A Victory Near Chulai

In the two day battle just concluded south of the American airstrip at Chual, there has been the first strictly American action in the Vietnam war. It was American Marines, fighting alone, gainst the Vietcong. Our generalship scked the scene and shape of the battle, and fought the battle to what

seems to be a conclusive victory. A victory in such a battle, to be conclusive, would have two objectives. The first would be to kill more of the esterny than the enemy was able to cill of us. Our present estimates of casualties among the Vietcong are 600 dead, perhaps 1,000 wounded. The casualties among Americans, when ansounced, are expected to be the heaviest of the war to date, but fewer than

The second proof of victory would be to have the territory involved, which the Victoong had been using as a strong base for its own harassments, eliminated from future Vietcong domination and brought into the sone of American domination we hope to create and build out from key points along the

those suffered by the enemy.

Aside from the two kinds of victory which may be claimed for the action, there is a third factor involved. We have never been very sure of how willingly and well the South Vietnamese themselves will fight in any particular engagement in this war. On the other hand, enemy propaganda has been trying to spread the idea that the Americans were in Vietnam merely to make the South Vietnamese fight an Ameri-

In this battle, the Americans themselves did the fighting, thus proving, to the South Vietnamese and to the North Vietnamese alike, that we mean business, that we are willing to lose our lives in the struggle, that we are no longer merely advisers.

we must prove to the Vietcong that they are not going to be able to take over the entire country by force of arms. An operation like this backs up that theory, in blood.

saide from these negative advantages. there is much to be happy about. Our involvement is still in what our own military leaders long proclaimed to be the wrong war in the wrong place. We can kill Victorig with bullets, but that doesn't happen to kill Communism. We may be able to keep the Vietcong from taking over South Vietnam, but that doesn't mean we ourselves can hope to stay there forever. It may be necessary for us to prove that we will fight and die on the mainland of Asia, but when we fought this battle, these two past days, it was, unfortunately, a battle of the white outsider against the non-white Asian. We lose, to some extent, and in some respects, even when


