



In New York, the report said, there is more sultur dioxide in the air than in any other major city—50 per cent more than in Chicago and twice as much as in Philadelphia.

The report said New York is not gaining in the struggle to reduce the amounts of various pollutants in the air."

Noting that 2,761 New Yorkers died from lung cancer last year and that the death rate from this disease was steadily rising, the report said:

"It has been generally concluded that air pollution is one of the factors contributing to the steady increase of lung cancer."







On Being Tough

Toughmindedness, if it has a meaning in politics, surely is anti-romantic and unneurotic. Talleyrand and Machia-velli professed to be without political illusions or causes. Machiavelli said that men and nations seek success sa an absolute imperative. "He who has no position in life," Machiavelli said, "canleyrand served Louis XVI, the Republic, the Directory, the Consulate, the Em-pire, the restored Bourbons, and Louis-Philippe. He could say of the govern-ments he served, 'I abandoned none be-fore it abandoned itself."

Talleyrand was a realist, and amoralty was the indictment issued against him. He was amoral in political action but his avowed political principles were legitimacy and reasonable liberty—a modest and sensible list. "My pretended crimes," he also said, "are the dreams of imbeciles. . . . Crime is the resource of political half-wits."

This, I think, deserves to be called bughmindedness. It is also a political attitude alien to Americans, and recommendation of Talleyrand's ternich's political conduct in a cerdeepest values of American public The fact is that the American popolicy has always reflected a puritan view, with little sympathy for the aberrations or selfishness of other na-tions, and little attention to our own. npersonal. But these are much discussed points, commonplaces of American political analysis. We know that we are puritans That does not, however, stop us from doing it. Being what we are we do well not to behave otherwise: which brings us back to toughminds ness. It is a matter of fact and of selfongratulation that we not only have to Machiavellis in our history, but no Caesars or Napoleons or even Bis-marcks. We recoil from their versions of political expediency. We would un-doubtedly make a mess of it were we to try to play the imperial game, But it may be that we are doing that today.

Possibly the most useful thing to be said is to insist on the difference between toughness in action—which is not at all hard to achieve; romantics, neu-rotics, ideologues, and thugs do it—and toughness of intelligence and analysis. The most powerful objection is made today to America's Santo Domingo inervention is not that it was a crime but that it was stupid. The objection to our Vietnam policies is not that they involve violence but that they make war analyses of Vietnam and bad generalizations about international Communism, and in pursuit of invalid if not unstainable goals. The objection to some of our recent European policies is not that they coldly employ American power and influence to shape European developments but that the conception of the developments that are possible is maive.
