

### Town Given Deed To Old Nike Site

The 332-acre Nike site off Keating rd., appraised at \$220,000, will become the property of the Town of Manchester, at a cost of \$100,000, with the filing of a deed today in the town clerk's office.

The terms of the transfer from the Federal Government specify that the property is to be utilized continuously for 20 years, for educational purposes and for none other, as stipulated in the town's Feb. 1, 1965 application.

Benjamin Van Clarke, a field worker for Dr. Martin Luther King's Southern Christian Leadership Conference, led the last of three marches on the courthouse Friday night after city officials ignored an ultimatum demanding an immediate meeting of a biracial committee, which had been formed to help ease racial tensions here.

Mayor T. Griffin Walker said he would reply to the ultimatum today.

Leaders said that downtown stores would be picketed in an effort to bring attention to the series and city officials.

### Texas Girls Dead; One Was Choked

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP)—Crime detection experts said early today a 6 1/2-hour autopsy showed Susan Rigby had been strangled by a powerful attacker.

Justice of the Peace Jerry Dellana, conducting the inquiry, said results were inconclusive as to what caused the death of the 17-year-old girl.

The sun-blackened bodies of the two security sisters who vanished 13 days ago were found Friday sprawled in a weed-grown vacant field near the north edge of Austin.

Dellana said pathological tests and X-rays detected no broken bones or skull fractures, but no sign of violent blows to the bodies.

Dellana said Dr. Earl P. Rose, Dallas medical examiner, has to conduct the tests, which will continue his investigation for at least a week, "particularly for further microscopic tests."

Homey Garrison, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said serology fingerprints were obtained from one body.

When asked if the dresses on the bodies were the same they wore when last seen, Garrison replied: "There are some things pertinent to the current investigation that are not ready to reveal."

Dellana said the bodies would be released to the parents for burial.

The black-haired, 21-year-old beautician was last seen driving on a street near the University of Texas campus July 15. Bodies were from Dallas.

Rose was aided by two Dallas dentists who had done work for the young woman, Dr. R. M. Brunson and Dr. John L. Mitchell.

Friday night Brumage positively identified Miss Stark by a bridge he placed in her mouth at 11:30 a.m. About 2 a.m. today Mitchell added identification to the bodies.

The bodies were discovered shortly after noon Friday, and were taken to the University of Texas hospital. Missing person hunts in recent days have been fruitless.

Chester Guyton, member of a city surveying crew, set up his transit on a few feet off Cooper Lane in a recent residential development, less than a mile outside the Austin city limits.

West-high weeds and Johnson brush came to the attention of the crew when it was cutting a new road. Guyton noticed an odd and walked another 25 feet into the weeds.

"I walked right up on one body," Guyton said. "I turned around and went back to the other."

### U.S., Viet War Planes Pound Many Targets

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP)—U.S. and Vietnamese war planes pounded Communist targets in both North and South Viet Nam today, but there was an apparent lull in major ground action.

A U.S. military spokesman reported no significant ground fighting although Viet Cong guerrillas launched several attacks on government positions.

The spokesman gave this description of the war action: "A government force killed 100 Viet Cong in the abandoned outpost of Ba Tin that was overrun Friday night for the third time this week.

Vietnamese casualties were described as light. The outpost is only four miles from Saigon.

The Viet Cong hit a watchtower, three miles from the capital's Tan Son Nhut airport Friday night, inflicting heavy casualties on nine defenders.

In another Viet Cong assault, Vietnamese defenders of a hamlet 40 miles northeast of Saigon killed 20 Viet Cong. Viet Cong losses, if any, were not reported.

Fourteen Viet Cong were killed Friday 300 miles north of Saigon during an eventful operation in Quang Tin province.

Meanwhile, 400,000 more people are expected to be displaced by the fighting, said a U.S. official. The fighting has displaced 1.5 million people in the past two weeks.

# Daring New Transfusions Saving RH Babies' Lives

**PORT CHARLT** — The doctor treating the transfusion needs a warning sound as it enters the baby's bloodstream. "Watching a television screen, the mother sees the needle in the right place.

"She needs the television screen, for he cannot see the baby."

"That's because the baby hasn't been born yet."

This is called intraventricular transfusion, done while the baby still lies in his mother's womb.

The striking new method is designed to save the lives of RH babies who might otherwise die because of the blood incompatibility between their parents.

Rh blood cells in the fetus are destroyed because the baby does not have a normal blood-building system. RH babies are given complete exchange transfusions before birth, but in some cases this may be too late.

