NEW HAVEN—A day of wet weather Sunday brought Connecticut its heaviest dose of rain since February and prompted flash flood warnings for small streams in the northeast corner of the state.

## Scientists Analyze New Mars Photos

PASADENA, Calif. (AP)—Scientists at Jet Propulsion Laboratory settled down today to an exhaustive study of Mariner 4's photographs of Mars, coming in at a rate of one every 10 hours, in a search for some hint of life.

Laboratory director William H. Pickering believes some sort of life exists on Mars and the agency for which he works, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, has plans for spending hundreds of millions of dollars to find it.

No evidence of life showed up in the first three photographs released last week. They outlined a desert-like area similar to the broad plains on earth's lifeless moon.

Before any more are released, all of the possible 21 photographs taken as Mariner 4 flew past Mars Wednesday are going to be carefully analyzed.

Transmitted across 134 million miles of space, they contain many "glitches," an engineering term for electronic errors and static. They also show areas that scientists doubt actually exist on Mars. A likelihood explanation, they say, would be some fault in the camera and radio system.

For instance, all three show a dark spot in the same area of the frame, almost as if the lens

## Soviet Ship Reported OK On Sun Trip

MOSCOW (AP)—The new unmanned Soviet space traveler was reported functioning perfectly today in its flight to orbit around the sun.

U.S. experts tended to rule out Mars as a target, saying that planet is no longer in a favorable position for another probe from earth.

By 4 a.m., the official Soviet news agency Tass reported the space craft was 140,480 miles from earth. Tass said further radio-communications with the satellite will be carried out in accordance with the program.

The Soviet space authority announced the spacecraft, named "Automatic Station Zond 3," was launched Sunday on an orbit around the sun. The first announcement said the spacecraft and its scientific gear were "functioning normally" and "preliminary data shows that the trajectory of the automatic station is close to the expected one."

The purpose of the flight, the announcement said, "is to check the station's systems in conditions of prolonged space flight and holding of scientific studies in interplanetary space."

### Smoke Fells Four In Hartford Fire

HARTFORD (AP)—A three-alarm fire in an Albany Avenue apartment building sent four firemen to the hospital for treatment of smoke inhalation today. None was in serious condition.

Residences of eight families—including 12 adults and 12 children—were damaged by flames and smoke. All occupants of the building were evacuated moments after the first alarm was turned in at 8:55 a.m.

Two businesses on the ground floor of the three-story brick structure were badly damaged by fire. Windows were smashed by firefighters for access to the fire, which officials say probably originated in a grill and pizza shop.

Heavy black smoke spread quickly through out the building. Flames went through hallways as far as the top floor, but families had left the building almost as soon as the fire started.

Firemen worked from inside the restaurant and a clothing shop. Others with air packs searched the apartments to see that no residents remained in the building.

## Bomb Plant Seen Target Of Cameras

PARIS (AP)—The Defense Ministry charged today that a U.S. photo reconnaissance plane that flew near the French nuclear complex at Pierrelatte was on a mission to take "unauthorized pictures."

The nuclear plant there is working on France's first hydrogen bomb.

A statement from the ministry said a protest had been presented at the U.S. Embassy in Paris.

The statement said cameras aboard the plane, an RF101, had taken 175 pictures of the complex Friday.

According to the Defense Ministry, the U.S. plane, which was based at Ramstein, West Germany, made four runs over the atomic installation.

"The French aerial defense, having been able rapidly to determine the American base to which the plane belonged, asked the American military authorities to surrender the photos taken right after the landing of the plane," the statement said.

The Defense Ministry accused the plane of three violations: flying in a restricted zone, taking photographs without authorization, and taking pictures in a restricted zone.

Until today the French maintained official silence on the affair.

According to French news reports, French fighter planes were sent up to chase the U.S. plane out of the area. The Defense Ministry statement supported these reports, but not in detail. It spoke only of an American

## Rusk Seen Stevenson's Successor

WASHINGTON (AP)—There was high-level speculation in Congress today that President Johnson may name Secretary of State Dean Rusk as head of the U.S. delegation to the United Nations.

Johnson, who flew to Bloomington, Ill., for the funeral of Adlai E. Stevenson, has postponed any announcement on his choice of Stevenson's successor in that post.

According to some associates, Rusk would be receptive to becoming chief of the U.S. delegation.

The sources who reported this said that if such an appointment were made, they believe Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara might be named secretary of state.

Last week at his news conference, prior to Stevenson's death, President Johnson was asked about published reports that he might contemplate a change in the office of secretary of state.

