed in choosing their favorite spots.

A few bug repellents do a fair job of making a mosquito go elsewhere.

Detailed research is going on to find why these work, and to turn them into a repellent that is safe and effective. Some repellents are being tested in the field.

It is admitted, that the five bug repellents will also be tested before the best is chosen. Green Man's repellent is being tested in New York of late to see if the bug is attracted to it.

Hal Boyle Viet Fort Taj Mahal Of the Hills

KEE SANH, South Viet Nam (AP) — They call the fortress built here by the U.S. Army's Special Forces "The Taj Mahal of the Hills."

It is the northernmost of scores of camps of its kind built in a string of points throughout South Vietnam. It lies only 10 miles south of the demilitarized zone that divides the warring land.

"It's the most beautiful of all the camps—and possibly the safest," said an officer on the supply plane that flew me here. Beautiful, yes. But safe? The possibility of being overrun, or betrayed from within, makes none of these camps a haven.

The Khe Sanh garrison lies on a plateau only four miles from the Locbin bunker, a 1,000-foot-deep gorge yawns at one end of the airstrip and down it tumbles a series of waterfalls in heavy splendor.

Reddish-brown berries ripen on hundreds of coffee trees on an adjoining plantation owned by a Frenchman whose father was slain by guerrillas. Green hills undulate in a green haze that hides their savagery.

