(Continued from Page One) were hit last week ago by Viet Cong troops. American casualties last week were among the heaviest in any single week of the war. A spokesman announced 23 U.S. servicemen were killed, 100 wounded and seven were missing or captured. Military officials said South Vietnamese forces suffered 735 casualties during the week. In addition, 250 killed, 450 wounded and 135 missing or captured. Viet Cong losses were 438 killed and 20 captured, the official said.

The Case Bros. warehouse provided a body needed for storage of the company's products and must be replaced soon, Dennison said.

Mrs. Bourn To Serve on State Board

Mrs. Katherine Bourn, chairman of the Manchester Board of Education, was today appointed to the first Board for Community Colleges by Gov. John Dempsey, as he took the first formal steps to implement the historic State System of Higher Education Act passed last month.

The United States kept up its air war against North Viet Nam today while a second action was reported on the ground in South Viet Nam. One U.S. Air Force plane crashed at sea 100 miles southwest of Saigon after being hit by gunfire but the pilot was picked up unharmed, a spokesman reported. The spokesman said 150 Communist guerrillas were killed in the Viet Cong attack Tuesday on the Vietnamese special forces camp at Da Nang, 80 miles north of Saigon. The figure was based on a Vietnamese body count, he said.

Small Group Said to Blame For Town Teen-age Problem

The Manchester Human Relations Commission (HRC) last night blamed a small group of teenagers for the town's teen-age problem.

The HRC members agreed that the town's teen-age problem is caused by a small minority of teenagers who are "restless for companionship and for something to do," and that most of the town's disturbances are caused by a small minority of teenagers.

The HRC members agreed that Manchester's problem is "largely a social one, but not unique," and that it is similar to problems experienced by towns and cities throughout the country.

Figures released by Police Chief James Reasoner were introduced which showed that 90 per cent of all teen-agers and young adults, picked up for "driving without a license," were from out of town. On the other hand, it was shown that many of Manchester's youth cause incidents in neighboring towns.

From these statistics, it was agreed that teen-agers and young adults "are more mobile and tend to cause more trouble" when they find stamping grounds away from home.

HRC member Saul Silverstein called for "a clampdown on the hard core in the community who are basically antisocial," and added, "the majority of our population is made up of reasonable people and no minority should be permitted to flout poor taste in the eyes of the law and our citizens."

He concluded, "Let's stop kidding these maladjusted kids and prevent the abdication of our law abiding residents. After we isolate the troublemakers, we can start preparing programs for those of our youth who claim they have nothing to do and nowhere to go."

The HRC members agreed to postpone any recommendations for a teen-age program until after the teenagers themselves come up with suggestions at a meeting scheduled for 8 tonight at the West Side YM.

A discussion of local relations was postponed until such time as the Connecticut State Civil Rights Commission makes available a long overdue report on complaints received in Manchester over the past few years.

Mrs. Barbara Goldberg, chairman of the race relations subcommittee, reported that the state commission had received only one or two formal complaints, plus several informal complaints, during the past two or three years.

Dr. David Warren speculated, "Since nobody has presented us with a race relations problem in the year that we have been in existence, I wonder if there are enough problems locally for our consideration?"

Mrs. Goldberg replied, "I think that people, rather than the state, are responsible for their problems of moving into Manchester. 'Drop the prospect and go elsewhere. Just because we haven't received any formal complaints doesn't mean that there might not be some.'"

21 Seeking Jobs With Fire Dept.

Observers Await Rally In Wall St.

NEW YORK (AP) — One of Wall Street's cherished traditions is the summer rally. And this year even those who scoff at such things are watching the market closely for a sign of a sustained rally.

Some brokers are hoping that the market's recent steady rise has laid a foundation on which a measurable rally can be built.

In their view the sharp break at the end of June was the climax of the long rally from the stock price highs reached May 14. These brokers term the rebound from that climax a technical reaction to overtrading and not a dyed-in-the-wool summer rally.

And they see the lacy trading and minor price variations of last week as a sign that the market had been immune to much of the nervousness which triggered the decline of last month and late May.

Like many of Wall Street's traditions there is nothing sure about a summer rally.

Sometimes it is absent or so minor and short an event as scarcely to merit that description. Sometimes it comes early in the summer. Usually it is tied to some news event that has little seasonal coloring. And sometimes the rally has been so late that the traditionalists have been hard put to defend it as a summer rally rather than an early fall rally.

Often any little rebound, however technical and short lived, is termed a summer rally just to get that tradition neatly sewed up and out of the way.

This year one is awarded with more than usual anticipation. That is because of all the uncertainties that caused the May-June break and that still persist.

Viet Nam is the biggest question mark. But with brokers say that most traders have discounted the buildup in the war there. Many who sold nervously in May and June foresee the trend to greater involvement of U.S. men and money in that area.

That may be why the market showed little reaction last week to the affirmation of the expected news. But even these brokers aren't sure how stock traders may react when and if the actual call of more troops takes place and the casualty lists mount.

Business uncertainties also have plagued the market. Many stock traders have taken to the sidelines after lightening their portfolios and are waiting to see how the 60-month old business upswing survives a summer slowdown and faces next fall.

Corporate profit reports now flooding in show that second quarter results were generally ahead of a year ago, with many continuing the upward push so striking in the first months of the year.

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Them reports failed to inspire the market last week. But rosters for the summer rally think that as the mood improves so will the impact on the stock buying public.

A rally would please business because it would tend to bolster public confidence and good business is built on that. The Federal administration would be pleased as a sign that it has control over the effectiveness of its fiscal policies had been overdone.

And a rally would please the traditionalists and hold that it would be both timely and auspicious.
