## Steel Negotiations Reach 'Tough' Stage

WASHINGTON (AP)—Johnson, who successfully have idled 450,000 workers and sought an eight-day postponement of the threatened steel strike to permit continued negotiations, had had no personal contact with the negotiators. Moyers said Johnson was getting frequent reports, however, from Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz and Secretary of Commerce John T. Connor who are sitting in on the talks. Wirtz and Connor met separately during the morning with the industry and labor negotiating teams. Originally, a strike that would have idled 450,000 workers and shut down 50 per cent of the industry had been called for 12:01 a.m. today by the AFL-CIO United Steelworkers Union. The postponement secured by Johnson put the deadline off to Sept. 2.

The union is demanding wage and fringe benefits increases amounting to about 53 cents an hour over three years. The industry's last offer was 40¢ cents.

## Same Old Story, August Rainfall Below Normal

WINDSOR LOCKS (AP)—Although showers were reported on about half of the 31 days in August, rainfall amounted to 1.06 inches—only 27 per cent of normal—the U. S. Weather Bureau reported today.

The August weather summary stressed that it was the sixth straight month and 14th in the last 16 that the monthly rainfall measured at Bradley Field, site of the bureau, was below normal.

The Connecticut River Valley received the least amount of rain in the state.

## Closeup of a President—Part II

### Congress Responds Well

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congress is responding like a giant computer to President Johnson's touch, rolling out in record-breaking volume legislation aimed at altering the course of American life.

By the time it adjourns for the year, probably in September, the administration-controlled Congress will have produced an astounding compilation of measures aimed at bolstering the economy and lifting the poor and oppressed to higher social and economic levels.

While this was going on, the President succeeded in smothering all but a recalcitrant few voices of opposition among the legislators to his course in Viet Nam. His judgment that there is no substantial dissent to the policies he is pursuing is generally accepted as accurate.

In his 21 months as President, Johnson has gone far beyond the New Deal of Franklin D. Roosevelt, the predecessor he reversed, to push the federal government into areas FDR never dared invade.

Now his task, as the President sees it, is to turn from the field of what Richard Goodwin, a presidential aide, called "material want" toward the improvement of "the quality of human life."

Translated, this means high-velocity beautification, rebuilding of the nation's alum-scarred cities, elimination of water and air pollution, and expansion of recreation facilities.

If all of this sounds ambitious, Johnson has never lacked ambition.

While Cabinet members and experts are busy shaping up legislation for the 1966 session of this Congress, the President has started studies for programs to lay before the 90th Congress.

Perhaps Congress will not be so docile in the future, but for practical purposes Johnson has got just about everything he asked for out of a body in which the Democrats outnumber the Republicans 2 to 1.

Major examples of his accomplishments include the negro voting rights bill, health care for the elderly, aid to secondary education, a \$7-billion housing program, establishment of a housing and urban affairs department, a \$2.6-billion excise tax cut, mental health grants, military pay increases and a proposed constitutional amendment on presidential disability.

Also Congress has given Johnson most of what he asked for foreign aid.

#### Pair Rescued After Hitting Power Line

BRIDGEPORT (AP)—Two boys were rescued from a power line tower Tuesday night after one of them had brushed a line carrying 11,000 volts.

"It's really a miracle they're alive, really a miracle," said the Rev. Joseph Pouliot, a Baptist minister who serves as police department chaplain.

The Rev. Mr. Pouliot ascended the tower during the lengthy rescue operation, which involved maneuvering a fire department ladder truck up to the tower and shutting off electrical power for three tracks of the New Haven Railroad.

The youths, Edward Huydic, 14, of Stratford, and Stanley Morach, also 14, of Bridgeport, had climbed the 50-foot tower to watch the trains go by.

Huydic suffered third-degree burns on approximately 30 per cent of his body, including his legs, feet, face and arms. His condition was described as fair.

Morach, who did not come in contact with the wires, was treated for shock.

The Rev. Mr. Pouliot said Huydic remained conscious despite the heavy jolt of electricity.

**Marines Shorten 'Boot' Training**  
WASHINGTON (AP)—The Marine Corps announced today it is compressing recruit training from 13 weeks to an eight-week course.

The action, effective immediately, follows a pattern used in World War II and Korea.

