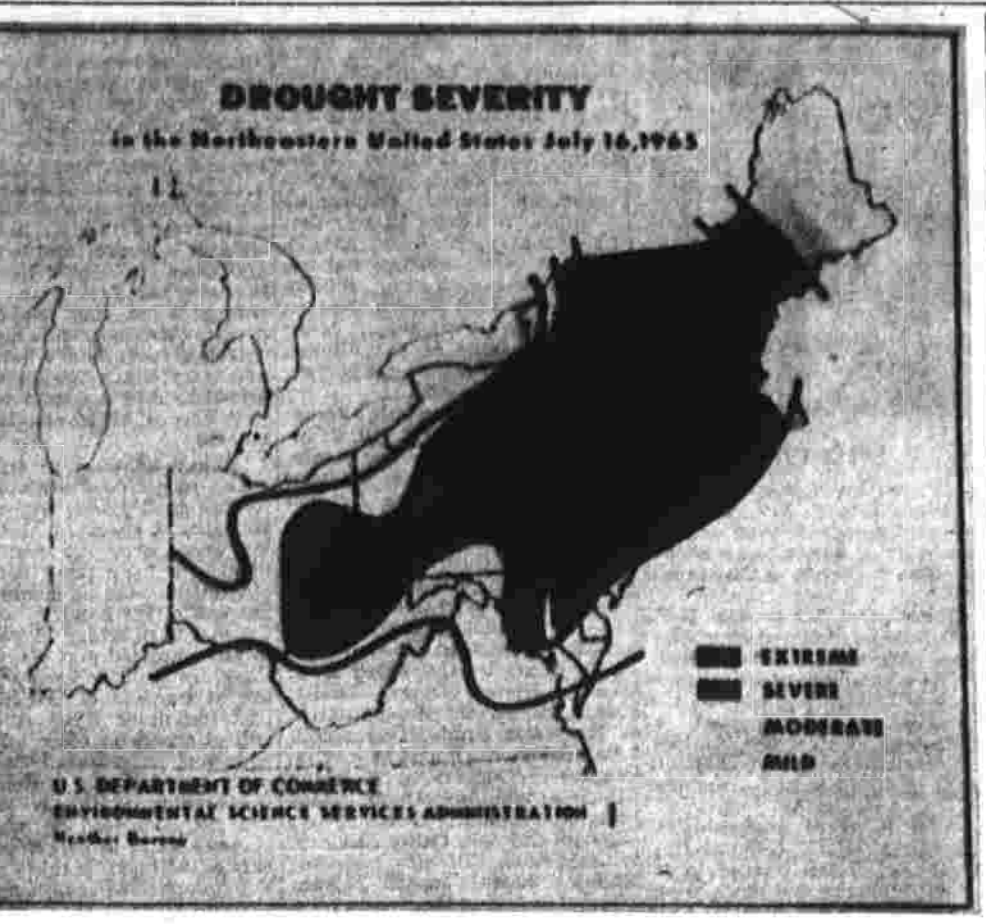

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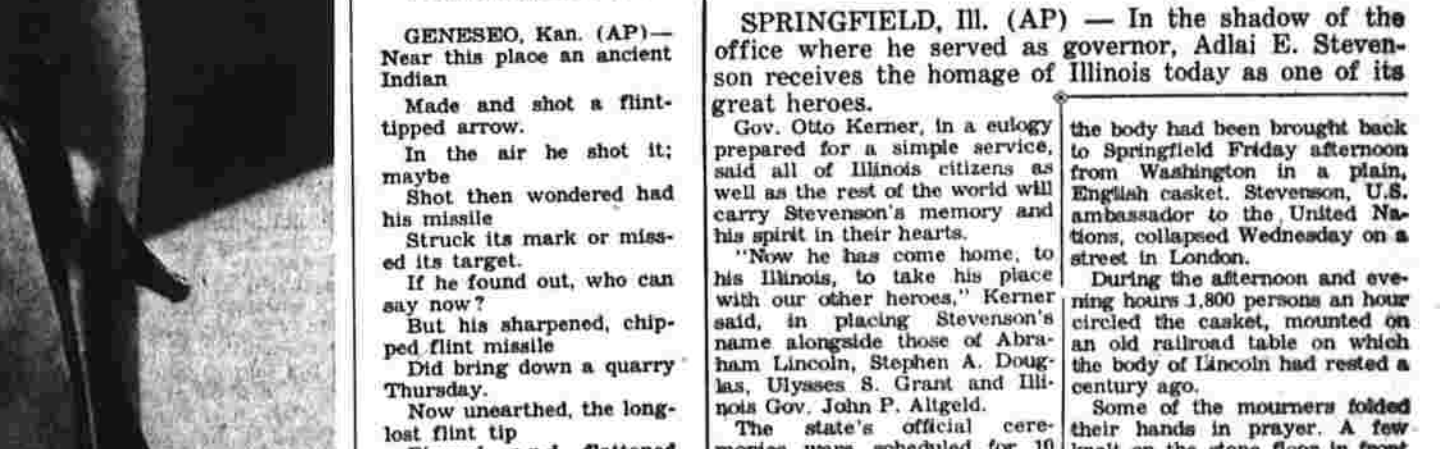

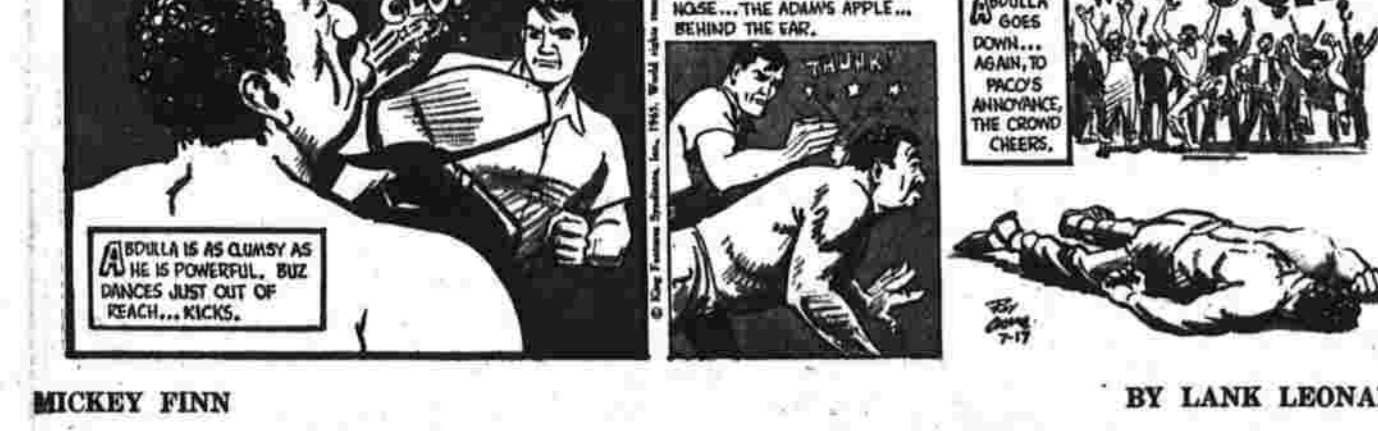

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Why would an actress give up a co-starring role in a television series to become a housewife?

"Because my religion has taught me that being a wife and mother is a more important role," explains Roberta Shore, cast member of NBC's 90-minute Western, "The Virginian."

## Life Is a Peachy Keen Affair

HOLLYWOOD (NEA) — Mia Farrow is a baby doll who has been tapped by somebody's magic wand and turned into a living woman. And she hasn't quite made it — there is still much of the doll about her.

She has a doll's eyes — big, blue and innocent. She has a doll's viewpoint — life is a peachy keen affair. And there is still something about the doll in the way she talks, a small and sweet voice, and a gentle intonation.

But much of the transformation has taken. She's strictly a human, mature woman in her physical appearance. And she has a human outlook toward her career.

