What's in a Name? Origins of Surnames Disclose Odd Facts

LONDON (AP) — If your last name is Belcher it doesn't mean you had an ancestor renowned for burping. It comes from a word meaning someone pretty-belched.

If your name is Albion, be proud of it. It derives from Alban, the first British king.

And if your name is Olson, don't despair. It's from the good and ancient Welsh personal name, Olaf.

Blackley — and there are lots of them in England — comes not from some online refined lady reduced to living in a hovel. Blackley is a variation of Blackley, a hamlet in Lancashire.

James Pennington Hughes discusses names — and hundreds more — in his just published book, "The Origins of Some Curious and Other Surnames."

"Some surnames which appear ordinary are in fact curious," says the author. "Others which appear grotesque are, when allowances have been made for medieval spelling and most universal illiteracy, the error of copyists, and the varieties of English dialect, straightforward enough."

With hints and a number of source book suggestions, Hughes has written a 128-page book full of fascinating facts about surnames, many of them found in the United States.

As he emphasizes, the great majority of them are not what they seem. Take the last name Bug.

"One thing the surname certainly does not come from," says the author, "is the insect. The bug proper was not known in this country in the middle Ages."

Hughes says Bug may come from an old Scandinavian name meaning dirty, or from burgh or borough.

The Normans apparently introduced last names to this country. The recording, by parishes, of all births, marriages and deaths was required. This was unpopular and many refused to comply.

The surname business was so haphazard that until 1810, in Yorkshire, the Rev. Sabine Baring-Gould found many men born with a name in one spelling, who were married under another.

Bridges, Briggs and Burgess, Hughes says, can all be from some ancient emigrant from whom allowances have been made for medieval spelling and most universal illiteracy, the error of copyists, and the varieties of English dialect, straightforward enough.

Newbold, he reasons, comes from a man who built a rather grand house, for bolt means a house of stone or timber when most houses were fashioned from wattle.

Wade, he says, is a synonym for Ford, or a person who lived near the spot where a creek or river was forded. Bellows is from bell house.

Calvert may not be as elegant as it sounds. The author finds it comes from the occupation of calf-herding, a man who looked after a pack of calves.

Lush and Lusher are not from tilling the bottle, but from the honorable office of Usher, Horch, he says, is a name of great antiquity, coming from a particular Ken.

There's nothing funny about the origin of Snodgrass and the good old English name of Snesum.

In the dialects, Snot meant smooth, or pruned, and so it meant residence at a well-kept lawn.

Sneason comes from Snet which means wise.

Former Goldwater Backer Successful in New Country

MELBOURNE — Australia's Robert Ansett may be remembered in California as the young American who took the presidential election — assertively because Barry Goldwater lost, but more for his later success in Australia.

In Australia, Robert Ansett is known as a transport magnate, a son who returned home to make good.

Ansett, 31, his wife, Karen, and their three children arrived last April and settled into a house in a Melbourne suburb. He has become general manager of one of Australia's four big rent-a-car firms and is showing business acumen as he struggles to improve his company's position in a tough market.

Ansett's father, Reginald Myron Ansett, heads the huge Ansett Transport Industries, including an airline.

The younger Ansett hasn't found it necessary to call on his father's resources. The son — by a previous marriage — lived in Melbourne until he was 30. He is an American citizen.

"I knew nothing about making a living when I decided to leave San Diego and migrate back to Australia," he said. "I had not even thought of making a living from renting cars."

He has helped lift the firm from a small one-city operation to a nationwide operation.

"We had about 10 cars in Melbourne and that was it," he said. "Now we are approaching 400 vehicles all told. The target is much, much higher."

Last year, the father warned Robert he was getting on eyes when it might soon be too late for him to migrate successfully.

"I made a now-or-never decision," Ansett said. "That was some of our San Diego friends suggested that I were leaving because Barry Goldwater lost, we decided along with them. 'Mind you, I'm still a Republican. But I've also decided thinking like an Australian without complicating it a little.'"

Ansett has received letters supporting his migration, from "equally upset" Republicans. The secretary has stenciled his first impressions of Australia for people who feel they would like to follow him Down Under. He replies to every letter.