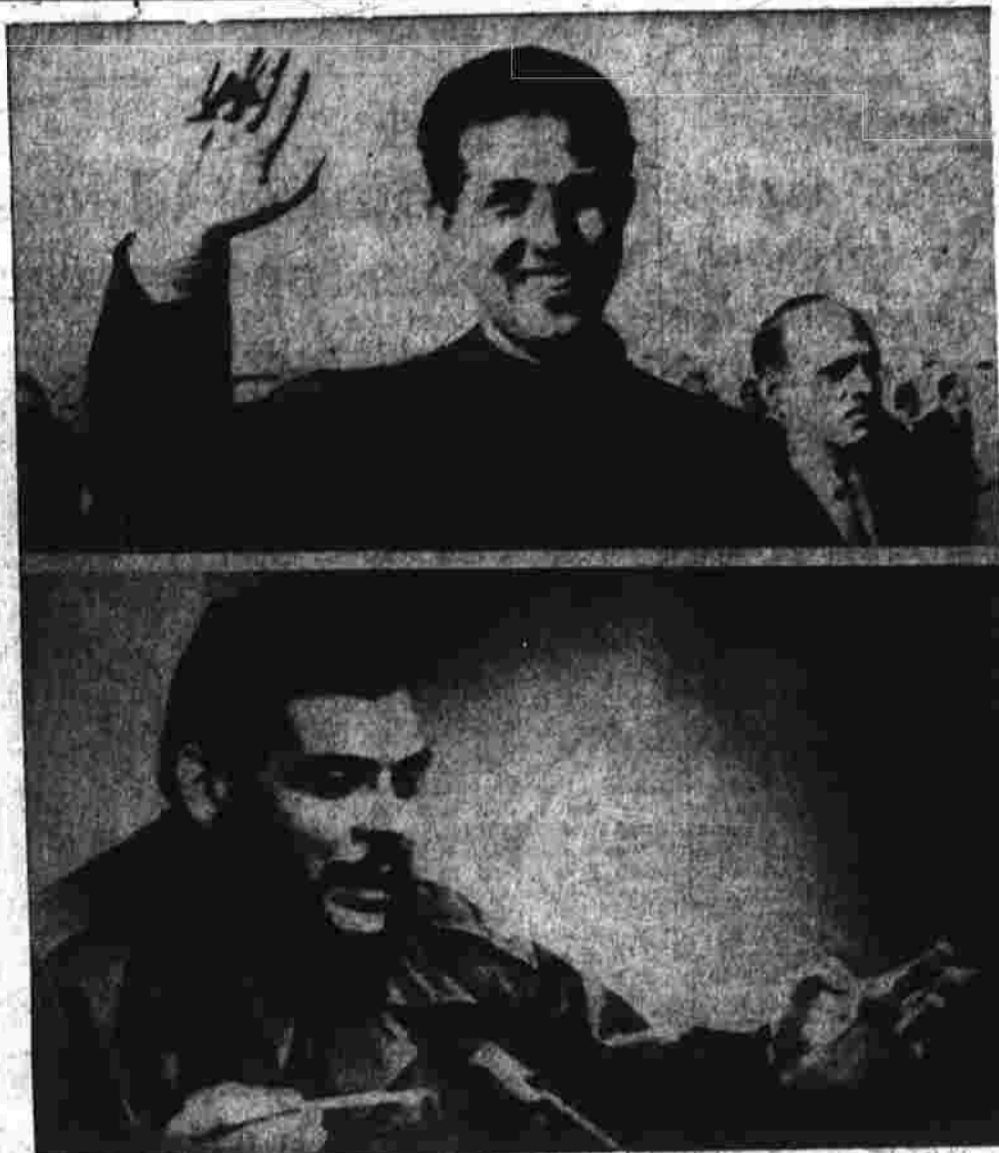
The aim is to process the 30,000 additional men authorized for the Corps without adding to present Marine facilities or increasing the staff of instructors.

The Corps takes the position that the shorter training period will not diminish the combat qualifications of recruits.

Recruits will work a full six-day training week instead of getting off part of Saturday.

The Marines train recruits at Parris Island, S.C., and San Diego, Calif.

The Corps was allotted another 30,000 men above the present 100,000 as part of the nation's buildup for the Viet Nam War.

## 'Copter Shot Down, Four Americans Die

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Four Americans and one Vietnamese were killed today in the crash of a helicopter believed downed by Red gunners 25 miles northwest of Saigon, a U.S. military spokesman said.

The aircraft, went down in Binh Duong Province a half-mile south of the town. The spokesman said it apparently came under heavy ground fire.

A Vietnamese army unit found the bodies of the occupants.

In another development, U.S. rescue crews ended a week-long search without success for a U.S. Navy pilot whose plane caught fire Aug. 24 during a bombing mission in North Viet Nam. The pilot was seen to have parachuted from the disabled A4 Skyhawk about 40 miles south of Thanh Hoa.

## Chicago, Carolina Are Sites

NEW YORK (AP)—Racial troubles erupted into violence in both the North and South Tuesday night. Two white men were injured in a free-for-all fight in Plymouth, N. C., and three Negroes were hospitalized in Chicago.

Tensions in Plymouth had been so high that civil rights leaders called off a scheduled demonstration. But seven Negroes walking down the main street of the eastern North Carolina town were confronted by a group of whites, touching off the shooting in which one white man was wounded and the fight in which another was stabbed.

The Chicago trouble began when about 40 demonstrators, mostly Negroes, picketed the home of School Sup. Benjamin Willis. He has been the target of protests of those dissatisfied with racial distribution of pupils in Chicago schools.

When the demonstrators began to lie down in the heavily traveled intersection of Sheridan Road and Bryn Mawr Avenue, police moved in to make arrests. Some of these placed bodily in patrol wagons fought their way out and the officers subdued them with clubs.

Seven of the demonstrators were taken to hospitals for examinations and three were held for treatment. Four were arrested and taken to jail.

Plymouth police said one of the Negroes in the group walking toward the center of town pulled a pistol from his waist and fired three shots at the white man.

The group of Negroes turned and fled down the street into a group of whites that had gathered in the middle of town. Several white men grabbed the Negro with the pistol and began beating him.