RH incompatibility involves a battle in the bloodstream. The mother's blood contains a type of antibody to destroy the baby's RH positive, the rest RH negative.

Trouble can occur if a mother has RH negative blood and the father has RH positive blood. The mother's body can set up antibodies to destroy the baby's RH positive blood cells.

**NEW YORK (AP)** — A team of doctors at Boston City Hospital has given 23 Rh-positive babies the new transfusion procedure, to quiet both her and the baby.

Doctors place the mother on a special diet. X rays to locate the baby's position. A very low dose of radiation is used to avoid radiation damage — and the picture is applied to this area. A point on the baby's low midline is located and a corresponding site marked on the mother's abdomen.

The transfusion machine is inserted through the wall of the mother's abdomen, through the uterus, through the amniotic sac and through the baby's abdomen.

Dr. Ferris says the doctor inserts the needle, using both vision and hearing — a whistling or popping sound when the needle is in the baby.

A dye is then injected so the exact location of the needle can be monitored on television. If all goes well, red blood cells from the mother's blood are absorbed by the baby's blood stream, replacing the damaged Rh-positive cells.

Dr. Ferris will report on the method at the International Congress on Pediatrics, meeting in Rome in September.

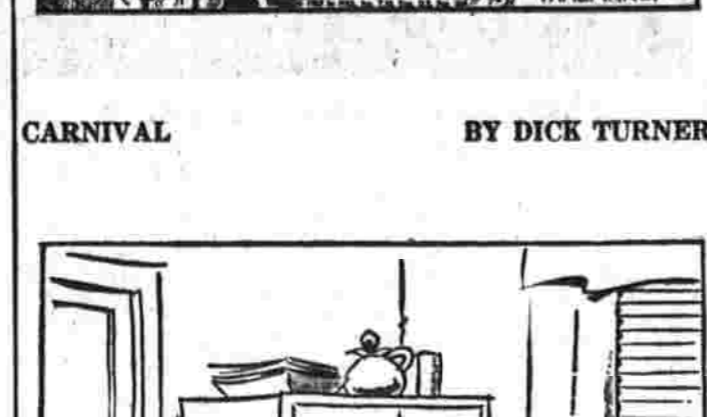

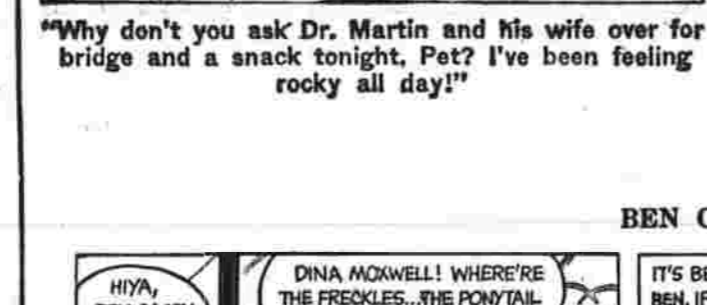

**HOLLYWOOD (AP)** — Ever since the coaxial cable tied television audiences into a neat national bundle, Hollywood has been fighting with New York for the title of television capital.

New York will be completely out of the competition during the forthcoming season. Hollywood's film and television studios will turn out 84 of the 98 prime evening programs.

All that New York has left is one dramatic series, a few variety shows, some game and panel programs and news department efforts.

With the fall season less than two months away and with production in high gear, there seems to be curious lack of excitement about coming events.

Among the new shows will be one about a gentl out of a bottle, a deceased mother reincarnated as a 1928 automobile, and a maladroit angel. But Hollywood seems primarily interested in the return of the serial drama — not necessarily soap opera — as a popular form. This started with "Peyton Place," an evening success. Now it is moving into "Dr. Kildare," which will be presented as two half-hour episodes a week with story lines running through as many as six episodes.

