

Resignations: To resign in good standing, an employe must Resignations: To resign in good standing, an employe must give at least 14 days prior notice, unless the mayor, because of extenuating circumstances, agrees to a shorter notice period. A written resignation must be supplied to the appointing authority (the mayor) stating the reasons for leaving.

The resignation shall be forwarded to the merit system board. Failure to comply shall be entered on the employe's prior through various interim steps, when, in the department head's judgment, and depending upon the seriousness of the offense, the employe's behavior constitutes a hazard.

And it does not lessen the real crime, he real tragedy in the situation. The crime, the real tragedy, is moral nature. The totally sad thing is that sese two great sections of Asian humity, so new to their gift of freedom, have not been able to manage that freedom better.

But the failings and incapacities of human and national nature are durable and persistent, and they are not going

The best that man has been able to do with them anywhere is to bring them under check and restraint, And the opinion of the military experts—that India and Pakistan are not

going to be able to fight one another m any large scale modern basis for very long-provides the practical key to what should be made the routine and ermanent condition of individual naions—that none of them shall really be able to fight another at all.

The war between Pakistan and India is a very pat illustration of the great steps that need to be taken toward acstial enforcement of United Nations law against war.

It involves two nations each with arms and armies greater than anything the United Nations could recruit in another of its volunteer police forces. The situation is the same as it would

be if two rival forces of gangsters should decide to stage a battle of automatic weapons in some village which was policed by a traffic duty constable. The constable would have to let them shoot it out, and hope they might run out of ammunition. What the situation should be is clear

sough. Those who are barbaric enough and stupid enough to want to shoot at one another should not be allowed to ossess the weapans required for it. The fillage constable, or the United Nations n the world, should be more strongly armed than anyone else could be, so that there would never be any question about the physical ability to step in and restore order where law and moralty gave the right to do so.

There has never been any doubt bout all this in the minds of the

They know, as certainly as any man nows anything, that this world is gomg to have to live by law, that it is ping to have to be a degree of world sufficient to keep order among naons, that individual nations are evennally going to have to be stripped of the physical military power with which y might defy this law, and that this law itself is going to have to be equipped with its own enforcement arm mopoly of weapons. The war between India and Pakistan

very much more than think about this, with eccasional partial rehearsals in which the United Nations has either dealt with responsive nations, or been able to recruit a volunteer police force adequate for some relatively small-sized

So this time, the world has to depend on the slim hopeful possibility that India and Pakistan can still be brought to a responsible, civilized mood, or on the cynical calculation that they may soon run out of planes and tanks. Neither the hope nor the calculation is very strong or reliable at the moment. But if the world gets out of this crisis. its will for doing something to fortify law against the next crisis ought to be a stronger will.

May Puzzle Labelists

It will undoubtedly confuse some of our more confident analysts of this cold war world to read that the official leader of the Young Communist League in Russia has been publicly bewailing the growth of something called "nihilism" among the youth of Russia.

For "nihilism," to the easy analyst, i another of those social ills Russian Communism exports to weaken the social structure and the ideological resolve of other cultures, while its own civilization remains virile and vibrant and positive in ts belefs. But as one reads the Russan attack

on it, one realizes that it is the same "nihilism," the same negative not-caring about anything, the same willingness to destroy just for the sake o destroying, which has been noticed in various parts of the American scene lately. Perhaps instead of blaming the Russians for exporting it to us, we should sympathize with them, because they have it too.

At any rate, in language that could be familiar, the young Russian leader complains of the spread of skepticism and the preaching of hopelessness among young Russians, just as so many American Jeremiahs preach along simi-

River Parkway Merits Study ways in southern New England, the Connecticut River Parkway proposed by U.S. Senator Abraham Ribicoff

First we have our older roads, origiually built to move traffic, and some of it was horse drawn when the roads by gas stations, honky-tonk restaurants, and poorly thought out intersecalso have some beautiful stretches of road, which generally are protected by nothing except chance.

Then we have our super-highways, stretching out as far as the eye can see, and all the time confronting the eye with essentially the same nursery-manufactured view. The federal interstate highways can hardly be distinlished from one another, be the locale outside of Billings, Montana, or Hartford, Conn. Monotony is their watchword; one is generally assured that nothing except more concrete car be seen from them. They are often

andscaped and sometimes lit-but hey are a plastic world. The Connecticut River Parkway would be solely designed for that old fashioned pastime, pleasure driving. It bine park-like scenic roads, a river, and recreation area. Its concept would not o a greater appreciation of this great river. As defined by the National Park service, a national parkway is "a fed-erally owned elongated park featuring a road designed for pleasure travel and

embracing scenic, recreational, or hisoric features of national significance." The national park service does not go in for multi-lane highways-indeed th main thoroughfares in Yellowstone Park, our single most popular park, are merely two lanes, with turn-offs, observations points, and parking areas and moderate speed limits. They do not cut great swaths into the countryside such as is required by the new Route 9 nor go in for sweeping access and

egress points. The finest existing example of a national parkway is the 500-mile Blue Ridge Parkway in the Smokies, a proj-Colonial Parkway (22 miles) connect-ing Jamestown, Williamsburg and Yorktown, Va., and the George Washington Memorial Parkway (47 miles) along both sides of the Potomac near The United States currently has 819 miles of parkway planned in other U.S. locations, with twohirds of it built or under construction,

mainly in existing national parks. A national parkway has a specific meaning quite apart from a national park which is the highest or most renational parkway is almost the lowest or least restricted, and could probably areas, or large acas (such as the ridgetops of the Connecticut) with large legree of flexibility as to usage.

Senator Ribicoff's proposal is a stag-ering, sweeping concept, but that is ot to say that it could not be brought to fruition without commercial disrup-tion to the county. As the Senator said, "The Connecticut River and its valleys are priceless assets. They have been placed in this generation's care—and ve are the stewards for the future." Ribicoff proposal envisions y. The study should be made that we may see how a world of scenic preservation for future generations meets the demands and the inherent rights of property for this generation.