State troopers and police quickly moved in and shot the demonstrators who later managed to escape. Police arrested two other Negroes.

George Williams, 46, of Greenville, N.C., was shot in the stomach and Clarence McCoy Adams, 27, of Pink Hill, N.C., was hospitalized with a knife wound. Both were reported in good condition.

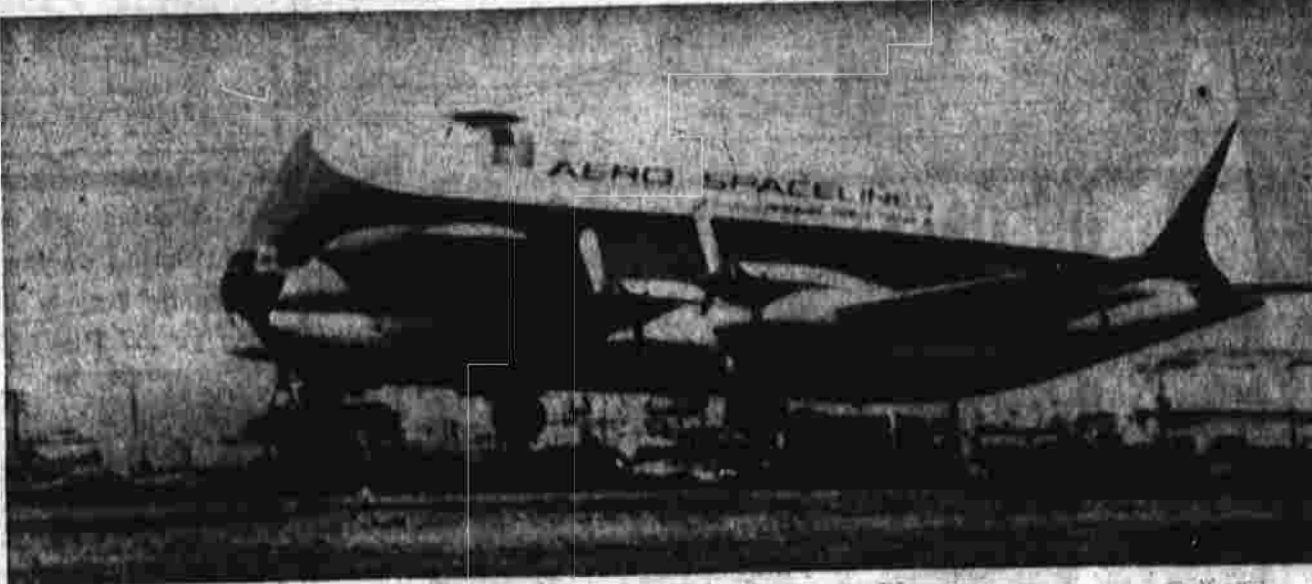
## Price-Fix Damages Near \$400 Million

NEW YORK (AP)—Damages assessed in a 1960 electrical equipment price-fixing scandal have neared \$400 million.

The total was increased Tuesday when a federal judge fined General Electric Co. and Westinghouse Electric Corp. nearly \$17 million for their part in fixing prices, rigging bids and dividing markets on electrical equipment valued at \$1.75 billion annually.

The companies had been found guilty in 1961. The ruling by U.S. Dist. Judge Wilfred Feinberg was in a civil case to determine damages.

Judge Feinberg ruled that Ohio Valley Electric Corp. and its subsidiary, the Indiana-Kentucky Electric Corp., were fraudulently overcharged by \$5-

### Daring Hunt for Viet Cong Fails in Mekong Delta Marsh

Editor's note: Vietnamese troops launched a massive operation recently into Viet Cong-infested swamps long thought to be impenetrable. Associated Press writer Hugh A. Mulligan accompanied them.

When the guns stopped, almost 100 Viet Cong soldiers, many of whom were Communist district chiefs and had some over the government side, led the way under close guard.

At 8:40 a.m., a flight of helicopters best overhead and delivered a Vietnamese ranger battalion deep into the swamps. All day long the search continued.

At division headquarters, aboard the landing ship, the biggest ship in the flotilla, Maj. Don Old of San Antonio, Tex., and Capt. Charles W. New York City kept tabs on the tactical situation, calling for air strikes, keeping track of the casualty and prisoner charts.

Operation Flying Dragon began near midnight with more than 100 troops moving from the ferry slip at Can Tho, on the wide river, to the Mekong River. They boarded the landing craft of two Vietnamese navy river assault groups.

The decks shook. The sultry delta air was arid with the smell of gunpowder.

Tracer bullets skipped off the water and danced into the jungle. The fleet moved up a narrow canal with barely room to turn a boat, dropped its massive jaws and disgorged wave after wave of troops. They hit the beach with a shout and disappeared into towering mangrove thickets.

South Windsor Council's Dictating Machine Brings Article in Magazine

An article and photograph on the town council's use of a dictating machine appears in "Mayor" and "Management" magazines for municipal executives.

Accompanying the story about the council's use of a light weight portable tape dictating machine used during all council meetings, is a picture of the council in action during a meeting at the high school library.

The machine has eliminated the need to hire a court stenographer, placed access to verbatim discussion records and simplified the job of transcribing and filing reports of the proceedings by permitting summarization of all but one-record statements.

