**Adjournment Eyed By Congressmen**

By EDMUND LE BERTON  
WASHINGTON (AP) — Now that the long deadlock over foreign aid has been broken, congressional leaders are talking some time in September for adjournment. Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield says he is shooting for adjournment around Labor Day of the session that has seen enactment of more legislation than any other recent session. President Johnson has come up for a vote so far have been approved. House Speaker John W. McCormack talks more conservative of winding up business "perhaps from Sept. 18 on." McCormack's date seemed to have more to do with the Senate. Some shrewdly pointing to high priority bills still on various rungs of the legislative ladder, say Congress can get through until sometime in October. But the agreement reached Tuesday by House and Senate conferees on reconciling the two versions of the foreign aid authorization bill clears away one stubborn obstacle. The discussions had been going on intermittently since June 18. The agreement came during the conferees' 14th meeting. Johnson's requests for foreign aid totaled \$1.49 billion. The \$1.38 billion figure finally approved includes \$1.7 billion in military assistance abroad, the remainder in economic aid. Both chambers are expected promptly to approve the compromise, which comes up for action in the House probably Thursday. The principal issue resolved was the duration of the authorization. The conferees finally took the House version — one year only — but the House negotiators agreed to support a longer authorization next time. The authorization bill, however, only sets a maximum for the actual appropriation, which must be considered later. Some members of Congress are unhappy about the compromise not to try to deprive the Soviet Union, France and other countries delinquent in their United Nations peacekeeping assessments of their votes in the U.N. Assembly. Every year someone makes the gesture of trying to eliminate or reduce U.N. funds in the appropriation bills. This year the effort may be pushed harder. The State Department ap-

**Adoption—Part 1 Illegitimate Children An Increasing Problem**

By MALCOLM BARLOW  
More than 240,000 children were born out of wedlock in the United States in 1961, the last year for which figures are complete. In 1940, 89,000 illegitimate children were born. To be sure, there are more people in the country than 21 years ago. But in 1940, of all births, 3.5% were illegitimate, and in 1961 the figure was 5.5%.

Since Adam and Eve brought Cain to the world, illegitimate children have been problems. But now that the family is recognized as the basic unit of all societies of men, those born outside the family are automatically denied many of the best benefits of society.

If the problem is reduced to Connecticut, the kids are even 1% of the total. If we go even further and reduce it to the circulation area of The Herald, we need only solve the problem for about 200 children.

Only 200 kids! Before we can think of helping these children, we must know what is being done now. This article and the one to follow, will try to pose the various problems and their possible solutions by following the baby named Johnny from his unhappy mother to his final home.

**New Clerks To Step Up Court Pace**

HARTFORD (AP) — Judges will be freed for more trial work in superior and Common Pleas Courts under a new procedure ordered by Connecticut's new court administrator. Associate Justice John P. Cotter of the State Supreme Court ordered Tuesday that clerks be appointed in Hartford, New Haven and Bridgeport. Cotter said the move will free judges for trial work and will assure that cases would be ready for trial. Under the new procedure, the assignment clerks will set down cases for trial only if counsel for at least one side is ready to proceed when called. The directive makes it clear that if a case assigned for trial is not begun when scheduled, it may be defaulted—unless trial is impossible due to death or illness. The assignment system will begin Sept. 7. Cotter's directive also provides for the appointment of presiding judges in Hartford, New Haven and Bridgeport whose jobs it will be to coordinate assignment and trial activities. The presiding judge will also have power to order that pretrial proceedings begin in civil cases headed for trial. Cotter said the same assignment procedures should be followed in other parts of the state when necessary.

