Telemetry Problems Scrub Gemini Trip

Over 600 Cong Dead In Van Tuong Fight

CHU LAI, South Viet (AP) - While Viet Cong survivors fled, a U.S. Marine officer said today American forces may have killed more than 600 of the Viet Cong in the battle of the Van Tuong peninsula.

Marine spokesmen said 500 Viet Cong bodies had been counted and casualties were light among the Marine regimental landing force that struck the entrenched guerrillas Wednesday.

But a U.S. military spokesman in Saigon said the Americans, fighting their biggest battle of the Viet Nam war, had suffered their heaviest loss of any single engagement in that war.

Major E. N. Snyder of Ocean side, Calif., operations officer for the 7th Regiment, said the estimate of more than 600 Viet Cong dead was based on aerial observation plus the body count.

"The Viet Cong was pushed out to sea or infiltrated around and through positions in the rear," Snyder said.

The Marine Regiment's intelligence officer, Maj. George H. Gentry Jr. of Fallbrook, Calif., estimated 1,200 guerrillas were in the combat zone and 800 others in the general area.

"I think some slipped out of the rear," Snyder said. "We accomplished our mission very successfully."

Walt said the area had been cleared of Viet Cong by nightfall and was quiet.

In other areas, the Viet Cong overran a district headquarters town and a special forces camp at Dak Sot, in the central highlands, and caused heavy casualties in an attack on a hamlet five miles west of Saigon.

The fighting showed an increase of activity in the war after several days of relative quiet.

The Marines opened their 300-mile march from the beachhead on the peninsula, 80 miles north of Saigon, navy helicopters, landing troops by helicopter and by landing craft.

They met heavy resistance. Heavy weapons, air strikes and mortar fire were used against the Viet Cong as the Marines fought their way across the peninsula.

The fighting went on through the night and most of today as the Marines pushed the Viet Cong back from bunkers, tunnels and caves.

A briefing officer said the battle was reminiscent of the World War II fighting on Iwojima.

"The Viet Cong kept coming out of holes that we hadn't found," he said.

"Suddenly there were Viet Cong in back of them. It was a slow operation."

The briefing officer said the entire operation was a solid success.

48-Hr. Wait Expected Before New Attempt

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—Technical problems and a heavy thunderstorm combined today to force postponement of the eight-day Gemini 5 flight of astronaut L. Gordon Cooper Jr. and Charles Conrad Jr.

There was no immediate indication when the flight would be resumed, but it was believed that another attempt could not be made until Saturday.

The effort was called off at 12:48 p.m. EST. As Cooper and Conrad waited out the count-down while seated in the training quarters of the spacecraft perched atop a fully loaded Titan 2 rocket.

The Titan 2 was in the space ship since 10:42 a.m. After the caps and drenching rain began falling, Cooper and Conrad said they still were anxious to launch.

When the primary system was switched back on it was working fine. But engineers expressed some concern and they wanted to take an extra 15 minutes to check it. In the meantime, the thunder and lightning swept in over the Cape and drenched the launch area.

HARTFORD (AP)—Mingling no words, Republican State Chairman A. Searle Pinney has turned down cold an invitation to appear at a rally for Ronald Reagan in New Haven.

Pinney made public today a letter sent to Reagan Aug. 9 in which he gave in detail his reasons for refusing an invitation to appear at a dinner in New Haven.

