





Saturday, July 3 Freedom's Vigil

In the Declaration a few intrepid sharacters signed in Philadelphia that still very short 189 years ago, they

wanted, out of a "decent respect to the opinions of mankind," to explain their action to all the rest of the world, but they were not specifically or intentionally out to save the rest of the world. Nonetheless, the principles they promulgated in explanation of their own decision to create and wage and win a Revolution were principles which had to be exemplary and contagious to others, as the years and the evolution of other peoples and social systems rolled on. Nor has their original omission of specific intent and words made any less real the development in this country, over these same years, of a sense of imission involved as a natural part of

the privilege and responsibility of our own freedom. The freedom we had proclaimed i principle had to be, by its very nature, freedom for all men. And our own awareness of the fact that this very freedom gave us a mission, a mission of holding up hope and example and of extending help to all similar aspirations, was also an awareness which had to grow, inevitably, sparked and brightened by such good visionaries as Linsoln, Wilson, Roosevelt, Eisenhower,

and Kennedy. This broad vision of our own potential role in the world has always been what has given us just a little bit more than the normal national pride in ourselves and it has been that degree of extra pull and inspiration for us which has so often moved us a degree beyond

If we are not the last best hope of earth, as Lincoln foretold our destiny, we are certainly the one nation in a leading position of responsibility and opportunity to try to provide it, or lead the way toward it.

Not for ourselves alone, then, but also for what we mean to the world comes that moment of deep-breathed pride which is likely to steal up upon us all some time in the course of our celebration of our national birthday. With such a fair dream to live by,

with so much that is creditable in the way we ourselves have tried to serve that dream, there has never been more than one really great danger for us. . It is a danger which comes almost exclusively from ourselves, often stimu-"lated by outside events and influences. It is true, but always facing its showfown inside us Americans.

It is a danger lying in how we define the freedom we possess and represent. There are times and locations in which we fall into the trap of trying to define freedom for others not in some true abstract which really means the principle of freedom, but in narrower and more concrete terms which merely represent a carbon copy of certain American institutions and customs.

Every time we fall into the trap of defining freedom for others as if it were some preconceived garment they could put on without much reference to their own tastes and traditions and instincts, we also find ourselves exposed, concurrently, to a temptation to try to narrow the definition of the freedom 'we ourselves possess here at home.

Without the risks of latitude, withbut room for the play of individualities. of customs, of traditions, and of opinions often diametically and perhaps completely opposed to one another freedom itself loses meaning, and ceases to be freedom, and begins growing into something that might more properly be labeled an oppression. Historically, the narrowest preach-

ments about freedom are also the loudest and they are always the most insistent that they alone interpret the spirit and intent of the founding fathers, the founding values. There has never been a time in our national history when we have not had with us voices and would-be leadership seeking to compress freedom into one special rigidly defined package which they would market to us as the one true article. Always heretofore, and it seems to be so still today, there has been a reservoir of some kind of natural, native Illuminated instinct and aspiration inside a great majority of ordinary American hearts which has been able to stand off the narrowness, and keep itself out of the straitjacket, and dare to serve and possess the cause of striciple and freedom by acting and biniting as free people. Assour greatest danger is within ourselves, so is our greatest, and so far saving, strength also there. May it keep an eternally vigilant watch on what we try to export abroad, on what we may try to impose upon ourselves, and never be smooth-talked or crisis-exhausted into abandoning its vigil.

We hate to say it, but we guess that former President Dwight D. Eisenhower's recently revealed diagust with our national political conventions is something more than an annoyance with the excesses of which television camera men and interviewers were guilty in 1964. Underneath the former President's criticism of details, there lurks, we think, a basic distaste for some of the natural elements of the democratic process - the hurly-burly, the confusion, the lack of unified command and discipline, the sudden filogical importance of trivia, the seeming neglect of the important, the instinct of people in convention crowds to leave their seats and their apparently unquenchable instinct to add to any con-

fusion by creating noise of their own. A convention run by the standards and procedures Mr. Elsenhower suggested to the Republican National Committee the other day would be a convention minus all the things a good many of us love as a natural and inevitable and not always objectionable

part of the political process. In short, let us not hesitate to say it this late date, Mr. Eisenhower's basic distaste is a distaste for politics itself, as well as for any of the noisy, messy disorders with which the voice of the people reaches through a great political convention to do its work in

spite of itself.

We can visualize the ideal convention Mr. Eisenhower described to his fellow Republicans the other day. It would have all the silence, decorum, energy, vigor, and dynamism of a tomb. He, and a good many others, are quite right in thinking that there should be some restraint, in the future. in the use of cameras and microphones on the floor of a national convention. Cameras and microphones should be there to record what happens, not decree and inspire and arrange or seem to try to influence what happens. If he holds himself to such recommendations. Mr. Eisenhower would be rendering the art and profession of politics a service, instead of trying to abolish

ceeded only by His mercy.

"Let us also employ this occasion to ask God's strengthening guidance for our President and all others in positions of leadership and authority, for the responsibility they bear is awesome and grievous. Only with divine help can they tope to preserve freedom as well as maintain order, to secure and safeguard

peace as well as enforce justice and de-"Finally, it is fitting that the bells of "Finally, it is fitting that the bells of churches join in commemorating the hour of independence. Their ringing will remind us not only of past sufferings and triumphs but of present struggles in the cause of freedom, that we may see the plight of those less free, and to their deliverance pledge 'our lives, our fortunes and our sacred honor.'"—