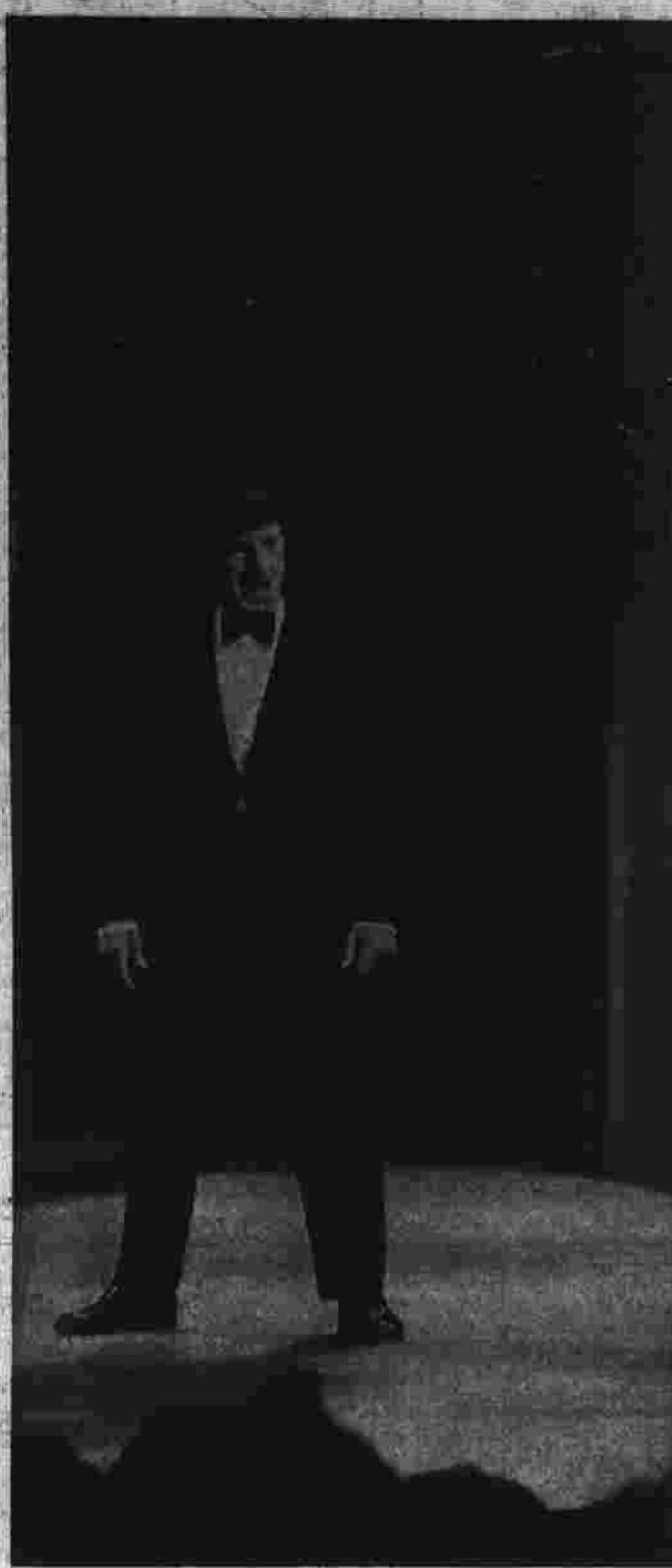
In recent seasons there have been occasions when a doctor on one network show would send a patient to a psychiatrist in another show on the same network. This season there will be some running back and forth by

## The Studies Assuming a Lead Role

**NEW YORK (AP)** — There is one aspect of television which, during the last five years, has exploded into a growth and an importance never before dreamed of.

It is the "documentary." One puts the word in quotes because it is really a catch-all for a quantity of productions which cannot otherwise be labeled.

For instance, a "documentary" can be a deep analysis of some aspect of the news; or it can be a travelogue; or an examination of history. There even have been re-creations of historical events using actors on the screen which have been called documentaries, although the use of the term here is hard to justify.

A documentary is a film which deals with a true event without resorting to the use of fictional figures. It can be an examination of a political issue or a crisis, past or present. It can be a memoir, as the Winston Churchill series was and the FDR series is.

It can be an assessment of a historical epoch, personality or event, as the programs in ABC-TV's "Sage of Western Man" series.

It can utilize live people acting as themselves, without rehearsal and speaking their own words. Or it can deal with inanimate objects. One thing it must have: The truth of authenticity.

It is amazing how this truth of authenticity seeps through film and creates an impact. In a medium largely devoted to the more or less astounding fictional experience of more or less astounding fictional people in a world not quite like our own, the documentary shines with the hard brightness of today's newspaper. This must be the reason why the audience response to documentaries is increasing every year, if not every month.

This response is as yet nowhere near to that of entertainment programs, but is noteworthy; and there is an ever greater interest among sponsors — actual and potential — in the documentary product. It is doubtful that this sort of film will flood the market, as each one requires months of preparation and vast amounts of cash. There is every probability, on the other hand, that the documentary will increase in quantity as surely as in quality.

This writer has never been of the opinion that the television audience is of low mentality. It is a fact that television is generally made up of programs that the majority of the audience prefers, but it also attempts to satisfy other tastes by offering variety.

Documentaries are now a vital part of this variety.