"I tell them the truth," said Ansett. "I point out that I am delighted with this country but then, it is my birthplace. I don't feel lost here, no matter how 'Mind you, I'm still a Republican. I warn them that they may not find it so easy if they come here without such advantages."

Ansett rates the cost of living in Australia a poor buy at first. In San Diego, home financing is tough to get. In Australia, he said, he bought a house without at least a fourth of its value as a deposit.

"It's a heck of a lot easier to get a loan here than it is in San Diego," he said. "People just aren't prepared to lend money without good security," he said.

"Everyone seems to live pretty well here, nevertheless, they have their own houses and modern autos."

His mother, Grace Alesman, lives in the San Diego suburb of Cheltenham.

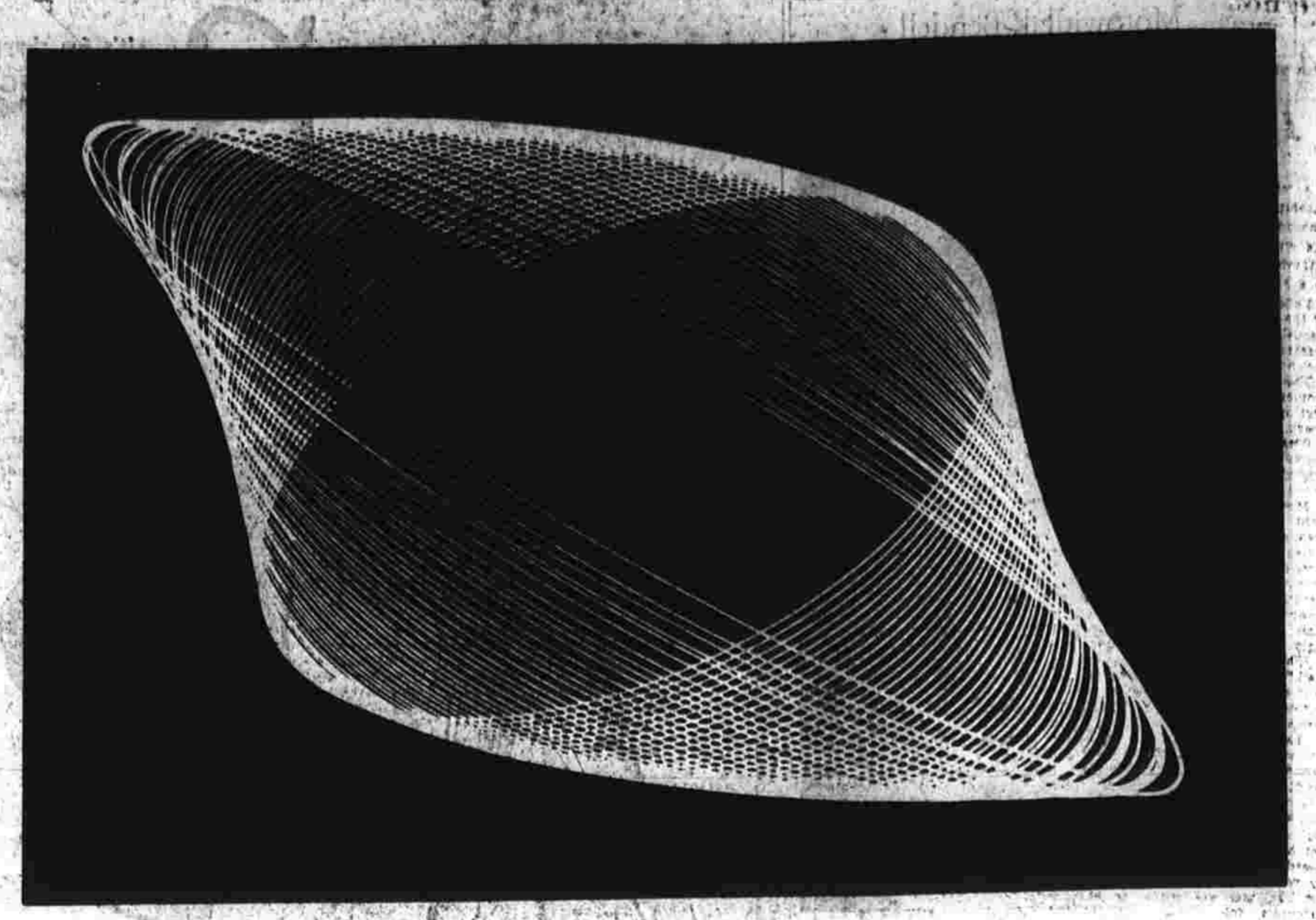

Idle Claims Up, Payments Down

Unemployment compensation claims filed in Manchester last week rose by eight, for a total of 812; there were 504 claims filed locally during the previous week.