 It takes a good imagination to decide that if the original United Nations cuncta who were in arrears had been limited to France, Belgium, South Africa and Yemen, the United States would never have spent a whole year of its United Nations life suspending all functioning of the United Nations General Assembly until these delinquent nations had paid up.  
 Perhaps, then, we can school or train ourselves or somehow indoctrinate ourselves to think that the United States position, as announced by Ambassador Goldberg on Monday, as a surrender to France and Belgium and South Africa and Yemen rather than as a surrender to Russia and her satellites.  
 Such acts of imagination may facilitate more comfortable thinking about the situation, but they do not cure its realities.  
 The realities are still, both long range and short range, more negative than positive.  
 As we give up our vendetta to deny other nations the right to make their own rules regarding what they shall pay into the U.N. treasury, we announce that we are now reserving to ourselves a similar right to make our own rules for we like it.  
 As we oblige Russia for its failure to honor the peace-keeping power and authority of the General Assembly, which ourselves helped create and enhance back in 1951, we are at the same time apparently planning to join Russia in future diplomacy which will shift the center of U.N. power away from the General Assembly, where there are now too many small nation members for both our tastes, back to the Security Council, where we two big powers can be sure we control things like big powers should.  
 Our target in the long fight over U.N. finance was not the rule and the law, but Russia. If that indicates that we have indeed, therefore, had some good reason to surrender to the will of the U.N. "consensus" that we win such a battle, there is no rationalization which can make the situation a very happy or auspicious one. And when Ambassador Goldberg pledges as he did Monday, that "the United States is prepared to join in a fresh drive to help the United Nations gather new strength until the rule of law is universally accepted," one welcomes the sentiment and the pledge, but hopes that Washington has something better in prospect than going back to a dominance of the Security Council in which both we and Russia could be sure the United Nations was keeping its nose out of the sectarian big power business of our own.

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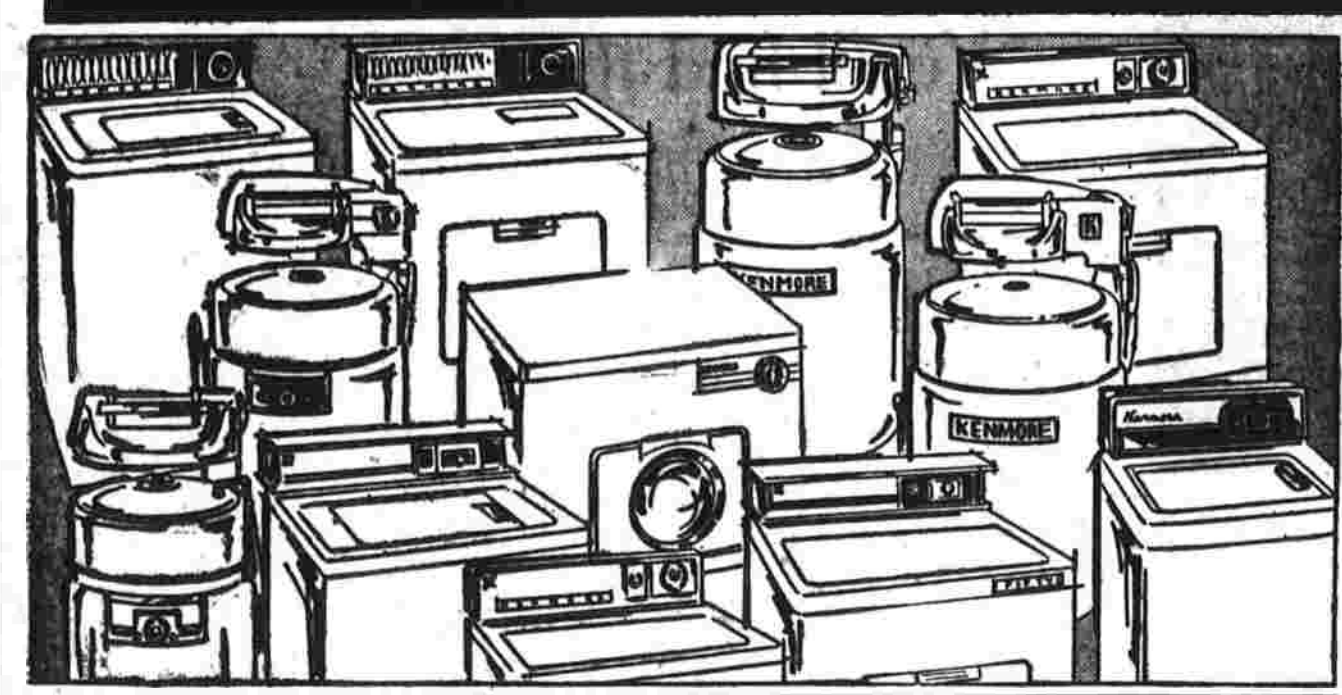

