Algerian authorities said a circuit failure touched off the explosion, but rumors swept Algeria that a bomb had been set off by antigovernment terrorists seeking to sabotage the conference. The foreign ministers of African and Asian countries were scheduled to hold a preliminary meeting at the summit on Tuesday and Wednesday. Dominican Quiet Explodes, 16 Killed in New Clashes

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP)—Political tensions in Santo Domingo exploded with 16 persons reported killed in clashes between armed rebels and junta forces.

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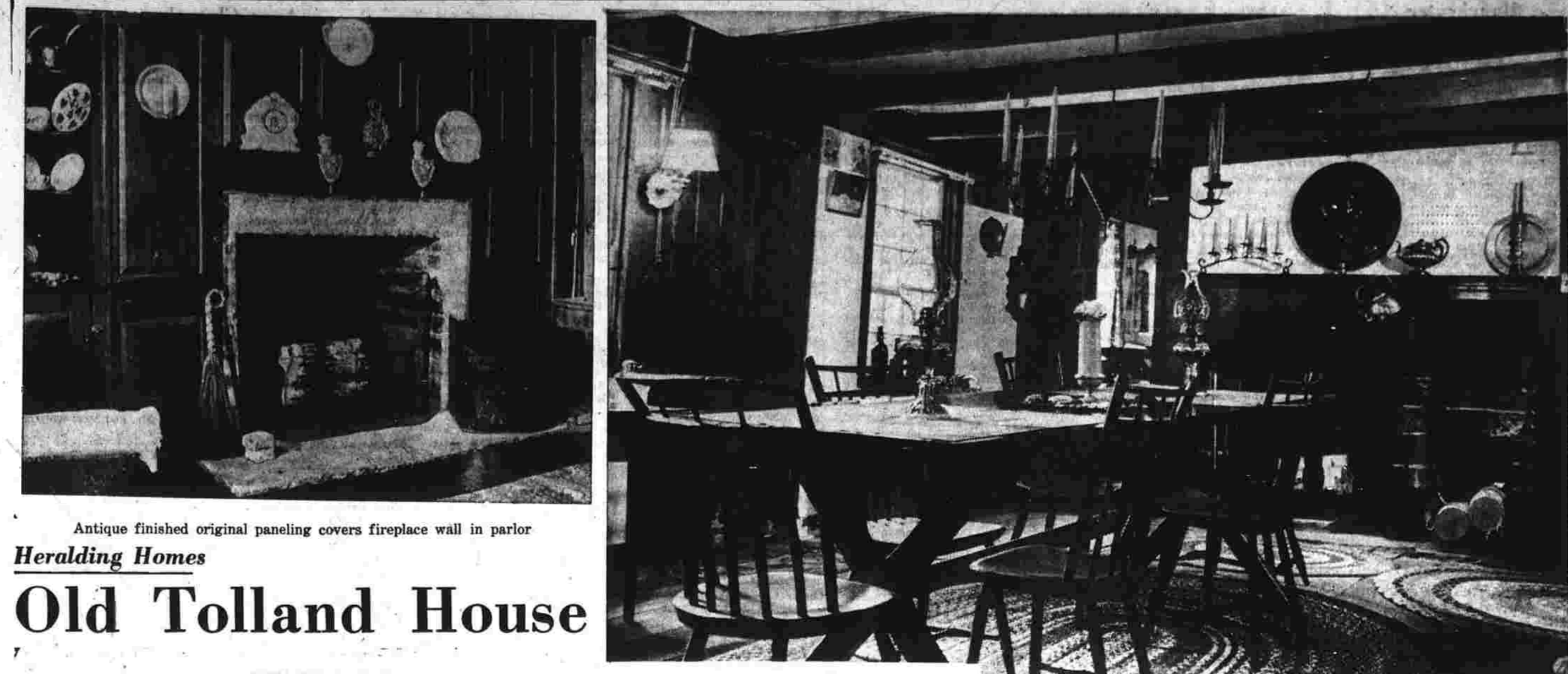
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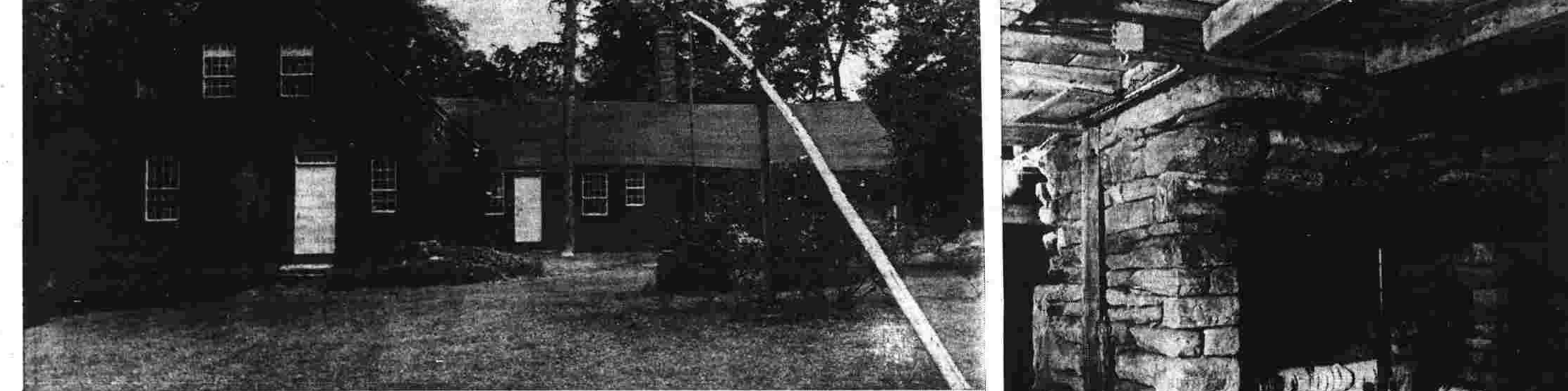

