## Fire Destroys 11 Businesses In Bay State

**BOSTON (AP)**—Eleven business establishments were wrecked in fires that hit three Massachusetts communities Monday. Damage was put at more than \$700,000.

One blaze ignited five buildings on Dutton Street in Lowell and caused about \$600,000 damage by unofficial estimates.

Five stores in Medford and a market in Danvers were destroyed in separate fires.

Residents from 15 communities fought the blaze in Lowell for more than three hours. The cause was under investigation.

The fire began in a three-story wood building occupied by Hubert Roofing Co., jumped to the Robert Boyle Construction Co. next door, then crossed the street burned a barber shop, a restaurant and the garage and offices of the City Club Co.

Several parked cars were damaged when building walls fell. No one was reported hurt.

Damage was estimated at \$200,000 from a fire earlier in the day in "Town Market" in Danvers. Officials believe exploding pressurized containers stocked on the store shelves caused the blaze.

One fireman, James McGlinchey, 32, of Danvers, was treated for smoke inhalation at Hunt Memorial Hospital.

Two alarms were sounded in Medford, a \$400,000 blaze destroyed five stores in Tufts Square, including a newspaper building on the rear of the Tufts Paper Co.

## A Negro's Look at the Riots

**George Goodman, 36, a Negro**—This I moved to here like everyone else for the Los Angeles riots, a Negro weekly newspaper, wrote the following account for The Associated Press.

**LOS ANGELES (AP)**—On the outside of the city where the terror of fire and pillage has slowed, it is quiet and hot. But there is still the snip fire and the snip fire. It is all over yet. Cars have moved in and out of the trouble zone—a fact which some feel has nullified the curfew's effectiveness.

Sunday afternoon I drove in and out of the danger zone, red-eyed and unshaven from an hour without sleep. No one was stopped for questioning. I passed numerous police check points.

"Police push them down here and they pop up some place else," said Palmer Lee Usher, a long-time southern Negro resident.

"What's going to happen when you cats leave?" I asked a white man who was just being arrested. And when we leave we'll finish the job," he added.

The most recurrent question asked among whites in an area like Southern California is usually thought of as liberal, being carried out here, it is probably the nation's worst racial riot in recent years.

"It looks like liquor stores, liquor stores, liquor stores," he said. "I went to a store and saw you and all the other people. What good does it do when you see a store like that? It's a store like that that makes my blood boil."

Others feel that Proposition 13, the constitutional amendment passed last year in California, is the cause of the rioting. It is the most liberal state in the nation, said Overton Washington, west side lawyer.

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## Food, Medicine Short In Devastated Watts

**LOS ANGELES (AP)**—Devastated after five savage days of rioting, the Watts district is "black ghetto" hiked its way to the point of starvation. The district is a mess of rubble, with no food and other items of day-to-day necessity such as milk and eggs.

A drive to collect and distribute food and medicine to the 60,000 residents was spearheaded by the Rev. J. Edgar Hoover, who quickly backed by officials and civic leaders in many ways.

Many supermarkets in the battered Negro slum were burned out during the rioting in Los Angeles' history.

Other smaller stores were looted. Some owners locked their doors at the beginning of the rioting and others reopened. A few stores—protected from mobs with sign signs as "Negro owned"—reopened Sunday. They were swamped by residents who had no food to eat in several days.

Nina Milligan, a Negro, complained. "My nephew's three young children who live behind us need milk and food. We don't know what we're going to do."

## Businesses Lose Heavily

**LOS ANGELES (AP)**—Devastating rioting has taken a heavy toll of the bustling business life of the West's biggest city. Losses are likely to climb far into the hundreds of millions of dollars, conservative estimates placed fire damage alone at \$175 million.

Violence has destroyed hundreds of business establishments.

The flow of customers to stores in other areas has been slowed by a curtailed public transportation system and the loss of business.

The future looked even more bleak for those whose businesses were hit by fire, burglary and looting. An insurance company executive said insurance firms probably would not pay their losses. The executive quoted the state's adjutant general as saying the riots were "more and more serious."

Dozens of merchants were forced to close because of fire and other damage.

With his service canceled throughout the vast riot area, the Southern California Rapid Transit District, worked out routes from outlying points, steering buses away from the danger zone.

The Bank of America closed its 40 branch offices. The Southern California Auto Club shut down four offices. The bill was far from the scene of violence.

The University of Southern California, on the shattered second floor of the building, canceled today's summer school classes.

The state adjutant general declined to be identified, explaining that insurance policies included in insurance policies protecting against fire, burglary and looting.

"The state adjutant general, Gen. Rodrigo L. Hill, provided the insurance companies with an excellent defense," he said.
