

Americans receive a great deal of training in buying on the basis of "name" and size. Whatever its value in everyday life, this procedure just does not make sense in selecting a college. There are more than 2,200 accredited, four-year colleges and universities in this country. An unparalleled dimension of choice is open to prospective students and their parents. evertheless, the thinking ofer

far too many students and parents is obscured by the feeling that perhaps 50 of those 2,200

At Wesleyan University we face this problem to some degree. My advice to students who seem to be applying because of Wesleyan's "prestige" is to think again and decide what they really seek in a college education.

Weathermen Say Long Drought May Be Ending

WASHINGTON (AP)-Rainfall in the drought stricken Northeast is expected to be above normal during the next 30 days, a Weather Bureau official said

for the period extending through Oct, 15 is 2 to 3.5 inches. The Weather Bureau said precipita-tion probably will run 3.5 to 5 inches.

The bureau expert said the heavy rainfall will help relieve the drought situation. However, meteorologists have said that many months of above average rainfall would be required to restore to normal the reservoirs which supply metropolitan areas.

Rainfall since June has been gradually increasing in the area which extends northward from Pennsylvania and the northern border of Virginia, Rainfall was about normal in most of the areas in the 30-day period which areas in the 30-day period which ended Sept. 15.

An exception is a small belt from New York City through Rhode Island which remains relatively dry.

The expert said the projected Beavy rainfall probably will arrive too late to benefit farmers and that it might hamper some harvesting activities.

River.

The profile of the average family in the survey as compared to a suburban white family shows little difference: Well educated (two-years of college); well paid (\$8,625); small family (3.61); church-going (only two had no church affiliation); good toba (two-thirds of the good jobs (two-thirds of the males held professional posi-tions), and transportation (only one family had no car, mos

Most of the families exper enced from cool to mixed receptions from their neignbors after first moving into the sub ms from their neighbors urban area, the report says. Only about seven families reare welcome as neighbors but not as friends, the report says.

On this basis, the Council of Churches has concluded the provide those who fear integration on which to make a judgment. Churches has concluded that while Negro families have achieved accommodation they have not been assimilated. In fact, says the report, they feel isolated from the social life of
