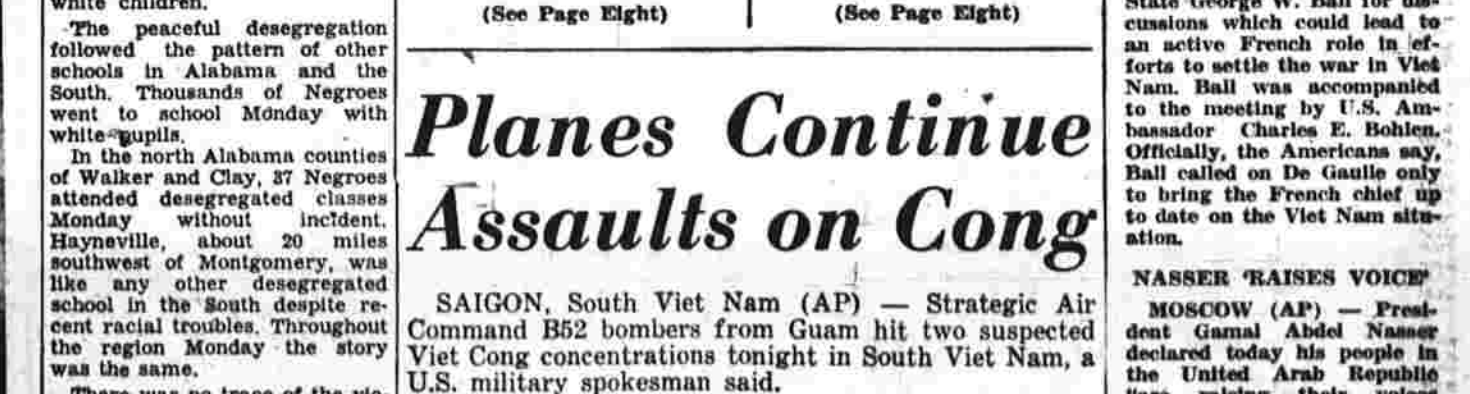

been present problem.

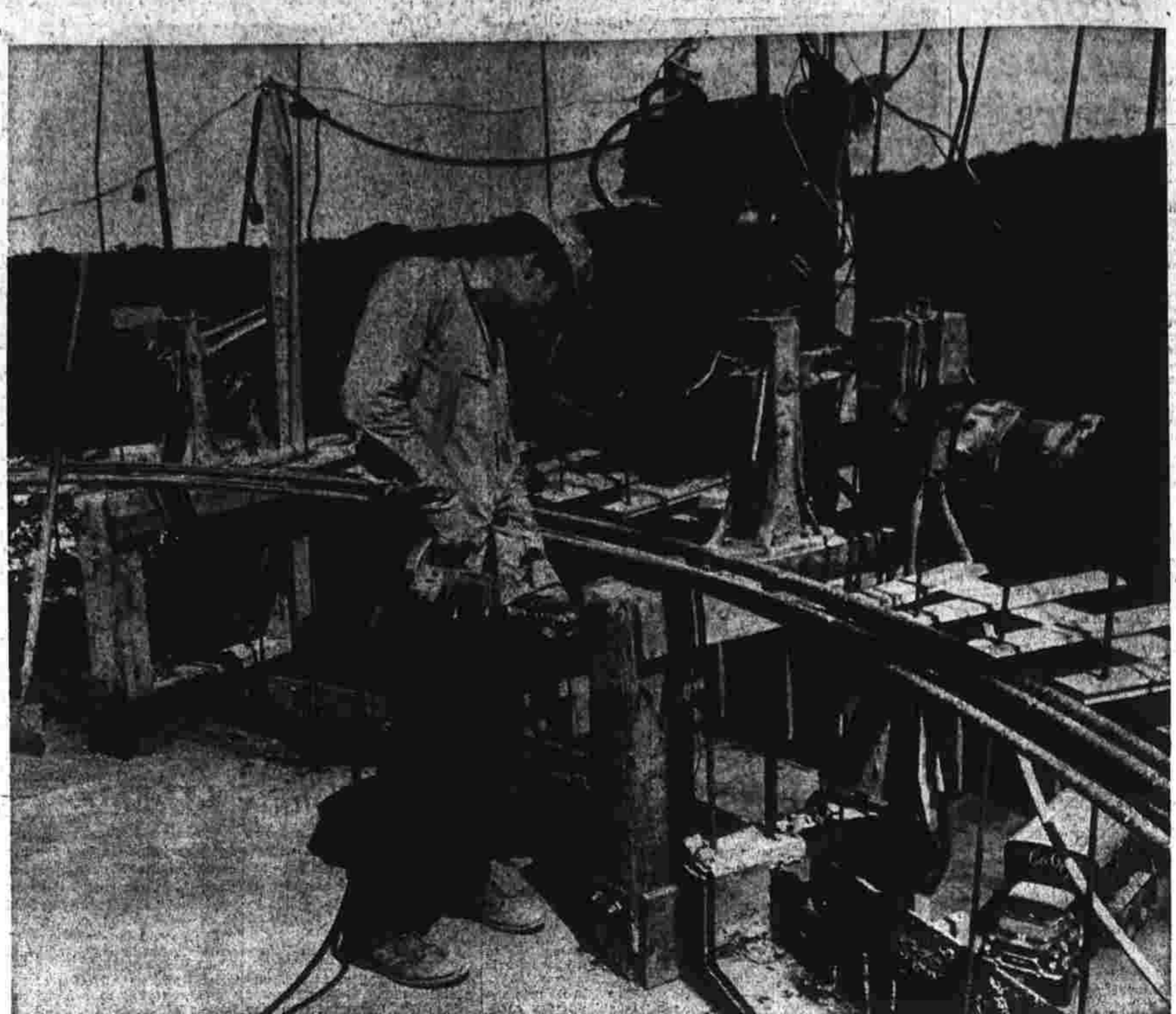

But is there validity to the
rebel claim of strength among the people
of the country, and the rebels are
really willing to work for the goals of
a democracy through the methods of

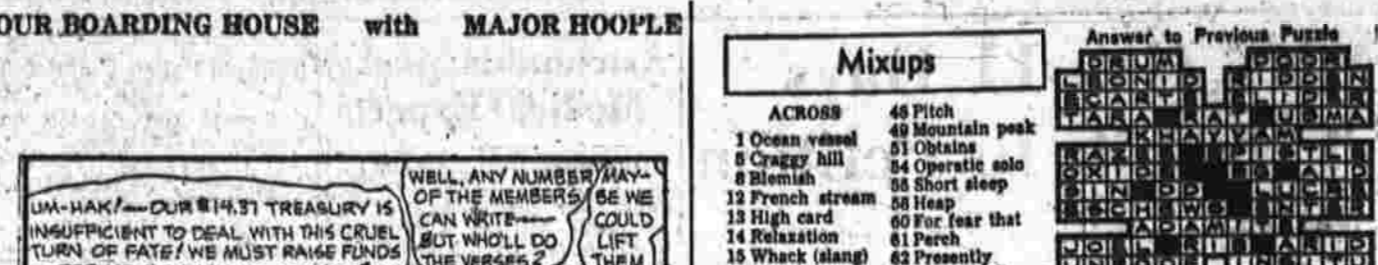
