## Inside Report

WASHINGTON—The best-kept secret in Washington is that, despite President Johnson's landslide election, the Democratic National Committee is nursing a gargantuan deficit.

Although National Committee operatives flatly refuse to reveal the size, the debt is over a million dollars—perhaps close to \$2 million.

The existence of this embarrassing encumbrance is one reason why President Johnson cannot delay much longer some basic decisions about the National Committee.

But another reason is the imminent departure of the mysterious and powerful Richard Maguire, National Committee treasurer the past few years.

Although Maguire plans no public announcement, it is now certain that he will resign as treasurer and return to his profitable law practice in Massachusetts this fall.

Although Maguire's resignation is not linked to the committee's failure to pay off almost one year after the election.

Maguire, who has wanted to get back to Massachusetts for months, has little authority over National Committee operations despite his responsibility for the National Committee's debt. This has left him in an untenable position—symbolic of the slow rot eating into the Democratic National Committee structure.

Headed nominally by Connecticut's John Bailey ever since the 1960 election of John F. Kennedy, the National Committee is now split into factions that are rough equivalents of the big-city liberals (Bailey) and the Texas conservatives (led by Clinton Anderson, President Johnson's personal agent and the committee's executive director).

## The Wage Law

By JAMES MARLOW

WASHINGTON (AP)—House-backed minimum wage bill that has been slow business and still is.

In the 7 years since 1968 Congress has raised it only \$1.00, from \$1.25 an hour to \$1.35.

And now a bill to raise the minimum to \$1.75 and extend the coverage of the law to 7.5 million more workers seems dead for this session. About 20.6 million workers are presently covered.

Even if the House should approve in 1966, the Senate won't have time to act.

Earlier this year President Johnson recommended an additional 4.6 million people be brought under the law's protection but he didn't recommend increasing the minimum wage, saying that was up to Congress.

So Congress undertook to raise the present \$1.35 minimum to \$1.40 on July 1, 1967, to \$1.70 on July 1, 1968.

And coverage would be extended for the first time to farm workers, bringing it up to \$1.15 an hour next July 1 and to \$1.25 an hour July 1, 1968.

But the bill would cover covered workers would start at \$1 an hour next January and go up in yearly increases to \$1.75 by July 1, 1970.

These newly covered workers would be employees of small retail stores, restaurants, hotels, motels, movie theaters, and other public places, and small telephone exchanges.

But the reason it is unlikely to become law this year is that it is caught in a quagmire in Congress, not the first time this has happened in this kind of bill.

Any hope of passage is out of the picture because the bill is in and out of Congress.

For example, the House Rules Committee, which is a kind of traffic cop who says what legislation can go up to the full House for a vote, won't clear it. This same committee has been a bottleneck on minimum wage bills before.

Organized labor strongly supports the measure. In fact, the AFL-CIO suggested the minimum be increased to \$2 an hour and that the 40-hour week be dropped to 35.

But the bill has been attacked by nearly every employer group in the country.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt asked for the minimum wage law in 1937. That was the year the Supreme Court, which had previously wrenched the piece of New Deal legislation after another, began a change of heart.

Until then the court had knocked out not only federal but state minimum wage laws, ruling that neither states nor Congress had the power to regulate interstate commerce.

But 1937 was a recession year on the heels of a depression. Congress responded to Roosevelt's request, but not without a rumble.

Today's minimum wage law is 25 years old.

struggle. The same House Rules Committee tried to strangle the minimum wage bill that time, too.

The full Congress finally approved in 1968 the Fair Labor Standards Act which imposed a minimum wage of 25 cents an hour, put restrictions on the use of child labor, ordered a 44-hour work week (later 40) for businesses in interstate commerce, and compelled overtime pay for hours worked over the 44-hour limit.

Nevertheless, while millions of workers benefited by this law, other millions weren't protected at all. In 1961 about one other million were included in the coverage.

The Supreme Court in 1945 upheld the wage-hour law, so after that it became simply a problem for Congress to increase the minimum and broaden the coverage as changing times demanded.

This, briefly, is the history of the increase in the minimum wage: It started at 25 cents an hour in 1938, went to 40 cents in 1945, automatically, and to 40 cents in 1948. In 1960 Congress increased it to 75 cents, to \$1 in 1962, to \$1.15 in 1964, to \$1.25 in 1965.

And in 1949 and 1951 Congress substantially broadened the child labor protection.

struggle. The same House Rules Committee tried to strangle the minimum wage bill that time, too.

The full Congress finally approved in 1968 the Fair Labor Standards Act which imposed a minimum wage of 25 cents an hour, put restrictions on the use of child labor, ordered a 44-hour work week (later 40) for businesses in interstate commerce, and compelled overtime pay for hours worked over the 44-hour limit.

Nevertheless, while millions of workers benefited by this law, other millions weren't protected at all. In 1961 about one other million were included in the coverage.

The Supreme Court in 1945 upheld the wage-hour law, so after that it became simply a problem for Congress to increase the minimum and broaden the coverage as changing times demanded.

This, briefly, is the history of the increase in the minimum wage: It started at 25 cents an hour in 1938, went to 40 cents in 1945, automatically, and to 40 cents in 1948. In 1960 Congress increased it to 75 cents, to \$1 in 1962, to \$1.15 in 1964, to \$1.25 in 1965.

And in 1949 and 1951 Congress substantially broadened the child labor protection.