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Asking Too Much Of The UN?

In this season of anniversaries for the United Nations, there are few observers who do not find themselves weighing the question of what the world organization ought to be doing against the problem of how much it should be burdened with at its present stage of development.
The question, at least, again by news that the UN Economic and Social Council, when it meets in Geneva next month, is to be asked to consider adopting generalizing, international standards for the blowing of automobiles here and for the location of highways.

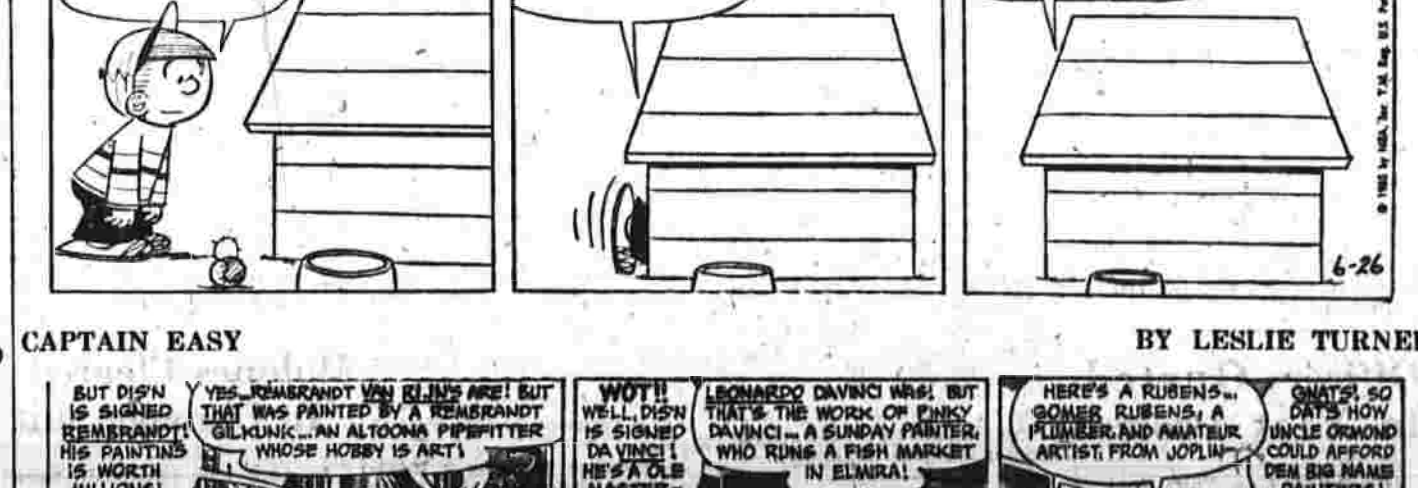

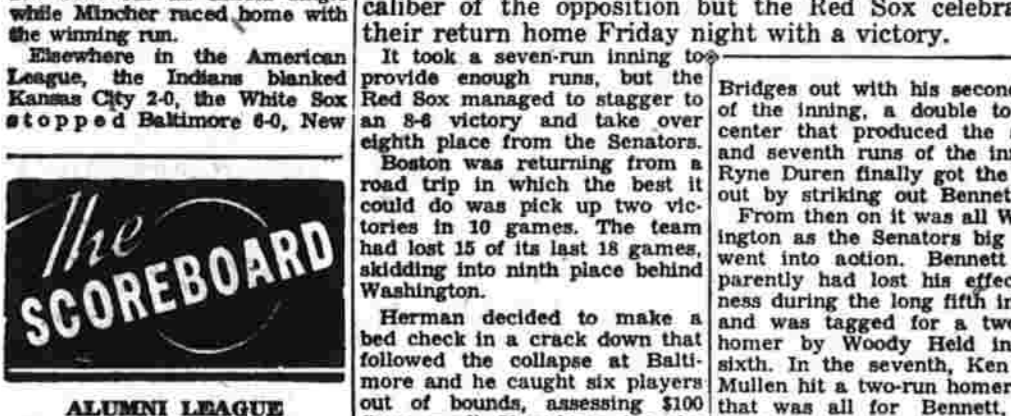
BIG LEFT HAND—Mets' pitcher-coach Warren Spahn takes a look at left hand of Lee Rohr, Mets' first draft choice.

One can't forget the Tippiys and Chippys, the Dustys and the Rex's, but, of course, there are also Mitties and Smokys and, naturally, Buttons. One little guy is called just that, Little Guy.

Sam and Max and Pierre are well represented, but there's also a Scottie called Mr. MacTavish, a dachshund titled

Fred, a poodle who answers to the name of Booboo, and a chihuahua who springs into your lap when you call Teko.

We must mention Cinnamon and Sandy, Rusty and Blitz, and let's remember Brandy, plus that cute little poodle named Chablis, and that sturdy dachshund called Schnapps.

Of course, there's that he-man of a dog called Raw Hide, and that fine representative of the good old sod, Sean Patrick. But, how about the poodle named G. G. or, to go a step further, the one called Ge Ge Angeline?