The basis of the system is a tape dictating machine which includes a preamplifier, speaker and volume control mixer unit and three desk type microphones.

For these meetings, it is possible to carry a case and set up in the library of the high school where council meetings are held.

The unit is also used by the zoning board of appeals at public hearings and by administrative personnel of the town for recording lengthy reports.

Mayor John Egan, in commenting on the system of tape recording, said that the system is a very important meeting.

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Unrest in Hampton Beach As Labor Day Approaches

HAMPTON BEACH, N.H. (AP) — You might consider this a typical New England seaside resort: adults, children, teenagers, elderly enjoying the sunshine, the water and the tranquility. It was not always thus.

A year ago on Labor Day eve, some 10,000 rioting youths shattered the quiet of Hampton Beach. Burning bottles, beer cans and rocks, they stamped beach areas, motels and businesses, and even the police station in a night-long melee that resulted in more than 200 arrests, caused thousands of dollars in damage, and injured a score or more.

Labor Day disturbances had been building up over the years and culminated in last year's destructive riot.

The youths were beaten back more than three miles to the Massachusetts border by club-wielding police. One boy lost an eye. Scores required hospital treatment. One state trooper lost several teeth when struck by a rock.

Strenuous state and local efforts were consequently directed toward one end: to prevent any recurrence of the outbreak. But with Labor Day approaching again, an uneasiness is again in the air.

State police, already manning the beach with a special 31-trooper patrol, plan to bolster their force by the addition of about 50 men in and about the area.

A National Guard battalion from Portsmouth, 400 strong, will hold maneuvers in the area on Sunday, the anniversary of the riot.

Col. Joseph L. Regan, head of the State Police, said he has no reason to expect trouble. But "if it develops, let me say we will be fully prepared."

Gov. John W. King's administrative assistant, Thomas A. Power, said: "Nobody's going to get out of hand this year."

If things do, the state has a new model control law to rely on. Enacted by the 1965 legislature, it provides for fines up to \$1,000 and three years in jail for participating in a riot.

In the past year a special state commission headed by Justice

Amos N. Blaisdell Jr. studied the community. The commission's report, while pointing a good deal of the blame on the youths involved and their parents, contained an indictment of Hampton Beach as well.

It reported a trend toward racial innuendo throughout most of the summer, and then a belated attempt to crack down on the Labor Day weekend.

Local efforts have been channeled into youth projects that would occupy time, eliminating the boredom that can result in violence. For example, the committee to Avoid Violent Events, financed with \$45,000 in federal funds, set up a summer program of dances and other activities.

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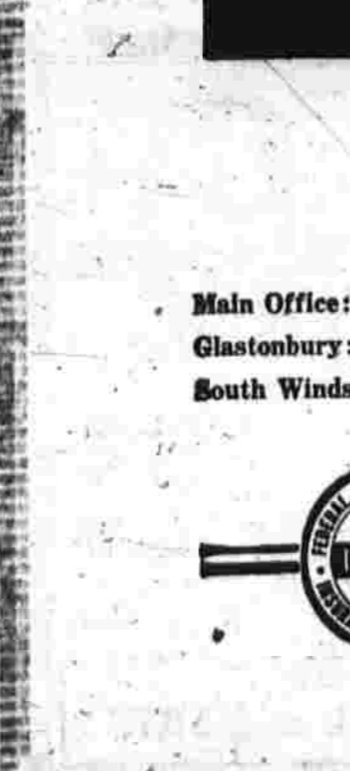
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# Connecticut Holds Its Own In Race for Tourist Dollars

HARTFORD (AP) — With the Labor Day finale in sight, how did Connecticut fare this summer in its bid to attract the tourist dollar?

Very well, thank you, says the Connecticut Development Commission, the Connecticut Association of Hotels and Motels, and several resort operators.

There were many indications that Connecticut held its own in the big, competitive New England business of tourism.

A hotel and restaurant trade magazine reports that business in Connecticut moved along this summer with the same last pace of last year. It estimates that at summer's end, some places will register as much as a 20 per cent increase in business over last summer.

A report in central Connecticut with a capacity for 400 persons says business was up 20 to 25 per cent over last season. The lodge was filled to capacity at some summer weekends and more vacationers were turned away.

Another large resort in Groton, with a capacity of 300, reports "extremely good business" and notes a trend of more and more persons settling in for a week or longer, in addition to a steady weekend clientele.

The development commission reports that inquiries on accommodations in Connecticut are up about 18 per cent over last year. A spokesman says there is a good ratio of inquiries to actual visits.

The commission boasts the charms of Connecticut's green hills, its lakes and its miles of Long Island Sound shoreline in its brochures, newspaper advertisements and travel films.

Camping has increased at state park sites, the sale of fishing licenses goes steadily up and the Mystic Seaport report increased attendance, and the volume of

traffice on the Connecticut Turnpike is up over last season.

The turnpike's success, however, may point to one of the problems of the Connecticut tourist industry.

"The turnpike, which runs from New York to Rhode Island, is a tourist gateway to the other New England states.

As one person close to the industry puts it: "We're trying to keep the tourists in Connecticut instead of having them go right through."

To do this, many persons in the tourist business are campaigning to have the state register more of Connecticut's historical sites as tourist attractions.

