





This, clearly, would be unacceptable. "But," the Times editorial continues, "the question does arise whether the honor of the United States is at stake in such a drastic and precise sense of the word. If the United States were to give up, pull out of Vietnam and leave the country to its fate there would, of course, be a loss of honor-but very few Americans would argue for such a solution today. Between doing that and forcing Hanoi to sue for peace on American terms there is a whole gamut of possible settlements that would not at all dishonorable to any except

Both Lippmann and the New York Times, then, focus their thinking on the same precise danger. 



WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson signed to-day legislation taking silver out of dimes and quarters and reducing the silver content of half-dollars, and said there will be no profit in hoarding the present coins. Johnson, speaking at a Whitee
House rose garden ceremony, said neither the present coins nor the new ones will have any scarcity value.

The mint is geared to get into production quickly on the new coins and produce more than 3.5 million of them in the next year, he said.

He said the change is necessary because silver is scarce.

"Our uses of silver are growing as population and economies grow," Johnson said. "The hard fact is that silver consumption now is more than double new silver production each year."

If the change had not been made, he said, "we would have risked coin shortages in the near future."

Johnson said the present silver coins won't become rartices, estimating that more than 12 billion silver dimes, quarters and halves are outstanding. He said another billion will be made before production is halted.

"Since the life of a silver coin is about 25 years, we expect our traditional silver coins to be with us in large numbers for a long time," Johnson said. "If anybody has any idea of hoarding our silver coins, let me say this: The Treasury has a lot of silver on hand. It can and will be used to keep the price of silver in line with value in our present silver coins. There will be no profit in holding them out of circuitation for the value of their silver content."
