

Survey Reports Conditions Suburbanite Negroes Face

The Negro family with the means to move into any suburban town in the country but it may encounter difficulties during and after the move, according to a survey issued this week by the Greater Hartford Council of Churches.

The survey covered 34 Negro families, most of whom have moved from Hartford into towns like Manchester, South Windsor, Ellington, Rockville, Williamstown and Mansfield, plus some towns west of the Connecticut River.

Most of the families experienced from cool to mixed reactions from their neighbors after first moving into the suburban area, the report says. Only about seven families report immediate acceptance.

After one year of suburban living most Negroes believe their present relations with neighbors are good, though, on the other hand, many feel they are welcome as neighbors but not as friends, the report says.

But when the question, "Would you do it again?" was asked, all except one said they would.

For Negro teen-agers, especially a girl, fitting in is very difficult. The Negro girl can't get around as the boy does and her social opportunities, in an almost all-white community, are limited.

'Big Valley' Gets Notice On the Road

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "Well, somebody had to stay home and see that the cattle got fed," commented Barbara Stanwyck as she gazed about "The Big Valley" and found all her co-stars gone.

Where had they disappeared to?

The four of them — Richard Long, Peter Breck, Linda Evans and Lee Majors — had been sent to the four corners of the United States to drum up attention for the hour-long color Western, which started this week on ABC. Personal appearances are a ritual for television stars; the Hollywood Reporter counted 200 of them on the road during this crucial premiere week of the 1965-66 season.

"Does it do any good?" mused Stanwyck. "I guess so. Anything that attracts attention to a new series can be of help. Good reviews might help, too, but not much. Bad reviews don't hurt, either."

"By the time the review appears in print, the viewer has seen the show already. He is just as liable to be defensive about a rap, figuring, 'That show wasn't as bad as all that.'"

"In the end, it's the viewers themselves who decide whether a show is a hit or not. They don't need any help to make up their minds."

This week marks Barbara's second debut with a television series. Five years ago she starred in her own anthology show which brought her both an Emmy and cancellation after one season.

What happened? "We started off great, then the next week we were preempted by the Nixon-Kennedy debate," she explained. "Five weeks later we were again preempted by a debate. I met someone in the Market in Beverly Hills who said, 'Too bad your show was canceled.'"

"It wasn't, but lots of people thought so. Unless you can hook them in the first six-eight weeks, you're dead."

While her youthful costars were touring the country, Stanwyck was putting in her 16-hour-plus day on "The Big Valley." She is the pro's pro among film actors, always on time with her lines learned. She almost springs onto the set when called, and was even saying "sir" to her director, Paul Henreid.

Besides the long hours, she is subject to the rigors of horse operas. On the current show she was playing an earthquake scene in a church when a prop rock landed on her head.

"The doctor said if I didn't have this wig on, I could have had my head split open," she said. "As it was, I got a lump the size of a goose egg."

"About this time a French farce would look awfully good to me."

Father Still Knows Best

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Back in the 1930s, Robert Young was part of the MGM variety that won those football games for Annapolis in movies like "Navy Blue and Gold."

Time passes, and Bob now wears the two stars of a vice admiral, commanding a huge aircraft carrier. At least that's his role for a television drama that will be seen on the Bob Hope Chrysler Theater this fall.

"Yes, it's getting to be time for the Navy to retire me," he commented on the set at Universal City.

At 55 he remains slim, handsome and unsuited for retirement as an actor. Nor does he have any intention of quitting, although his television fortune from "Father Knows Best" would allow him to do so.

"Retire? Not me," he said. "I haven't had any movie scripts submitted to me lately, but I do get offers from television and I'm grateful for them. I like to take them occasionally; otherwise in a year or two they'll stop sending them. The producers will say, 'Oh, he's too rich to work.'"

"My main problem is to avoid being lazy. My wife Betty helps me out on that. When I got this script, I liked it, but I started thinking how it would interfere with mowing the lawn and playing golf. She convinced me to take it."

The average working citizen can understand his reluctance to return to work. All but one of his four girls have flown the nest, and the last one enters junior college in February. The Youngs retain the family home in Beverly Hills, but spend most of their time on an acre in Rancho Santa Fe, a rural community near San Diego.

"Our house is on the golf course," Bob explained. "I have a golf cart in my carport, and a path leads to the eighth tee. I just drive down the hill and start playing."

Bob has earned his leisure. He put in hard duty, first at MGM,

then Fox and RKO, later as one of the busiest free-lancers in films.


"I tested for the part three or four times, and got it," she says.

HOLLYWOOD — (NEA) — Jerry Van Dyke looked after the young man who had been talking to him on the set and explained why he hadn't introduced him.

"I don't know his name, but I think he's my agent."

The statement gave Jerry a nice air of confidence.

"If my series doesn't do well," he added, "I'll know his name, boy."

Jerry's series is "My Mother the Car," a whimsical NBC entry in color. He plays a not overly successful lawyer who buys an antique red car and discovers it is the reincarnation of his mother. He had just finished a scene in which he poured the ingredients of a Bloody Mary, less vodka, onto the car's hood to ease the headache caused by the alcoholic content of antifreeze.

"This is what I have really wanted," Jerry said, referring to the series. "I have been married eight-and-a-half years, and for six we haven't had a home. We have lived out of a car. This is harder work and takes longer hours, but we have a home. Of course, I'm so busy, I don't get to see it much."

Van Dyke has been working in show business since he was 16. "It has been a long haul, and I have enjoyed it, but—" he says, letting his voice trail off. Most of his time was spent in small clubs across the country until he appeared in a two-partner on The Dick Van Dyke Show as the brother of his real brother. "I got a lot from that," Jerry says.

Now he says his aim is "oh gosh, to make a living, I guess. I hope by the time I get through this series there'll be something else opened. But when I read about the money NBC is pouring into pilots for next year, I get panicky. We're only just on the air. However, the lack of pressure I am getting makes me believe we have a good show. After each Judy Garland show (Jerry was a regular for the first 10 weeks), I was afraid to look at anybody. Everybody was yelling all the time."

'I Spy' Takes Chance

NEW YORK (NEA) — The verdict is not yet in on "I Spy," the NBC comedy adventure color series which stars Robert Culp and Bill Cosby, but producer Sheldon Leonard is already working on the series' second season.

"I am taking a calculated risk," he said, "and have committed myself for \$60,000 worth of stories that may never be used. But if we get the O.K. from NBC for a second season, we would be seriously handicapped without scripts that are set far in advance."

Because "I Spy" is filmed on location in exotic spots Leonard must have a location manager at work on at least eight scripts by November. NBC must notify Leonard by the end of October if they want a second season of the series. "They actually can

have two weeks leeway if they pay a penalty. So I may not hear until mid-November.

As soon as Leonard gets a go-ahead, he will send his location manager to Spain and Scandinavia to find specific locations. "He should be through by the end of January," Sheldon said. "Then begins the task of mounting the production, ordering film, arranging for storage. It will be a race to get the actors before the cameras by March, which is when we must begin actual filming."

"I Spy," which may not have a cast of thousands, nevertheless can claim to be years in the making. Three years ago Leonard began the process he describes as "bullying, coercing and seducing technological people. An amateur could get high-speed color film which worked in bad light, but professionals only had low-speed film to work with. The pilot film, which will be buried in the schedule probably around Christmas, was purely a technical exercise to prove we could film according to the set-up."