This conflicting attitude is obvious when you visit Mia in her cheerful but modest second-floor apartment in Beverly Hills. The room reflects her half-doll, half-woman personality — there are the paper flowers she makes on the one hand, and her collection of fine antique books on the other.

"I've had no adult experiences, until lately," she says. "And the ones I've had have hurt and shocked and saddened me. I used to trust my intuition about people, but no more. As a child, I was an observer—I was terribly shy—and I would meet people and watch them and I thought that I had them all pegged."

"But lately people seem to have put on facades when I meet them. And that's been hard to take."

This, of course, may be be-

cause lately Mia Farrow has become a celebrity of some note. As Allison MacKenzie on "Feyton Place," Mia is the top aid on the world's biggest soap opera.

As a child—the daughter of John Farrow and Maureen O'Sullivan—she went through the dream times of most kids. For a while she wanted to be a fireman. And a nun. And then she wanted to be a boy so she could be a general "and wage brilliant campaigns for peace."

"I decided to be a writer," she says, "and my father encouraged me in that because he thought I had talent."

But eventually the wish to act superseded all those other wishes. And she was acting on Broadway, in "The Importance of Being Earnest," when the scouts from 20th Century-Fox saw her and asked her to test for "Feyton Place."

"I said, 'No thank you very much,'" she says. "So they asked me to test for a straight motion picture contract. That was fine. But then Paul Monash, the executive produced of Feyton Place, said that I had to be Allison. So I agreed."

Mia signed a three-year contract with the show. A bit more than a year of that has run out, and she says with finality, that she will not sign to do any more. When her three years is up, Feyton Place will have to write out Allison MacKenzie somehow.

Why is she so adamant about it?

"Only one reason," she says.

"No artist should be required to do something he hasn't seen. And I am. Every Friday, I get three scripts for next week's shooting. And many times I am required to do or say things I don't believe in. I don't want that."

The odds are favorable that, when her term expires, she'll be able to move on to whatever she wishes. Scripts flood in, even now when she can't do them. (Although there is talk that 20th Century-Fox will fit her into a feature later this summer.) She is a good bet for movie stardom a few years from now.

Those who know her feel that such stardom will not affect her

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life very much. She will always be the child-at-heart who buys crazy things by mail from the Sunday papers, using phony names. And she'll always be the woman who keeps framed pictures of John Kennedy and Frank Sinatra on her television set.

## Aloofness Can Protect The Actor

By AGNES MOOREHEAD HOLLYWOOD (IP) — I have played so many authoritative and strong characters that some people are nervous at the prospect of meeting me for the first time.

Hmmmm, come to think of it, in their shoes I might be, too.

To be frank, there is a certain amount of aloofness on my part at times, because an actor can so easily be hurt by unfair criticism.

After all, in their profession actors play on emotions and sensitivity. They are sensitive in a most vulnerable way because they are selling themselves — their looks, attitudes and so forth. If people take potshots at them, it really hurts!

For this reason, a great number of actors tend to socialize within their own profession. This is not snobism, but rather a case of protecting themselves. My profession is sacred to me. I'm happy when people like a performance. I can't help it when they don't. This is a responsibility I have to shoulder. I seldom read any criticism. Destructivism seems to be one of the foibles of mankind.

When I'm before the public, there probably are individuals who are hesitant about coming up to speak to me. In this situation, they put up the barriers.

I have always felt that the most successful artists are the easiest to talk to, except that they are protected by buffers — secretaries and assistants. Some kind of protection is absolutely necessary. Because an actor gives and gives and gives in entertainment, he has to keep something of himself and can't exhaust himself in private life.

I think an artist should be kept separated to maintain glamor and a kind of mystery. Otherwise it's like having three meals a day. Pretty dull.

I don't believe in the girl-next-door image. What the actor has to sell to the public is fantasy, a magic kind of ingredient that should not be analyzed.

I'm sure Endora, my alter ego on "Bewitched," would agree. She's quite an actress herself, sometimes, and better versed in magic than most of us.