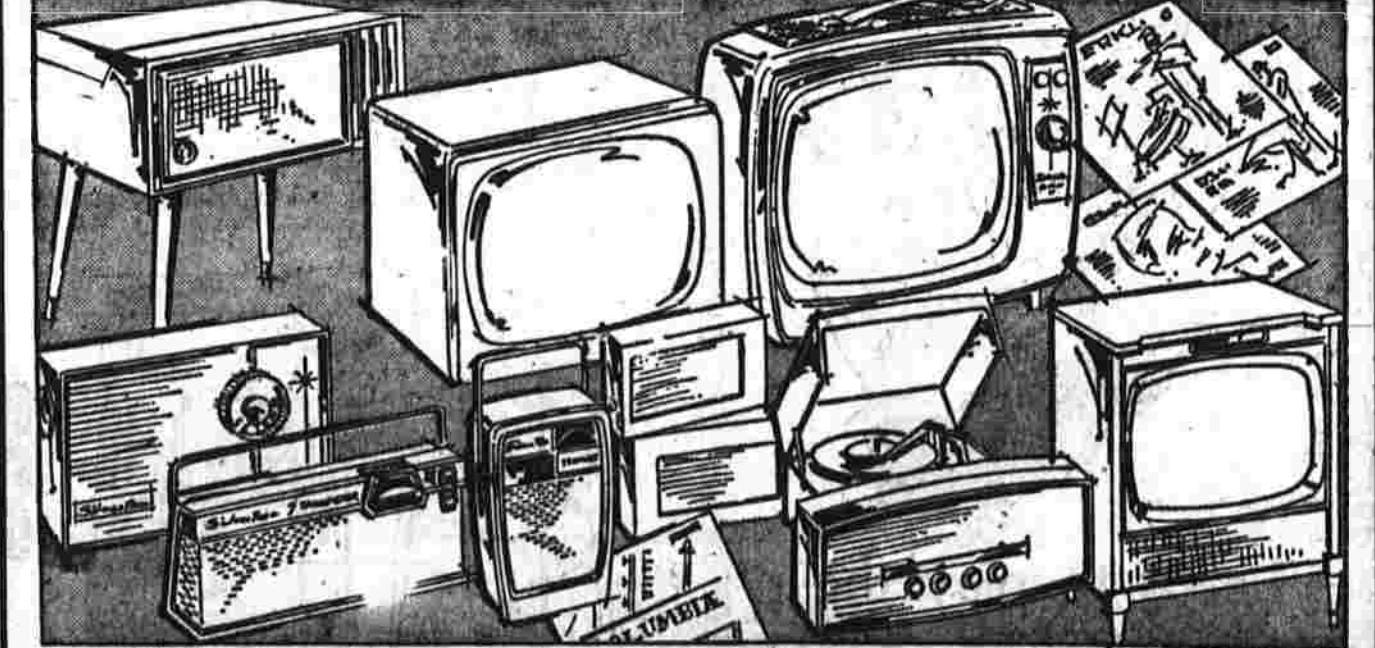

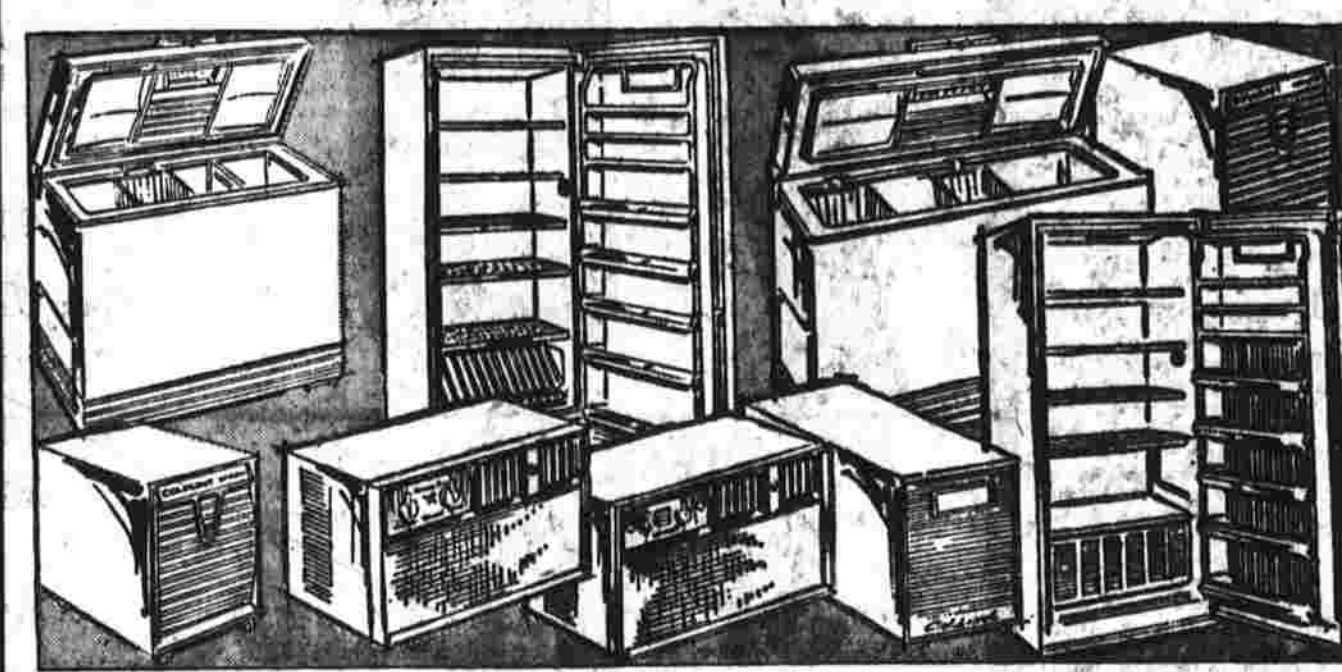

# Bishop Pike Faces New Heresy Charges

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Bishop Pike faces new heresy charges in a theological battle within his church, but he says he is confident his fellow bishops will exonerate him of heresy charges.

Bishop Pike, replying to charges that he disbelieves in the doctrine of the Trinity and the Virgin birth, the bishop said "liberal belief in the Nativity doctrine is not required to be affirmed by our church."

He said this is made clear by the "doctrines in the Church of England" and "The Faith of the Church," which he co-authored and which was distributed by the Episcopal Church.

When his views on the Trinity were discussed at last year's convention of bishops, there were no charges of heresy, Pike said. He termed the doctrine "a matter of faith, not of dogma, and non-negotiable."

Four years ago several Episcopal priests in Georgia charged in a letter that Pike committed heresy by declaring the Virgin Birth and some other biblical miracles as "myths."

The letter never got beyond the Georgia bishop, who agreed with Pike in defining "myths" as possible explanations of deeper truths.

The charges were aired in an article in the Episcopal magazine, "The Living Church."

"I don't think the charge of heresy will get beyond 'Glacier,' said Pike, who is in charge of the vast diocese of California, an area extending from Sacramento in Northern California to San Luis Obispo, halfway between Los Angeles and San Francisco.

"Those who are accusing me of heresy — and only some of the names are known to me by their own's reputations — are among the conservatives in the church," he said.

Bishop Pike is considered a liberal, both within the church and political circles.

Two of the heresy charges, regarding the Virgin Birth and the Trinity, are based upon his own published book, "A Time for Christian Change," and statements made four years ago.

# RPI Graduate Center Moving to Hartford

A \$7 million answer to the problem of Rensselaer Hartford Graduate Center's expansion needs was proposed yesterday by the school's dean in an explication of architects' plans before members of the Hartford Redevelopment Agency.

Dean Warren C. Stoker of 31 Summit St. unveiled the idea that the engineering graduate center pull up stakes from its present home in South Windsor and begin anew in virtually the center of Hartford, specifically on the fringe of the City of the Plaza area directly west of the recently constructed Travelers Data Center.

