UNITED NATIONS, N.Y.

(AP) — Despite a dearth of dolars in the U.N. Treasury, Secretary-General U Thant has recmmended a 7.7 per cent intures in 1966.

He is asking the 20th session of the General Assembly opening Sept. 21 to approve a record budget calling for gross expend-fures of \$116.787,110. He may ask later that the figure be raised to \$120 million. Thant says the increased exmeet the demands of the 114 member countries for expansion of U.N. economic and social programs, and to increase the size of his staff.

The recommendations are

enly for the regular U.N. budg-et. Total gross expenditures for all U.N. activities are estimated at \$522.2 million. This includes the 11 specialized U.N. agen-cies, the peacekeeping opera-tions, programs for technical assistance, the special fund, the children's fund, and refugee aid programs. programs.

Net expanditures in the regular budget for 1965 are stimated at \$98,818,310. Thant can figure on \$17,918,000 in income from such sources as the U.N. post office and sales of U.N publica

crease of \$4,739,800 for salaries in 1966. He wants to hire 641 more persons, bringing the over-all total of persons em-ployed in the U.N. secretariat to He says also that \$4,074,400 is needed for the newest U.N. org-an, the Conference on Trade and Development. This was created to spur the economic well-being of underdeveloped countries. It is setting up its main headquarters in Geneva. Thant said the U.N. financial situation remains precarious. situation remains precarious. He had to borrow \$4 million from the U.N. special fund in April and May to meet payroll and other urgent bills. While the special fund has been repaid, it will again become necessary t him to borrow from the fund to meet the September payroll. Of concern now is about \$50 million owed for the peacekeeping operations.
U.N. officials say that receipt of \$65 million in voluntary contributions would rescue the or-ganization from its immediate plight. Fifty millions would be applied against the peace-keeping debt, and \$15 million repaid into the U.N. working capital fund.



Par For The Human Course All that has been achieved in the way of international agreement to keep the military part of world life out of space is a pledge not to orbit weapons of mass destruction. That pledge, said President Johnson yesterday, we intend to keep on honoring.

There is nothing else to keep the military out of space except the possible restraint and good sense of the human race, and that has never yet applied to policies being pursued by the human race as it has organized itself into individual nations.

Accordingly, when President Johnson also announced yesterday that he had ordered the Department of Defense to proceed immediately with the development, for this nation, of a manned orbiting laboratory, he was scoring par for the course in such matters. What we announce openly that we are about to do Soviet Russia may al-

ready have begun to do secretly. To take our earthly wars out into space may be regrettable, and something we know better than to do, but we do not know how not to do it, either. So, from now on, the air will be full of our protestations that we are willing

to keep war out of space if everybody else will, under some system which guarantees no trickery, and space will soon begin to be full of all kinds of nilitary command posts, launching platforms, and anything and everything that we and the Russians may be able to label as outside the classification of weapons of "mass destruc-

But one can be sure that as soon as we get military platforms up there in space, the mass destruction weapons that could get up there in a hurry would be only a launching pad away. There is, in short, no better basis for hoping we can keep war out of space than there is for hoping we can keep war out of land, sea and air.

And President Johnson's announcement yesterday constitutes the first formal announcement that, from now on, the military capacities and advantages of the growing conquest of space will be part of the calculations of all great earthly powers. Under the way we human beings run

our world, this has to happen because it can happen. We have not, as yet, developed the power to choose for ourselves what we will do with such a thing as our con-

quest of space. There are no particular villains in this matter-not the Air Force which is anxious to get going on the project, not President Johnson who gives the order, not the Russians who may have their own first military experiments for space already under construction. This is par for the human course Once again, we speak of peace, but prepare for war.