He told his questioner: "I think you do a great damage and a great disservice to one of the most competent and most dedicated men that I've ever known, Secretary Rusk. He sits on my right in the Cabinet room. He ranks first in the Cabinet, and he ranks first with me."

## Bomb 'Scare' Latest Threat To Belafonte

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—A bomb scare on a jet airliner scheduled to fly singer Harry Belafonte out of San Francisco Sunday culminated a week of threats against the Negro star.

The San Francisco Chronicle said today.

A telephoned threat by an anonymous woman warned "the Seattle flight will never get there," and Belafonte's taxiing Western Airlines plane was ordered back to the terminal.

The flight left for Seattle, Wash., after a two-hour delay.

As the FBI and sheriff's deputies searched the plane and luggage of 122 passengers, Belafonte was quoted as telling Deputy Gene Boklund, "Someone smeared yellow paint on my car in San Mateo Friday night."

Belafonte has been active in the Negro civil rights movement.

The newspaper said several "hooligans" threatened Belafonte's life last week as the singer and his troupe of 30 did an engagement in San Mateo.

## U.S. 1st Division Attacked by Cong

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Troops of the newly arrived U.S. 1st Division were attacked by the Viet Cong for the first time during the night and three Americans were killed, a U.S. spokesman announced.

The spokesman said several more Americans were wounded in the attack that began with a mortar barrage against forward elements of the division's 2nd Brigade outside the Bien Hoa base 12 miles northeast of Saigon.

The 1st Division troops had arrived in Viet Nam last week. It was the first action in Viet Nam for the "Big Red One" division that made an enviable record in Africa and Europe during World War II.

"I had been through Korea and I thought I was a combat veteran until last night," said Maj. B. McJilton of Fort Worth, Tex. "I had never seen fighting like that before."

## Bandits Hold Store Aide, Take \$40,000

TOWSON, Md. (AP)—Three swarthy bandits held a department store official and his family at gunpoint overnight and escaped today with approximately \$40,000 from the store safe.

Two of the bandits appeared at the home of Conrad O. McClung, 21, assistant manager of Hutlers Department Store, and said they were attorneys.

Once inside the home, about 9 o'clock Sunday night they drew pistols on McClung and his wife, Mary Lou, and kept them trained on the couple until morning.

A third bandit was admitted about 15 minutes later, said police, then the McClung children were put to bed. They are Peter, 4, and Michael, 8.

McClung was told what to do the following morning in the apparently well-planned robbery.

Early today, before the regular hours of the store, the bandits took all four members of the family to the store.

One of the trio rode in the McClung family car, holding a gun on McClung and his family. The others followed.

At the store, one of the bandits signed himself in as an auditor on the store's night book, McClung told police.

## Syngman Rhee Dies, Ex-Korean President

HONOLULU (AP)—Syngman Rhee, a fierce old Korean patriot whose greatest dream and last wish eluded him, died at Maunaloa Hospital in Honolulu today of a stroke. He was 90.

The former South Korean president's last wish was "to go home and die," but increasing debility prevented his return. He died in failing health for three years.

The founder of the Korean Republic was admitted to Queen's Hospital a month ago today after he began bleeding internally. His condition improved and he was sent back to Maunaloa Hospital a nursing home.

Doctors said they had an hour's indication that death was near, giving them time to summon his Austrian-born wife, Francesca, 65, and his adopted son, Rhee In-soo.

Unfulfilled was his life's ambition and dream—that unification of Korea as a republic. The mountainous peninsula on Asia's east coast still is divided along the truce line where the bloody Korean War was halted in 1953. He never had seen his country since.

## Registrars Abandon Tough Literacy Test

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP)—Voter registrars abandoned a difficult literacy test in the face of demands today from Negro leaders and the threat of new demonstrations at Greensboro, Ala.

Members of the Hale County Registration Board made the decision to halt use of Alabama's literacy test in their county after a conference with attorney John Nixon of the Justice Department.

Between 75 and 100 Negroes, many of them carrying towels as a protection from tear gas, appeared at the Greensboro Courthouse two hours after the board went into session.

Reinforced squads of state troopers stood guard after the burning Saturday night of two rural Negro churches near here.

Negroes walking in small groups from a downtown church said their towels would afford some protection in the event tear gas was fired at them. Police gave no indication they planned to use gas, however.

Negro leaders had warned that their followers might march on the courthouse or stage a sit-in unless registration procedures were speeded up. Hale County became the second to drop the literacy test voluntarily; several other counties have been forbidden to use the test in court rulings and a statewide challenge is pending.

State investigators examined the ruins of the two churches. They declined to express an opinion on whether the fires

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### Coventry GOP Could Capture Five Finance Posts

A decision by the secretary of state, supported by Town Council John S. G. Rottner, will require the Republicans after their caucus today to name a candidate to run for the five seats on the Board of Finance. The caucus will be at 7:30 p.m. at Coventry Grammar School.

