



Three Times And Out?

President Nasser of Egypt embraced each other the other day, their mutual affection being demonstrated in Jidda, the King's capital. The occasion for their undying brotherhood was the fact that they had just signed their third solemn agreement to stop fighting each other by proxy in the country of Ye-

They agreed on peace in Yemen last

And now they have agreed again. By their agreement, both the royalists in Yemen, who have had King Faisal's backing, and the republicans, whose revolution President Nasser has been assisting with perhaps as many as 60,000 troops, are to give way for the formation of an interim national gov-

Then President Nasser, inside of 10 months, is to withdraw all his troops. Then, in 15 months, a national plebiscite is to be held to determine what permanent form of government the peo-In the communique issued the other day, both King Faisal and President Nasser pledged to help the Yemenis and with hope that such diminished

somebody else's soil may prove contagious elsewhere. In Yemen, where the royalists were in the hills and the revolutionaries in the cities, where King Faisal was representing old-fashioned Near Eastern absolutism and President Nasser the cause of modern revolution and progtotal control of the country. The only victory for anybody would be a sort of negative victory, for the country itself, if both outsiders would get out. They have now pledged to do so, for the third time. Perhaps, this time, their zest for doing battle with each other on the soil of Yemen has diminished enough to permit them to keep their

Technology Vs. Beauty

Congress has now passed legislation clearing the way for the construction of overhead power lines to the Atomic Energy Commission's linear accelerate Stanford University. For two and one-half years the residents of nearby Woodside, Calif., have blocked these lines through court action. The unexpectedly spirited debate in the House in which 125 members rallied to Woodside's support proved the widespread public interest in this admittedly complex but vitally important problem of reconciling technology with scenic and conservation values.

Further delay is still possible since Weodside, although its cause is now hopeiess, can contest the new law in the courts and thus hold up construction for another several months. A better solution would be for the A.E.C. to conwoodside and Ban Mateo County raise funds to do the same with the existing local, low-voltage distribution lines. Such a move would get rid of the more

than 2,000 unsightly now mar the town. There is merit in the A.E.C. argument that the Federal Government should not be made to observe a high-er esthetic standard than the local compromise would prevent any delay in the operation of the linear accelerator. For the longer future, this controversy should make clear to the Federal Government's science research policymak-ers the desirability of more intensive research into techniques for placing high voltage lines underground at costs that would not be prohibitive.

The Manchester Education Association (MEA) yesterday formally petitioned the State Department of Education for a teacher referendum to decide who will negotiate for public school teachers in Manchester.

By law, once the petition is filed a referendum must be held ond referendum will cost tax-Robert Wolfert, MEA president, was not at home to answer how many signatures were on the petition.

According to the new right-tonegotiate bill, which lays down the procedures for referendums and negotiations, the petition must be signed by 20 per cent of either all the professional staff or all the supervisors or administrators, or all the teach-

Whichever it is depends on whether the MEA wants to represent all the professional staff or just the teachers.

Since the National Education Association, the parent body of the MEA, has long professed the belief that teachers and administrators can and should be in the same organization, it is likely that the MEA petition represents all the professional staff, both teachers and administra-

There are approximately 480 professional staff members in the Manchester School System; collect about 96 signatures from

the 417-member MEA.

The MEA also petitioned for the first referendum, which was held in April and won, uncontested, by the MEA. However, it was soon invalideted by the it was soon invalidated by the right-to-negotiate bill passed by the General Assembly months

SILO COMPLETED high concrete full height in rose to its full height in less than a week by a process called slip-form construction. The silo, completed Monday at midnight, was built for the Central Connecticut Cooperative Farmer's Association on Apel Pl.

The base of the silo required

General Manager Richard Mar-tin was absent for eye cataract and the sides another 900, all supplied continuously for a week by Manchester Sand and Gravel hats during that period, as acting general manager, town coun-plied continuously because of he process used, A form for the walls was

placed on the base and unformed concrete poured into it. Steel rods were placed into the concrete and, when the concrete hardened, lifts attached to the rods and to the form pulled the form up so that more concrete could be poured. The lifts inched up the rods at a rate of 10 inches an hour. The form had to be kept in motion in order to keep it from sticking to the concrete. Although the walls of the ailo are only 7 inches thick all the way up to the top, the steel rods and the curving walls are

said to add more than enough strength to make it a lasting structure. When the silo's four compartments are filled with grain it will be even stronger. The total cost of the silo will be about \$80,000. It will be ready by at least Oct. 1 for the fall corn crop from the Mid-

A Midwest construction firm, Borton Inc., Hutchinson, Kan., came east to build what is probably the first grain silo built by this process in Connec-ticut. In the west these silos are common features in most The whole operation was su-pervised by Manchester Engi-

Two other alip-form constructed silos were built in Portland and Rocky Hill but they were for the storage of ce-

ment.