The private restoration of the Goodspeed Opera House in East Haddam, where the popular Melville Castle State Park is also located, has given the economy of that area a boost, says a resort operator in nearby Moodus.

There are reports here and there of slack business that go against the trend. A northwest Connecticut resort reported business "a little slow."

And the overture from the New York World's Fair did not materialize this year.

Last summer, lodging places in southwestern Connecticut all reported that New Haven were accommodating Fair visitors, compared to 1,832,952 in July of last year, an increase of 9.4 per cent.

# Hotel Destroyed, Woman Dies in Long Island Fire

LONG BEACH, N.Y. (AP) — Fire destroyed a Long Island boardwalk hotel Tuesday and killed a 40-year-old woman. About 400 persons, most of them elderly, escaped.

Deputy Fire Commissioner Martin Heald said the dead woman was Dorothy Gollub, 40, of the Bronx. Her body was found Tuesday night, five hours after the blaze began.

Long Beach Fire Chief Edward Wagman said firemen evacuated 300 persons from the six-story hotel. Ladders were used to rescue 80, including a

group of 45 trapped on a high parapet.

Heald described the 30-year-old building as a total wreck and estimated damage at \$1 million. Wagman said the fire apparently was caused by an explosion in the boiler room.

U.S. SIGNS AGREEMENT  
WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States has become the tenth signer of an international agreement designed to settle disputes between private investors and governments of foreign countries where they invest.

The convention will go into effect when it has been ratified by 30 governments which are members of the World Bank. Previous signers were the Central African Republic, Ivory Coast, Jamaica, Mauritania, Niger, Nigeria, Pakistan, Tunisia and the United Kingdom.



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# Viet War Creating Strange Bedfellows

LAP VO, South Viet Nam—A Viet Cong unit is believed to be hiding out nearby, Murphy and Pike consider themselves to be in one of the safest places in Viet Nam.

"The black palmans don't want to mingle with Maj. Hui's men," said Pike, "and the major keeps a loving eye on the two American friends, as he call us. We can't even go out in the bushes without having two of his bodyguards with sub-machine guns standing by. Every morning I take a bath in that muddy puddle over there, five of his boys are watching to be sure I wash behind the ears."

Murphy told what it was like to advise a reformed bandit chief in the ways of modern warfare.

Actually he's not too reformed. He used to drive me crazy, plainly pleased that she had not been fully converted.

"He still doesn't see why he has to go to all the trouble of requisitioning supplies when he can go out and steal them. Radio fascinate him and he still hasn't got the hang of artillery support and air strikes, but his men are terrific fighters and very well disciplined. Of course, every now and then, the boys will backslide a bit and begin collecting some taxes in the neighborhood, but by and large they stick pretty much to the business of fighting the VC's."

Named for their leader, Huynh Trung Hieu, the battalion last February abandoned its bandit activities and signed up to fight on the side of the government. Huynh Hieu and his men belong to a sect of Buddhists called the Hoa Hao—pronounced wai-how. They wear their hair long, their hair cut against the Viet Cong dates back to 1947 when the Communists killed Huynh Phu Son, their admired leader, on the way to a peace palace.

Having no particular love for the government, whom they regard as a rival in collecting taxes and plundering the population, the Hieu bandits refused to pledge loyalty to Saigon.

Instead, in coming over to join the Americans, they were found against the Viet Cong, who Huynh Hieu and his men pledged allegiance to the great military fraternity, everywhere, in all ages. "He was given the rank of major."

"They were the toughest outfit ever to go through the government training camp," said Murphy. "They call me AWOL out of 228 men. Maj. Hieu really rules them with an iron hand. They don't drink, they don't smoke and they are one of the few Vietnamese outfits that cannot bring their wives to camp."

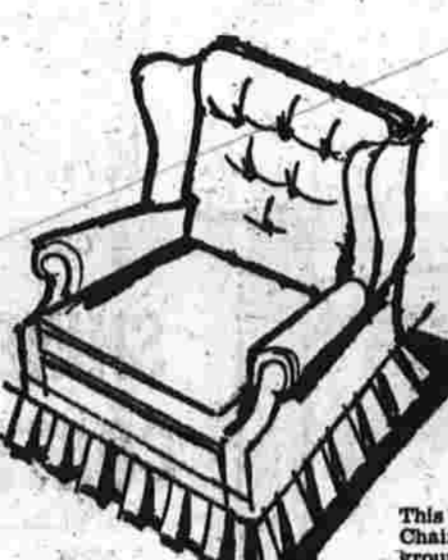
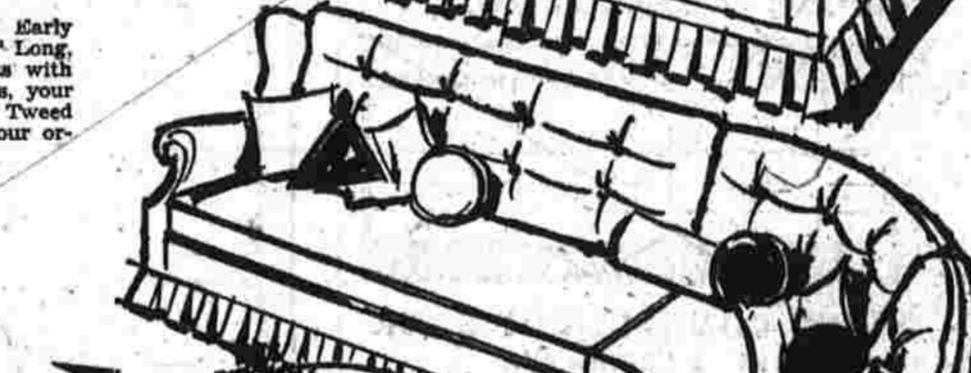

## MRA Ready to Apply To State for Funds

The Manchester Redevelopment Agency has asked the town for the green light to apply for the state share of the North End Renewal Project. The board of directors will act on the request at its meeting Tuesday.