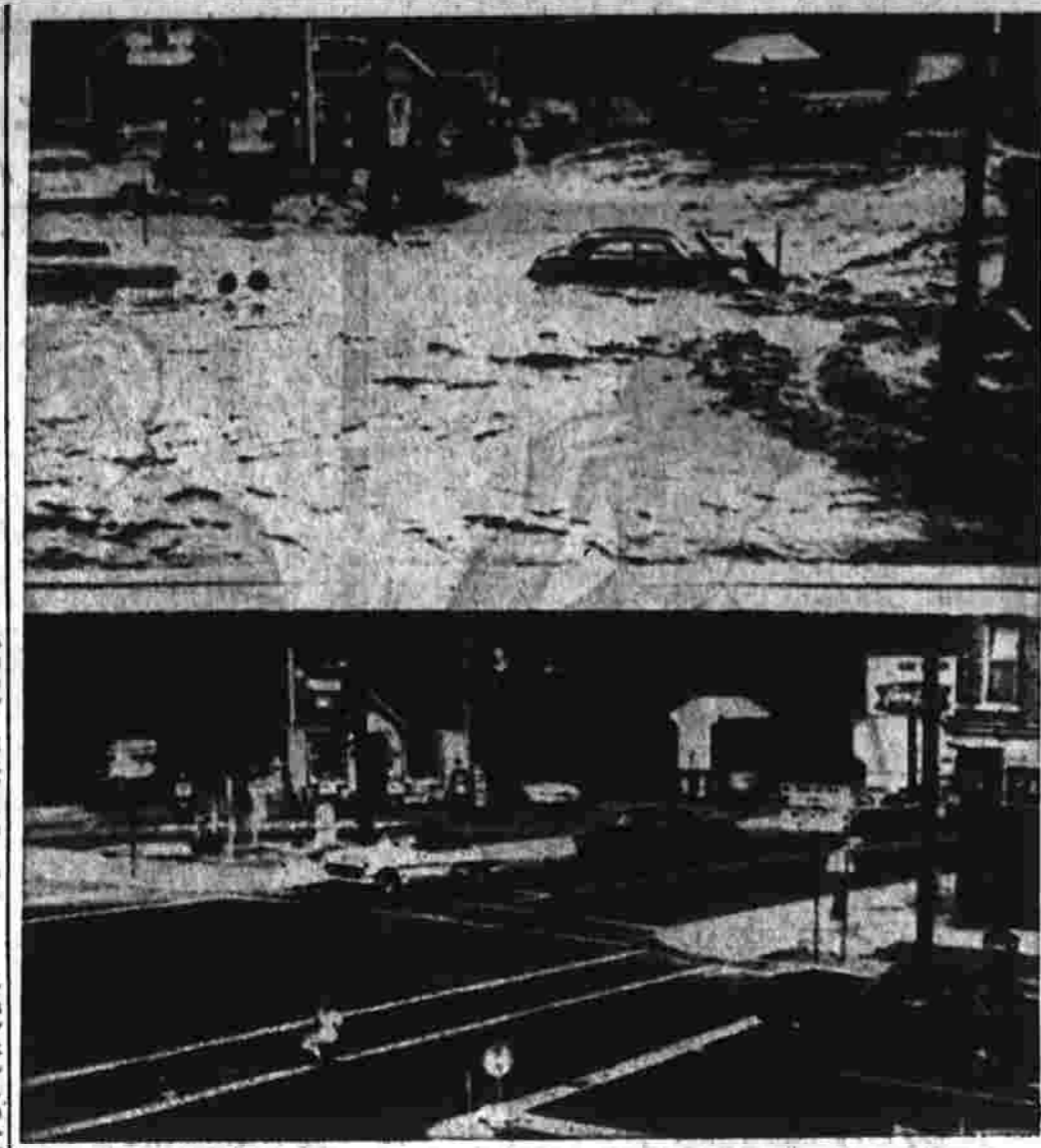

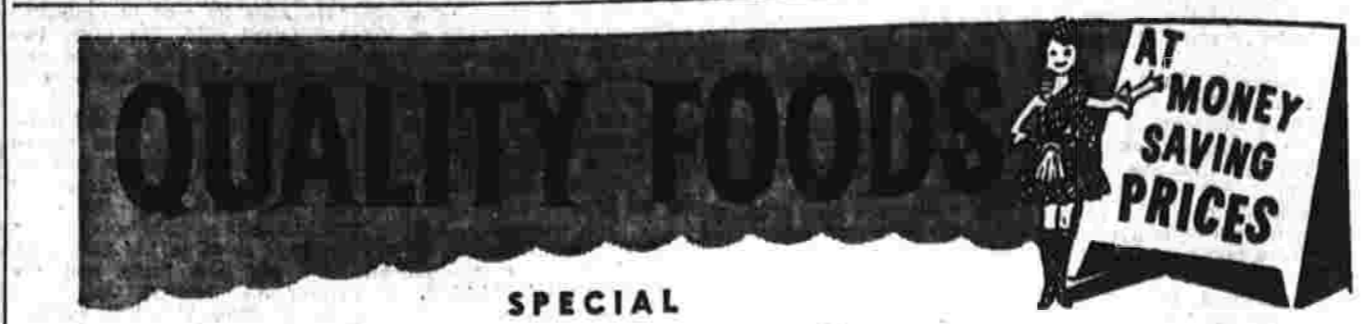
