**Events in World**

**SEOUL, South Korea (AP)**—President Chung He Park ordered a thorough investigation today into a series of terrorist attacks on opponents of his government.

An explosion early today shattered windows in the home of Yoo Ok-woo, chairman of the opposition Minjung party's central standing committee.

Tuesday night an explosion shattered the gate at the home of an editor of the opposition newspaper Donga Ilbo, and four unidentified men beat up the production chief of a radio station run by the newspaper.

The paper's assistant managing editor said an anonymous telephone caller Wednesday night threatened him and his family with death.

Police Director Koo Ja-choon said special details would be assigned to the homes of both government and opposition leaders.

**SANTIAGO, Chile (AP)**—Preliminary approval by the Chilean Senate early today virtually assured passage of a bill empowering President Eduardo Frei to partially nationalize more than \$1 billion worth of U.S. copper holdings.

Frei's government will purchase 51 per cent of the stock of the Kennecott Company's Chilean subsidiary and 26 per cent of the stock of the subsidiaries of the Cerro and Anacondas companies. The companies also have agreed to an expansion program to make Chile the world's No. 1 producer of copper.

The bill, approved 26-14, was supported by Frei's Christian Democrats, the Liberal-Conservative coalition and the Radical party. It was opposed by a coalition of Communists, Marxists and Socialists and extreme left independents who demanded complete nationalization.

The measure still requires final approval in the Senate and acceptance in the Chamber of Deputies of Senate amendments.