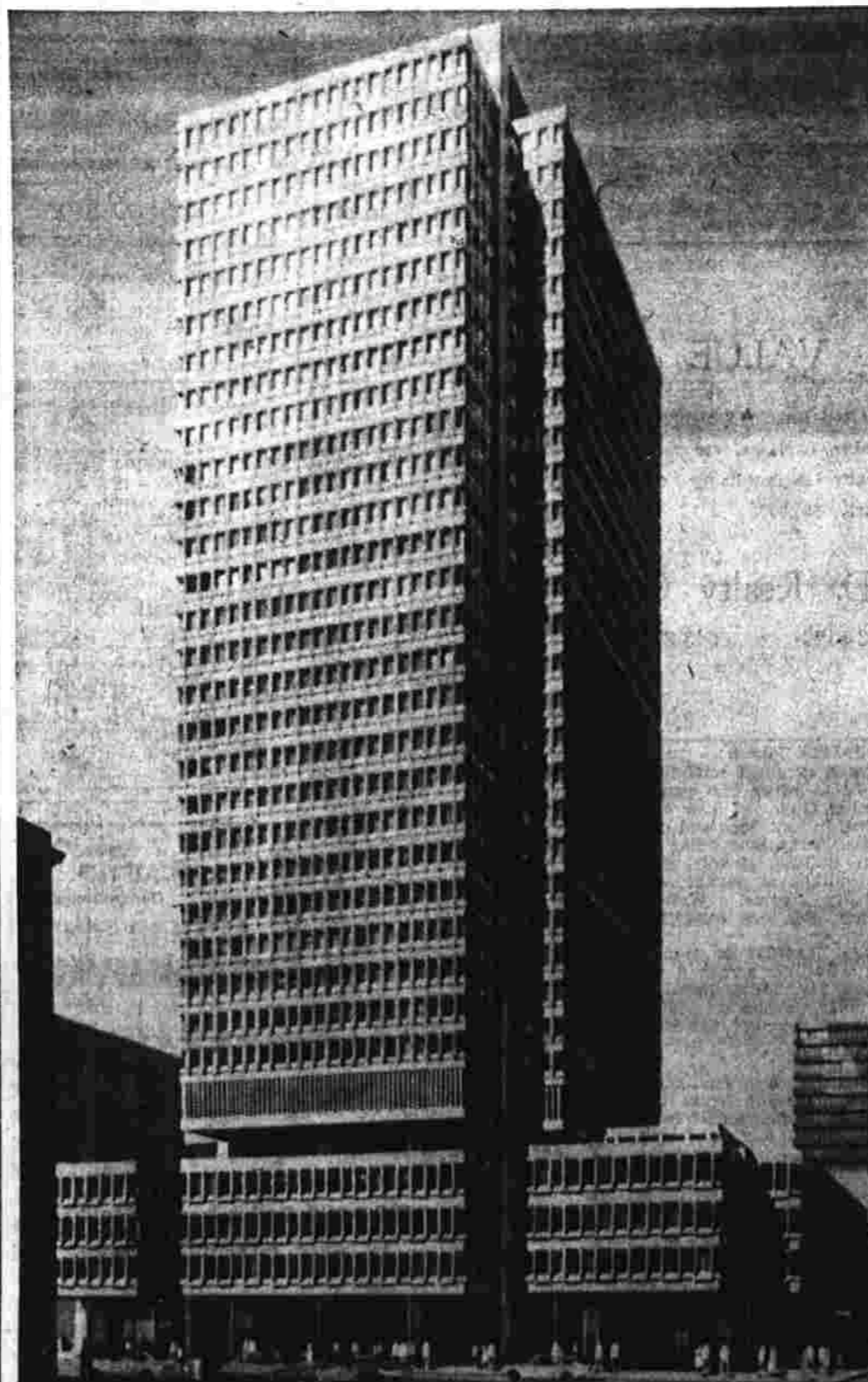

At first utilizing a small plant with a dozen employees, the firm, specializing in textured concrete architectural elements, has since expanded to what Chasse calls an optimum size and now employs more than 100 persons. Besides its contribution to the Boston skyline, Allied Casting has also sculptured the greatest portion of the buildings and walkways at Constitution Plaza in Hartford and much of the stonework of the sculpture and arts buildings of the University of Hartford. Breaking Barrier On TV's Old West

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Marked for extinction at the end of the 1964-65 season, the long-run Western "Rawhide" won a reprieve and an overhaul.

Co-star Eric Fleming has been put out to pasture. Clint Eastwood remains, along with cast regulars Paul Brinegar and Steve Raines. They will be joined next season by David Watson, British actor and singer, and Raymond St. Jacques, graduate of Yale and the American Shakespeare Festival at Stratford, Conn. St. Jacques is a Negro.

The tall, broad-shouldered actor will play Simon Blake, cowboy.

"He is a man of great dignity, the kind who would never be called 'nigger' or 'boy,'" said St. Jacques. "As far as I know, the element of race will not figure in the stories. Blake is a cowboy first, and a Negro second, just as I am an actor first, and a Negro second."

Although seldom portrayed in films or on television, Negroes were profuse in the old West. Evidence can be found in a new book by two UCLA scholars, "The Negro Cowboys." St. Jacques has read it and other research and he's determined to effect an accurate portrait.