The decision upsets the assumption that one party cannot hold more than four seats on the seven-member board. The question arose because two Democrats resigned four-year terms which would have expired in October, but were replaced to serve only until the Oct. 4 election.

Two Republicans will be serving on the board after October because their terms will have expired. Three regular terms expire in October, two held by Republicans and one by Democrats. Under the normal election procedure, the Republicans could win two of those posts.

With the two short terms also expiring, a Democrat will be guaranteed election to one seat and a Republican will be guaranteed election to one. This is because no voter can vote for more than one of two candidates seeking the same term.

The two offices are interpreted as being the same term. The reasoning is based on two laws: One is General Act 8-167, which provides for minority representation generally on election boards and permits five of seven to be of the same party.

The other is a special act for Coventry passed in 1961. It provided for a four-three board to be elected in 1961, but did not specify what the makeup of the board would be thereafter.

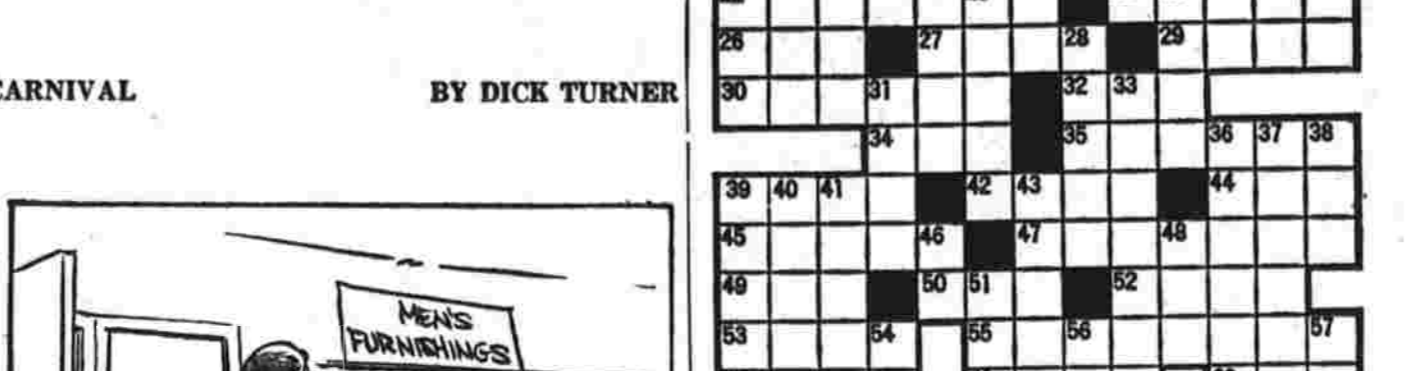

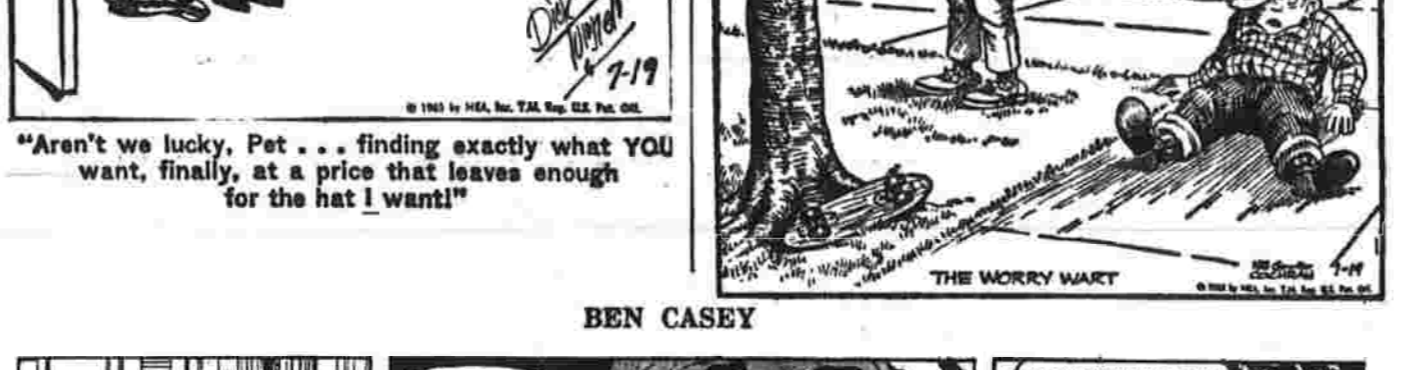
