Dr. Roy A. Lieualen, chancellor of the Oregon education system, said 250 awards will be given this coming winter term from a list of 1,000 candidates. The standard for excellence is "yet to be determined." Among possible factors to be considered, he said, may be a teacher's ability as a lecturer, his talent for teaching a discussion group, the quality of his reading list, and his willingness to counsel and talk with students outside of the classroom.

Each Oregon campus facility excluding the medical and dental schools, which have no undergraduate courses—will propose a plan for selection of "excellent" teachers and then submit it to the state board. The board will also act on a proposal that outstanding teachers be nominated by students.

This possibility of student participation in the selection of teachers to receive the awards raised some eyebrows in the state, but it was defended by Dr. Lieuallen and John Mosser, a Portland lawyer who guided the plan through the Legislature. "If a student cannot tell whether a teacher is able or not then who can tell?" asked Mr. Mosser, "The greatest mind in the world must communicate in order to teacher."