Probably the greatest motivating factor in the decision, Stoker said, was the presence of the Travelers Data Center in the vicinity. "Past history in other cities certainly proves that one such facility soon attracts another. We would certainly anticipate satellite locations in this area."

This decision to institute a meaningful doctoral program probably was given its greatest impetus by a grant of \$45,000 from the Hartford Foundation for Public Giving, bestowed in 1963. "Without that grant," Stoker said, "we could not be here today."

Cook, in outlining the conceptions of his firm, described the center as initially a central building housing laboratories, classrooms, lecture rooms, library, cafeteria and service area. As the center expanded it would radiate outward from the original core in all directions.

Cook demonstrated that the Windsor St. site was an ideal location for the college complex. The site was simple, a sloping terrain allowed buildings to be situated at different levels, connected together without impeding circulation throughout the campus.

Stoker expressed his hope that the center might be ready for occupancy by September of 1966, by which time the school would probably have over 650 students. The master's degree programs and possibly 100 involved for a doctorate.

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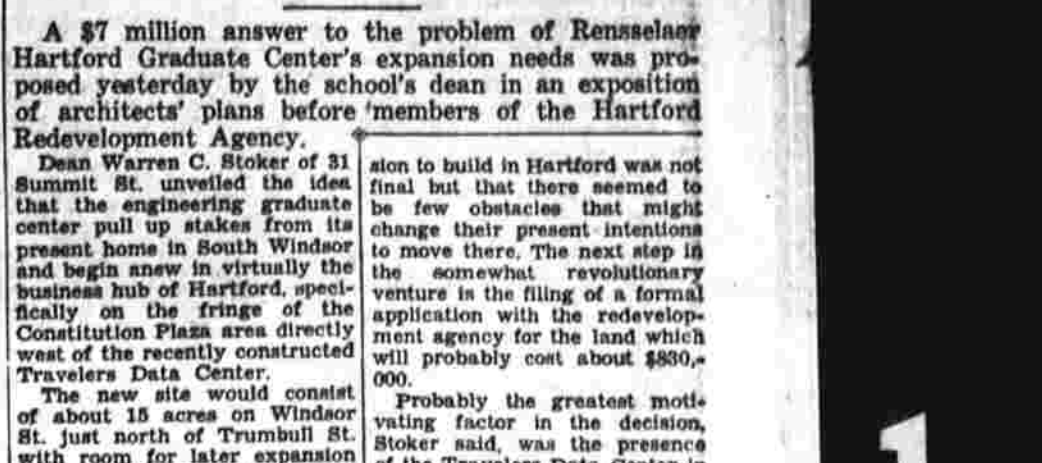

### Tolland Harvard Busing Plan Seen Causing Overloading Here

If Hartford were to send 80 children to Tolland schools under an anti-poverty plan proposed to the Hartford board of education, the board would have to set up portable classrooms or institute double sessions and hire an additional three teachers, to accommodate children.

David Cook, chairman of the Tolland school board, said this would be the result if a field study of Hartford schools, recently completed by Harvard University researchers, were to be implemented.

The study recommends that two children from poor areas of Hartford be allocated to each classroom available in metropolitan area towns. Figures for Tolland show that with 40 classrooms, the town would probably be asked to handle 80 children. This compared with an elementary school population of 80.

The program was recommended by the Harvard Board of Education and the Harvard School of Education. One line of thought is that cities such as Hartford must have help from area towns if they are to end de facto segregation, arising from the concentration of disadvantaged families in core areas of the city.

Cook described the child who would be involved as either a state dependent, or one whose parents earn less than \$4,000 annually, as defined by the 1965 General Assembly. He questioned whether the plan would be reciprocal, entailing the busing of 80 Tolland children to "culturally disadvantaged schools" in Hartford. If so, he questioned "who would pick the 80 children from town to be sent to the cooperative schools?"

Cook added that "in recent years, many Tolland children have ridden buses as many as 21 miles a day, and adding a round trip ride to Hartford of nearly 40 miles, results in some 80 miles of bus riding daily for the children."

He added that, apparently, under the plan, "we could probably collect all Tolland children in a bus and send them to Union or Ashford."