The amount of the state financial assistance is expected to be \$228,471, or about one-eighth the net cost of the project. A federal grant for \$1.5 million has already been approved and will pay for three-quarters of the renewal cost.

The town will pay the remainder either in kind or cash. It has already allocated \$100,000 in cash and has acquired property for and built the Robertson School addition toward meeting the rest of its share.

The state contribution comes as part grant and part loan. When the renewal project is completed, the town will realize an increase estimated at about \$30,000 in property tax income from the renewal area as a result of the increase of property value.

The state asks the town to repay one third of that increase each year for 15 years. In this manner the town will repay about \$100,000 of the \$228,471 total cost.

What the town actually repays the state depends entirely on the increase in property taxes paid to the town. The repayment could be more or less than \$100,000.

The total cost of this revitalization of the 26.6-acre North End area will be about \$2 million. It is likely that before the Manchester Redevelopment Agency will start to negotiate with business and home owners for their property.

The actual money for this property should arrive late in October, according to Edward Rybczyk, the agency's executive director.

The Federal Housing Authority will authorize a maximum price based on two private appraisals. If any of the 60 families and 80 businesses in the renewal area feel the price is not right, they may appeal in court within a certain period of time.

Those businesses that have to

## Bolton PBC Okays Book Buying

The public building commission (PBC) has voted to inform the board of education and the high school architect to pick up where they left off before the issue of the \$2,500 was decided.

At a meeting Monday night the PBC drew up a letter to the school board authorizing expenditure up to \$5,000 for library books and asking for an account of how much has been spent on the books. The school board, when the temporary hall in expenditures was called, had spent something over \$4,000, and some bills were returned to the board by the PBC.

The PBC will ask architect Arnold Lawrence to confirm quotes on various corrective measures at the high school and heating in two south rooms and industrial arts finishing room, acoustical treatment of the administrative area, and weatherstripping of the outside gym door.

The architect will be asked to find out if the indoor-draft fan for the inglenook in the building next to the school will be sent to the board of education and the board of finance.

The PBC will also send out letters to various companies who might be interested in building the building next to the town garage to keep overhead equipment out of the elements. Attempts to get bids by advertising have been unsuccessful and the question of whether or not the equipment will be covered is about to enter its second year.

Work toward eventual completion of the new Pioneer plant concerns four phases now under way. The first phase, the construction of Hale Rd. by the town. The road's path has already been mapped through the area into the Pioneer tract and is now being graded.

The second phase will provide water to the new plant. The Manchester Water Co. plans to let out bids for this work in a few days. The company's president, Ernest Morse, says the pipeline should be completed by Oct. 1.

Clearing the site is the third phase. A Pioneer official says that phase has been completed and bids will be invited in a day or two for site preparation.

The final stage, the actual building of the plant, is being held up at the moment pending a satisfactory settlement with the steel unions. President Lyndon B. Johnson has announced that a strike had been called for eight days and that negotiations will continue between union and management.

This steel will cause about a two-week delay in letting out bids for the plant, predicts a Pioneer spokesman.

## Town Making Belated Move To Quit Refuse District

When the board of directors took action Tuesday to withdraw from the defunct North-east Refuse Disposal District (NRDD), it will have done what it was asked to do within 45 days.

On June 15 the directors of the NRDD passed a resolution asking the legislature of member towns to act within 45 days to withdraw from the district.

The resolution was passed after General Manager Richard Martin said that Manchester is satisfied with its present method of refuse disposal, and that it is five or more years away from considering other methods.

The other three towns, faced with the recent General Assembly which created a three-town North Central Refuse District, have agreed to do the same.

Vernon and South Windsor have already withdrawn from the NRDD and have joined the new district, and Bolton at its next town meeting is expected to do the same.

The NRDD formed last Nov. 12, after about 12 months of study. It now only a paper on its face, with no charter, no bylaws and no authority to bring other towns into the district.

Under provisions of Title 7, Sections 330-332 of the General Statutes, as adopted by the 1961 State Legislature, even the paper organization will cease to exist within six months of the withdrawal votes.

In all of the deliberations of the NRDD, a 5-man Manchester representation was split, four to one, on the method of disposal.

Francis Datta, the town Republican delegate, sided with the representatives of the other three towns in pressing for a resolution.

The four local Democratic delegates, Frank Stamler, Joe Anderson, Miss Katherine Gillin and James Perry, proposed that further study be made of composting, or some form of refuse disposal, other than incineration.