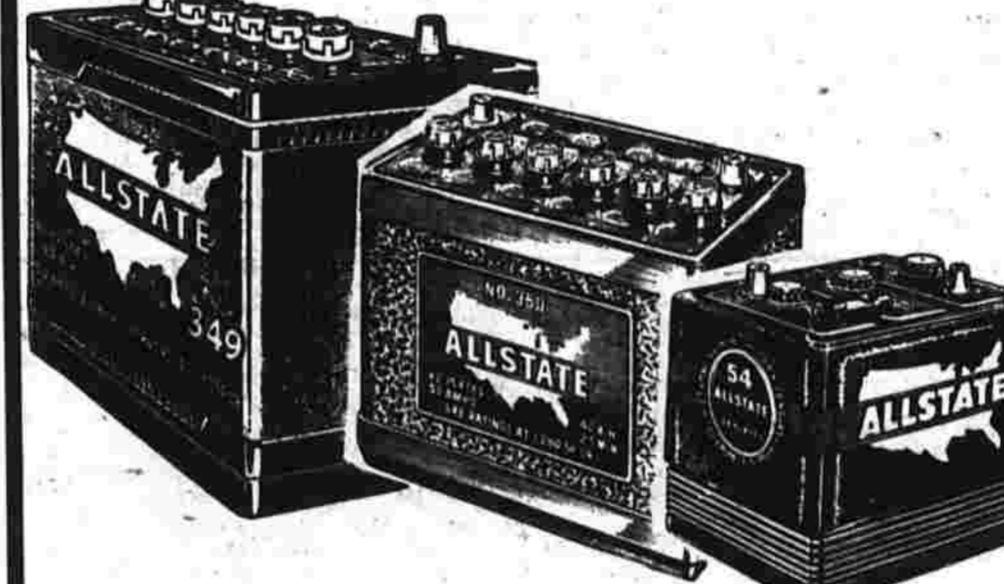

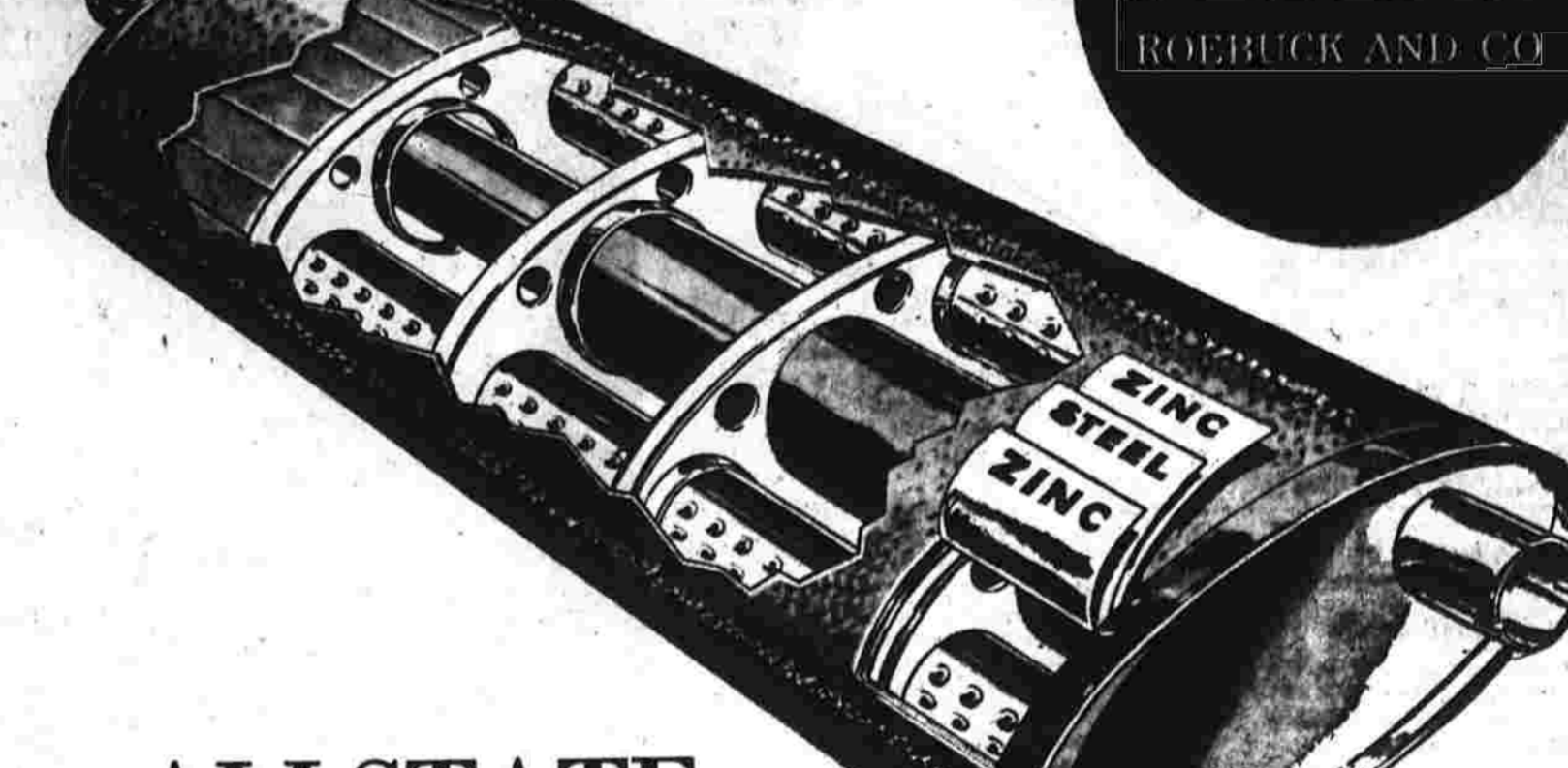

### The Unarmed Constable

The most encouraging thing in the news about the war between India and Pakistan today is actually a rather sorry kind of happenstance.

But it happens to point the way toward the conditions of world peace which have to be achieved, if there is to be life for the world.

The negative, despairing kind of encouragement which is available today is the estimate of the military experts that neither India nor Pakistan can sustain for a very long time, of their own resources, a war which uses such modern instruments of destruction as the plane, the bomb, the tank. Assuming that nobody gives them more weapons, that nobody helps them set up their own arms manufacture, that nobody supplies them with the gas and oil it takes to run a modern war, it can be calculated that India and Pakistan have a limited number of days or weeks during which they can make war on one another in truly modern fashion.