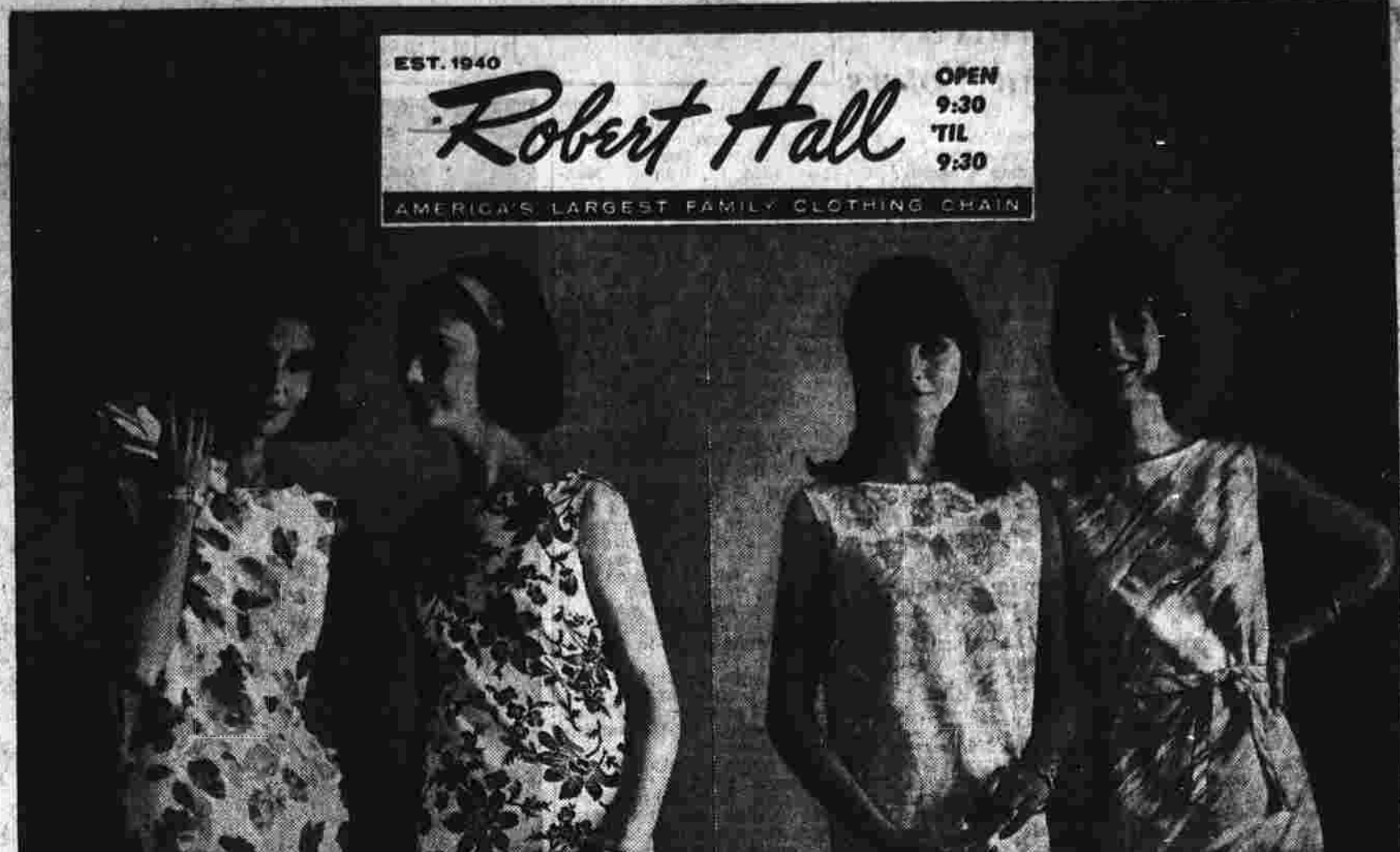

Five Projects Approved By Rhode Island Voters

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP)—Rhode Island voters have approved five referendum questions by margins of better than three to one.

More than 45,000 of the state's eligible voters turned out for the special election Tuesday.

Approved were \$10 million worth of bond borrowing and two other major issues at a cost to the state and the communities of more than \$1 a vote.

The turnout in Newport—4,440 or 85 per cent—was the largest in the state as compared with 6,800 or 85 per cent, in Providence.

Newport voters came out solely for the continuation of Moses Bridge tolls to help it improve the proposed Jamestown-Newport Bridge, which was approved 20,729 to 10,896 across the state.

West Greenwich voters were the only ones to reject any of the state-wide referenda. They turned down the bridge proposal, the \$10 million bond issue for state college facilities and the Rhode Island Recreation Building Authority proposal.

The proposal to permit spending of a previously-approved \$3 million dollars in bond money for the Rhode Island Junior College in Warwick, rather than in Providence, was the widest margin of approval. The vote was 28,798 to 8,469.

Public, Parochial Schools Try Shared Time Program

CHICAGO (AP)—The Chicago area begins an experiment with shared time programs this fall in public schools and overworked parochial schools.

A fourth program has won tentative approval.

Under shared time plans parochial pupils would study their religion and related subjects in their church schools and courses such as math and sciences in public schools.

The proposal has been tentatively approved by many Protestant and Jewish groups. Their opposition was limited, at least temporarily, two weeks ago when a Catholic priest dismissed a property owner's suit challenging the legality of one of the programs.

"Anything we do in shared time is in the center of an experiment," the Rev. Fr. McGinnis, a Protestant minister and president of the city's Roman Catholic school system, said in an interview.

"There's no dispute that a priest's duty is to teach the universal faith. Everyone is loyal with it."

Fr. McGinnis said the reasonable attitude "for Protestants, Jews and non-believers would seem to be: 'Let's take a whiff at this thing.'"

A leading critic of shared time has been the Rev. Robert J. Bond, executive secretary of the 80-church Chicago Diocese of the United States, a Protestant organization that led the opposition when the school board first considered the issue in March 1964.

"I'm still opposed to it," the Rev. Mr. Bond said.

Two of the programs are in Chicago proper. One approved by the Chicago Board of Education after hearings last year, calls for pupils in a new Catholic high school to take math, English and other classes in a new public school.

The other, approved earlier this month, involves about 100 freshmen at a North Side public high school who will take some of their course work at a nearby Catholic school.

In suburban Elk Grove, pupils of a Catholic junior high will attend some classes in public schools.

The most ambitious of the four programs will involve 1,200 children at the overworked Lincoln Park, Without a shared time program.

Pension Board Backs Increased Benefits

The town pension board had gone on record as endorsing a plan for increasing the pensions of the town's older former employees, and is asking the board of directors to approve a \$18,000 addition to the pension fund to finance it.

The board is also asking the directors to extend the pension plan to cover the elected town treasurer and the two registrars. The town clerk, who is also elected, was included in the plan several years ago.

In addition, actuary Homer Anderson has been authorized to investigate the cost of improvements in the police department retirement plan that would both increase pensions and decrease service requirements.

Approval has been granted for pensions for John S. Polson, an employee of the town engineering department; and Joseph Forbes, a water department filter plant operator. Both will retire July 1.

The pension improvements for town employees already required were discussed by the pension board last month. Although the board voted at the time to send their recommendations to the directors, they delayed action pending a more detailed report from actuary Anderson.

The plan calls for an increase of 15 per cent in payments on services benefits earned under the town's pre-1954 pension plan, and an increase in 25 per cent on benefits under the present plan earned before a similar improvement went into effect last year.

The plan also provides for a 10 per cent increase in the pension for the town after 1968. All the improvements would apply to persons who retired before 1963.