The actual breakup of the NRDD was attributed to the split on the necessity for speed and over disposal method.

The dissolution was inevitable when the district delegates failed to endorse an enabling act which would have given the NRDD authority to bond and finance without first getting approval from the electorate of the four member towns. The act was subsequently killed by the State Legislature.

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## Her Summer Spent in Peru Described by Miss LaPenta

Ariana LaPenta, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Nicholas A. LaPenta of 65 Wedgewood Dr., is returning to Manchester High School next week after a summer of experiences with a Peruvian family in Lima, Peru.

A high school senior, she was one of about 800 students from all over the country to take part in this American Abroad program of the American Field Service. In school, she will be starting her fourth year of Spanish, the language of her guest country.

Much of her fascination with the life of the Peruvians was communicated impetuously in letters to her family and friends. These letters told the story of a young girl away from home in a land so alive only in her imagination.

She described Lima as a city enduring the winter under an almost constantly overcast sky, although the climate is moderate with temperatures hovering in the sixties. She also spent some time in the little town of Pucallpa, a small town on a mountain peak throwing shadows across warm reservoirs below in the desert-like terrain.

### Parents Ask How to Pay College Cost

NEW YORK (AP) — There will be 14 million students going to colleges and universities in the United States this fall and about that many, American parents wondering how they can ever meet all the costs.

Millions more already are facing up to the same problem. In the years ahead their parents will wind up their high-school years and college careers seem to grow even faster than children do.

The solution? Savings, loans, scholarships, or maybe just waiting out by getting a part-time job?

The nation will be spending \$4 billion this year for education, \$4 billion more than in the year before. The U.S. Office of Education estimates that the college population has more than doubled in the last 10 years with degrees becoming ever more of a factor in landing a job.

Some parents start saving for the college years even before the child enters elementary school. This is one investment that pays off in the long run.

There are many types of these. For example, the nation's many corporations have started scholarship programs for their children of employees. Some unions offer the same type of aid for ambitious children of members.

Putting his children through college would cost the parents even more than it does today, if the above weren't aided by endowment drives. Colleges also are their rising cost by contributions from corporations, foundations, alumni, individual citizens and government agencies. The federal government is also helping to pay for the rising cost of higher education.

Other parents dream of a scholarship competition for their children. Some unions offer the same type of aid for ambitious children of members.

Commercial banks are also creating the total volume of loans to cover cost of a college education. Federal savings and loan associations are authorized to make such loans this fall.

