The full Congress finally approved in 1938 the Fair Labor Standards Act which imposed a minimum wage of 25 cents an hour, put restrictions on the use of child labor, ordered a 44-hour work week (later 40) for businesses in interstate commerce, and compelled overtime pay for hours worked over the 44-hour limit.

Nevertheless, while millions of workers benefited by this law, other millions weren't protected at all. In 1961 about another 4 million were included in the coverage.

The Supreme Court in 1941 upheld the wage-hour law, so after that it became simply a problem for Congress to increase the miminum and broaden the coverage as changing times demanded.

This, briefly, is the history of the increases in the minimum wage: It started at 25 cents an hour in 1938, went to 30 cents in 1939 automatically, and to 40 1939 automatically, and to 40 cents in 1945. The possibility of reviving the practice of walking for pleasure aprung up last night as Town Planmer Joseph Tamsky put his idea of a network of walkways before the Conservation Commission.