The minimum payments for new pensioners, who have been in the pension program since they became eligible, will be increased from \$30 to \$35 for those participating for less than 15 years and from \$50 to \$60 for those in the plan 15 years or more.

The whole package would cost about \$18,000.

The Manchester Patrolmen's Association is asking a 50 per cent pension for policemen retiring at age 50 after 25 years service and for firefighters retiring at age 50 after 25 years service. Anderson is looking into the cost of the request, but has estimated it will increase the cost of the plan.

The board is also reviewing a proposal to turn the administration and management of the town's insurance company. The investment portfolio is now being handled by The Hartford National Bank & Trust Co.

Town Tables Law to Back Water Ban

A proposed water-use ordinance, drawn and recommended by Town Council Irving Aronson and which would provide for penalties up to \$25 per day for violators, was tabled unanimously by the board of selectmen last night, until such time as Aronson and Town Water Dept. Lawrence Wolkoff take up with a better reason for the move.

Both town officials said that the present 5 to 9 p.m. ban on outdoor use of town water was ordered primarily to ease a present-day problem and that there is no critical water shortage at present.

Wolkoff warned that now is the time to convene water and not two months from today, when the predicted low rainfall makes the situation really critical.

Aronson reported that the voluntary ban, even without penalties, is serving its purpose and that most water users are cooperating. He said that the proposed ordinance would cut down on complaints and the townspeople who call up and put the finger on their neighbor's water.

Director Nathan Taylor criticized the need for an ordinance which would penalize the users of the town's water supply when it is the fault of the town's management for not moving to increase the water supply.

Taylor had called attention to the need several months ago. Public Works Director Walter Foss assured the board that plans to increase the water supply were now in the works but that their implementation will still about two months off.

Aronson in urging adoption of the ordinance, said, "We have not needed a large number of calls for water in the past but there is no sense in looking the horse in the teeth when he is kicking." He said that the ordinance would be placed against all of the town's water customers, including customers of the privately owned Manchester Water Co.

Aronson explained that the town has control over the Manchester Water Co. and can't tell it to order a ban which could penalize its customers. The North End water company has placed no ban but has asked its customers to cooperate in a voluntary conservation of water.

Director Harold A. Turington cautioned against passage of the ordinance, saying, "It's very easy to pass an ordinance but it's difficult to remove it. There may be some unintended consequences in its enforcement."

So, for the time being, the 5 to 9 p.m. ban on outdoor use of town water will continue until further notice, with violators answering to their neighbors and to their consciences, and not to the police.

Rockville Three Face Two Counts Of Forgery

Three men connected with Tolland town, a housing development of Old Stafford Rd., Tolland, have been arrested after an extensive investigation of reported irregularities.

Arrested Thursday were Milton N. Ackerman, 52, Far Rockaway, N. Y.; J. P. Amidon, Willington, and Abraham H. Feinstein, of West Hartford.

The three are each accused of two counts of forgery and one count of conspiracy. Ackerman was released under \$10,000 bond, Amidon under \$1,000 bond, and Feinstein under \$5,000 bond. They were arrested by state police under a bench warrant issued by Tolland County Superior Court.

Tolland town, a development of about 17 houses, was the target of court action several months ago. About 12 of the homes were in bankruptcy action instituted by the Rockville Savings and Loan Association. According to State's Attorney Joel H. Reed II, the charges stem from alleged signature forgeries on documents pertaining to the homes in the project.

Bolton (with help from Manchester) is exporting the Pirates of Pireaus, a Greek folk band to the big metropolitan tomorrow night. Instrumentalists and singers straight from the Athenian fields of Bolton will live up Plaza 7 with a half-hour performance at 8:30 on an express cafe on the veranda outside the fourth floor of the Connecticut Bank and Trust Co.

In rehearsal for two months the group was observed last night in the throes of its next-to-last session. Neither he nor Dr. Hughes attend to the Greek lyrics. Dr. and Mrs. Peter Gram and their daughters, Coralis and Elizabeth, do the singing. Mrs. Gram plays the guitar. Dr. Gram the mandolin, and Coralis, the tambourine. Dr. Gram was raised in Athens, incidentally, and Mrs. Gram's blood lines are just as Hellenic.

The group will play 12 songs including the Greek "Old MacDonald" called "Old MacDonald" (which is what the rooster says). The dog, by the way, says "wo-wo-wo."

The commission summed up what it sees as the potential effect of the charter as a coalition of many existing practices providing clarity, adoption of home rule, retention of town meeting, greater direction and coordination with two French songs and a humorous song, "Main Hans by Main Side."