All of the rise was reflected in the Rockville Branch office, which reported 123 claims, 30 more than were reported for the week ending Sept. 11.

Claims filed throughout the state last week showed a small increase of 241, for a total of 19,509 reported for the corresponding period last year.

Waterbury led the state last week with 5,558 claims filed, and was followed by Bridgeport with 2,477, New Haven with 2,380 and Hartford with 2,074.

Manchester was in the 14th spot among the state's 20 offices. It had been 15th the week before.

Unemployed workers were paid \$78,683 during August from the Manchester office, compared to \$80,902 paid out locally during August of last year.

Benefits paid out in Manchester for the first eight months of 1965 are far below the totals for the corresponding period last year—\$12,236 in 1965, compared to \$86,074 in 1964.

Zone Change Okayed For Brandeis Corp.

A zone change from Rural Residence and Residence Zone AA to Residence Zone B for 25 acres of land across from Wickham Park owned by the Brandeis Corporation has been approved by the Town Planning Commission (TPC).

If the firm now wants to construct with its plans to build a 300-family complex of apartments there it will have to request a special permit from the commission.

And, said several TPC members last night, such a permit would probably involve a compliance agreement because of the peculiar sewer conditions prevailing.

The conditions revolve around the use of Metropolitan District Commission (MDC) sewer lines run in from East Hartford.

The MDC says it will only make the sewer connection if Brandeis agrees to take over emergency trunk lines, which the MDC is planning. It would be parallel to the present.

Along with use of this trunk line will be an agreement which will live along Burrills Ave. in East Hartford.

Since the MDC is in the habit of billing towns based on the sewer lines, Brandeis would be billed for this sewer service and would in turn have to collect it from Brandeis or whomever owned the property then.

Martin Alvord focused on this point and warned the commission that the special permit should have a condition to it by which the town would never have to pay these assessments.

Birth of a Hurricane Concealed, Death is Bared for All to See

WINDY NOTES — A world of air and force still beyond the knowledge of man, the hurricane is clearly visible in the rubble of destroyed homes, flooded lands and numbers dead. St. Moody was there when the storm came from Florida and Louisiana in the following AP Special Report.

NEW YORK (AP) — Day after day the fire of the tropical windless sea. The air turns heavy, moist, oppressive. Blasted by the sun, the air turns cooler. Cooler air from the trades funnel in from the north, where air moves in. The rotation of the earth, the movement takes a counterclockwise turn as the air spirals upwards, pressure at the center of the funnel drops.

The velocity of the rotating winds rises. A passing ship notes that the wind is blowing from a weather satellite photographs the circular pattern of clouds. The word of the hurricane is "eye".

It began on Friday, Aug. 27. A ship far at sea near the vast stillness of the Atlantic Ocean between South America and Africa reported heavy rain squalls. A Texas weather satellite sent back a photograph of a rotary cloud pattern in the area, the turning place of the hurricane.

"There's something out there," said the Miami, Fla., Weather Bureau. "The hurricane is moving westward. West had up to five feet of rain. The wind was blowing from the east-southwest of Miami. By Aug. 31, they reported the storm system near Florida.

But the storm regenerated the next day, struck the coast of Florida by which hurricanes are fueled. The wind had a velocity that determines hurricane force. By midnight winds near the eye of the storm were gusting at 100 miles. Hurricane Betsy, second tropical storm of the season, had been born.

Hurricane is a tickle thing, led in its short, violent life by many forces, some not clearly understood. But in general it moves in a great arc from the sea northward toward land and then curves back to sea.

The sea rolled between the scores some 200 miles from the Bahamas. It seemed headed toward the coast of Florida, Louisiana and the islands near the Gulf of Mexico.

The only consolation of a hurricane, said forecasters, is that when it gets level with your latitude, the chances are good that it will turn back. But Betsy did not.
