

Miss Florrie Bishop Bowering's 10-room Cape Cod on Metcalf Rd., Tolland, is one of the oldest houses in that area. It will be open the public Wednesday, June 30, as part of a house tour planned during the celebration Tolland's 250th anniversary.
The house was built before 1720 by ancestors of the former Sen. William Benton of tors of the former Sen. William Benton of Southport, It was occupied by members of the Benton family until 1933, when it was purchased by its present owner.


Miss Bowering moved into her home 15 years ago. She has filled it with antiques which she started collecting about 40 years ago and stored until she found the proper place to display them. place to display them. The house, its owner says, was "carved from the wilderness." Its original paneling and flooring, still intact, was made from trees cleared to make room for the dwelling. The stone used for the five fireplaces and for other uses in the house was taken from a rock ledge on the grounds. Beams are all hand hewn or hand sawed and joined with pegs. Handmade HL (Holy Love) hinges are on others, and wooden hinges and latches on

10 rooms. Rooms on the first floor include a formal parlor, a birth, and death room which room, a large dining room, kitchen, bedroom and sleeping quarters for the handy man. Three bedrooms are on the second floor. A Venetian wine glass is displayed in a corner cupboard in the parlor. It came from members of the U.S. Supreme Court had drunk from it as a loving cup 100 years ago. An organ in the room was made around the time of the Civil War, and other furnishings date back to about 1825. A fine old cobbler's bench from Maine is now used as a coffee table in the living room. Antiques throughout the house include old Chelsea china, a pair of Staffordshire dogs, a gold plated French telephone of ancient vin-tage, a flax wheel and candle mold, both found in the house, and a high bed in Miss Bowering's room, circa 1740.

The windows in the house have their original small panes of handmade glass, some of which are cracked. Pressure? Or Water?

We would think that water authorities, everywhere in the drought-stricken northeast section of this country, would soon decide what their real problem is, and decide it one way. If their problem, in New York, in Hartford, or in Manchester, is merely one of sufficient pressure in the water mains at certain hours of the day, then

the problem is no different from what thas been in any year on record, and there is really no greater emergency than there has ever been. If, on the other hand, their real problem is not merely the old, routine problem of how to have adequate pressure at all hours of the day, but a problem of total quantity of water available, they had better admit so, and enlist the understanding and cooperation of

the public on that basis. We suspect this is a poor year for any water authority, anywhere in these regions where reservoirs are barely half full and where the underground water levels are lower than ever recorded at this time of year, to be takthe public view that it, for its part, has no particular problem with quantity. To the contrary, we would tend to rain intervenes, it will be a very rare water authority in the northeast section of the country which does not have to and up rationing water, not just to save pressure, but to save something for the pressure to push through the

The Reluctant Friends

Peace must be anything but wonder--ful, to judge by the way street mobs in Japan and in South Korea welcomed the reopening of full diplomatic relations between their two countries. The mobs had different motivations.

In Japan, they seemed to be principally leftist or Communist in sympathy. Their grievance, then, was that the restoration of diplomatic relations had Japan recognizing the government of South Korea was the "only legal government" in Korea, thus excluding the government of North Korea. 


