

The latest small cluster of Presidential appointments would seem to serve some unstated purposes of official famlly accommodation rather than any visible purposes of the national welfare. One office involved, that of postmaster general, now goes almost all the way back to the purely political significarice it had through so many presidencies, until John F. Kennedy tried to put in a man who could concentrate on trying to deliver the mail instead of parcel out the patronage.

But, in 1963, President Kennedy himself went part way back toward classification of the office as mainly political when he named John A. Gronouski to the post. It was assumed, then, that the main qualification Mr. Gronouski had to be postmaster general was his standing as a distinguished member of the community of Americans of Pelish

Now it is to be Postmaster General Lawrence O'Brien - an appointment which moves the last of the close Kennedy group out of the White House while, at the same time, it keeps his redoubtable talents for the practical side of the political game at the service of the Johnson administration. The new accommodation being found

for Mr. Gronouski is one which President Johnson goes to great oratorial lengths to justify on the basis of the same qualification which won him his original appointment to the Kennedy catinet. His Polish ancestry is one of the factors which is to make suitable and fruitful his appointment as ambassador to Poland. And the President, in announcing the appointment, spoke as if he thought this factor offered great proof of his own burning passion to cement better relations between the United States and the iron curtain country of Poland.

Some of us will have unworthy thoughts, in which we wonder whether the dominant consideration was not that some kind of place had to be found for Gronouski. And we notice that it is a distinguished professional diplomat, John Cabot, who is being replaced at Warsaw. Perhaps some of the less professional characters President Johnson seems to prefer for ambassadorial posts are going to do more for us abroad than the trained professionals. But one wonders if the special assign-ment Ambassador Cabot has had at Warsaw-that of those periodic meetings with the Chinese ambassador to Warsaw-is also going to be transferred to the good Mr. Gronouski from

As we said at the beginning, it is easier to believe the President was solving some unstated official family problem than it is to figure out any special advantage to any of the national services involved in these shifts.



The news from the Dominican Re public today is good. The military unta which the United States intervention saved from possible defeat by the rebels has announced its decision to resign and yield to a new provisional government designed by the political committee of the Organization of American States. That means, if it carries through,

that the United States is finally free of the charge of trying to win the civil war in the Dominican Republic for the military dictatorship against which the revolt was originally staged. Our function in the crisis would be reduced to that of seeing that neither

This does not resolve the basic legal and moral questions surrounding our original intervention. But it can mean that we do ourselves a little less permanent damage in the hemisphere than has seemed probable. The present plan for a provisiona

government means that the rebels

haven't won, in the field of action, the victory they may have been about to gain when our Marines intervened. But if there is any validity to the rebel claim of strength among the people of the country, and the rebels are really willing to work for the goals of a democracy through the methods of democracy, the acceptance of this provisional government should give them their fair and full chance to work for and gain that victory by ballots instead

of bullets. This prospect of peace in Dominica comes just in time. For, the night before mortar shells were falling in the city zone held by the rebels, and the military junta and the United States forces were arguing over which one of them must have been firing them, and the stalemate of many weeks threatened to become a three-cornered blood

But perhaps in Dominica, as just previously in Yemen, this is a season for people to realize the dead end futility of struggles nobody can really win in the field. May it prove contagious, in Kashmir, for instance, or in Vietnam.

A Computer Would Have Known The other day a suspect New York police were holding and questioning in connection with an alleged attempt at extortion wound up his session under the third degree with a confession that had no relation to the alleged extortion. The suspect confessed to a murder the police were trying to solve, and signed a confession in which, according to police, he gave "astonishing details" of the killing that "conceivably could only be known to the perpetrator."

So the police charged the fellow with murder, and, the next day, presented him in court. There his lawyer appeared, with indisputable proof that this delightful character had actually been in Bronx County Jail on last June 14, the

Now, of course, there is developing what has come to be the standard outcry on the part of those who constitute themselves volunteer watchdogs over the doings of the police. They want an investigation into what could have happened to make somebody confess to a murder he could not possibly have committed.

They point out, with justified horror, that here might have been an instance in which, if it hadn't been for the fortunate fact that the suspect had a jail record, he might even have been convicted of the murder to which he had confessed with such an alarming amount of detail.



Route 9 Near Reality Despair has given way to hope among those Middlesex citizens who have for several years fought a sometimes several years fought a sometimes frustrating battle for the completion of a modern highway to link the towns from Middletown to Old Saybrook. Their goal now appears in sight.

Thanks to the generosity of the 1965 General Assembly the major obstacle, insufficient funds, has been remedied and the State Highway Department can now make commitments for the work. There are four remaining segments. The bids have been received on one, a second is to be advertised this summer and the last two will be put out to bid in November or December. Since contractors generally need two

summers to complete a segment such as this the prospect is that the four-lane Route 9, all the way from Middletown to Old Saybrook, will be ready for use sometime in 1967. This does not include the four-lane connector from the East the four-lane connector from the East Haddam bridge approach which the Assembly approved this year, since the State Highway Department must draw the plans and acquire the right of way. But the series of delays is now apparently ended unless the \$805-million program of roads now authorized turns out to be too much for the department to handle and the remaining Route 9 projects are thereby affected. However, at the moment, the outlook for completion by 1967 is bright, and this should be good news for motorists who who 'on recent weekends have found themselves' hopeleasiy involved in bumper-to-bumper traffic on a stage-coach era road that should have been replaced long ago.