### Getting into College Scholarships Provide a Way

By JOHN C. HOY, Dean of Admissions, Wesleyan University, Middletown, Conn. Written for NEA

College is expensive. But one need not give up hope of a college education for lack of money. Fortunately, where family resources do not measure up, scholarship assistance is available to the qualified student. But virtually all scholarships and other financial aid are firmly anchored to the "need principle."

Parents of a child seeking a scholarship should file a Confidential Financial Statement with the College Scholarship Service. The organization serves as clearinghouse for this sort of information for most American colleges and universities.

Thus, one application filed at the service's headquarters at Box 178, Princeton, N. J., will provide the personal financial information to back up a scholarship application for almost all institutions of higher learning in the country.

Applications are thoroughly processed by the service. Information received is computerized and "rated" on the basis of the family's long experience in appraising families in terms of the "need principle."

The resulting evaluation of financial need is forwarded to every institution in which the prospective student is interested. Each college admissions office has a financial aid specialist who will, if requested, review with parents the evaluation placed on their Confidential Financial Statement.

The following table will provide a rough-thumb idea of how much parents are expected to contribute from their income toward a son's or daughter's education:

This means that a family with an income of \$4,000 a year and one dependent child is only expected to pay \$380 toward a year of that child's education. But the family whose income stands at \$16,000 or higher is expected to contribute \$3,720 a year.

Actually the computations of the College Scholarship Service are somewhat more complicated. Other family assets besides income are weighed. And consideration is given to such extenuating circumstances as other educational expenses, insurance and retirement needs, debts, unusual or continuing illness and limitations upon the earning power of the parents. To repeat, a college education is expensive—scholarship help notwithstanding.

How much is the college tab? The following typical budgets for two different kinds of schools may help parents estimate costs more closely. Such information is always available in a college catalog.

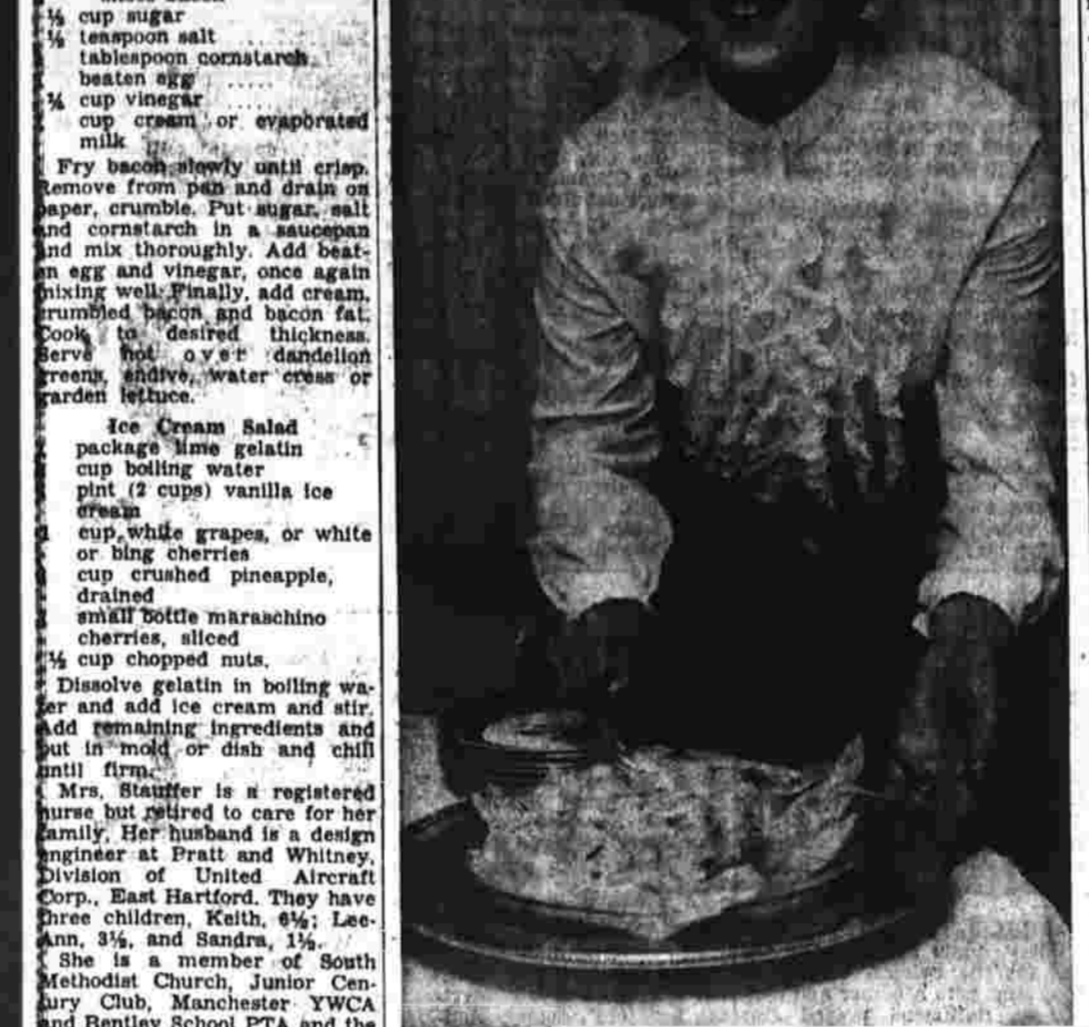
