Totally Ready On Two Fronts? Such is our national state of numbed paralysis of thought and feeling on the mestion of war and peace, holocaust and survival, that it has become almost impossible for us to use the normal processes of our own minds to put two and two together.

If we can't face what the answer seems likely to be, we turn away from If neither of two news developments seems actually real and reasonable in itself, we can hardly be expected to

respect the addition. One story this week, from Washington, tells us that one Buford Ellington, a former governor of Tennessee who is director of something called the Office of Emergency Planning, has proclaimed that this nation is "prepared" and ready for whatever may come of the escalation of the war in Vietnam. We have a "domestic mobilization plan" which is complete, as no such plan has ever been before. We stand ready for instant regulations to freeze all prices, rents and wages for at least five days, to print ration cards and coupon books for use by the end of five days. The food-ration level has been fixed in advance at from 2,000 to 2,500 calories a day. The telegrams to war plants, bringing into effect standby munitions contracts, are drafted and

One reason we have such preparedness already in store, and feel we can keep ahead of any varying demands of our actual situation is that, for the next war, we would have an instrument hitherto not available to a nation's war effort—the computer. The nation's mobilization computers have already been sands of items which might have some bearing on the problems of keeping the country going during a war. This computer operation is spread and divided among several secret sites, so there will not be too much danger that we should ever be caught without the computer's wisdom and guidance.

While we get this news from Washington, there seems to be almost a chorus of news stories and broadcasts from Vietnam, all emphasizing one main point. The inspiration for their conclusion seems to have been the first landing of regular United States infantry in Vietnam-a symbol of how far we have come from the days when we were merely going to advise and equip the South Vietnamese.

The big conclusion being made by the merican correspondents in Vietnam now is that this has now become distinctly an American war, in which we now expect to do the main fighting, in which we admit the armed forces of the South Vietnamese are no longer capable of waging the kind of war which is in prospect, and in which we are preparing to retain and remain in the big base facilities we are now building in Vietnam for years to come.

These two developments in the news -- the one of our supposed total readiness here at home, the other that of our increasing assumption of almost total responsibility for the conduct of the war in Vietnam-ought, we suppose, to be added together. And if nobody human feels like doing it, perhaps our official computers, if they have been stored with enough history, can buzz and humand click and deliver themselves of some kind of an informed, reliable prediction of what is likely to happen in such a set of circumstances. Perhaps e computer could tell us where we e, and whether, now having gone to tatal involvement in Vietnam, we are son going to need to call upon its computer sister for its formula of total mobilization here at home.