An alternative to the study, according to Cook, "would be to do away with school systems that they now exist and substitute universal control, where teachers and students could be assigned at will and no children would have the advantage that a few possess."

Cook emphasized, however, that he has not read the Harvard study and that the board's education had not discussed it.

Commenting on the visit of Turkish Premier Adnan Menderes, which ended Tuesday, Pravda said: "The causes which brought about tension have been eliminated, and the misunderstanding... resulting from this tension have been firmly brushed aside."

### Voluntary Curbs Urged, Not Military Censoring

WASHINGTON (AP) — Twenty-seven editors with a court if it might affect the outcome of any pending criminal litigation. They urged the Justice Department to issue guidelines for the publication of news about criminal cases and yet decided.

The two, Sam Ragan, executive editor of the News and Observer, Raleigh, N.C., and Alfred Friendly, vice president and managing editor of the Washington Post, were joined by the Justice Department Tuesday in opposing a bill introduced by Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Or., aimed at insuring unprejudiced trials.

Ragan is the immediate past president of the Associated Press Managing Editors Association; Friendly is chairman of the publisher committee of the American Society of Newspaper Editors.

Both of the editors told a Senate Judiciary subcommittee that special committees set up by newspaper organizations are searching for the best way to balance the guarantee of free press and fair trial.

Ragan said he does not regard a free press and a fair trial as incompatible, but rather, "it is simply a matter of how to achieve both."

Friendly argued that "the future might 'easily' become a means to lower an iron curtain behind which prejudiced or corrupt police and courts could enjoy invulnerability."

Morse was the only witness in favor of his bill on the opening day of the hearings.

"When it comes to much of this crime news," he said, "the press, radio and television serve merely as conduits for what one side or the other wants told about its case."

Morse said the bill was aimed at prejudicial information given to newsmen by other sources that would not affect what they might uncover on their own.

The measure would make it a contempt of court punishable by a \$1,000 fine or a federal employee or for a defendant or his attorney to give out prejudicial information without a subpoena.

U.S. Steel Set To Spend More

NEW YORK (AP) — The U.S. Steel Corp. has announced a doubling of capital spending for 1966, the highest since the next three years.

The company, the nation's largest steel producer, also announced Tuesday a major capital expansion program.

The reorganization plan calls for moving the company's headquarters from New Jersey to Delaware and involves the conversion of preferred stock into debentures, which are a debt of the company and represent no ownership of equity.

Financial circles said the move, among other things, are expected to substantially reduce the company's federal income taxes.

A reorganization plan was filed in the largest reorganization of the company's capital since it was founded in 1901.

U.S. Steel capital spending program for the next three years is equal to the expenditure of the largest American steel industry last year.

Telemetry Problems Scrub Gemini Trip

Over 600 Cong Dead In Van Tuong Fight

48-Hr. Wait Expected Before New Attempt

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—Technical problems and a heavy thunderstorm combined today to force postponement of the eight-day Gemini 5 flight of astronaut L. Gordon Cooper Jr. and Charles Conrad Jr.

There was no immediate indication when the flight would be resumed, but it was believed that another attempt could not be made until Saturday.

The effort was called off at 12:48 p.m. EST. As Cooper and Conrad waited out the countdown while seated in the cramped quarters of the spacecraft, perched atop a fully loaded Titan 2 rocket.

They had been in the space ship since 10:42 a.m. After the caps and drenching rain began falling, Cooper and Conrad said they were anxious to be launched. The center controller called the launch attempt at 1:05 p.m.

The shot had been delayed three hours, 18 minutes because of a problem with the spacecraft's power system.

Cooper, 35, an Air Force lieutenant colonel, and Conrad, 35, a Navy lieutenant commander, originally were to have blasted off at 9 a.m. on man's longest planned space flight during the space race to ground control.

They said the trouble appeared to be in a commutator.

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—Two youths evaded security forces and wandered dangerously close to the Gemini 5 launching pad today before they were caught and removed.

Apparently seeking a close vantage point to watch the blastoff, one of the youths, a 16-year-old, was spotted by an Air Force camera operator before the launch pad equipment and tracking gear.