After that, they would have to return to old-fashioned, hand-to-hand combat, which might not be so much fun, and which wouldn't, in any case, take so many lives, or so many innocent lives.

This kind of expertise is, one must admit, a poor and cynical kind of comfort.

And it does not lessen the real crises, the real tragedy in the situation. The real tragedy of the real tragedy is, moral in nature. The total and Asian thing is that these two great sections of Asia humanity, so new to their gift of freedom, have not been able to manage that freedom better.

But the fallings and incapacities of human and national nature are durable and persistent, and they are not going to vanish.

The best that man has been able to do with them anywhere is to bring them under check and restraint.

And the opinion of the military experts—that India and Pakistan are not going to be able to fight one another on any large scale modern basis for very long—provides the practical key. It would be to make the routine and permanent condition of individual nations—that some of them shall really be able to fight another at all.

The war between Pakistan and India is a very pat illustration of the great steps that need to be taken toward actual enforcement of United Nations law against war.

It involves two nations each with arms and armies greater than anything the United Nations could recruit in another of its volunteer police forces.

The situation is the same as it would be if two rival forces of gangsters should decide to stage a battle of automatic weapons in some village which was policed by a traffic duty constable. The constable would have to let them shoot it out, and hope they might run out of ammunition.

What the situation should be is clear enough. Those who are barbaric enough and stupid enough to want to shoot one another should not be allowed to possess the weapons required for it. The village constable, or the United Nations in the world, should be more strongly armed than anyone else could be, so that there would never be any question about the physical ability to step in and restore order where law and morality have the right to do so.

There has never been any doubt about all this in the minds of the theologists.

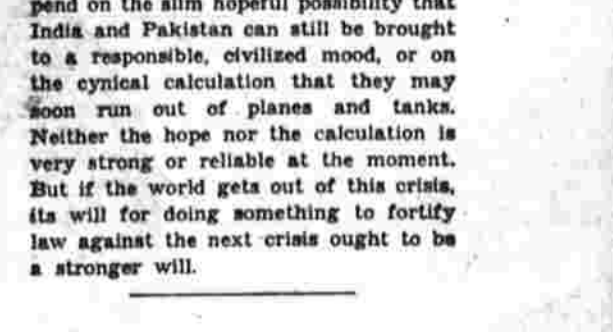
They know, as certainly as any man knows anything, that this world is going to have to live by law, that it is going to have to be a degree of world law sufficient to keep order among nations, that individual nations are eventually going to have to be stripped of the physical military power with which they might defy this law, and that this law, at least in going to have to be equipped with its own enforcement arm monopoly of weapons.

This was between India and Pakistan

happened before the world has done very much more than think about this, with occasional partial rehearsals in which the United Nations has either dealt with responsive nations, or been able to recruit a volunteer police force adequate for some relatively small-sized world crisis.

So this time, the world has to depend on the slim hopefulness that India and Pakistan can still be brought to a responsible civilized accord, or on the cynical calculation that they may soon run out of planes and tanks.

Neither the hope nor the calculation is very strong or reliable at the moment. But if the world gets out of this crisis, its will for doing something to fortify law against the next crisis ought to be a stronger will.



### May Puzzle Labelists

It will undoubtedly confuse some of our more confident analysts of this cold war world to read that the official news of the Young Communist League in Russia has been publicly bewailing the growth of something called "militarism" among the youth of Russia.

For "militarism," to the usual analyst, is another of those social ills Russian Communism exports to weaken the social structure and the ideological resolve of other cultures, while its own civilization remains virile and vibrant and positive in its beliefs.

But as one reads the Russian attack on it, one realizes that it is the same old, same old, same negative not-caring-about anything, the same willingness to destroy just for the sake of destroying, which has been noted in the various parts of the American scene lately. Perhaps instead of blaming the Russians for exporting it to us, we should sympathize with them, because they are so much more aware of it.

At any rate, in language that could be familiar, the young Russian leader complains of the spread of "militarism" and the preaching of "hopelessness" among young Russians, just as so many American Jeremiahs preach along similar lines in this country.