Offhand you might think that difficult for a Connecticut boy who has spent most of his professional career in Manhattan.

"But I've done a lot of riding in New York," he reported. "I did so for the same reason I took fencing lessons; I think both should be part of an actor's equipment. The fencing paid off when I staged duels and battles in Shakespearean plays, and the riding is paying off now."

"I spent three weeks on the trails in Griffith Park getting acquainted with the horse I'll use in 'Rawhide.' I want to be sure I look as though I belong on it."

St. Jacques plays a New England man, which he is. Born in Hartford, he grew up in New Haven and went to Yale "because it was a natural step for boys in my high school." He pursued an acting career in New York against the usual vicissitudes.

"A lot of actors I knew wouldn't take other jobs; not me," he said. "As soon as a play closed, it was 'Macy's, here I come.' Or I'd read proof at NYU — I had an education; why not use it? I did everything — waiter, cook, butler. I kept telling myself if I didn't make it as an actor by 30, I'd quit and go back to school to become a psychologist."

Now 30, St. Jacques seems secure in his career. He has appeared in most television dramatic series — a "Slattery's people" got him the "Rawhide" job — and in films like "The Pawnbroker," "Mister Moses" and "Buddwing."

He admitted that the climate has improved for Negro actors in the past two years: "The civil rights movement has stimulated the authors' imaginations and they're writing roles for us now."

It's Happening Monday, Baby!

NEW YORK (AP) — A most unusual, experimental program aimed at a minority audience will occupy 90 minutes of CBS' expensive prime time Monday night.

From 9:30 to 11 p.m. (EDT) viewers will be regaled with the latest in beat music by more than 20 top-singing acts cloaked by younger crowd. In between numbers there will be non-commercial commercials — in a language which older viewers may find difficult to understand.

The show is "It's What Happening, Baby!" a public service on behalf of The Federal Office of Economic Opportunity. The special audience is youngsters between 16 and 21 who are thinking about quitting or already have quit — high school before graduating.

Host and message-giver is a disc jockey named Murray Kaufman, 35, but always called "Murray the K" by his young fans. Murray is peculiarly qualified, for he was himself a high school drop-out, has an enormous youthful following, and speaks (and invented a lot of) the slangy hip talk that is almost a secret language of the kids.

"The OEO looked around and found that I was able to reach them," Murray explained during a rehearsal break. "When they first came to me with an idea, I thought they were trying to intellectualize the problem and said that I could perhaps present the idea another way. The special is my idea."

"As a drop-out myself, I've been there and I know what those kids on the streets of New York or in the hills of West Virginia or any place are thinking about. I couldn't care less about the nice little girls from Scarsdale or Shaker Heights — it's boys mostly. And the rapport will be mostly that it's what's happening."

Murray warned to his subject.

"Look, I know what it's like. Maybe your father is drunk. The cops don't like you. You're being pushed off your block. You got problems and they press. You're closed in and the only thing you know is that you've got to take care of number one."

"So all I'm going to do is tell it like it is — that all they need is a break and a chance. I'm going to tell them that there's a way that they can make some money and be what's happening."

Your reporter looked puzzled. "Be what's happening — that just means be somebody," Murray explained impatiently. "I'm no messiah but I'll be telling

those kids that there are five or six different OEO programs where they can earn and learn. I don't even care if we reach the kids — if we can hit their friends, they'll go back and they'll sell them the message."

Murray, CBS and the musical performers (who range from Herman's Hermits to the Cannibal and the Headhunters) are contributing their services.

Participating in 'Perry Mason'

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — What makes a television series go on and on and on?

Each of the long-run winners — Ed Sullivan, Red Skelton, "Gunsmoke," "Ozzie and Harriet," "What's My Line," Donna Reed, etc. — has a peculiar quality of its own. And what about "Perry Mason"? Barbara Hale, who has tirelessly taken dictation from the undefeated attorney for eight years, has her own theory:

"I think there is a great deal of audience participation in our show. It gives the audi-

ence a chance to read into the characters whatever they want to believe. Then at the end, they get a chance to see whether their judgment was right."

