A Dearth Of Suckers?

The New Hampshire Sweepstakes Commission is in trouble,—trouble with its own Legislature, trouble with the

The New Hampshire Legislature, this year, acted as if it were beginning to have its moral regrets for ever saving voted the sweepstakes business in the first place. It refused to allow the Commission to sell its tickets in state parks, hotels and motels; if clamped a \$20,000 ceiling on the salary of the former FBI agent who runs the sweepstakes, and many of its members grew angry when the Commission waited until the Legislature had adjourned and then ordered 42 highway billboards set up to promote the lottery.

With such lack of help from its own Legislature, the Sweepstakes Commission finds the outside suckers lagging. Even though this seems to be a banner tourist year for New Hampshire, the visitors aren't buying the sweepstakes tickets the way they did last year. The sale has been lagging some 400,000 behind the figure for a year ago, forecasting a substantial decline in the final

Last year, in its first year, the New Hampshire legal gamble wound up grossing over \$5,700,000 of which it returned \$2,500,000 to the state's local school districts. This year it had been hoped the gross would go up to may be down to only \$4,000,000, with a decline to something like \$2,100,000 in the amount brought in for the state." The Sweepstakes Commission is considering all kinds of potential remedies, most of which, like one for engaging a public relations firm to give the sweepstakes wider and better publicity

Loopholes In Speeding

Where there's a law there's usually a loophole—and a lawyer to discover it Connecticut's regulations on speeding contain built-in loopholes, and motorists are wriggling through them to the serious detriment of the state's anti-speed

safety program.

The big loophole was left when the 1963 session of the General Assembly passed a maximum speed law for Connecticut's highways but left the law on speed limit signs the way it was. Con necticut now has, a law which sets 7 miles an hour on superhighways and limited access roads, and 60 miles an hour on all other roads. It is not too difficult to get a straight conviction of motorists who violate these limits—or the license superposition that the license suspension that goes with



But violation of posted speed limits is something else again. These limits range from 25 miles an hour in many eities to 60 miles an hour on the Connecticut. Turnpike. If a motorist charged with violating these signs can convince the judge of the jury that he was traveling at a speed which was safe and reasonable for the time of day, the state of the traffic, and the weather, he is likely to go free.

This room also serves as a public entrance to other town hall offices and is the only area available for writing reports.

At the present time, the town manager serves as chief of police, with the resident serving as executive officer.

The purchase of a third cruiser was also recommended by the committee. At present, the town owns two police cruisers, a 1964 Plymouth and a 1965 Ford. Both cars are equipped with two-way radios.

The town is dependent on the hall offices and is the only area available for writing reports, sorting records, interrogating suspects and carrying on all other activities of the police department.

The committee cites the need for separate facilities and recommends that space could be sought in the new firehouse or in a property leased for this purpose.

eight full-time constables, the committee said a nucleus of eight qualified men is necessary before an organized police force becomes effective tions system, and that one partitime and three full-time dispatchers be hired and trained. Noting that when an organized police force becomes effective tions. before an organized police force can assume full responsibility for the protection of the town.

The committee considers an eight-man force a reasonable minimum. The figure is well below that of comparable towns, the report says.





New Crisis, Humphrey

WASHINGTON (AP) - Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey said today Negroes are on the verge of a major economic crisis, with the gap widening between their training and job re-Humphrey said in a speech prepared for the White House conference on equal employ-ment opportunity that nonwhite jobiessness increased in July when the national employment rate fell to 4.5 per cent.

"Less than four per cent of the white working force was out of a job," he said, "but for adult nonwhites the employment rate actually increased. "It is no exaggeration to say that nonwhites, principally Negroes, are on the verge of a major economic crisis. For the gap is widening between Negro education and training on the one hand, and the requirements of the labor market on the other. "Three Negro men in five are unskilled or semiskilled, And more than half the Negro men over 25 have less than a gram-mar school education. In North-ern industrial centers one out of ern industrial centers one out of every three Negro workers has suffered unemployment in the past few years. In some neighborhoods the unemployment rate among Negroes is as high as 40 per cent."

Humphrey said no single aspect of Negro needs can be considered apart from others, but "nothing is more important to the Negro in his struggle to free himself from his circule of frustration than the ability to hold a good lob." good job."
"What can we expect when hope is resolutely crushed from the young, when there are no jobs even for the educated, and no homes in good neighborhoods even for the hard-working?" he