He also found, in Russia, "thoughtless and presumptuous rejection of authority and scornful or ignorant attitudes toward the historical experience of the older generation of Soviet people."

Either there is some kind of camouflage that famed Iron Curtain, or times and cultures and civilizations in this world are much more alike than we think. It is a rather more and pin labels are others would ever admit.

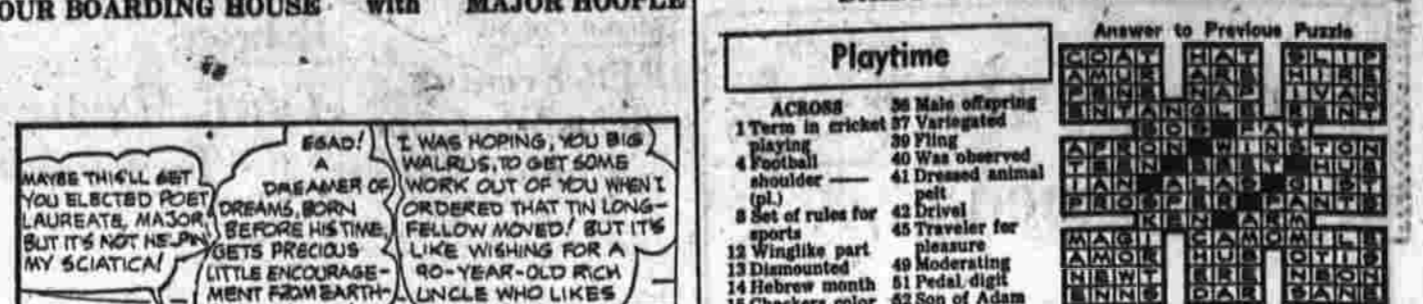
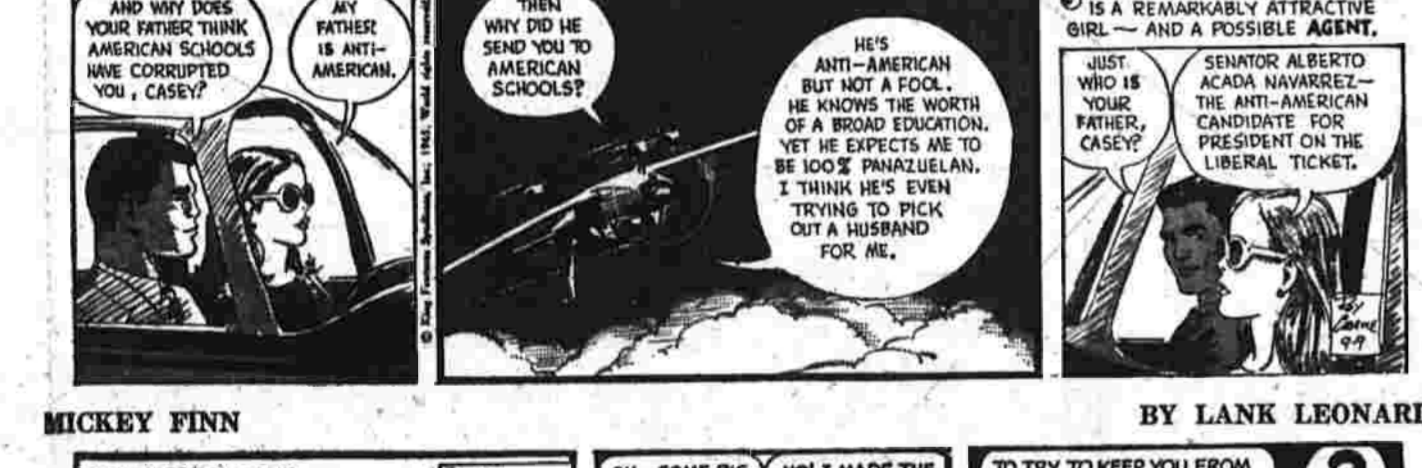

**FOREST HILLS, N. Y. (AP)**—"I can beat Emerson," a confident Arthur Ashe said today as he contemplated his next assignment in the National Tennis Championships.