Whatever the reasons for its longevity, "Perry Mason" will soon start shooting on its ninth season with the original cast intact: Raymond Burr, Barbara, Bill Hopper, Bill Talman and, when his health permits, Ray Collins. One would expect the tensions to show after a group of actors had been exposed to each other so long a time.

"The only thing that worries me," said Barbara, "is that we have had no fights. We've never even had a disagreement. People can't believe that, but it's true."

"Ray Burr and I have worked together so much that we can

actually speak a kind of shorthand. I'm a little shy about speaking up when something doesn't seem right in a scene, and I have a nervous habit of clearing my throat when that happens. Ray invariably looks up and asks what is wrong. The next time we do the scene, the matter is corrected, and we go right on with our work."

"With Bill Hopper it's entirely different. He loves to gab, so he and I talk in longhand."

Barbara didn't expect to be back for another season of "Perry Mason." There were reports that Burr was seeking new pastures and that CBS figured the series had run its course. But the show survived the spring axings, and Barbara is glad.

"I've always been pleased to do the show," she reasoned. "The best thing about doing a series is that you can be at home, instead of traveling all over the world to make movies. I've been able to be with my three children as they grow up. Our youngest, Juanita, was 3 when we started the show; now she's graduating from grade school."

Barbara, who is married to a series star, Bill Williams (Kit Carson), never worries about the size of her role.

"Some of the new writers think I want more lines when I ask them about my part," she said. "It's not that at all. The value of Della is her quietness. But I just like to know what I'm being quiet about."

Linkletter Host

'Talent Scouts' Back

NEW YORK (AP) — The question: Why is a 53-year-old man with a thriving 20-year-old daytime program and a fortune shrewdly invested in everything from soft drinks to cattle, willing to spend a long, hot summer as host of a vacation-time television program?

Art Linkletter's "Houseparty" is a daytime institution. His new assignment is CBS' old "Talent Scouts," which emerged this week for another exposure in the network's summer sun.

"Well," began Linkletter with a confident grin, "I've had an idea for a long time that television needed an evening program built around real human interest. I talked to CBS about it and we developed an idea — why not try it out on 'Talent Scouts' this summer. And if it goes, who knows what then?"

The title has been around for a long time — Arthur Godfrey presided over the show for seven years.

Assorted hosts, one after the other, took over for a season, introducing stars and celebrities who in turn introduced their proteges — although viewers sometimes had the impression the stars had never before seen the young professionals they were so proud to present.

Linkletter insists that he is about to do something really different with the old show. One thing undeniably is new. He has

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

Changing 'Nightlife'

NEW YORK (AP) — ABC's "Nightlife" program, which in 10 months has gone through many upheavals, will try something else — again — starting Monday night.

It was launched as "The Les Crane Show," shifted emphasis and behind the scenes personnel constantly until Crane, who started out brash, waspish and provocative, was — comparatively — as meek and winsome as a sweet girl graduate.

Finally, as the show's dismal ratings failed to show improvement, Crane was pushed out of the late evening show's host chair. A new name, "Nightlife" was tied on the show and a policy of "guest hosts," each serving a week or so, was instituted.

Still nothing much happened to make ABC happy. But now

one of ABC's variety teams has been brought in to produce the show. That is Nick Vanoff and William Harbach, who have done so well with "Hollywood Palace." And Crane, presented in different context and background, gets a second chance for four weeks anyway and maybe longer, depending on how things work out.

"I don't know what's going to happen with the show," said ABC programming head Edgar Sherick. "But I do know that we are in this thing for keeps — we are intent on establishing a late-evening program and we know that the perfect format is not established overnight. Even the 'Tonight Show' went through about seven changes of format before they found the right one."

Sherick said that, with Harbach and Vanoff working in Hollywood, it was possible that the base of the show would be moved there particularly since it is planned to shoot it live and in color, "and we're busy coloring our West Coast studios."

As for Crane (who will share his billing this time with comedian Nipsey Russell and Dave Garroway), Sherick would only say that "he has merely agreed to come back for four weeks."
