

Dr. ,Richard Nicholson said that a program scheduled to take effect in September provices that relatives of all Connecticut blood donors could draw free blood from the Connecticut bank. He said that this would be a

He said that this would be a nationwide program, and that there is a danger that residents of areas not having Red Cross programs would be drawing from local supplies.

Nicholson said that in these cases the local blood bank would have no hope of being repaid for the blood shipped out of state. for the blood shipped out of state.

Theoretically, the doctor said, out-of-state persons would draw blood from the Connecticut bank but an equal number of Connecticut residents would draw from out-of-state banks.

It would not work out this way, Nicholson said, because there are many areas of the country which do not have Red Cross services. He said that only 50 per cent of the blood supplied to hospitals comes from the Red Cross, the remainder coming from commercial groups.





The girl is usually told to seek the services of an adoption agency whether or not she wants to keep her child. Agencies are equipped to handle all the problems involved, including maternity homes, legal matters, and advice and support to the young mother.

There are three agencies in operation in Manchester and the Hartford area. They are Children's Services of Connecticut, Inc., the Diocesan Bureau of Social Service of the Hartford Diocesan Service of Connecticut, The Hartford Diocesa cese, and the Jewish Social

Services Northeast Office on

Among other services it assists unmarried mothers who need care for themselves before confinement and, at the mother's request, places her baby in in an adoption home if it Children's Services is non-

Children's Services is nonsectarian and is staffed by
trained caseworkers.

The Diocesan Bureau has an
office on Park St. Its services
for the unwed mother are similar to those of Children's Services. But it will serve only
Catholic mothers unless the
father of the baby is Catholic.

The Jewish Social Service office in Hartford also serves the
Manchester area. Its services
are the same as the other two
agencies. It will help non-Jewism mothers but only Jewish
couples can adopt the agency's
children.

All of the agencies respect
the secrecy that most of the
young mothers desire. Their fees
are based on the girl's ability
to pay, and, in fact, they often
help support girls if they are
in very poor financial condition.

None of them set themselves
up as judges of the girls. All
offer advice and guidance in returning to normal life after the
birth. Their more concrete services include medical care, living
arrangements, and even job
placement. None pressure the
girl to give the baby up for
adoption.