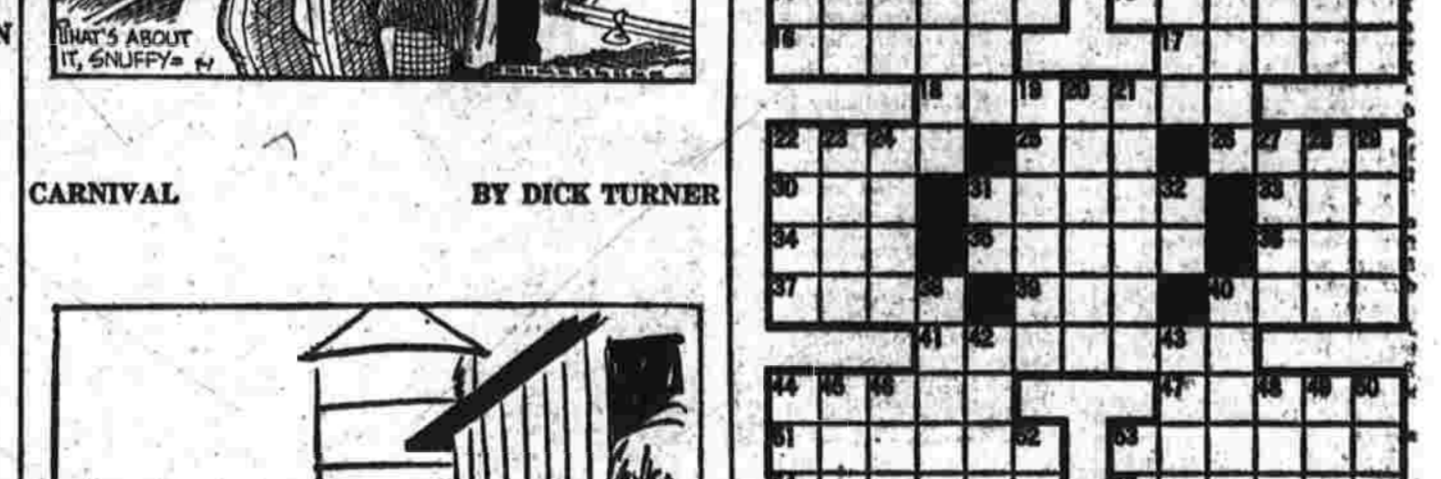
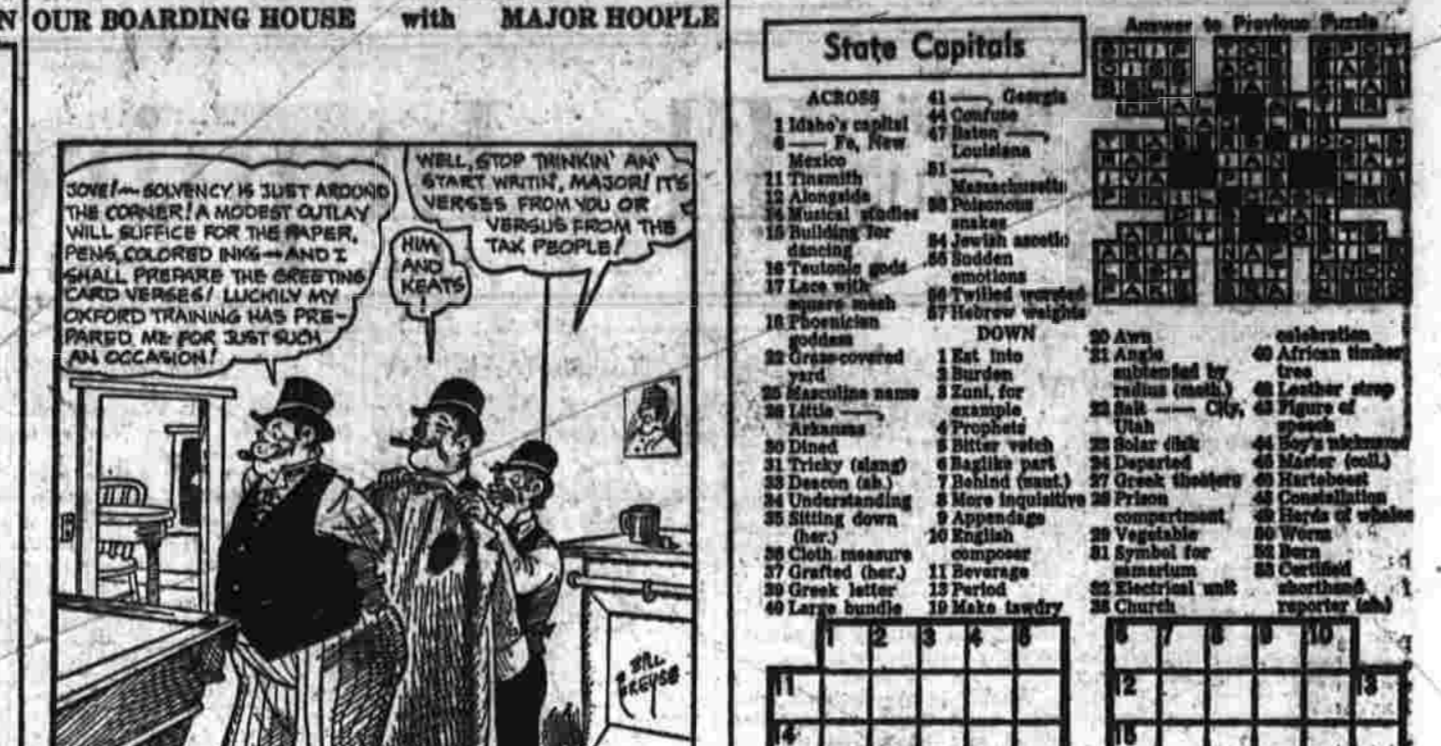

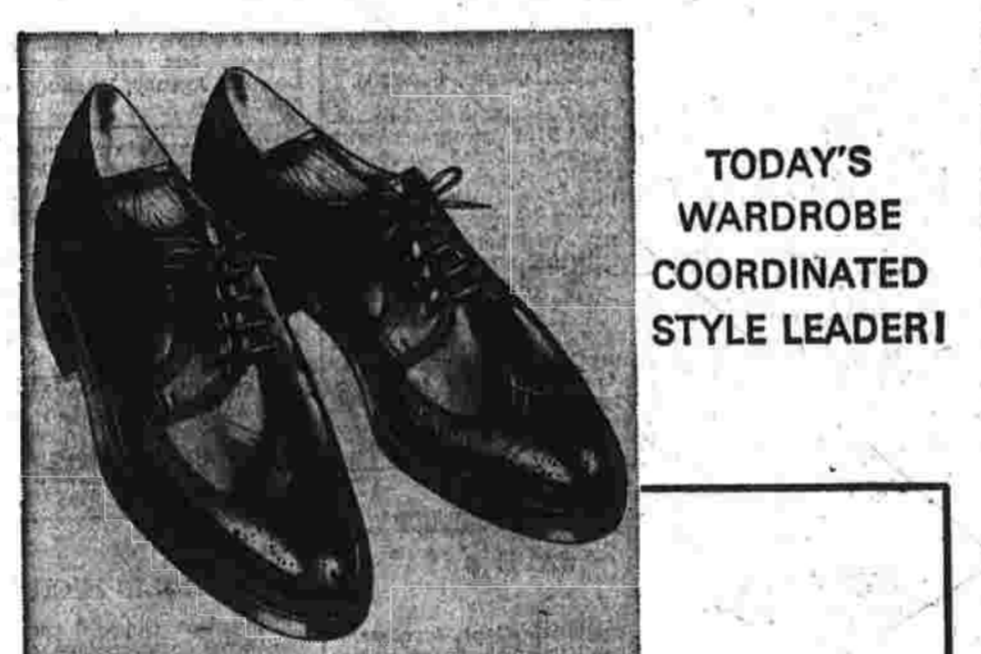
